I. NOTES ON THE LITURGY.

I.—THE FESTIVALS.

The Festivals of the Church are not all celebrated with the same degree of solemnity; the words *Double*, *Semi-Double*, and *Simple*, found in the Calendar, show the degree of solemnity with which each feast is celebrated. The order is as follows: *double of the first class*, *double of the second class*, *double major*, *double*, *semi-double*, and *simple*. When the office is *double*, an entire Anthem is said or sung before and after each Psalm; when *semi-double*, only a word or two are said or sung before the Psalm. A *simple* has only three lessons at Matins. A *feria* is a week-day for which no Saint's Office is appointed.

The principal Festivals are *doubles of the first class*. Some Festivals have an Octave, or succession of eight days on which, with certain exceptions, the Office and Mass of the Feast are said.

II.—THE ROMAN MISSAL AND VESPER BOOK.

The prayers, and portions of the Holy Scripture, of which the Mass is composed, are partly always the same and partly different every day. Those that are invariable are contained in what is called the *Ordinary* of the Mass, at the beginning of the Missal. The parts that are changeable, or *proper*—*viz.*, the *Introits*, *Collects*, *Graduals* and *Tracts*, *Gospels*, *Offertories*, *Secrets*, *Communions*, and *Post-Communions*—form the subsequent contents. As the *Prefaces* are not so frequently subject to change, they follow each other in regular succession in the *Ordinary* of the Mass. In the Calendar, in the first part of this Directory, the proper Mass for each day in the year is indicated.

If a double falls on a Sunday, the Mass of the double is said instead of that of the Sunday, unless it be a Sunday of the *first class*—*viz.*, the First Sunday of Advent or Lent, Passion, Palm, Easter, Low, Pentecost, and Trinity Sundays—which are never superseded. The Sundays of the *second class*, which are superseded only by doubles of the *first class*, are the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th of Advent; Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima Sundays; and the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th of Lent. The Gospels for Sundays thus superseded are said at the end of the Mass, instead of St. John's Gospel; and a Commemoration of Sunday, by its proper *Collect*, *Secret*, and *Post-Communion*, is made after the *Collect*, &c., of the Festival.

The Evening Service of the Church is contained in the Vesper-Book. The following is the order of Vespers: *Pater noster* and *Ave Maria* being said, the Priest intones the Versicle *Deus, in adjutorium meum intende*, to which the choir answer by the Response, *Domine, ad adjuvandum me festina*, with the *Gloria Patri*; and when five Psalms, with their Anthems, have been sung, the Priest chants the *Little Chapter*. Then are sung the Hymn, with its Versicle and Response, and *Magnificat* with its Anthem, followed by the Prayers

and Commemorations appointed for the day; which, if it be neither a double nor within an Octave, are the Commemorations or *Suffrages* of the Saints, to be found after the Common Vespers for Sunday. All these Commemorations are indicated in the Calendar.

Every double has *first* and *second* Vespers: the *first* on the eve of the Festival, the *second* on the Festival itself. As a double is of higher rank than an ordinary Sunday, which is only a semi-double, it often happens that the Vespers are not of Sunday, but of some double that falls on it, or on the ensuing day, and in that case a Commemoration only is made of Sunday.

II. THE ANGELUS.

In Catholic countries, and in many places at home, the Angelus Bell is rung in the morning, at noon, and in the evening at sunset to honour the Mystery of the Incarnation. To gain the indulgences attached to this Devotion the Angelus must be said *kneeling*, except on Saturday evening and Sunday, when it is said *standing*. In Paschal Time, that is from Holy Saturday at noon till the Saturday before Trinity Sunday at noon, inclusively, the *Regina Cœli* is said instead of the Angelus. This prayer is always said *standing*. Those who do not know the *Regina Cœli* may gain the indulgences by saying the Angelus; but it must be said *standing* during Paschal Time. For the convenience of the Faithful is appended a translation of the *Regina Cœli* taken from the *Raccolta* (p. 165).

Queen of Heaven, rejoice. Alleluia.

For He whom thou wast made worthy to bear, Alleluia,

Hath arisen as He said. Alleluia.

Pray for us to our God. Alleluia.

V. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary. Alleluia.

R. For the Lord hath risen indeed. Alleluia.

Let us pray.

