## I. NOTES ON THE LITURGY.

#### I .- THE FESTIVALS.

The Festivals of the Church are not all celebrated with the same degree of solemnity; the words Double, Semi-Double, and Simple, found in the Ualendar, show the degree of solemnity with which each feast is celebrated. The order is as follows: double of the first class, double of the second class, double major, double, semi-double, and simple. When the office is double, an entire Anthem is said or sung before and after each Psalm; when semi-double, only a word or two arc said or sung before the Psalm. A simple has only three lesssons at Matins. A feria is a week-day for which no Saint's Office is appointed.

The principal Festivals are doubles of the first class. Some Festivals have an Octave, or succession of eight days on which, with certain exceptions, the Office and Mass of the Feast are said.

#### II. -THE ROMAN MISSAL AND VESPER BOOK.

The prayers, and portions of the Holy Scripture, of which the Mass is composed, are partly always the same and partly different every day. Those that are invariable are contained in what is called the Ordinary of the Mass, at the beginning of the Missal. The parts that are changeable, or proper—viz., the Introits, Collects, Graduals and Tracts, Gospels, Offertories, Secrets, Communious, and Post-Communions—form the subsequent contents. As the Prefaces are not so frequently subject to change, they follow each other in regular succession in the Ordinary of the Mass. In the Calendar, in the first part of this Directory, the proper Mass for each day in the year is indicated.

If a double falls on a Sunday, the Mass of the double is said instead of that of the Sunday, unless it be a Sunday of the first class—viz., the First Sunday of Advent or Lent, Passion, Palm, Easter, Low, Pentecost, and Trinity Sundays—which are never superseded. The Sundays of the second class, which are superseded only by doubles of the first class, are the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th of Advent; Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima Sundays; and the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th of Lent. The Gospels for Sundays thus superseded are said at the end of the Mass, instead of St. John's Gospel; and a Commemoration of Sunday, by its proper Collect, Secret, and Post-Communion, is made after the Collect, &c., of the Festival.

The Evening Service of the Church is contained in the Vesper-Book. The following is the order of Vespers: Pater noster and Ave Maria being said, the Priest intones the Versicle Deus, in adjutorium meum intende, to which the choir answer by the Response, Domine, ad adjuvandum me festina, with the Gloria Patri; and when five Psalms, with their Anthems, have been sung, the Priest chants the Little Chapter. Then are sung the Hynm, with its Versicle and Response, and Magnificat with its Anthem, followed by the Prayers

and Commemorations appointed for the day; which, if it be neither a double nor within an Octave, are the Commemorations or Suffrages of the Saints, to be found after the Common Vespers for Sunday. All these Commemorations are indicated in the Calendar.

Every double has first and second Vespers: the first on the eve of the Festival, the second on the Festival itself. As a double is of higher rank than an ordinary Sunday, which is only a semi-double, it often happens that the Vespers are not of Sunday, but of some double that falls on it, or on the ensuing day, and in that case a Commemoration only is made of Sunday.

## II. THE ANGELUS.

In Catholic countries, and in many places at home, the Angelus Bell is rung in the morning, at noon, and in the evening at sunset to honour the Mystery of the Incarnation. To gain the indulgences attached to this Devotion the Angelus must be said kneeling, except on Saturday evening and Sunday, when it is said standing. In Paschal Time, that is from Holy Saturday at noon till the Saturday before Trinity Sunday at noon, inclusively, the Regina Cæli is said instead of the Angelus. This prayer is always said standing. Those who do not know the Regina Cæli may gain the indulgences by saying the Angelus; but it must be said standing during Paschal Time. For the convenience of the Faithful is appended a translation of the Regina Cæli taken from the Raccolla (p. 165).

Queen of Heaven, rejoice. Alleluia. For He whom thou wast made worthy to bear, Alleluia, Hath arisen as He said. Alleluia.

Pray for us to our God. Alleluia.

V. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary. Alleluia.
R. For the Lord hath risen indeed. Alleluia.

Let us pray.

O God, who through the resurrection of Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, has vouchsafed to give joy to the whole world, grant us, we beseech Thee, that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may obtain the joys of eternal life. Through the same our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

# III. INDULGENCES GRANTED TO THE FAITHFUL IN SCOTLAND.

An Indulgence is a remission of the whole, or a part, of the temporal punishment that often remains to be suffered for sins which, as to their guilt and eternal punishment, have been already remitted. For the effect and validity of an Indulgence, it is not only necessary that there be a competent authority in him who grants it, and a just cause or motive for the grant, but it is also necessary, on the part of him who obtains it, that he renounce and be sincerely sorry for all his sins, that he be in the state of grace,

and that he duly perform the conditions prescribed. Of Indulgences, some are called plenary, which, when fully obtained, remit the whole of the temporal punishment that remained due on account of past sins; others are for a certain number of years or days, which, when fully obtained, remit as much of the temporal punishment as would have been discharged by the performance of so many years or days of Canonical Penance.

The conditions for most of the Plenary Indulgences include confession. But for those who go to confession once a week, their weekly confession, if they remain in a state of grace, will suffice (Decrees of Sept. 9, 1763, and Nov. 15, 1841); and, by a Decree of June 12, 1822, a Plenary Indulgence granted for a festival may be gained if the confession be made a week before. Moreover, by a Decree of Oct. 6, 1870, it will for any Indulgence suffice that the confession, and also the Holy Communion, be made on the day before that which is appointed for the Indulgence.

The Holy See has been graciously pleased to grant to the Faithful in Scotland the following Plenary Indulgences, on certain condi-

tions after specified :-

1st, From the Feast of St. Thomas, Apostle, 21st of December, to

the first Sunday after the Epiphany, inclusively.

2nd, From Ash-Wednesday to the second Sunday of Lent, inclusively.

3rd, During the time appointed in each Diocese for complying with Easter duties.

4th, From Pentecost Sunday to Sunday after Corpus Christi.

5th, From Sunday before the Feast of SS. Peter and Paul to the Octave day.

6th, From Sunday before the Feast of the Assumption to the

Octave day.

7th, From Sunday before the Feast of All Saints to the Octave day. 8th, On the Feast of St. Andrew, and during the Octave.

The following are the CONDITIONS on which the Faithful may gain these Indulgences.

1st, That within the time prescribed they approach to the Sacra-

ments of Penance and the Holy Eucharist.

2nd, That on the day of their Communion they offer up some prayers to God for the happy state of the whole Church of Christ; for its Supreme Pastor, the Bishop of Rome; for peace and concord between all Christian Princes; for the exaltation and propagation of the Holy Catholic Faith, especially in our own country; and for the eternal salvation of all Christians.

3rd, That, if they have an opportunity, they visit within the limited time some church or oratory, and pray to God as has been

mentioned before.

4th, That, if their circumstances enable them, they perform some works of mercy.

## IV. INDULGENCE FOR THE LITANY OF THE B. VIRGIN.

On the 6th May, 1879, His Holiness granted the Apostolic Benediction, and an Indulgence of seven years on each Saturday, and on the Feasts of the Blessed Virgin, to the Faithful of England and Scotland who shall recite or sing the Litany of the Blessed Virgin in any church in either country.

## V. THE DEVOTIONS FOR THE MONTH OF OCTOBER.

For the October Devotions, prescribed by Decrees of 20th August, 1885, etc., the following Indulgences have been granted: 1st, seven years and seven quarantines each time one joins in the public recital of the Rosary and Litany of the B. Virgin (or, being legitimately impeded, says them privately), and prays according to the intentions of the Pope; 2nd, a Plenary Indulgence to those who, having done this at least ten times, confess and communicate; 3rd, a Plenary Indulgence to all who, on the Feast of the Rosary or within the Octave, confess, communicate, and pray in some church to God and the B. Virgin according to the intention of His Holiness; 4th, seven years and seven quarantines, each time, for the recital of the prayer to St. Joseph enjoined by the Encyclical of 15th August, 1889.

Prayer to St. Joseph. Commanded by Leo XIII. to be recited every day throughout the Catholic world during the month of October.

To thee, O blessed Joseph, we fly in our tribulation, and while imploring the help of thy most holy spouse, thy protection also with confidence we crave. By that affection which united thee with the Immaculate Virgin, Mother of God, and by the fatherly love with which thou didst embrace the Child Jesus, we humbly supplicate thee to look down benignantly on the heritage which Christ Jesus purchased with His blood, and in thy might and

nower to succour us in our necessities.

Defend, O most provident Guardian of the Divine Family, the chosen race of Jesus Christ; keep us, most loving Father, from all taint of error and corruption; do thou from heaven, as our most powerful Protector, stand graciously by us in this conflict with the powers of darkness; and as of old thou didst rescue the Child Jesus in the imminent peril of His life, so now defend the Holy Church of God from hostile wiles and all adversity, and through thy never-failing patronage so shield each one of us, that guided by thy example and supported by thy aid, we may live in holiness, piously die, and attain eternal happiness in heaven. Amen.

N.B.—By a quarantine Indulgence is meant the remission of so much of the future penalty (poena) of sin as is the equivalent of keeping a Lent according to the strict discipline of the Church.

## Let us Pray.

O God, our refuge and our strength, look with favour on Thy people who cry to Thee; and through the intercession of the Glorious and Immaculate Virgin Mary, Mother of God, and Blessed Joseph her Spouse, of Thy Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and of all the Saints, mercifully and graciously hear the prayers which we pour forth for the conversion of sinners, and for the freedom and exaltation of our Holy Mother the Church. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

St. Michael the Archangel defend us in the day of battle; be our safeguard against the wickedness and snares of the devil;—"the Lord command him," we humbly pray;—and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, thrust into hell Satan and the other wicked spirits who go about the

world for the destruction of souls. Amen.

His Holiness, Leo XIII., grants an Indulgence of 300 days to all who recite these prayers as above.

# VII. ASSOCIATION FOR THE PROPAGATION OF

This Institution assists by prayers and alms the Missionaries who are engaged in preaching the Gospel. The prayers are a Pater and Ave each day. It will suffice to say for this purpose the Pater and Ave of our morning and night prayers, adding the aspiration, Saint Francis Xavier, pray for us. The alms is only one halfpenny per week. One member in ten acts as collector, and pays in the amount to another member, who has ten such collections to receive. Donations are likewise thankfully received. Two committees, one in Paris, and the other at Lyons, distribute the alms to the Missions. A return of the sums received, and of their appropriation, is inserted annually in the Annals of the Propagation of the Faith. This collection, to the reading of which each member is entitled, appears six times a year. One copy is supplied to every ten members.

PLENARY INDULGENCES.—On the 3rd of May (the Anniversary of the foundation of the Society); the 3rd of December (the feast of St. Francis Xavier); the feasts of the Epiphany, Annunciation, and Assumption—or any day within the Octave of these five festivals; the 29th of September (the feast of St. Michael); all the feasts of the Apostles; two days in each month, at the member's option; once a year for the general commemoration of deceased members; once a year for the special commemoration of deceased members of the Council, Committee, or Decade to which he belongs; at the hour of death, provided he invokes the name of Jesus. Children, who have not yet made their first communion, may likewise gain these indulgences. These and the following are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

Partial Inducences.—300 days every time a member attends the Triduum of the 3rd of May and the 3rd of December; 100 days every time a member recites Our Father and Hail Mary, together with the invocation of St. Francis Xavier; 7 years and 7 quarantines every time a member performs any good work in the interests

of the Society.

FAVOUR OF PRIVILEGED ALTARS,—For every Mass said in the name of a member for a deceased member. For personal privileges

and other special favours to Priests, see the Annals.

Whoever contributes at one time 200 francs  $(\pounds 8)$ , at the least, to establish a permanent fund—even though this sum should be immediately expended on the Missions—shall be regarded as a member in perpetuity and as such enjoy all the privileges and indulgences on performing the other conditions prescribed.

Alms and Donations for the Association are received in Scotland

by any of the Clergy.

## VIII. EASTER DUTIES AND INDULGENCE.

By a Rescript from the Holy See, dated 27th October, 1896, the Faithful of the Dioceses of St. Andrews and Edinburgh, Glasgow, and Dunkeld, are authorised to satisfy the obligation of the Paschal Communion, and to gain the Plenary Indulgence, on any day from the first Sunday of Lent to Sunday within the Octave of the Ascension, inclusively; and those of the Diocese of Galloway, of Aberdeen, and of Argyll and the Isles, from the first Sunday of Lent till Low Sunday. This extension is granted for a term of five years.

## IX. FAST AND ABSTINENCE DAYS, AND LENTEN INDULT.

I .- FAST DAYS ON ONE MEAL.

