




Regensburg and the Scots - Alasdair Roberts




The Scottish Sword of State - Charles Burns OBE

The anniversary was marked with a reception hosted by the First Minister of Scotland and allows us to recall the historic links that Scotland had with the Papacy and continental Europe. It is well illustrated with colour plates of the Honours of Scotland.

Produced originally for the exhibition of the same name in 1982, it was fully revised with colour illustrations throughout in 2010 for the Papal Visit of Benedict XVI and provides valuable commentary on Scotland's relationship with the Holy See.

This unique presentation includes previously unseen cine film recordings of Blairs during its prime and looks at the recent decision to rescue and regenerate the Blairs Estate. 

This book is the first complete history of the Scots College Rome from its foundation to the present and marked the 400th anniversary. It fills a gap in Scottish historiography in presenting the seminal account of what is almost certainly the oldest extant Scottish institution on the continent of Europe.


Monasteries and the Reformation in Scotland - Mark Dilworth


Scottish Secular Priests 1580-1653 - Brian M. Halloran



This beautifully produced, new history of medieval Glasgow consists of eight chapters each written by a different author, among them David Sellar, Dr E Patricia Dennison, and Dr James Macaulay. It considers areas such as law, courts and people, the great buildings of early Glasgow, daily life, disease and death, and the role of the church. Professor Michael Lynch's introduction expertly draws the chapters together, and the timeline, from the 7th to the 17th century provides the reader with a useful reference tool.