O God, who through the resurrection of Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, has vouchsafed to give joy to the whole world, grant us, we beseech Thee, that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may obtain the joys of eternal life. Through the same our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

III. INDULGENCES GRANTED TO THE FAITHFUL IN SCOTLAND.

An Indulgence is a remission of the whole, or a part, of the *temporal* punishment that often remains to be suffered for sins which, as to their guilt and *eternal* punishment, have been already remitted. For the effect and validity of an Indulgence, it is not only necessary that there be a competent authority in him who grants it, and a just cause or motive for the grant, but it is also necessary, on the part of him who obtains it, that he renounce and be sincerely sorry for all his sins, that he be in the state of grace,

and that he duly perform the conditions prescribed. Of Indulgences, some are called *plenary*, which, when fully obtained, remit the whole of the temporal punishment that remained due on account of past sins; others are for a certain number of years or days, which, when fully obtained, remit as much of the temporal punishment as would have been discharged by the performance of so many years or days of Canonical Penance.

The conditions for most of the Plenary Indulgences include confession. But for those who go to confession once a week, their weekly confession, if they remain in a state of grace, will suffice (Decrees of Sept. 9, 1763, and Nov. 15, 1841); and, by a Decree of June 12, 1822, a Plenary Indulgence granted for a *festival* may be gained if the confession be made a week before. Moreover, by a Decree of Oct. 6, 1870, it will for *any* Indulgence suffice that the confession, and also the Holy Communion, be made on the day before that which is appointed for the Indulgence.

The Holy See has been graciously pleased to grant to the Faithful in Scotland the following Plenary Indulgences, on certain conditions after specified:—

1st, From the Feast of St. Thomas, Apostle, 21st of December, to the first Sunday after the Epiphany, inclusively.

2nd, From Ash-Wednesday to the second Sunday of Lent, inclusively.

3rd, During the time appointed in each Diocese for complying with Easter duties.

4th, From Pentecost Sunday to Sunday after Corpus Christi.

5th, From Sunday before the Feast of SS. Peter and Paul to the Octave day.

6th, From Sunday before the Feast of the Assumption to the Octave day.

7th, From Sunday before the Feast of All Saints to the Octave day.

8th, On the Feast of St. Andrew, and during the Octave.

The following are the CONDITIONS on which the Faithful may gain these Indulgences.

1st, That within the time prescribed they approach to the Sacraments of Penance and the Holy Eucharist.

2nd, That on the day of their Communion they offer up some prayers to God for the happy state of the whole Church of Christ; for its Supreme Pastor, the Bishop of Rome; for peace and concord between all Christian Princes; for the exaltation and propagation of the Holy Catholic Faith, especially in our own country; and for the eternal salvation of all Christians.

3rd, That, if they have an opportunity, they visit within the limited time some church or oratory, and pray to God as has been mentioned before.

4th, That, if their circumstances enable them, they perform some works of mercy.

IV. INDULGENCE FOR THE LITANY OF THE B. VIRGIN.

On the 6th May, 1879, His Holiness granted the Apostolic Benediction, and an Indulgence of seven years on each Saturday, and on the Feasts of the Blessed Virgin, to the Faithful of England and Scotland who shall recite or sing the Litany of the Blessed Virgin in any church in either country.

V. THE PENTECOST NOVENA.

For the Pentecost Novena, prescribed by Encyclical Letters of 5th May, 1895, and 9th May, 1897, the following Indulgences have been granted to those taking part in the Novena; 1st, seven years and seven quarantines for each day; 2nd, a Plenary Indulgence on any one day of Novena, or on Pentecost, or on any day of the subsequent Octave, on the usual conditions of Confession and Communion and prayers for the Pope's intention. [These Indulgences are attainable by those also who are legitimately impeded from attending the Public Devotions, provided the Novena be done in private and the other conditions fulfilled.] Moreover, those who again, during the Octave of Pentecost, inclusive of Trinity Sunday, publicly or privately recite every day, according to their devotion, some prayers to the Holy Ghost, and satisfy the other conditions, may gain a second time the above Indulgences, both plenary and partial.