1st, All the days in Lent except Sundays.
2nd, The Wednesdays and Fridays of Advent.

3rd, The Ember-Days occurring in the four seasons of the year, being the Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays after the first Sun-

day of Lent, after Pentecost Sunday, after the third Sunday of September, and after the third Sunday of Advent. But if the 14th of September, or the 13th of December, fall upon a Wednesday, the Ember-Days of that season are kept the week following.

4th, The Vigils or Eves of Pentecost Sunday, of SS. Peter and Paul, of the Assumption, of All Saints, of St. Andrew, and of

Christmas.

N.B.—When a Fast-Day falls upon a Sunday, it is to be observed on the Saturday before.

#### II .- DAYS OF ABSTINENCE.

On which the Church prohibits the use of Flesh Meat.

1st, All Fast-Days, unless a Dispensation be granted for some

days in Lent.

2nd, All the Sundays in Leut, unless a Dispensation be granted. 3rd, The Fridays throughout the year. But if Christmas-Day falls on a Friday, it is not a day of abstinence.

## III.-LENTEN REGULATIONS FOR 1898.

By authority of the Holy See

## 1. For those who are bound to fast.

1. Flesh meat is allowed at the chief meal on all days, except Wednesdays and Fridays, Ember Saturday, and the last four days of Holy Week.

2. Eggs, milk, butter, butterine or margarine, and cheese, are allowed every day without exception, both at the chief meal and, in small quantity, at collation. [Butterine is now allowed through-

out the year.]

3. Dripping and lard are allowed at the chief meal and, in small quantity, at the collation every day in Lent except Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. [This permission is now extended to all fast and abstinence days throughout the year.]

4. Suet is allowed only when flesh meat is allowed.

## 2. For those who are not bound to fast.

1. Persons under 21, or those who on account of old age, bad health, or laborious employment, are not bound to fast, may eat flesh meat

at every meal on days when it is allowed.

2. On such days, persons not exempted as above, but obtaining a dispensation on account of weak health or the like, may eat flesh meat once only, unless dispensed also from abstinence.

## 3. For all.

1. On Sundays flesh meat, eggs, etc., may be taken by fasters and non-fasters alike at every meal; but fish and flesh cannot be taken at the same meal.

2. The prohibition of fish and flesh at the same meal applies to all days in Lent, as also to all fast-days throughout the year, and

is binding on both fasters and non-fasters.

N.B. The Holy Father earnestly exhorts the Faithful to compensate for these relaxations, granted for very urgent reasons, by other good works, and especially by almsgiving to the poor.

## X. MARRIAGES.

By the decree of the Council of Trent (Sess. 24, Chap. 10 de Reformat. Matrimonii), the solemnising of Marriage is forbidden from Ash Wednesday till Low Sunday inclusively, and from the first Sunday of Advent till the Feast of the Epiphany inclusively.

The decree of the same Council (*ibid*. Chap. 1) respecting Clandestine Marriages was extended to the whole of Ireland on the 2nd December, 1827; and was consequently in force thirty days after-

wards.

Marriage cannot be contracted by persons within the 4th degree of kindred without a Dispensation; and, if attempted, is invalid.—Spiritual kindred, contracted by Baptism or Confirmation, is an

impediment.

A "mixed marriage" (that is, a marriage between a Catholic and one who, though baptised, (Toes not profess the Catholic Faith) is unlawful without a Dispensation; and the Dispensation cannot lawfully be given unless for a sufficiently grave reason, and subject to the following conditions: 1. That all the children that may be born of the marriage shall be baptised, and brought up, in the Catholic Faith. 2. That the Catholic party shall have full liberty for the practice of the Catholic religion. 3. That no religious marriage ceremony shall take place elsewhere than before the Catholic Priest.

## XI. SICK CALLS.

All sick calls should be given in at the Priest's house at a timely hour in the morning. If this reasonable rule were adhered to, it would save the Clergy much unnecessary labour, and the people many disappointments, which they may justly ascribe to their own want of system.

On Saturdays, eves of Holidays, and other days which are generally devoted to the Confessional, the Priest should not, if possible, be called away from this important duty. Unless in cases of necessity, sick calls should not be made on Saturdays or Sundays,

when the Clergy have so many other duties to attend to.

It is the duty of the people to conform to whatever regulations may be made by the Clergy, on these and other matters connected with religion, in their respective congregations. All things should be done in order, according to the advice of St. Paul.

When the Priest is called to attend a sick person, everything that he requires for the administration of the Sacraments should be furnished as decently as possible in the room where the sick person lies—viz, a table covered with a clean linen cloth, on which should be laid a candle, a vessel of holy water with an Asperges, a small vessel of common water for the purification of the Priest's fingers after the administration of the Holy Viaticum, and a napkin for the sick person at the time of Communion. As the Priest generally brings the Blessed Sacrament on these occasions, everything should be so becomingly prepared, according to their means, as to show the great respect of the immates for Jesus Christ, and the high value they set upon the honour thus rendered to their house in the visit of their Lord and Redeemer.

While the Priest is administering the Viaticum and Extreme Unction, the assistants should devoutly offer up their prayers to God on behalf of the sick person, to implore that he may receive

those Sacraments with the necessary dispositions.

# XII. EXTRACTS FROM THE RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISION FOR THE RELIEF OF THE POOR IN SCOTLAND.

# Address—Board of Supervision, Edinburgh. John Skelton, Secretary.

The Board issued a Circular Letter, dated 3rd November, 1864, enclosing rules relating to the "General Register of Poor," and "The Children's Separate Register". Rules I., II., and III. provide for the mode of keeping such Registers by the Inspectors of

Poor in every Parish.

RULE IV.—"The Parochial Board of each Parish or Combination shall before the first January, 1865, name and publicly announce two lawful days in the week on each of which, during one hour to be fixed and announced in like manner by that Board, but not earlier than 9 A.M., nor later than 3 r.M., both 'The General Register' and the 'Children's Separate Register,' directed by Rule V. to be kept, shall be open to inspection at the office of the Inspector of Poor, free of charge, by any known Minister of any religious denomination officiating in the Parish or Combination, and on payment of one shilling on each occasion that he inspects it, by any ratepayer of the Parish or Combination giving his name and address in writing."

RULE VII.-"The particulars relating to each child required to

be entered in the 'Children's Separate Register' are :-

"1st, The name and the age ascertained or presumed. The date at which he or she became chargeable, and whether as an orphan, or as a deserted child, or as a child separated from a parent, or parents, and if so separated, then the reason for such separation.

"2nd, The Religious Denomination - whether Protestant or Roman Catholic-with the grounds for holding the child to be of

the denomination entered in the Register.

"3rd, The name, religious denomination, and place of residence of the parents, or of the last surviving parent of the child, so far as

these are known or can be ascertained.

"4th, The date of any minute of the Parochial Board or Committee thereof, directing that the child be sent to the Poorhouse or be boarded out, and when directed to be boarded out, the name, religious denomination, and place of residence of the person with whom the child is boarded, and date of removal thereto; and if the child be registered as a Roman Catholic then the date of intimation sent, in terms of the Board of Supervision's Minute of 13th February, 1862, to the priest of that faith residing nearest to the place where the child is to be boarded. Also, in like manner, similar entries with reference to every subsequent order for removal, and actual removal of the same child boarded out, from one place or house to another, or from the case of one person to another, from time to time so long as the child is receiving relief.

"5th, The date and the age at which, and the circumstances in consequence of which, the child may have ceased to be chargeable to the Parish or Combination, and the name, residence, and occupation or trade, of the person with whom the child may have been apprenticed, or may have engaged as a servant, while receiving

parochial relief."

RULE VIII.—"In every case in which an orphan or deserted child, or a child separated from its parents, is ordered to be sent to the Poorhouse, the Inspector shall state in the ticket for his, or her, admission, the religious denomination of the child as entered in the 'Child's Separate Register,' and the House Governor of the Poorhouse shall enter the child in the Poorhouse Register as of that denomination; and he shall cause to be delivered on Monday of each week to any known Minister of the religious denomination of any inmate, and who regularly visits, or has been nominated to visit the Poorhouse, for the purpose of instructing the children of this own denomination, a list of all such children then inmates of the Poorhouse, if he applies for it."

# EXTRACT FROM MINUTE OF BOARD OF SUPERVISION, 13TH FEBRUARY, 1862.

"Complaints having been made to the Board that Pauper children, whose parents were Roman Catholics, have been placed by the Parochial Board in Protestant Institutions, to which Roman Catholic Clergymen are denied access, and have been thus brought up Protestants, the Board therefore desire to remind Parochial Boards, that they are bound to take care that the education given by them as a part of the relief which they are required to afford to Pauper children, shall not be so conducted as to counteract the religious instruction which the parents, or surviving parent, may intimate a desire to give to any such child. In the case of children who have no surviving parent, the intention of the parents in this

respect must be inferred to have been to bring up the children in

the religious tenets which they themselves professed. "In order to acquit themselves of these obligations, Parochial Boards ought to place the younger children of Roman Catholic parents, whom it is desired to board out, in families of the Roman Catholic persuasion, when suitable families of that persuasion can be found in the parish, or within such distance beyond it as the Parochial Board may consider it expedient to send Pauper children. If no such families can be found and the parish has Poorhouse accommodation, then such Roman Catholic children ought to be placed in the Poorhouse, where the Roman Catholic Clergyman has access to them in terms of the Rules and Regulations; but if there be no suitable Roman Catholic family in which the child can be boarded, and the parish be not possessed of Poorh use a commodation, then special care ought to be taken that wherever the child may be placed, the known Clergyman of the religious persuasion of its parents shall have free access to it, at reasonable hours, for the purpose of imparting religious instruction; and the place of residence of every such child ought to be intimated to the nearest resident Clergyman of the religious persuasion of its parents.

"Where there is a properly conducted Roman Catholic school in the Parish, the child of Roman Catholic parents, who is boarded out, ought to be sent to that school, if it be within a reasonable distance of the Roman Catholic family in which the child is boarded; or if no suitable Roman Catholic family can be found willing to receive it, and there be no Poorhouse accommodation belonging to the Parish, then the child, which must in that case of necessity be boarded in a Protestant family, ought, if possible, to be placed with one which resides within such a moderate distance of a properly conducted Roman Catholic school as will admit of the child's regularly attending that school, and the child should be required to attend it accordingly."

## Education of Roman Catholic Children.

"The Board are of opinion, that although education is part of the relief which the Parochial Board is bound to provide for pauper children, that Board is not legally bound to subsidise, from the Parochial funds, schools of every different religious denomination to which any of the pauper children and the ratepayers may happen to belong.

"A parent, or if there be no parent, then a legal guardian is the only person who in the opinion of the Board has a right to determine what religious tenets shall be taught to the child.

In the case of children who have no surviving parent, the intention of their parents in this respect must be inferred to have been to bring up their children in the tenets which they themselves, or the last survivor of them, professed.

"The Board are of opinion that the Parochial Board ought not to object to pay for the children sent by desire of their parents, or legal guardians, to an existing and properly taught Roman Catholic school, similar fees to those which may be usually paid for pauper children at other schools in the same Parish."

# RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF POORHOUSES,

By these rules the following, amongst other, provisions are made:— The keeping of the Register of Inmates by the House Governor, and to enter therein the name, religious persuasion, etc., of every inmate.

RULE I. provides "that inmates who refuse to attend on account of their religious principles" shall be exempted from attendance at morning and evening prayers, and divine service on Sundays.

RULE II.—"Any regular Minister of the religious persuasion of any inmate shall at any time in the day, on the request of any inmate, be allowed by the House Governor to enter the Poorhouse for the purpose of affording religious assistance to such inmate, or for the purpose of instructing his child or children in the principles of his religion."

RULE LII.—"When a regular Minister of any religious persuasion shall request permission to visit members of his congregation who may be inmates of the Poorhouse, orders shall be given for his admission at such hours as the House Governor may consider proper; and if such inmates, or several of them, desire it, arrangement shall be made for assembling them in some convenient apartment where religious instruction may be given or divine service conducted with decorum, and apart from the other inmates."

Rule Lill. - No work except the necessary household work shall

be performed by the inmates on Sabbath-day.