All these Indulgences are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

VI. THE DEVOTIONS FOR THE MONTH OF OCTOBER.

For the *October Devotions*, prescribed by Decrees of 20th August, 1885, etc., the following Indulgences have been granted: 1st, seven years and seven quarantines each time one joins in the public recital of the Rosary and Litany of the B. Virgin (or, being legitimately impeded, says them privately), and prays according to the intentions of the Pope; 2nd, a Plenary Indulgence to those who, having done this at least ten times, confess and communicate; 3rd, a Plenary Indulgence to all who, on the Feast of the Rosary or within the Octave, confess, communicate, and pray in some church to God and the B. Virgin according to the intention of His Holiness; 4th, seven years and seven quarantines, each time, for the recital of the following prayer to St. Joseph enjoined by the Encyclical of 15th August, 1889.

PRAYER TO S. JOSEPH.

To thee, O blessed Joseph, we fly in our tribulation, and while imploring the help of thy most holy spouse, thy protection also with confidence we crave. By that affection which united thee with the Immaculate Virgin, Mother of God, and by the fatherly love with which thou didst embrace the Child Jesus, we humbly supplicate thee to look down benignantly on the heritage which

Christ Jesus purchased with His Blood, and in thy might and power to succour us in our necessities.

Defend, O most provident Guardian of the Divine Family, the chosen race of Jesus Christ; keep us, most loving father, from all taint of error and corruption; do thou from heaven, as our most powerful Protector, stand graciously by us in this conflict with the powers of darkness; and as of old thou didst rescue the Child Jesus in the imminent peril of His life, so now defend the Holy Church of God from hostile wiles and all adversity, and through thy never-failing patronage so shield each one of us, that guided by thy example and supported by thy aid, we may live in holiness, piously die, and attain eternal happiness in heaven. Amen.

N.B.—By a *quarantine* Indulgence is meant the remission of so much of the future penalty (*poena*) of sin as is the equivalent of keeping a Lent according to the strict discipline of the Church. (*Raccolta.*)

VII. PRAYERS ENJOINED BY THE POPE.

To be said kneeling after Low Mass.

Hail Mary, *three times.* Then *Salve Regina.*

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy; Hail, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To Thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve; to Thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this vale of tears. Turn then, most gracious Advocate, Thine eyes of mercy towards us; and after this our exile, show unto us the Blessed Fruit of Thy womb, Jesus; O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

V. Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God.

R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Let us pray.

O God, our refuge and our strength, look with favour on Thy people who cry to Thee; and through the intercession of the Glorious and Immaculate Virgin Mary, Mother of God, and Blessed Joseph her Spouse, of Thy Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and of all the Saints, mercifully and graciously hear the prayers which we pour forth for the conversion of sinners, and for the freedom and exaltation of our Holy Mother the Church. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

St. Michael the Archangel defend us in the day of battle; be our safeguard against the wickedness and snares of the devil;—"the Lord command him," we humbly pray;—and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, thrust into hell Satan and the other wicked spirits who go about the world for the destruction of souls. Amen.

An Indulgence of 300 days is granted to all who recite these prayers as above.

VIII. ASSOCIATION FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE FAITH.

This Institution assists by prayers and alms the Missionaries who are engaged in preaching the Gospel. The prayers are a *Pater* and *Ave* each day. It will suffice to say for this purpose the *Pater* and *Ave* of our morning and night prayers, adding the aspiration, *Saint Francis Xavier, pray for us*. The alms is only one half-penny per week. One member in ten acts as collector, and pays in the amount to another member, who has ten such collections to receive. Donations are likewise thankfully received. Two committees, one in Paris, and the other at Lyons, distribute their alms to the Missions. A return of the sums received, and of their appropriation, is inserted annually in the *Annals of the Propagation of the Faith*. This collection, to the reading of which each member is entitled, appears six times a year. One copy is supplied to every ten members.

PLENARY INDULGENCES.—On the 3rd of May (the Anniversary of the foundation of the Society); the 3rd of December (the feast of St. Francis Xavier); the feasts of the Epiphany, Annunciation, and Assumption—or any day within the Octave of these five festivals; the 29th of September (the feast of St. Michael); all the feasts of the Apostles; two days in each month, at the member's option; once a year for the *general* commemoration of deceased members; once a year for the *special* commemoration of deceased members of the Council, Committee, or Decade to which he belongs; at the hour of death, provided he invokes the name of Jesus. Children, who have not yet made their first communion, may likewise gain these indulgences. These and the following are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

PARTIAL INDULGENCES.—300 days every time a member attends the Triduum of the 3rd of May and the 3rd of December; 100 days every time a member recites *Our Father* and *Hail Mary*, together with the invocation of St. Francis Xavier; 7 years and 7 quarantines every time a member performs any good work in the interests of the Society.

FAVOUR OF PRIVILEGED ALTARS.—For every Mass said in the name of a member for a deceased member. For personal privileges and other special favours to Priests, see the *Annals*.

Whoever contributes at one time 200 francs (£8), at the least, to establish a permanent fund—even though this sum should be immediately expended on the Missions—shall be regarded as a member in perpetuity, and as such enjoy all the privileges and indulgences on performing the other conditions prescribed.

Alms and Donations for the Association are received in Scotland by any of the Clergy.

IX. EASTER DUTIES AND INDULGENCE.

By a Rescript from the Holy See, dated 1st March, 1902, the Faithful of the Dioceses of St. Andrews and Edinburgh, Glas-

gow and Dunkeld, are authorised to satisfy the obligation of the Paschal Communion, and to gain the Plenary Indulgence, on any day from the first Sunday of Lent to Sunday within the Octave of the Ascension, inclusively; and those of the Diocese of Galloway, of Aberdeen, and of Argyll and the Isles, from the first Sunday of Lent till Low Sunday. This extension is granted for a term of five years.

X. FAST AND ABSTINENCE DAYS, AND LENTEN INDULT.

I.—FAST DAYS ON ONE MEAL.

1st, All the days in Lent except Sundays.

2nd, The Wednesdays and Fridays of Advent.

3rd, The Ember-days occurring in the four seasons of the year, being the Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays after the first Sunday of Lent, after Pentecost Sunday, after the third Sunday of September, and after the third Sunday of Advent. But if the 14th of September, or the 13th of December, fall upon a Wednesday, the Ember-Days of that season are kept the week following.

4th, The Vigils or Eves of Pentecost Sunday, of SS. Peter and Paul, of the Assumption, of All Saints, of St. Andrew, and of Christmas.

N.B.—When a Fast-Day falls upon a Sunday, it is to be observed on the Saturday before.

II.—DAYS OF ABSTINENCE.

On which the Church prohibits the use of Flesh Meat.

1st, All Fast-Days, unless a Dispensation be granted for some days in Lent.

2nd, All the Sundays in Lent, unless a Dispensation be granted.

3rd, The Fridays throughout the year. But if Christmas-Day falls on a Friday, it is not a day of abstinence.

III.—LENTEN REGULATIONS FOR 1905.

By authority of the Holy See.

1. *For those who are bound to fast.*

1. Flesh meat is allowed at the chief meal on all days, except Wednesdays and Fridays, Ember Saturday, and the last four days of Holy Week.

2. Eggs, milk, butter, butterine or margarine, and cheese, are allowed every day without exception, both at the chief meal and, in small quantity, at collation. [Butterine is now allowed throughout the year.]

3. Dripping and lard are allowed at the chief meal and, in small quantity, at the collation every day in Lent except Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. [This permission is now extended to all fast and abstinence days throughout the year.]

4. Suet is allowed only when flesh meat is allowed.

2. *For those who are not bound to fast.*

1. Persons under 21, or those who on account of old age, bad health, or laborious employment, are not bound to fast, may eat flesh meat at every meal on days when it is allowed.

2. On such days, persons not exempted as above, but obtaining a dispensation on account of weak health or the like, may eat flesh meat once only, unless dispensed also from abstinence.

3. *For all.*

1. On Sundays flesh meat, eggs, etc., may be taken by fasters and non-fasters alike at every meal; but fish and flesh cannot be taken at the same meal.

2. The prohibition of fish and flesh at the same meal applies to all days in Lent, as also to all fast-days throughout the year, and is binding on both fasters and non-fasters.

N.B.—The Holy Father earnestly exhorts the Faithful to compensate for these relaxations, granted for very urgent reasons, by other good works, and especially by almsgiving to the poor.

XI. MARRIAGES.

By the decree of the Council of Trent (Sess. 24, Chap. 10 de Reformat. Matrimonii), the solemnising of Marriage is forbidden from Ash Wednesday till Low Sunday inclusively, and from the first Sunday of Advent till the Feast of the Epiphany inclusively.