RULE LIV.—No work except as above shall be required from any poor person, who shall be entered in the Register as professing the Roman Catholic religion, on any of the following days observed as Holidays in the Roman Catholic Church, that is to say, the 1st and 6th days of January, the 17th and 25th days of March, the 29th day of June, the 15th day of August, the 1st day of November, Ascension Day and Corpus Christi Day.\*

## REFORMATORY AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

## I. REFORMATORY SCHOOLS.

By the Reformatory Schools Act, 29 and 30 Vict., c. 117, section 16 (Aug. 10, 1866), it is enacted—

Christmas and St. Andrew's day (not mentioned in the above Rule) are Holydays of Obligation in Scotland, but the 17th and 25th days of March are not.

That the parent, step-parent, or guardian-or, if there be no parent, step-parent, or guardian, then the god-parent or nearest adult relative-of any youthful offender sent or about to be sent to a school which is not conducted in accordance with the religious persuasion to which the offender belongs, may apply to the court by whom such offender was sentenced to be sent to a Reformatory School; or to the visiting justices of the prison to which the offender was committed by that court; or to the justices or magistrate by whom the offender was sentenced to be sent to a Reformatory School (or justices or magistrate having the like jurisdiction); with request to send or remove such offender to a Certified Reformatory School conducted in accordance with the offender's religious persuasion: and the court, visiting justices, justices, or magistrate (as the case may be) shall, upon proof of such offender's religious persuasion, comply with the request of the applicant, provided-1, that the application is made before the offender has been sent to a Certified Reformatory School, or within thirty days after the arrival at such School; and 2, that the managers of the School named are shown to be willing to receive the offender.

## II. INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

By the Industrial Schools Act, 29 and 30 Viet., c. 118, Section

20 (Aug. 10, 1866), it is enacted-

That, if the parent, step-parent, or guardian-or, if there be no parent, step-parent, or guardian, then the god-parent or nearest adult relative - of a child sent, or about to be sent, to a school, not conducted in accordance with the religious persuasion to which the child belongs, states to the justices or magistrate by whom the order of detention has been made or is about to be made (or to two justices or a magistrate having the like jurisdiction), that he, or she, objects to the child being sent to, or detained in the school specified, or about to be specified, in the order; and names another Certified Industrial School in Great Britain which is conducted in accordance with the child's religious persuasion, and signifies his, or her, desire that the child be sent thereto; then the justices or magistrate shall, upon proof of such child's religious persuasion, comply with the request of the applicant, provided-1, That the application is made before the child has been sent to a Certified Industrial School, or within thirty days after its arrival at such school; and 2, that the managers of the school are shown to be willing to receive the child.

N.B.—With regard both to Reformatory and to Industrial Schools, when thirty days after the offender's or child's entrance into a non-Catholic School have passed, application for transfer to a Catholic Reformatory or Industrial School can be made

only to the Home Secretary. The following is the form of application :-

"To the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Home Department.—Right Hon. Sir, I, the undersigned, being the (state relationship, or, in default thereof, whether god-parent or quardian, striking out from 'and' to 'kin') and nearest adult relative, or next of kin of ......, an offender aged ..... years, not belonging to the Established Church, but to the Roman Catholic Religion, and now under detention in the Certified School at ...... apply to you to order, pursuant to the Statute 29 and 30 Vict., cap. 117, the transfer of the aforesaid ......to the Roman Catholic Certified School established at.......

"I offer the annexed proofs that the aforesaid ......belongs to the Roman Catholic Religion, and that the Manager of the

School is willing to receive the Offender.

"Signed this ..... day of ....., at ... ..., in the parish of ..... in the county of..... (Signature, or mark, of applicant).... (Description of applicant)..... (Place of abode).... Witness to mark (when applicant cannot write). (Signature of witness)..... (Description).... (Place of abode).....

Form of approval of Manager :-

"I, the undersigned, being the Manager of the Roman Catholic Certified School established at ....., hereby declare that I am willing to receive into this Institution the Offender.....referred to in the foregoing Petition.

Form of Certificate of Baptism :-

\* . \* There is a Catholic Certified Reformatory School for boys at

West Thorn, Parkhead, Glasgow.

There are Catholic Certified Industrial Schools for boys at 72 Abercromby Street, Glasgow; Slatefield Street, Glasgow; and Tranent; for girls at 74 Abercromby Street, Glasgow, and Nazareth House, Claremont Street, Aberdeen. The United Industrial School, Edinburgh, is expressly designed for Catholic boys as well as Protestants.

## XIII. THE PIOUS ASSOCIATION OF THE HOLY FAMILY.

- A. STATUTES OF THE UNIVERSAL ASSOCIATION OF FAMILIES CONSECRATED TO THE HOLY FAMILY OF NAZARETH.
- 1. The object of this Pious Association is that Christian Families may consecrate themselves to the Holy Family of Nazareth, may devote themselves to its veneration, and may set it before themselves as an example, honouring it in presence of its picture or representation with daily prayer, and forming their lives on the model of the sublime virtues of which it has given an example to every grade of society, and especially to those who labour.
- 2. The Pious Association has its centre in Rome, and its President and Protector is the Cardinal Vicar for the time being of His Holiness. Assisted by the Secretary of the Sacred Congregation of Rites, and hy two other Prelates chosen by himself, and also by an ecclesiastic as Secretary, he directs the Association in all parts of the world, solicitously providing for the preservation of its spirit and character, and for its continual propagation.

3. In every Diocese and Apostolic Vicariate, the Ordinary, in order to promote the Association among the faithful, will make use of an Ecclesiastic appointed by himself under the title of 'Diocesan

Director".

4. The Diocesan Directors will place themselves in communication with the Parish Priests, who alone have the power to enrol families in their respective parishes. In May of each year the Parish Priests will forward to the Diocesan Director, and the latter (under the orders of the Ordinary) will send on to the central office in Rome, the number of families newly inscribed in the Pious Association.

5. The Consecration of Families shall be made according to the form approved and prescribed by Pope Leo XIII. This consecration may be performed either by each family in private, or by the families assembled in the Parish Church, in presence of the Parish

Priest or his delegate.

6. There shall be a representation (picture or image), of the Holy Family of Nazareth in every enrolled family, and the members of each family, at least once a day, in the evening if possible, shall pray in common before such representation. For this purpose is especially recommended the Prayer approved by His present Holiness (LEO XIII.); and also the frequent use of the three ejaculations:—\*

Jesus, Mary and Joseph, I give you my heart and my soul. Jesus, Mary and Joseph, assist me in my last agony. Jesus, Mary and Joseph, may I breathe out my soul in peace with you.

An Indulgence of 300 days may be gained, each time, for these three ejaculations; and 100 days for any one of them. (PIUS VII., 28th April, 1807.)

7. The representation of the Holy Family may be either that mentioned in the letter of Pope PIUS IX., of holy memory, dated January 5th, 1870, or any other which represents our Lord Jesus Christ in the hidden Life which He led with His Mother the Blessed Virgin and with her most chaste spouse St. Joseph. The Ordinary, according to the decree of the Council of Trent, has the power to forbid such representations as are at variance with the idea of the Association.

8. Families enrolled in the Association enjoy the Indulgences and spiritual advantages granted by the Sovereign Pontiffs, as

indicated in the card of membership.

9. The Cardinal Protector with his Council shall draw up and publish a Regulation containing detailed provision for the better working of the Association, and, in particular, indicating its proper Feasts, the day of the titular Feast, the day of the annual general renewal of the Act of Consecration, the meetings to be held, etc.

# B. INDULGENCES AND PRIVILEGES GRANTED TO THE PIOUS ASSOCIATION OF THE HOLY FAMILY.

#### I .- PLENARY INDULGENCES.

The members of the Association of the Holy Family, of either sex, who, having confessed their sins, shall receive the Holy Eucharist, and devoutly visit a Parish Church, or a public Oratory, and there pray for some space of time for Our intention, may gain a Plenary Indulgence on the following days viz.:—

I. On the day on which they shall enter the Association, making their Consecration according to the Form approved by Our Congregation of Rites and given at the end of this summary.

II. On the day on which (according to the custom of the locality where the Association exists) is held the general meeting for the

renewal of the Consecration of the Associates.

III. On the following Festivals, viz:—The Nativity, Circumcision, Epiphany, Resurrection, and Ascension of Our Lord; the Immaculate Conception, the Nativity, the Annunciation, the Purification, and the Assumption of Our Lady; the Feast of St. Joseph (March 19th), the Patronage of St. Joseph (the third Sunday after Easter), and the Espousals of Our Lady (January 23rd.)

IV. On the titular Feast of the Association.

V. On one day of each month at the choice of the members, provided that during the month they recite the prescribed prayers in family worship before a representation of the Holy Family.

VI. At the hour of death, if (not being able to confess and communicate) they are truly sorry for their sins and invoke the Holy Name of Jesus either vocally, or at least (if they cannot speak) in will and desire.

#### II. - PARTIAL INDULGENCES.

I. The members of the Association of the Holy Family of either

sex, who, being at least interiorly sorry for their sins, shall visit the Parish Church in which the Association is established, or any Church or Shrine, and shall pray to God for the welfare of Christianity, may gain a Partial Indulgence of seven years and seven times forty days, on the Feasts of the Visitation, the Presentation, and the Patronage of Our Lady; on any day on which with contrite heart they say the prescribed prayers before a representation of the Holy Family in common family worship in their own family (which must be enrolled); and on the days on which they shall be present at any of the meetings.

II. They may also gain an Indulgence of 300 days, as often as with contrite heart they recite the following Prayer (in any

language) before a representation of the Holy Family:

#### PRAYER.

FOR DAILY RECITATION BEFORE A REPRESENTATION OF THE HOLY FAMILY.

O most loving Jesus, who by Thy ineffable virtues and by the example of Thy domestic life didst consecrate the Family which Thou didst choose on earth; in Thy clemency look down upon this household humbly prostrate before Thee and imploring Thy mercy. Remember that this family belongs to Thee, for to Thee we have in a special way dedicated and devoted ourselves. Look upon us in Thy loving-kindness, preserve us from every danger, give us help in the time of need, and grant us the grace to persevere to the end in the imitation of Thy Holy Family; that having revered Thee and loved Thee faithfully on earth, we may bless and praise Thee eternally in heaven.

O Mary, most sweet Mother, to thy intercession we have recourse,

knowing that Thy Divine Son will hear thy prayers.

And do thou, O glorious Patriarch St. Joseph, assist us by thy powerful mediation, and offer by the hands of Mary our prayers to Jesus.

Members who either through sickness or for any other reason cannot recite this prayer, may gain the same Indulgence by saying devoutly five Our Fathers and live Hail Marys with the "Glory be to the Father".

III. They may gain an Indulgence of 200 days once a day, by saying (in any language) the ejaculation—"Jesus, Mary, and Joseph enlighter are highly as and exercise 1".

Joseph, enlighten us, help us, and save us!"

IV. Members may gain an Indulgence of 100 days by working to promote the en olment of Christian families in this pious and universal Association.

V. Members may gain an Indulgence of 60 days, each time, by the following good works: 1. Devoutly assisting at the Holy Sacrifice and other divine offices in the Parish Church in which the Association is established. 2. Saying five Our Fathers and five Hail Marys for deceased members. 3. Putting an end to family dissensions, or causing them to be made up. 4. Endeavouring to bring back to the ways of salvation a family which has strayed. 5. Teaching Christian doctrine to boys or girls. 6. Doing any other good work by which the Association benefits.

All these Indulgences, whether plenary or partial, may be

applied to the souls in Purgatory.

#### C. PRIVILEGES.

#### I. -FOR ALL ASSOCIATES.

Masses said for deceased Associates at any altar, shall benefit their souls in the same way as if said at a Privileged Altar.

#### II .- FOR PARISH PRIESTS.

1. The Privileged Altar on three days in each week, provided they do not already enjoy that privilege. 2. The faculty (except in Rome itself) of blessing Rosaries, Crosses, Crucifixes, statuettes and medals, and of applying to them the Indulgences usually given by the Sovereign Pontiff; but only for members of the Association, on the day of enrolment, or on that of the solemn renewal of consecration.

FORM OF CONSECRATION OF A CHRISTIAN FAMILY TO THE HOLY FAMILY.

O Jesus, our most loving Redeemer, who didst come into the world to enlighten it by Thy teaching and by Thy example, and who didst will to pass the greater part of Thy mortal life in the poor cottage of Nazareth, in humble subjection to Mary and Joseph, thus sanctifying that Family which was to be the model of all Christian families: graciously receive this family, which dedicates and consecrates itself to Thee this day. Do Thou protect us, do Thou watch over us! Do Thou bestow upon us Thy holy fear, peace, concord, and Christian love; that so, by the imitation of Thy Family as our pattern and model, we may each and all obtain everlasting happiness.