The decree of the same Council (*ibid.* Chap. 1) respecting Clandestine Marriages was extended to the whole of Ireland on the 2nd December, 1827; and was consequently in force thirty days afterwards.

Marriage cannot be contracted by persons within the 4th degree of kindred without a Dispensation; and, if attempted, is invalid.—Spiritual kindred, contracted by Baptism or Confirmation, is an impediment.

A "mixed marriage" (that is, a marriage between a Catholic and one who, though baptised, does not profess the Catholic Faith) is unlawful without a Dispensation; and the Dispensation cannot lawfully be given unless for a sufficiently grave reason, and subject to the following conditions: 1. That *all* the children that may be born of the marriage shall be baptised, and brought up, in the Catholic Faith. 2. That the Catholic party shall have full liberty for the practice of the Catholic religion. 3. That no religious marriage ceremony shall take place elsewhere than before the Catholic Priest.

XII. SICK CALLS.

All sick calls should be given in at the Priest's house at a timely hour in the morning. If this reasonable rule were adhered to, it would save the Clergy much unnecessary labour, and the people many disappointments, which they may justly ascribe to their now want of system.

On Saturdays, eves of Holidays, and other days which are generally devoted to the Confessional, the Priest should not, if possible, be called away from this important duty. Unless in cases of necessity, sick calls should not be made on Saturdays or Sundays, when the Clergy have so many other duties to attend to.

It is the duty of the people to conform to whatever regulations may be made by the Clergy, on these and other matters connected with religion, in their respective congregations. All things should be done in order, according to the advice of St. Paul.

When the Priest is called to attend a sick person, everything that he requires for the administration of the Sacraments should be furnished as decently as possible in the room where the sick person lies—*viz.*, a table covered with a clean linen cloth, on which should be laid a candle, a vessel of holy water with an Asperges, a small vessel of common water for the purification of the Priest's fingers after the administration of the Holy Viaticum, and a napkin for the sick person at the time of Communion. As the Priest generally brings the Blessed Sacrament on these occasions, everything should be so becomingly prepared, according to their means, as to show the great respect of the inmates for Jesus Christ, and the high value they set upon the honour thus rendered to their house in the visit of their Lord and Redeemer.

While the Priest is administering the Viaticum and Extreme Unction, the assistants should devoutly offer up their prayers to God on behalf of the sick person, to implore that he may receive those Sacraments with the necessary dispositions.

XIII. EXTRACTS FROM THE RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD FOR THE RELIEF OF THE POOR IN SCOTLAND.

Address—LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD, EDINBURGH.

[By enactment of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1894, the duties previously discharged by the Board of Supervision and by Parochial Boards, have been transferred to, and are continued by, the Local Government Board and Parish Councils respectively; accordingly the latter names take the place of the former in the following Extracts.]

The Board issued a Circular Letter, dated 3rd November, 1864, enclosing rules relating to the "General Register of Poor," and "The Children's Separate Register". Rules I., II., and III. provide for the mode of keeping such Registers by the Inspectors of Poor in every Parish.

RULE IV.—"The Parish Council of each Parish or Combination shall before the first January, 1865, name and publicly announce two lawful days in the week on each of which, during one hour to be fixed and announced in like manner by that Council, but not

earlier than 9 A.M., nor later than 3 P.M., both 'The General Register' and the 'Children's Separate Register,' directed by Rule V. to be kept, shall be open to inspection at the office of the Inspector of Poor, free of charge, by any known Minister of any religious denomination officiating in the Parish or Combination, and on payment of one shilling on each occasion that he inspects it, by any ratepayer of the Parish or Combination giving his name and address in writing."

RULE VII.—"The particulars relating to each child required to be entered in the 'Children's Separate Register' are:—

"1st, The name and the age ascertained or presumed. The date at which he or she became chargeable, and whether as an orphan, or as a deserted child, or as a child separated from a parent, or parents, and if so separated, then the reason for such separation.

"2nd, The Religious Denomination—whether Protestant or Roman Catholic—with the grounds for holding the child to be of the denomination entered in the Register.

"3rd, The name, religious denomination, and place of residence of the parents, or of the last surviving parent of the child, so far as these are known or can be ascertained.

"4th, The date of any minute of the Parish Council or Committee thereof, directing that the child be sent to the Poorhouse or be boarded out, and when directed to be boarded out, the name, religious denomination, and place of residence of the person with whom the child is boarded, and date of removal thereto; and if the child be registered as a Roman Catholic then the date of intimation sent, in terms of the Local Government Board's Minute of 13th February, 1862, to the priest of that faith residing nearest to the place where the child is to be boarded. Also, in like manner, similar entries with reference to every subsequent order for removal, and actual removal of the same child boarded out, from one place or house to another, or from the care of one person to another, from time to time so long as the child is receiving relief.

"5th, The date and the age at which, and the circumstances in consequence of which, the child may have ceased to be chargeable to the Parish or Combination, and the name, residence, and occupation or trade, of the person with whom the child may have been apprenticed, or may have engaged as a servant, while receiving parochial relief."

RULE VIII.—"In every case in which an orphan or deserted child, or a child separated from its parents, is ordered to be sent to the Poorhouse, the Inspector shall state in the ticket for his, or her, admission, the religious denomination of the child as entered in the 'Child's Separate Register,' and the House Governor of the Poorhouse shall enter the child in the Poorhouse Register as of that denomination; and he shall cause to be delivered on Monday of each week to any known Minister of the religious denomination of any inmate, and who regularly visits, or has been nominated to visit the Poorhouse, for the purpose of instructing the children of

his own denomination, a list of all such children then inmates of the Poorhouse, if he applies for it."

EXTRACT FROM MINUTE OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD, 13TH
FEBRUARY, 1862.

"Complaints have been made to the Board that Pauper children, whose parents were Roman Catholics, have been placed by the Parish Council in Protestant Institutions, to which Roman Catholic Clergymen are denied access, and have been thus brought up Protestants. The Board therefore desire to remind Parish Councils that they are bound to take care that the education given by them as a part of the relief, which they are required to afford to Pauper children, shall not be so conducted as to counteract the religious instruction which the parents, or surviving parent, may intimate a desire to give to any such child. In the case of children who have no surviving parent, the intention of the parents in this respect must be inferred to have been to bring up the children in the religious tenets which they themselves professed.

"In order to acquit themselves of these obligations, Parish Councils ought to place the younger children of Roman Catholic parents, whom it is desired to board out, in families of the Roman Catholic persuasion, when suitable families of that persuasion can be found in the parish, or within such distance beyond it as the Parochial Board may consider it expedient to send Pauper children. If no such families can be found and the parish has Poorhouse accommodation, then such Roman Catholic children ought to be placed in the Poorhouse, where the Roman Catholic Clergyman has access to them in terms of the Rules and Regulations; but if there be no suitable Roman Catholic family in which the child can be boarded, and the parish be not possessed of Poorhouse accommodation, then special care ought to be taken that wherever the child may be placed, the known Clergyman of the religious persuasion of its parents shall have free access to it, at reasonable hours, for the purpose of imparting religious instruction; and the place of residence of every such child ought to be intimated to the nearest resident Clergyman of the religious persuasion of its parents.

"Where there is a properly conducted Roman Catholic school in the Parish, the child of Roman Catholic parents, who is boarded out, ought to be sent to that school, if it be within a reasonable distance of the Roman Catholic family in which the child is boarded; or if no suitable Roman Catholic family can be found willing to receive it, and there be no Poorhouse accommodation belonging to the Parish, then the child, which must in that case of necessity be boarded in a Protestant family, ought, if possible, to be placed with one which resides within such a moderate distance of a properly conducted Roman Catholic school as will admit of the child's regularly attending that school, and the child should be required to attend it accordingly."

Education of Roman Catholic Children.

"The Board are of opinion, that although education is part of the relief which the Parish Council is bound to provide for pauper children, that Board is not legally bound to subsidise, from the Parochial funds, schools of every different religious denomination to which any of the pauper children and the ratepayers may happen to belong.

"A parent, or if there be no parent, then a legal guardian is the only person who in the opinion of the Board has a right to determine what religious tenets shall be taught to the child. . . . In the case of children who have no surviving parent, the intention of their parents in this respect must be inferred to have been to bring up their children in the tenets which they themselves, or the last survivor of them, professed."

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF
POORHOUSES.