O Mary, loving Mother of Jesus and our Mother, by thy gracious intercession make this humble dedication acceptable to Jesus, and

obtain for us His graces and blessings.

St. Joseph, holy Guardian of Jesus and Mary, assist us by thy prayers in all our spiritual and temporal necessities; so that, with Mary and with thee, we may for all eternity bless and thank our Divine Redeemer, Jesus.

## XIV. CELEBRATIONS FOR DECEASED CLERGYMEN.

By a rule immemorially observed in the Mission of Scotland, every Missionary belonging to it offered up three Masses for the soul of each Bishop or Priest who died attached to the Mission. In consequence of the greatly increased number of Clergymen, this

rule was modified in 1847 by the Vicars Apostolic, by authority of the Holy See, in so far that every Missionary was bound to celebrate thrice for those belonging to his own District, and once for those who had served in another District. Lastly, in virtue of a Papal Rescript of 20th June, 1879, the rule was again altered by the Archtoshops and Bishops, to the effect that every Missionary is obliged to celebrate thrice for a deceased Missionary of his own Diocese, and once for one of any other Diocese.

## XVII. VICARS APOSTOLIC IN SCOTLAND.

FROM THE EXTINCTION OF THE HIERARCHY IN 1603 TILL ITS RESTORATION IN 1878.

1. The ancient Hierarchy ended with James Betoun, Abp. of Glasgow who died at Paris on the 25th April, 1603, aged 79. After being subjected to the jurisdiction of the Archpriests and first Vicar-Apostolic of England till 1623, and afterwards to local Prefects of the Mission, the Clergy were incorporated into a missionary body by decree of Propaganda, 1633, and governed by the following Prefects-Apostolic—WILLIAM BANNATUNE (or Betlenden), 1653-61; ALEXANDER DUNBAR (or Winster), 1662-68, 1672-94; and JOHN WALKER (or Hoss), 1663-71. In May, 1694, a Scottish Vicariate Apostolic was established. This was divided into two Districts, the Lowland and Highland, in February, 1731; and these into three, the Eastern, Western, and Northera, by Papal Rescript of 13th February, 1827. This last arrangement remained in force till the re-establishment of the Hierarchy by the Apostolic Letter Br supremo Apostolatus apice, 4th March, 1878.

# Archdiocese of St. Andrews and Edinburgh.

Comprising Counties of Edinburgh, Berwick, Fife (southern part, to the right of the Eden), Haddington, Linlithgow, Peebles, Rochurgh, Selkirk, and Stirling (except Baldernock).

The See of St. Andrews was founded before 900; erected into a Metropolitan See by Bull of Sixtus IV., 17th August, 1472; and was vacant for 307 years, from the execution at Stirling of John Hamilton, 8th Archbishop, on 7th April, 1571, till the restoration of the Hierarchy in 1878.

# Diocese of Argyll and the Isles.

Comprising Counties of Argyll and Inverness (south of a line drawn from the northern extremity of Luch Luing to the junction of the Counties of Inverness, Aberdeen and Banff); the Islands of Bute and Arran, and the Hebrides.

The See of Argyll was founded about 1200, being disjoined from the Diocese of Dunkeld; and was vacant for more than three centuries. James Hamilton was appointed to the See on 14th July, 1553, but was probably never consecrated.

The See of the Isles (Insularum, or Sodorensis) is said to have been founded about 447 by St. Patrick, who consecrated Germanus, its first Bishop; was united to Man till the end of the 14th century; and was vacant for 325 years, from the death of Roderick Machean in 1553.

# Diocese of Galloway.

Comprising Counties of Ayr (South of Lugton Water), Dumfries, Kirkeudbright, and Wigtown.

The See of Whithorn (Candida Casa) or Galloway was founded in 397 by St. Ninian, Apostle of the Southern Picts; was extinct from about 803 to 1189; and was vacant for 320 years, from the death of Andrew Durie, O. Cist., at Edinburgh in September, 1558.

# PART IV.

# I. EVENTS, 1896-97.

17th March.—Laying the Foundation Stone of St. Patrick's Church, Dundee.

On Wednesday afternoon, 17th March, a notable epoch in the history of the Catholic Church in Dundee was marked when the foundation stone of the new church to be erected in Arthurstone Terrace and dedicated to St. Patrick, was laid by his Lordship Dr. Smith, Bishop of Dunkeld. Notwithstanding the extremely inclement nature of the weather, not only the enclosure where the ceremony took place, but all the approaches thereto were crowded with those anxious to witness the solemn function. Besides his Lordship the Bishop, the Right Rev. Mgr. Clapperton, and a few of the Very Rev. Canons, a large body of the diocesan clergy were present.

About four o'clock the bishop, followed by the clergy and preceded by the acolytes, entered the enclosure and took up position at the spot where the foundation stone was to be placed. Having sprinkled the spot with holy water, a psalm and antiphon were sung by the priests and choir, and subsequently his Lordship blessed the foundation stone and engraved on each face of it the sign of the cross. Psalm cxxvi. having been recited the bishop touched the stone, which was hanging suspended over the cavity prepared for it, and it was then lowered slowly into its place. Finally the blessings of the foundations of the church took place,

and the concluding prayers were chanted.

Very Rev. Canon Phelan, then addressing those assembled, said that the bishop had very prudently dispensed him from the duty of speaking on that occasion, but he just desired to say one word. In sunshine and in storm the work of God went on, and let them hope that those showers now descending from the clouds of heaven might be a figure and a sign of those plentiful showers of grace and benediction that would descend from the Father of all good things upon the work commenced this day. The erection of another Catholic church where men would be gathered together to worship the Heavenly Father, where the waters of life would break forth as in a desert place, where the

saving maxims of the Gospel would be preached and souls find rest and comfort and peace and loving welcome, where our Lord Himself shall dwell and the bread of life be distributed -such an occasion must be a source of joy and happiness and consolation to them as Catholics, and must also be a benefit and a distinct gain to the community in which they lived. It was not only this, but it was also for them a monument to the self-sacrifice and self-denial of their people, with whom love of religion and sacrifice for religion's sake was a national tradition. It was alsoand they gloried in it—a monument to their undying faith in the glorious and beloved patron in heaven, St. Patrick. How proud they should feel that they were spared to do this work! Many and many loved ones belonging to them, whose hearts were now silent and had gone down to the grave, had longed for the privilege that they had on that day enjoyed, of assisting in the raising of a church dedicated to Ireland's patron saint there in that city of Dundee. Let them hope that it would not be a mere idle monument in the city in whose prosperity they rejoiced, in whose rapid advance they gloried. Let them hope that it might not be a mere idle ornament to their city, but that it might be the centre and source of truth and love and benediction to those around them. They would, he was sure, not only do this, but with the help and co-operation of their beloved pastor, Canon Butti, and by their prayers and edifying lives they would teach the manly Scot around them to respect and love their faith

Underneath the foundation stone was placed a bottle containing a medal of Pope Leo XIII., a jubilee medal of Queen Victoria, and copies of the Dundee Advertiser, Dundee Courier, Dundee Catholic Herald. A copy of the following document ac-

companied the foregoing articles :-

Before and after the ceremony selections of sacred music were played by the volunteer hand, and a choir selected from the different choirs in the city assisted in the rendering of the psalms.—Catholic Herald.

21st April.—Laying Foundation Stone of the Convent, Lawside, Dundee.

Something like four years ago the initiation of what was intended to become in later years a convent and House of Mercy took place, when the foundation stone of the present convent at Lawside, Dundee, was formally laid by his Lordship Dr. Smith. During the interval which has since elapsed the good Sisters have been diligent in their work of procuring the necessary funds for the completion of the building, with the result that on Wednesday last the foundation stone of the House of Mercy was laid in the presence of a large and deeply interested audience. The ceremony was performed by Lady Chrichton Steuart and was presided over by his Lordship Dr. Smith, assisted by a number of the clergy of the diocese. Previous to laying of the stone a procession representative of the Guilds of the Immaculate Conception and Holy Angels, together with the Society of St, Vincent de Paul, walked through the convent grounds to the scene of the ceremony, chanting a new hymn in honour of St. Margaret. Queen of Scotland, under whose special patronage the new house is to be dedicated. The processionists were preceded by a beautiful banner of Scotland's saintly queen. A discourse incidental to the ceremony was delivered by the Very Rev. Canon Phelan. During the proceedings the band attached to the Mars Training Ship, and consisting of about forty young boys, discoursed appropriate selections.

## 13th June.—Re-Opening of St. Mungo's Church, Glasgow.

The solemn reopening of St. Mungo's Church, Glasgow, took place on Sunday, 13th June. The decorations and alterations now make the sacred edifice one of the handsomest in the west of Scotland. On Sunday forenoon, Pontifical High Mass was celebrated in presence of Bishop Maguire. Father Beyaert was celebrant, Father Bonaventure, C.P., deacon, and Father Christopher, C.P., sub-deacon. Father Arthur, C.P., was master of ceremonies. Bishop Maguire was attended by Canon Cameron and Father Gregory, Provincial of the Passionist Order. The congregation was so large that it filled every part of the spacious church, and many had to be content with seats in the passages. The music of the Mass was Lambilotte's in D, and was magnificently rendered by the choir.

At the conclusion of the first Gospel, Bishop Maguire delivered the sermon.—Glasgow Observer.

#### 15th June.—Pilgrimage to Iona.

Thirteen hundred years ago Columba, in company with twelve evangelists, crossed over from Ireland for the purpose of converting the heathen in northern latitudes, and found a landing on Iona, and for nigh a thousand years did the light they kindled remain uneclipsed. In these remote ages the learned, the pious, princes and warriors, the poor and the stricken, all turned towards Iona for counsel, for absolution and for refuge. Though for a different purpose, yet in a reverential spirit, thousands of Christians all over the world to-day make their visit to thit hallowed and, in some respects, uniquely picturesque spot. Is was fitting that Catholics should commemorate the death of this great Catholic saint by a pilgrimage to the scene of his grandest life-work and the last upon which he closed his eyes for ever. As previously arranged, a large and representative body of Catholics, clergy and laity, numbering between five and six hundred, left Oban on Tuesday morning in fine weather by the swift and comfortable steamer (trenadier, and after a couple of hours' sail on Atlantic waters the island was safely reached. As the landing is affected by means of boats, it took some time before the large company were all ashore. The Cathedral erected on the island some centuries after the death of St. Columba is new a ruin, although still a prominent object in the landscape. It was on this special occasion partly roofed over and otherwise temporarily restored. Some of the mouldering parts of the stonework were covered with screens, and a beautiful altar had been erected, and otherwise the place looked quite transformed.

The Right Rev. Bishop Smith, of Argyll and the Isles, had proceeded to the island the day previous, and awaited the arrival of the pilgrims. In landing the party was divided into two sections. Some of the company were ferried from the shore to the landing-place by the Benedictine monks of Fort Augustus. On the way to the Cathedral the company walked bare headed, and hymns were sung. When all had been assembled within the Cathedral walls the scene was exceedingly effective and picturesque and full of colour, while the odour of incense floated all around. Among those present were the Right Rev. H. Macdonald, C.SS.R., Bishop of Aberdeen; Very Rev. Canon Chisholm, of Blairs; Rev. J. Canon MacDonald, of Paisley; Canon Holder, Dundee, etc. Among the laity were Lord Ralph and Lady Kerr and Lord Lovat. A good many of the pilgrims belonged to Edinburgh, Glasgow and Dundee. Pontifical Mass having been celebrated by Bishop Smith, of Argyll and the Isles, Archbishop McDonald, of St. Andrews and Edinburgh, preached an eloquent sermon in English. Taking for his text, "The just shall be in everlasting remembrance" (Psalm exi. 7 v,), he said these words naturally suggest themselves as we keep the anniversary of the great saint who in a distant age planted the standard of the Cross on these shores, and brought the blessing of the true faith to so large a portion of this country. Since then many changes have swept over the face of the land, but still the memory of St. Columba is fresh in our midst. In his