By these rules the following, amongst other, provisions are made:—

The keeping of the Register of Inmates by the House Governor, and to enter therein the name, religious persuasion, etc., of every inmate.

RULE I. provides "that inmates who refuse to attend on account of their religious principles" shall be exempted from attendance at morning and evening prayers, and divine service on Sundays.

RULE II.—"Any regular Minister of the religious persuasion of any inmate shall at any time in the day, on the request of any inmate, be allowed by the House Governor to enter the Poorhouse for the purpose of affording religious assistance to such inmate, or for the purpose of instructing his child or children in the principles of his religion."

RULE LII.—"When a regular Minister of any religious persuasion shall request permission to visit members of his congregation who may be inmates of the Poorhouse, orders shall be given for his admission at such hours as the House Governor may consider proper; and if such inmates, or several of them, desire it, arrangement shall be made for assembling them in some convenient apartment where religious instruction may be given or divine service conducted with decorum, and apart from the other inmates."

RULE LIII.—No work except the necessary household work shall be performed by the inmates on Sabbath-day.

RULE LIV.—No work except as above shall be required from any poor person, who shall be entered in the Register as professing the Roman Catholic religion, on any of the following days observed as Holidays in the Roman Catholic Church, that is to say, the 1st and 6th days of January, the 17th and 25th days of March, the 29th

day of June, the 15th day of August, the 1st day of November, Ascension Day and Corpus Christi Day.*

REFORMATORY AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

I. REFORMATORY SCHOOLS.

By the Reformatory Schools Act, 29 and 30 Vict., c. 117, section 16 (Aug. 10, 1866), it is enacted—

That the parent, step-parent, or guardian—or, if there be no parent, step-parent, or guardian, then the god-parent or nearest adult relative—of any youthful offender sent or about to be sent to a school which is not conducted in accordance with the religious persuasion to which the offender belongs, may apply to the court by whom such offender was sentenced to be sent to a Reformatory School; or to the visiting justices of the prison to which the offender was committed by that court; or to the justices or magistrate by whom the offender was sentenced to be sent to a Reformatory School (or justices or magistrate having the like jurisdiction); with request to send or remove such offender to a Certified Reformatory School conducted in accordance with the offender's religious persuasion: and the court, visiting justices, justices, or magistrate (as the case may be) shall, upon proof of such offender's religious persuasion, comply with the request of the applicant, provided—1, that the application is made before the offender has been sent to a Certified Reformatory School, or within thirty days after the arrival at such School; and 2, that the managers of the School named are shown to be willing to receive the offender.

II. INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

By the Industrial Schools Act, 29 and 30 Vict., c. 118, Section 20 (Aug. 10, 1866), it is enacted—

That, if the parent, step-parent, or guardian—or, if there be no parent, step-parent, or guardian, then the god-parent or nearest adult relative—of a child sent, or about to be sent, to a school, not conducted in accordance with the religious persuasion to which the child belongs, states to the justices or magistrate by whom the order of detention has been made or is about to be made (or to two justices or a magistrate having the like jurisdiction), that he, or she, objects to the child being sent to, or detained in the school specified, or about to be specified, in the order; and names another Certified Industrial School in Great Britain which is conducted in accordance with the child's religious persuasion, and signifies his, or her, desire that the child be sent thereto; then the justices or magistrate shall, upon proof of such child's religious persuasion,

* Christmas and St. Andrew's day (not mentioned in the above Rule) are Holydays of Obligation in Scotland, but the 17th and 25th days of March are not.

comply with the request of the applicant, provided—1, That the application is made before the child has been sent to a Certified Industrial School, or within thirty days after its arrival at such school; and 2, that the managers of the school are shown to be willing to receive the child.

N.B.—With regard both to Reformatory and to Industrial Schools, when thirty days after the offender's or child's entrance into a non-Catholic School have passed, application for transfer to a Catholic Reformatory or Industrial School can be made only to the Home Secretary. The following is the form of application:—

"To the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Home Department.—Right Hon. Sir, I, the undersigned, being the (*state relationship, or, in default thereof, whether god-parent or guardian, striking out from 'and' to 'kin'*) and nearest adult relative, or next of kin of....., an offender aged.....years, not belonging to the Established Church, but to the Roman Catholic Religion, and now under detention in the Certified School at....., apply to you to order, pursuant to the Statute 29 and 30 Vict., cap. 117, the transfer of the aforesaid.....to the Roman Catholic Certified School established at.....