native Ireland Catholics are gathering in thousands to honour him in the places associated with his early life. We also in Scotland have a deep debt of gratitude to discharge, seeing that we owe to him under God the greatest of all blessings. England too will not refuse us sympathy and interest in return for the share which the sons of St. Columba had in bringing the light of faith to her northern counties. Even more, we have seen, and within these few days, an earnest company of our brethren in race, though separated in faith, holding a commemoration service in these ruins in honour of St. Columba, and rejoicing in the persuasion that by some kind of legitimate descent they are the true successors of St. Columba's disciples. Far be it from us to view their actions with an unfriendly eye. All who reverence our great saint should rejoice to see this revival of devotion towards him, and should hope and pray that it may help him to hasten the day of God's mercy when all with one heart and voice will see and acknowledge the true source from which the Celtic Church derived its holiness and its success. Here I would call attention to the various incidents recorded by the holy biographer of St. Columba. In the 35th chapter of the first book, narrating the visit of Bishop Cronan, he brings out incidently the identity of the belief of the Columban Church with the Catholic faith in the Sacrifice of the Mass and in the pre-eminent dignity of bishops. So again (III. book) in connection with the decease of Bishop Columbanus in Ireland, we have an example of the doctrine of the communion of saints as really practised by St. Columba, just as in 1146 we have a striking instance of the earnestness with which, after his death, his followers had recourse to his intercession and other anxious care in keeping his festival by "celebrating the holy service of the Mass". I refer to these incidents on account of the glimpses which they furnish of the faith and discipline of the Church of Iona, and we must remember that the monastic constitution of that Church provided exceptionally favourable conditions for the faithful and accurate transmission of the cherished traditions. Two facts tend further to show the relation in which the Church stood to the Holy See less than half a century after the death of St. Columba—first an action of the prelates of the south of Ireland in the difficulties regarding the eastern controversy, when they sought guidance even on a point of variable discipline from the See of Rome, "the Head of Cities"; and secondly, the missionary labours of St. Aidan in the north of England when the Columban monk and the Roman priests met in the announcement of the same doctrine and the dispensing of the same sacraments without a shadow of difference. To conclude, the feeling uppermost in our minds to-day must be one of joy. But our joy is not without a tinge of sadness, typified by these ruins in which we stand, because of the decay and desolation which afterwards, through causes into which time will not permit me to enter, overspread the land and led to the

fall of the ancient Scottish Church. But in that fall a remnant still remained faithful, and nowhere in such numbers as in the islands and glens hallowed by the journeys of the saint and his disciples. As his memory has never faded from their hearts, so we feel sure that his powerful intercession has been exerted on their behalf and, we hope, on behalf also of the children of those who, at least, in many cases more in ignorance than in malice, raised an ungrateful hand against his work. May his memory and the memory of all our national saints be ever fondly cherished. May the ancient prophecy ascribed to him be speedily fulfilled, that if his shrine is now in ruins, if where the voice of monks once rose in prayer, the lowing of cattle now resounds through its broken arches, the day will come when Iona, the joy of his heart shall witness the restoration of its pristine glory.

Father Campbell, S.J., preached in Gaelic. Afterwards there was a solemn "Te Deum," in which all present joined.—

3rd Sept.—Laying the Foundation Stone of Shieldmuir Church.

On Saturday, 3rd Sept., the ceremony of the laying of the foundation stone of Shieldmuir Church by his Lordship Bishop Maguire took place. For the occasion a procession was formed, including members of the different societies of the parish and from the parishes of Motherwell, Uddingston, Wishaw, etc. The societies represented were the Children of Mary, the League of the Cross and the Irish National Foresters. The procession, which wended its way from Shieldmuir to Motherwell, was well-nigh half a mile long, and favoured with brilliant weather presented a magnificent spectacle. There were several beautiful banners flying, and these, together with the music supplied by the Shotts, the Wishaw and the Bellshill brass bands, added considerably to the beauty of the pageant. Returning again, the processionists took up positions inside the church and awaited the beginning of the ceremony.

At the ceremony there were present: His Lordship Bishop

Maguire and a great many priests of the Archdiocese.

Every available spot was occupied inside the yet unfinished building. Every scaffold had its complement of onlookers, and when the bishop began the ceremony there was an immense crowd congregated. Inside the foundation stone was laid a bottle containing copies of the Glasgow Herald, Glasgow Observer, Catholic Directory of Scotland for 1897, MS. history of the parish, statistics of the school and parish. Having laid the foundation stone and completed the ceremony, the bishop delivered an address to the people.—Catholic Herald.

7th Sept.-New School at Crieff.

In 1890 a school was opened at Crieff in connection with St. Fillan's Church in the face of strenuous opposition from the local press and the School Board. It began with thirty scholars, and in 1895 it had over seventy; so that the schoolroom, which was small enough at the start, became inconveniently overcrowded. The schoolroom formed part of the conventual buildings, and there was no space for enlargement or extension. It was proposed, therefore, to build a larger school on a site near the church, and very much more convenient for the bulk of the scholars. This has now been done, and the school reopened its new premises on Monday with the same staff of teachers as were formerly engaged in the old schoolrooms at Strathearn Terrace. The very favourable reports which have been hitherto received from examiners must have been very encouraging to the promoters of this new school building, judging from the substantial and elegant appearance of the new venture. The building, which is of Dunmore sandstone, seems, says The Crieff Journal, to have been planned to suit the ground, and the appearance towards Cemetery Road is decidedly scholastic with the cross emblems, belfry and smart ventilating cowl, with the cardinal points attached to a vane rising from the centre. There are three entrance doors, one for boys and one for girls, and a separate entrance for teachers. In the boys' playground a shelter-roof is provided, which goes over the doorway and along the side wall of the cloak-room. The playground and shelter for girls is on the opposite side, and the shelter provided is much larger than the boys, which will serve for drilling purposes in wet weather. The main wing of the building goes to form one large hall 50 feet by 20, having a ceiling 16 feet high. A plentiful supply of light is provided by five large windows and two smaller in the gable. These gable windows are placed sufficiently high to give very efficient ventilation when wanted. The provision made otherwise for the inlet of fresh air and outlet of vitiated air is well seen to, and the system can be regulated to suit the season of the year. The heating of the building will be from four open fires. When necessary the hall may be divided into class-rooms by a wood partition, which is drawn out of another fixed partition dividing cloak-room and infants' room. The infants' room is situated on the side wing, and is divided from the main schoolroom by a passage. This passage is heated by an open fire, which will be of service for both cloak-rooms adjoining. Two well-mounted wash-hand basins are placed in each cloak-room, with a plentiful supply of water. A convenient and well-furnished lavatory is provided for the use of the teachers, also a retiring room on second floor over infants' room. Ample allowance is made in fixed and movable presses for all the requisites of an up-to-date school. As the main class-room is likely to be in demand as a music and lecture hall provision had to be made for the necessary platform. This has been arranged for in an ingenious manner. The framework when not in use forms a seat and the floor boards take the shape of a corner cupboard. The building will accommodate 130 scholars, and the estimated cost is £1000, which gives an expenditure of £7 10s, per head. The resident Catholics of Crieff are too few and poor to meet this heavy expense unaided. They have subscribed as liberally as they could, and Canon Crumly hopes that their efforts will be aided by the generosity of benefactors in other parts of the kingdom.—Tablet.

24th Sept., 1896.—Reopening of St. Andrew's Pro-Cathedral, Dundee.

St. Andrew's Pro-Cathedral, Dundee, after having been closed for the past six weeks in order that the interior might be repaired, redecorated, and generally improved, was reopened on Sunday. The work of repainting has been carried out on rich and elaborate lines, and has been designed in accordance with the best examples of ecclesiastical decoration, and in harmony with the building and befitting its importance. Special care has been bestowed upon the sanctuary, and the rich altar has been taken as the keynote for the tone and general effect of the surroundings. The ceiling is finished in pale blue, relieved with gold stars, a light and aerial effect being gained by radiations in gold and dark blue from the top of the cornice. The cornice itself is finished in soft tints, relieved with gold, and further enriched by a beautiful fringe worked out in geometrical forms. The walls of the sanctuary are coloured in buff, relieved in diaper pattern of gold fleur-de-lis. The rich colouring of the dado and responds—the former being designed in intricate arcading and ornamental ashlar work—is particularly effective. walls of the church are coloured in a soft sage green, the spandrils of the arches and along the top of the dado being relieved with free decorative stensil work, while the ceiling is coloured light buff, panelled and relieved by the main ribs of the roof, which are decorated with colour and relieved with gold. The spandrils under the front of the gallery have been treated in the same manner as the large spandrils at the roof. This work has been carried out with great care and attention, the workmanship and result being highly creditable to the contractor, Mr. J. Thomson. In addition to these decorations, the artistic richness of the building is further enhanced by beautiful representations of the Stations of the Cross in Gothic oak frames and by a handsome and richly-carved bishop's throne and canopy executed in oak, the back being relieved with scroll work in brass. decoration of the sanctuary is completed and still further enriched by handsome polished gas brackets. The oak canopy is being carried out by Mr. Bremner, Broughty Ferry. The Right Rev. Monsignor Clapperton is at present arranging to have the window beside the Lady altar filled in with stained glass from Munich. The whole of the improvements and decorations have been carried out from the designs prepared by Mr. T. Martin Cappon, architect, who is to be congratulated on the beautiful and artistic result. The services on Sunday consisted of solemn Mass in the forenoon, when the Rev. Father Malachy, C.P., preached, and of pontifical benediction, the erection and blessing of the new Stations of the Cross in the evening.—Dundee Advertiser.

#### 26th Sept.—Opening of St. Saviour's, Glasgow.

On Sunday, 26th Sept., the mission of St. Saviour's, the first of several new missions being inaugurated in the Archdiocese of Glasgow, was solemnly opened. It embraces the eastern half of St. Anthony's parish, Govan, and a small portion of the western end of St. Margaret's, Kinning Park, and the hamlet known as "The Half-way" on Paisley Road. The Catholic population numbers about 3000. The building itself is constructed to serve both as a church and school. The church, seated for over 700 persons, occupies the whole of the upper flat, the school classrooms being on the ground floor. The building is well lighted, well ventilated, and in winter will be heated throughout with hot water which is led through the building by an admirable arrangement of pipes. A handsome presbytery has been built, and is in harmony with the buildings round about, so that the new mission starts on its way fully equipped for the work it has to do. The cost is about £7000. Of work there is sufficient for two priests, and Fathers Emile and Louis de Backer, brothers, have been appointed, the former having charge. Fathers de Backer, before being appointed to St. Saviour's, had charge of the mission of Alexandria for ten years, previous to which Father Emile served for a time in two other missions. The mission of Govan rose itself from small beginnings. There have been but three parish priests since its erection, and the erection of the present church and school is due to the efforts of the Rev. Dixon-Swan, lately deceased, and the Very Rev. Canon McBrearty, the present rector. The history of the mission might be told by an examination of the schools, which have been added to three times, and each addition was thought sufficient to give accommodation for many years. The last addition was made some six years ago. There was a very large congregation on Sunday morning when the new chapel was opened, every seat was occupied, and the passages were blocked. His Lordship Bishop Maguire pontificated, the celebrant being Very Rev. Canon McBrearty, deacon Father Emile de Backer, sub-deacon Father O'Brien (Crosshill), and

Father Touhy (Govan) master of ceremonies. His Lordship was assisted by the Very Rev. Canon Mackintosh, Kinning Park. After the Gospel, his Lordship preached, and prefaced his sermon by a few appropriate remarks. His first duty, he said, was to offer his good wishes and congratulations, and also those of his Grace the Archbishop, to the people of that portion of Govan on that day. They were broken off from the other mission of Govan, and that marked a new step in the progress of their religion in that district and on the south side of the river. It was only a short while since, about thirty-five years, that Govan itself was made a separate mission. It was a pleasure to him that as a boy he was present at the opening of the mission of Govan, and he little thought then he should see that development and take the part he was taking in it. It was a happy thing for the Catholics of Govan that their religion grew so much in the short space of thirty-five years. His Grace the Archbishop regretted very much he could not be personally present, but he sent his best wishes and his blessing. His Lordship then preached from the words of St. Paul to Titus, "For the Grace of God our Saviour hath appeared to all men ". Lambilotte's Mass was efficiently rendered by Govan choir, under the leadership of Mr. E. Strain. -Catholic Times.

# 4th Oct.—Golden Jubilee of the Franciscan Sisters in Scotland.

The golden jubilee of the establishment of the Franciscan Sisters in Scotland was celebrated on Monday morning, 4th Oct., when Father Francis, O.S.F., sang High Mass. Father Macluskey was deacon, and Father Toner sub-deacon. Bishop Maguire occupied a seat in the sanctuary, his Lordship being assisted by Canon Condon and Canon Carmichael. Canon Macfarlane, V.G., was master of ceremonies. The pretty little chapel was crowded with the friends of the Sisters. Bishop Maguire, in the course of his sermon, dwelt on the good work accomplished by the Sisters during the time they had been in Glasgow. The music was Bauer's Mass, and was brilliantly rendered by a choir of Sisters. At the close of the Mass the Te Deum was sung. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament followed, and afterwards a general absolution was given.—Glasgow Observer.

# 6th Oct.—Foundation of a new Convent Chapel in Edinburgh.

On Wednesday, 6th Oct., his Grace the Archbishop performed the ceremony of laying the corner-stone of a new chapel in connection with the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor, Gilmore Place, Edinburgh. His Grace was assisted by Monsig-

nor Grady, V.G., as deacon; Canon Donleyv, sub-deacon; Father Whyte, S.J., assistant priest, and Father Shaw (chaplain to the convent) as master of ceremonies. Several priests and a considerable number of laymen were in attendance. At the end of the ceremony his Grace delivered a short address, in the course of which he made plain the necessity that existed for having a chapel in connection with an institution such as that of the Little Sisters of the Poor. His Grace alluded in eloquent terms to the splendid work of the Sisters among the poor of the city—work which had gained the sympathies and the help of not only the Catholics of Edinburgh, but also of those who were outside the Catholic faith. In conclusion he expressed the hope that Catholics would not allow themselves to be outstripped by their non-Catholic brethren in the support of such a charitable institution, and appealed for aid in the erection of the chapel. The new building will accommodate 250 persons, and cost about £3000.—Catholic Times.

#### 13th Oct.—Opening of Blair's New College.

The first section of the new Catholic College at Blairs, near Aberdeen, has now been completed at a cost of £8000, and on the 13th inst., it was formally opened in presence of a large gathering of the clergy from the various dioceses of Scotland. The proceedings commenced with Pontifical High Mass, which was celebrated by Bishop Macdonald, Aberdeen, who was assisted by Canon Chisholm, LL.D., rector of the college. The ceremony of blessing the new building afterwards took place in presence of the Most Rev. Angus Macdonald, Archbishop of St. Andrews and Edinburgh; Bishop Smith, Dunkeld; Bishop Macdonald, Aberdeen; and the clergy and students. Amongst those present were the Lord Provost of Aberdeen and several professors of the university. Bishop Smith having performed the ceremony of blessing the building, Canon Chisholm read the following letter from the president of the Scots College, Rome, conveying the blessing of the Pope: "Scots College, Rome, 6th October, 1897. My dear Canon Chisholm,-I have just returned from the Vatican, and hasten to inform you that Leo. XIII. most cordially blesses the new college, its rector, professors and students, as well as the members of the Blairs Society, assembled to inaugurate the new buildings. The Holy Father is deeply interested in the progress you have made in carrying out a scheme he had so much at heart, and hopes that New Blairs will do much for the spread of the Catholic faith in Scotland. While communicating to you his Holiness's blessing, allow me to say that I most humbly join with all wellwishers of Blairs in the hope that you may be spared to complete the work you have so auspiciously begun.—I am, etc., ROBERT FRASER." Archbishop Macdonald afterwards delivered a splendid and eloquent address. In the afternoon a dinner was held in celebration of the occasion, the chair being occupied by Canon Chisholm. The toasts pledged included "The Pope and the Queen," "The Bishops," "New Blairs," and "Blairs Society". In the course of the day a meeting of Blairs Society, comprised of former students of the college, was held, and in the evening the students who are now in session gave an operatic performance in celebration of the inauguration of the new building.





## II. ORDINATIONS.

The Rev. WILLIAM C. Brown was born at Shepherd's Bush, London. He went to St. Edmund's College, Old Hall, Waren, in September, 1884, where he completed his humanities in 1892. He entered St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, Glasgow, in August, 1893, and after following the usual course of philosophy and theology, he there received the tonsure and minor orders, on the feast of SS. Simon and Jude, 1896, and the sub-diaconate on 19th December following. He was raised to the diaconate on 3rd May, and was ordained priest by his Lordship Bishop Maguire in St. Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow, on Pentecost Sunday, 1897. He is now stationed at Rutherglen.

The Rev. John Joyce was born at Fountainhall on the 11th September, 1871. He began his studies for the priesthood in Blairs College, Aberdeen, which he entered on the 19th September, 1887. In October, 1891, he was transferred to the Scots College, Rome, where he studied philosophy and theology. He received minor orders during the year 1894. On All Saints' Day, 1895, he received the sub-diaconate in the College Church of Propaganda; and on Christmas Eve of the same year he was raised to the diaconate in the Church of St. John Lateran, and in the same church on the 30th May, 1896, he was ordained priest by Cardinal Parocchi. He returned to Scotland in June, 1897, and was stationed at St. Patrick's, Edinburgh.

The Rev. Thomas Joyce was born 12th October, 1873. He went to Blairs College, 1887, to Paris, 1891, and in the following year to the Scots College, Rome. He received the tonsure and minor orders at various dates during his first year of theology, from Cardinal Parocchi. He was ordained sub-deacon on St. Cecilia's, 22nd November, 1896, deacon about three weeks later, and priest in the month of May following, by Mgr. Cassetta. On returning to Scotland, he was stationed at Dumfries, and afterwards at Kilmannock.

The Rev. Patrick A. McCarthy was born at Feenagh, Co. Limerick, on 23rd December, 1872; studied classics at St. Munchin's College, Limerick; philosophy at le Grand Seminaire of Le Mans, Sarthe, France; and theology at St. Mary's College,

Oscott, Birmingham, and St. Peter's New Kilpatrick, Glasgow, where he received minor orders from Bishop Maguire in October, 1896, sub-diaconate in December of the same year and diaconate in May, 1897. He was ordained priest on Pentecost Sunday, 6th June, 1897, in St. Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow. He is stationed at St. Augustine's, Coatbridge.

The Rev. John McDaniel was born in Dundee on the 18th of April, 1873. He entered St. Mary's College, Blairs, on the 2nd of August, 1886, and having completed his course of classics there, was sent to study philosophy at the Sulpician Seminary at Issy, Paris. There he received tonsure from Cardinal Richard, Archbishop of Paris, on the 22nd of May, 1893, and the same year was sent to the Scots College, Rome, where he studied theology. Towards the close of the year 1894, he was promoted to minor orders, and two years later, in the Church of St. John Lateran, received the sub-diaconate and diaconate in November, 1896. On the 19th December of the same year he was raised to the priesthood by Cardinal Parocchi. Having completed his studies, he was, in April, 1897, called to Scotland, and appointed assistant priest in St. Patrick's, Dundee.

The Rev. Donald C. Mackay was born at Stronachavie, near Tomintoul, 2nd November, 1873. On 26th September, 1887, he went to Blairs, passed to the Seminary of Issy in October, 1892. and to that of St. Sulpice in October, 1894. He received the tonsure 18th May, 1894, minor orders 8th June, 1895, subdiaconate 30th May, 1896, diaconate at Christmas of the same year, and was finally raised to the priesthood by his Eminence the Cardinal Archbishop of Paris on the 12th of June, 1897. He was then recalled, and appointed as junior assistant to St. Mary's Cathedral, Aberdeen.

Rev. Andrew F. Murdoch was born at Blairs, 7th January, 1874. He entered Blairs College, September, 1887. Thence after five years he passed to the Petit Séminaire de St. Sulpice at Issy. In 1893, he was sent to the Scots College, Rome, where he received tonsure and minor orders at the hands of Cardinal Parocchi. In 1897 he was recalled to Scotland. He received the sub-diaconate in Aberdeen Cathedral, diaconate at Blairs, and was finally raised to the priesthood by the Bishop of Aberdeen at Blairs on 19th September, 1897. He was stationed as professor at Blairs College.

The Rev. JOSEPH B. PAYNE was born in Lochgelly, 14th March, 1874; entered Blairs, 20th September, 1887; passed to the Seminary of Issy in October, 1892, and to that of St. Sulpice in October, 1894. He received the tonsure from Cardinal Richard on the 22nd December, 1894, and minor orders on the 8th June, 1895,

from Mgr. De Forges. On the 30th May, 1896, he was ordained sub-deacon, and deacon on the 19th December of the same year. He was raised to the priesthood on the 12th June, 1897. He received all the major orders from Cardinal Richard. On his return to Scotland he was stationed at St. Michael's Linlithgow.

The Rev. Thomas N. Taylor was born in Greenock, 16th December, 1873. He studied classics at St. Aloysius College, Glasgow, and in August, 1889, entered St. Mary's College, Blairs. In October, 1891, he passed to the Seminary of Issy; in 1893, to that of St. Sulpice. He was ordained sub-deacon 8th June, 1895, and deacon 21st December of the same year. Raised to the priesthood by Cardinal Richard, Archbishop of Paris, on the 12th of June, 1897, he returned home and was stationed at St. Patrick's, Dumbarton.

The Rev. Stephen A. Thornton was born at Glasgow on the 20th January, 1871. He was ordained priest in Rome 19th December, 1896.





## III. OBITUARY.

MEMOIR OF CANON MACMANUS, received too late for last year's DIRECTORY. The Very Rev. Patrick Canon MacManus was born in Co. Fermanagh, Ireland, on the 5th Feb., 1822. At an early age he came with his parents to Edinburgh, and from that city he was sent to Blairs College to study for the priesthood. After an unexceptionally brilliant course of studies there he was transferred to Paris where he distinguished himself in the famed seminaries of Vaugirard, Issy, and St. Sulpice. was ordained priest on the 29th May, 1847, by the Archbishop of Paris, and on his return to Scotland in June of the same year, he was stationed at Creighton Mains, near Edinburgh. At this period large numbers of men were employed in the construction of the railway from Edinburgh to London, and the young priest was charged with their spiritual guidance. He served afterwards in different capacities at Edinburgh, Dumfries, Dundee, Bathgate, Stirling and lastly at Jedburgh. For the last twelve years of his life, or more, the canon had been suffering from severe illness and lived in comparative retirement. On the establishment of the Metropolitan Chapter, the late Archbishop Smith appointed him canon, and afterwards penitentiary. Though long expected his end was rather sudden. Canon MacManus was an eloquent preacher, a good classical scholar and a sound theologian,

His obsequies took place at the Cathedral. Father MacManus, nephew of the deceased, sung the High Mass, and Father McGinnes, Edinburgh, and Canon Holder, Dundee, both former curates of the canon, acted as deacons of the Mass. Nearly all the priests of the Archdiocese were present. His Grace the Archbishop gave the absolutions. In accordance with deceased's request there was no funeral oration. His body was interred in

the new Cemetery, Liberton.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. James Henderson, who died at Fraserburgh on the 28th February, in the 30th year of his age and the 6th of his priesthood.

The Rev. James Henderson was born in Keith on 12th July 1867, thus only being in his thirtieth year at the time of his death. He entered Blairs College on 31st July, 1880, and passed to the English Benedictine College at Douai in August, 1884. Hence he was transferred to the Scots College, Rome, in October, 1886. He received the tonsure from Mgr. Lenti on 20th Januarry, 1889, and the minor orders on the following Sunday. On 28th October, 1890, he received the sub-diaconate in the church attached to the German College, and the diaconate in the Basilica of St. John Lateran on 20th December in the same year. On 23rd May, 1891, he was ordained in St. John Lateran's by Cardinal Parocchi, Vicar of Rome. In 1892 he left Rome, and on his arrival in Scotland was appointed to St. Mary's, Aberdeen, where his memory and sterling qualities are still kept fresh. Early in 1893 he was appointed to Kirkwall, and in 1894 was removed to Strichen. From Strichen he moved to Frascrburgh to be more centrally placed amongst his charge. No more imposing monument will testify to his zeal, energy and devotion than the beautiful church he had erected in Fraserburgh. Indeed Catholic Fraserburgh owed a big debt to Father Henderson—a debt, alas! which can now be but repaid by prayer for the eternal repose of his soul.

The obsequies took place at Fraserburgh on Thursday, 4th March. Pontifical High Mass of Requiem was sung by the Right Rev. Hugh Macdonald, C.SS.R., Bishop of the Diocese, surrounded by a numerous body of clergy, and the sermon preached by the Rev. Jas. Macgregor of the Cathedral, Aberdeen. After Mass his remains were taken by rail to Keith, his native place, when on the following day High Mass was again sung. Thereafter the funeral cortege proceeded to the cemetery, where the concluding portion of the service was said by Father John Paul, the resident priest at Keith. The news of the Rev. Father's death came with startling suddenness to the clergy and people of the Diocese of Aberdeen. For the past year the deceased had been complaining a little regarding his health but not to so great an extent as to arouse in his friends any fear of a serious constitutional breakdown. On the day previous to his death, he had a rather severe attack of lung hemorrhage, yet his medical adviser thought a few weeks perfect rest would restore him to his usual health. A priest from Aberdeen was sent out to relieve him of his Sunday duties. During the course of that day it was evident that Father Henderson was gradually sinking. The last Sacraments were immediately administered to him and he quietly passed away about midnight, having retained his consciousness to the end and himself joining in the prayers for the "departing soul" .-Tablet.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. Andrew Fleming who died on the 15th April, in the 76th year of his age and the 47th of his priesthood.

The Rev. Andrew Fleming was born in Aberdeen on 30th October, 1821, and was the son of Mr. P. Fleming, merchant, a Protestant in religion. His mother was a daughter of Captain Johnston, Mains of Balquhain. He was educated at Robert Gordon's Hospital, where he proved himself an excellent scholar, and he afterwards entered the employment of Mr. Edwards, a wholesale merchant in Adelphi. While still under twenty years of age, he, along with several other young men, began to attend the lectures of Father Charles Gordon, of St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church, better known as Priest Gordon. The personality of this notable man seems to have attracted these lads, and his influence eventually effected their conversion. The enthusiasm of the young converts led to their resolution to enter into orders, and Mr. Fleming accordingly commenced his studies at Blairs College in August, 1841. Mr. Fleming, it may be mentioned, was the last survivor of that little band of converts, which included Mr. Alexander Monro, a compositor by trade, who abandoned the case-room, and rose to be Monsignor Monro. Provost of the Cathedral Chapter of Glasgow. Mr. Fleming went through his whole course of study at

Blairs.—Aberdeen Daily Free Press.

The funeral took place from St. Mary's Cathedral to the Snow Churchyard, Old Aberdeen. At 11:30 a solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated in the Cathedral. There was a fairly large congregation, among those present being a number of clergymen, who had come to show their respect for the deceased ecclesiastic. The coffin, which was of oak, was placed in front of the altar, and was surrounded by lighted tapers. The Mass was celebrated by Bishop Macdonald, assisted by Rev. James Macgregor, of the Cathedral, while Rev. A. F. Thomson, of Peterhead, nephew of the deceased, was deacon, and Rev. Professor Shaw, of Blairs College, was sub-deacon. The master of ceremonies was Rev. A. Grant. Among the other clergymen present were Canon Chisholm of Blairs; Canon Holder, Canon M'Intosh, Canon Tochetti, Canon M'Namara, Rev. John Ritchie, Glasgow; Rev. J. C. Meany, Glengairn; and Rev. Mr. Docherty, Dundee. The music of the Mass was impressively chanted by a choir of priests, under Rev. D. Chisholm, St. Peter's. After Mass Canon Chisholm preached the funeral sermon. There was, he said, a peculiar fitness that the Rector of Blairs should raise his voice in testimony of one who was so long and so closely connected with their national college, one whose whole life had been spent in its service, and one to whom the college was in a very special manner indebted. The life of a priest was, as a rule, an uneventful one. His connections and aims were centred round

his church, his school and his people. He had his duty in his morning Mass, that great act of sacrifice uniting God, the priest and the people, in a bond close, intimate and indissoluble, and he had his duty to himself in the recitation of the Breviary. In the daily exercise of those and kindred duties. Mr. Fleming led a quiet, happy life. He died at the advanced age of 76 years, 50 of which were spent in the college. His life might have been uneventful, but it was none the less useful. He had a great work to do, and he was specially adapted for it. He had charge of the temporalities of the college, and the fact that he was placed in charge of these when a young man about two years after his ordination testified to the high opinion his superiors entertained of his business capacity. They were fortunate in finding one so young who had been brought up to business before entering college. That the Bishop's choice of a Procurator was a judicious one, future events bore admirable witness, for he proved himself a worthy successor of Rev. Donald Carmichael, a wise, prudent man, who was looked upon by all as before his time and generation in his knowledge of agricultural matters. The improvements which he inaugurated, Mr. Fleming carried out to a successful issue. He used to tell that the estate had trebled in value during his time of office, and he (Canon Chisholm) was in a position himself to testify to the conscientious care and wise judgment which Mr. Fleming brought to bear on the charge entrusted to him, and which made it a comparatively easy matter for his successor to carry on the work. Mr. Fleming was born outside the Church, and received his early education at Gordon's College, of which he used always to speak in terms of affection. When a young man he fell under the influence of old Father Charles Gordon, who received him into the Church and sent him to college. When he (Canon Chisholm) went to Blairs in 1848, Andrew Fleming was head student, and was then studying divinity. Mr. Fleming was a man of strong individuality. He had a commanding appearance, and was singularly outspoken and straightforward. He had a big mind, a warm heart, and he held no compromise with anything that was mean or paltry or unbecoming a gentleman. He had a high opinion of his position as a priest. With him the priest was first and foremost, and if he had a pardonable liking for tracing his connection with the best families, it was from the feeling that the connection reflected credit upon the priest. Although his days were spent in the comparatively monotonous routine of college life, the management of the estate brought him into contact with men of the world, and by every one he was looked upon as a man of sterling worth and probity. The striking part in his character was his punctuality. He was a forcible preacher, and an example in that he delighted in preaching God's Holy Word. In conclusion Canon Chisholm referred to the sad circumstance that the funeral dirge was rising amid the alleluias of

the happy Easter tide. On the conclusion of the funeral oration, the service was concluded by the Bishop sprinkling the coffin with holy water and waving incense over it. At one o'clock, on the termination of the service, the cortege was formed, the clergymen in their robes accompanying the hearse in carriages to the Snow Churchyard. The final burial rites were performed there, before the coffin was lowered to its last resting-place.—Catholic Times.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. Walter Dixon-Swan who died at Rothesay in the 76th year of his age and the 48th of his priesthood.

Father Dixon was born in Dublin on the 4th of February, 1822, and was admitted into Blairs College on 30th July, 1839. There he received the minor orders, and being called to the Western District he was ordained in St. Andrew's Cathedral on the feast of All Saints, 1849, by the Right Rev. Dr. Smith, Coadjutor-Bishop for the Western District. He was first stationed in St. Andrew's, and from there he proceeded to St. Patrick's, Coatbridge. After a stay of two years there he returned to St. Joseph's, Glasgow, and two years later went to St. John's. In 1855 he went to Girvan, and in 1865 was appointed to the important charge of St. Antony's, Govan, which mission had been founded only four years previously. His labours in Govan bore abundant fruit. Soon the congregation of St. Antony's began to increase with the rise of the burgh. The mission was organised, schools were erected, and in 1878 a handsome new church was built to replace the building which had become quite unsuited to the necessities of the parish. Father Dixon laboured on until twelve years ago, when he retired full of years and honours, after the completion of his life's work, in the sixty-fourth year of his age and the thirty-sixth year of his priesthood. Seventeen months ago he had a severe attack of pleurisy, and received all the last Sacraments, and for several months was confined to the house. He was, however, able to go about afterwards, and said Mass every Sunday in the church until the beginning of last winter, Even then he was able to say Mass in his own house till about a month ago. Although previously not too well, it was only ten days before his death that he took to his bed. Father MacElmail, of Rothesay, administered all the Sacraments, and shortly afterwards the deceased passed calmly away. While in Rothesay, Father Dixon-Swan did not entirely give up his sacerdotal ministrations. He was always willing and ready to assist the priest at St. Andrew's, and when Father MacElmail was disabled he at once undertook his duties in the way of saving Mass, attending sick calls, and otherwise assisting. Father Dixon was of the family of Dixons, the great Glasgow ironmasters and coal owners. The funeral of the deceased priest took place at Dalbeth in the presence of a large gathering. Prior to the interment a Requiem Mass was celebrated at St. Andrew's church, Rothesay, by the Right Rov. Bishop Smith, of Argyll and the Isles. The funeral left the church for the 10-50 steamer via Wennyss Bay, and a large number of Catholics and Protestants followed, many crossing the Firth, and some going all the way to the cemetery. Bishop Smith officiated at the graveside.—Catholic Times.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. Daniel Donnelly, Strathaven, who died at St. Elizabeth's Home, Glasgow, on the 28th April, 1897, in the 48th year of his age, and the 25th of his priesthood.

Father Donnelly was a native of Greenock. After a firstclass preliminary education, during which he showed himself a very clever scholar, young Mr. Donnelly entered a lawyer's office in Greenock. But his leanings towards the priesthood were too strong to be resisted, and he went to Rockwell College. Tipperary, for the purpose of prosecuting his studies for the sacred ministry. There he remained for about ten years, and during his course of studies he distinguished himself in several subjects, and was in fact looked upon as one of the ablest students in the college. Subsequently he went to Paris, where he continued his studies, and received minor orders at the hands of the famous Archbishop Darboy. During his stay in Paris Mr. Donnelly was, of course, in the midst of the Franco-Prussian War, and he had several exciting experiences. On one occasion, when he was out walking with a fellow-student, he missed his way, and on inquiring was promptly arrested as a spy. Returning to Scotland, he was ordained in 1873 by Archbishop Eyre. After his ordination he was sent to Johnstone, where he laboured under Canon Chisholm with marked success. and also assisted greatly in the building of the church there.

A gifted musician, he organised in Johnstone a Catholic Choral Union, which made several very fine appearances in public. He was afterwards transferred to St. Patrick's, Glasgow, where he assisted the late Canon Dwyer. Subsequently he went to Blairs College, where he laboured as a Professor for a number of years with conspicuous success. Anxious to return to mission work, Father Donnelly applied to his superiors for a change, and as there was no vacancy in the Glasgow Archdiocese he was sent to Ratho, a village lying eight miles west of Edinburgh. For fully four years he laboured there, and it is sufficient to say that his memory is still green in the hearts of the Catholics of that district. Coming back to Glasgow, he was attached to St. Mary's, where he discharged the duties of chaplain to the Industrial Schools, at the same time fulfilling the duties of

chaplain to the Cemetery at Dalbeth. During the past seven years Father Donnelly has been in charge of the mission at

Strathaven, where his people were devoted to him.

A man of unusual culture, Father Donnelly led a very quiet life. Modest and unassuming to the highest degree, he performed the duties of his sacred office with a rigour and exactitude that could not to be surpassed. A model priest, he was a living example to his people, and his death at such an early age will be deeply deplored by a wide circle of friends.

The funeral service took place in the Cathedral, Glasgow, amidst a great gathering of priests and laity. Canon Chisholm and two of the priests stationed at the Cathedral officiated at the Requiem Mass in presence of His Lordship Bishop Maguire, who was assisted by Canon MacFarlane, V.G., and Canon Carmichael.

His body was conveyed to Dalbeth Cemetery, and reposes in the grave reserved for the priests of the Glasgow Archdiocese.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. PATRICK J. AGNEW, of St. Sylvester's Church, Chicago, who died on the 23rd July, in the 48th year of his age, and the 24th of his priesthood.

Father Agnew was born in Dundee in 1849, and passed his earlier course of studies at Blairs. From there he was sent to Douai in France, and remained at that famous college until the Franco-Prussian war interrupted his studies. He returned to Scotland until the war was over, and then going once again to France he entered the College of St. Sulpice, where he remained until he was ordained to the priesthood in 1874. Returning to Scotland in that year, he acted as curate in the Diocese of Galloway until he got charge of the parish of Dalbeattic. In 1882 Father Agnew went to America for the purpose of raising funds for the mission work of the Diocese of Galloway. While travelling in the United States he became possessed with the idea that it was there that his life's work lay. Returning to Scotland at the close of his tour he received the permission of his superiors to leave the Diocese of Galloway and to affiliate himself to the Chicago priesthood. This he did, becoming attached to the Cathedral of the Holy Name, where he remained until eight years ago, when he was transferred to the pastorate of St. Sylvester's, Chicago. When Father Agnew took up the mission it was but a small and unimportant one; but during the eight years that have clapsed since the beginning of his pastorate it has become, largely through his efforts, one of the most important missions in Chicago. The funeral took place on the Friday following his death. Archbishop Teehan officiated, and the funeral sermon was delivered by the Rev. Father Daniel Reardon, who was an intimate friend of the deceased. - Glasgow Observer.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. George Rigg, who died at Dalibrog, South-Uist on the 13th August, 1897, in the 36th year of his age and the 4th of his priesthood.

The following is a short account of Father Rigg's death and

funeral taken from the Glasgow Observer :-

It is with feelings of profound regret and deep sorrow we have to chronicle the death of this highly esteemed and much respected young priest, who, after a short illness of only a week's duration fell a victim to the dire scourge of fever before he had yet reached the prime of life. Day after day for weeks past Father Rigg had been attending cases of fever and nursing the patients from morning till night as no other person, not even the nearest relative, would venture within a gun shot of the infected houses. On Friday, 6th inst., he was confined to bed. Drs. Ogilvie, Grant, Lamont and Fletcher were in continuous attendance on him day and night, and notwithstanding that he had all that medical skill and good nursing could do for him, he succumbed on the following Friday, thus having sacrificed his own life to save the lives of others. His death has cast a terrible gloom over the whole district, and his loss will be keenly felt and hard to replace. The funeral, which was largly attended. took place on Saturday at Hallin burial ground. The procession was a sad spectacle to behold, and rendered still more touching by the mournful strains of the different laments played on the bagpipes. On approaching the burial ground the coffin was carried by the six neighbouring priests—viz., Fathers Chisholm, Barra; M'Donald, Eriskay; Mackintosh, Bornish; M'Rae, Ardkenneth; M'Dougall, Benbecula; and M'Kenzie, Barra. And there amidst his own sorrowing flock and members of all other denominations, his mortal remains were laid in their last resting-place. Father Rigg was a man of high literary attainments and a profound theologian. Besides attending to his own pastoral duties he interested himself in all matters affecting the welfare of the parish. Having been a member of the School Board, Parish Council and District Committee, his loss to these Boards will be greatly felt

Pray for the soul of the Rev. W. J. O'SHAUGHNESSY of Girvan, who died at Rutherglen on the 23rd August, in the 51st year of his age and the 28th of his priesthood.

Father O'Shaughnessy was born on 24th April, 1847, at Dalton, near Hamilton. After the usual elementary education he entered St. Aloysius' College, Glasgow, and in due course he passed to Blairs to begin his studies for the priesthood. In 1865, after spending several years in the famous old college, he was transferred to the Benedictine College of St. Edmund, Douai. In

the same year he entered Issy, near Paris, and there he received the tonsure in the Church of St. Sulpice on 16th June, 1867. He afterwards entered the College of St. Sulpice, and in June, 1868, he received minor orders. On 22nd May, 1869, he was ordained sub-deacon, and the diaconate was conferred on him the same year. Being obliged to return to Scotland in bad health, he was on his recovery ordained priest on 14th June, 1870, in St. Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow, by Archbishop Eyre. His first appointment was at St. Mary's, Greenock, where he was immediately sent. There he remained till 17th June, 1872, when he was sent to Girvan to take charge of the mission. In 1876 he built the church at Maybole, the edifice being opened the same year. Following that achievement he travelled in the United States collecting funds to discharge the debt on the buildings erected by him in the Diocese of Galloway. Returning to Scotland he was placed in charge of the mission at Ayr, and here he remained till the mission was taken over by the Bishop, when he was transferred to Galston, and subsequently to Girvan. Leaving Girvan he went to Nice in search of health. A short time ago his health, which had been anything but strong, entirely collapsed, the bursting of a blood vessel in the cerebral region bringing on a severe crisis, which while it lasted left his life in peril. Recovering slightly he went to the South of France in hope of recuperating, and there he remained till a few weeks ago. When entirely broken down he came to his brother's house at Rutherglen, where he gradually sank until death overtook him .- Catholic Herald

### THE CATHOLIC HIERARCHY

The Catholic Hierarchy, or the governing body of the Holy Catholic Church, consists of: 1. His Holiness the Sovereign Pontiff, assisted by the Sacred College of Cardinals, and by about twenty Sacred Congregations, or permanent ecclesiastical committees, of which the Cardinals are the chief members; 2. the Patriarchs, Archbishops and Bishops; 3. the Apostolic Delegates, Vicars and Prefects; and 4. certain Abbots and Prelates.

### I. GENERAL SUMMARY.

HIS HOLINESS THE POPE,

BISHOP OF ROME AND VICAR OF JESUS CHRIST,
SUCCESSOR OF ST. PETER PRINCE OF THE APOSTLES,
SUPREME PONTIFF OF THE UNIVERSAL CHURCH,

### SACRED COLLEGE OF CARDINALS.

#### PATRIARCHATES.

There are ten Patriarchates, with fourteen Patriarchal Sees; eight of the Latin Rite, and six of Oriental Rite. The greater, or more ancient Patriarchates, are those of: Alexandria, Latin and Coptic; Antioch, with four Patriarchal Sees, Latin, Greco-Melchite, Maronite, and Syriac; Constantinople, Latin; and Jerusalem, Latin. The less are those of: Babylon, Chaldaic; Cilicia, Armenian; East Indies, Latin; Lisbon, Latin; Venice, Latin, and West Indies, Latin.

This summary of Residential Sees of Archbishops and Bishops, amounting with the 14 Patriarchal Sees to 978, is taken from the official Gerarchia Cattolica, published at Rome, for 1897.

The number according to the same Gerarchia, of Patriarchs, Primates, Archbishops, and Bishops (including those who were retired, and Archbishops and Bishops of Titular Sees), was 1298.

Note.—Titular Sees, formerly called Sees in partibus infidetium (that is, in infidel regions), are, for the most part, assigned to Archbishops and Bishops appointed, either to Apostolic Delegations, Vicariates, or Prefectures; or to the office of Coadjutor, Auxiliary, or Administrator of a Diocese.

### II. THE SOVEREIGN PONTIFF.

### III. THE SACRED COLLEGE OF CARDINALS.

The Cardinals, as the advisers and assistants of the Sovereign Pontiff, are the supreme council or senate of the Church. On the death of the Pontiff, they elect his successor.

There are three orders of Cardinals, Bishops, Priests, and Deacons. These orders are distinct from those of the Hierarchy: with very few exceptions, the Cardinal Priests are archbishops or

bishops; and the Cardinal Deacons are generally priests.

The Sacred College, when complete, consists of 70 members: 6 Cardinal Bishops, whose dioceses are the six 'Suburban Sees,' near Rome; 50 Cardinal Priests, who take their title from the 'Titular Churches,' to which they are appointed, with jurisdiction and right to a throne, etc., therein; and 14 Cardinal Deacons, who are appointed to other churches called 'Deaconries'.

The first Cardinal Bishop is *Dean*, the first of the Priests is *First Priest*, and the first of the Deacons is *First Deacon*, of the Sacred College. The Dean has the right of consecrating, and the First Deacon the right of proclaiming and crowning, a new Pope.

On the death of the Pontiff the Cardinal Camerlengo has the

administration of the public affairs of the Holy See.

The 'creation' of a Cardinal sometimes precedes, even by several years, the 'publication' or proclamation. The Cardinal is then said to be 'reserved in petto,' and, when proclaimed, he takes precedence according to date of creation.

Of the 47 Cardinal Priests, 2 are Patriarchs; 27 are Archbishops, and 7 Bishops, of Residential Sees; and 11 others have received episcopal consecration; so that, including the 6 Cardinal Bishops, 53 Cardinals are Patriarchs, Archbishops, or Bishops.

#### CATHOLIC POPULATION OF THE EMPIRE.

The estimated Catholic population of the United Kingdom is nearly 5 millions and a half: namely, England, 1,500,000; Scotland, 365,000; Iroland (according to the Census of 1891), 3,549,956. Including British America (with a Catholic population of about 2,600,000), Australia, India, and all other possessions, the total Catholic population of the British Empire is probably about 10 millions and a half.

### POSTAL REGULATIONS.

#### INLAND LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.

When prepaid, not above 4 oz.,1d.; for every additional 2 oz., 4d. Inland letters must not exceed 2 feet in length, 1 foot in width, or 1 foot in depth, unless sent to or from a Government Office

#### LETTERS TO THE COLONIES AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

To all places abroad, the postage is 2½d, the half-ounce. For some places prepayment is necessary, and in a few places an additional charge is made on delivery.

### BOOK POST (INLAND OR FOREIGN).

½d. for every 2 oz. Book-packets must be posted, either without covers (and not fastened in any way), or in unfastened envelopes, or in covers that can be easily removed for the purpose of examination. *Inland* book-packets over 2 oz. in weight may be sent as letter-packets.

### NEWSPAPERS (INLAND).

For every registered newspaper, with or without a supplement, ½d.; but a packet, containing two or more newspapers, is not liable to a higher postage than would be charged on a book-packet or letter of the same weight. Every packet must be open at both ends, and must have no enclosure, except its supplement or supplements. To places abroad, the postage is ½d. for every 2 oz.

#### UNPAID

inland letters, book-packets and newspapers are charged with double postage, and if insufficiently stamped, with double the deficiency.

#### REGISTRATION.

Prepaid letters, newspapers, and book-packets may be registered for the United Kingdom, and for almost all places abroad, for a fee of 2d.

### PARCEL POST (INLAND).

The greatest length allowed is 3 feet 6 inches, the greatest length and girth combined, 6 feet. The greatest weight allowed is 11 lbs. The rates are: not above 1 lb., 3d.; and 1d. for every additional pound, or part of 1 lb.; but for 11 as well as 10 lbs. the charge is 1s. There is also a *Foreign and Colonial* Parcel Post.

#### MONEY ORDERS.

For inland money orders the charge is: for sums not exceeding £1, 2d.; above £1 and not exceeding £3, 3d.; above £3, and not exceeding £10, 4d.

#### POSTAL ORDERS

are issued for 1s., 1s. 6d., 2s., 2s. 6d., 3s., 3s. 6d., 4s., 4s. 6d., 5s., 7s. 6d., 10s., 10s. 6d., 15s., 20s. For broken amounts, postage stamps, not exceeding 5d. in value, may be affixed to the face of any postal order.

When the original Inventory was recorded after 1st June, 1881, the 44 Vict. Cap. 12, Sec. 41, provides that the one per cent. Legacy and Succession Duty payable by children and others, under the Legacy and Succession Duty Act, is not payable in respect of any personal property included in the Inventory, and on which the Stamp duty has been paid (Sec. 41). This does not apply to Legacies or Successions out of heritable property or out of foreign assets, or to heritable property; nor does it apply to the duties payable by the other relatives of the deceased or strangers in blood: the Legacy and Succession Duties payable by those persons remain the same.

Sec. 42 of the above Act charges pecuniary legacies and shares of residue below £20 in value, where the deceased died on or after 1st June, 1881, with the duty imposed by the Legacy Duty Acts, subject to the relief granted by Sec. 13 of the 43 Vict. Cap. 14, and "as modified by this Act" (See Secs. 33 and 36).

Sec. 38, Sub Section 2, charges with duty "any property taken as a donatio mortis causa made by any person dying ou or after the 1st day of June, 1881, or taken under a voluntary disposition, made by any person so dying, purporting to operate as an immediate gift inter vivos whether by way of transfer, delivery, declaration of trust or otherwise, which shall not have been bona fide made three months before the death of the deceased".

This applies only to lawful children of the deceased, illegitimate children being subject to Duty at the rate of 10 per cent.

Sec. 11 of 52 Vict. Cap. 7, amends Sub-Sec. 2 of Section 38 of 44 Vict. Cap. 12, by substituting "twelve" months in place of "three" months before the death of the deceased, and "the description of property shall include property taken under any gift whenever made, of which property bona fide possession and enjoyment shall not have been assumed by the donee immediately upon the gift and thenceforward retained to the entire exclusion of the donor, or of any benefit to him by contract or otherwise".

The main object of this College is to educate and train for the Priesthood those who may feel themselves called to dedicate themselves to God and the salvation of souls as Clergymen on the Scottish Mission. To this object all its funds are applied.

Students are received on Burses and as Boarders. The Terms for College Bursars are £30 entrance money, payable £20 first year, and £5 each year for the two following years. For Boarders the Terms are £40 the first year, and £45 for each succeeding year. The requisite outfit comprises, two suits of tweed of the pattern known as parson grey (small boys may come in knickerbockers), two pairs of strong shoes, one pair slippers, the usual underclothing for day and night use, flannels, stockings and towels, a warm overcoat for winter. The Course of Education comprises all that is usually taught in Colleges.

Henceforward Students will not be admitted before their fourteenth year. They must bring with them a certificate showing that they either have passed in the Sixth Standard, or have satisfactorily stood an examination in religious and secular knowledge equivalent to that required in the Sixth Standard. The time of entry is fixed for the 3rd of September. Classes are taken up on the 4th of September, and all Students must be in the College by that date. The greatest care is taken of their health; strict attention is paid to their comfort, and they are attended by a Medical Gentleman as often as occasion may require. Parents are requested not to send boxes containing sweets or confectionery except during the Christmas and Easter Holidays.