"I offer the annexed proofs that the aforesaid.....belongs to the Roman Catholic Religion, and that the Manager of the School is willing to receive the Offender.

XIV. THE PIOUS ASSOCIATION OF THE HOLY FAMILY.

FORM OF CONSECRATION OF A CHRISTIAN FAMILY TO THE HOLY FAMILY.

O Jesus, our most loving Redeemer, who didst come into the world to enlighten it by Thy teaching and by Thy example, and who didst will to pass the greater part of Thy mortal life in the poor cottage of Nazareth, in humble subjection to Mary and Joseph, thus sanctifying that Family which was to be the model of all Christian families: graciously receive this family, which dedicates and consecrates itself to Thee this day. Do Thou protect us, do Thou watch over us! Do Thou bestow upon us Thy holy fear, peace, concord, and Christian love; that so, by the imitation of Thy Family as our pattern and model, we may each and all obtain everlasting happiness.

O Mary, loving Mother of Jesus and our Mother, by thy gracious intercession make this humble dedication acceptable to Jesus, and obtain for us His graces and blessings.

St. Joseph, holy Guardian of Jesus and Mary, assist us by thy prayers in all our spiritual and temporal necessities; so that, with Mary and with thee, we may for all eternity bless and thank our Divine Redeemer, Jesus.

XV. CELEBRATIONS FOR DECEASED CLERGYMEN.

By a rule immemorably observed in the Mission of Scotland, every Missionary belonging to it offered up three Masses for the soul of each Bishop or Priest who died attached to the Mission. In consequence of the greatly increased number of Clergymen, this rule was modified in 1847 by the Vicars Apostolic, by authority of the Holy See, in so far that every Missionary was bound to celebrate thrice for those belonging to his own District, and once for those who had served in another District. Lastly, in virtue of a Papal Rescript of 20th June, 1879, the rule was again altered by the Archbishops and Bishops, to the effect that every Missionary is obliged to celebrate thrice for a deceased Missionary of his own Diocese, and once for one of any other diocese.

XIX. VICARS APOSTOLIC IN SCOTLAND,

FROM THE EXTINCTION OF THE HIERARCHY IN 1603 TILL ITS RESTORATION
IN 1878.

1. The ancient Hierarchy ended with JAMES BETOUN, Abp. of Glasgow, who died at Paris on the 25th April, 1603, aged 79. After being subjected to the jurisdiction of the Archpriests and first Vicar-Apostolic of England till 1623, and afterwards to local Prefects of the Mission, the Clergy were incorporated into a missionary body by decree of *Propaganda*, 1653, and governed by the following *Prefects-Apostolic*:—WILLIAM BANNATYNE (or *Bellenden*), 1653-61; ALEXANDER DUNBAR (or *Winstler*), 1662-68, 1672-94; and

JOHN WALKER (or *Ross*), 1668-71. In May, 1694, a Scottish *Vicariate-Apostolic* was established. This was divided into two *Districts*, the *Lowland* and *Highland*, in February, 1731; and these into three, the *Eastern*, *Western*, and *Northern*, by Papal Rescript of 13th February, 1827. This last arrangement remained in force till the re-establishment of the Hierarchy by the Apostolic Letter *Ex supremo Apostolatus apice*, 4th March, 1878.

Comprising Counties of Aberdeen, Banff, Caithness, Cromarty, Elgin or Moray, Inverness (north of a straight line drawn from the extreme north of Loch Luing to the junction of the Counties of Inverness, Aberdeen, and Banff), Kincardine, Nairn, Ross (except Island of Lewis), Sutherland, and the Orkney and Shetland Islands.

The See of Aberdeen was founded at Mortlach in 1063; transferred to Aberdeen in 1125, under its fourth Bishop, Nectan; and was vacant for 301 years, from the death of Hon. WILLIAM GORDON at Aberdeen, on 6th August, 1577.

BISHOP OF ABERDEEN.—Right Rev. **ÆNEAS CHISHOLM**: born at Inverness on 26th June, 1836; ordained in Rome, 15th May, 1859; nominated to the See of Aberdeen by Brief of 7th January, 1899; consecrated in Aberdeen by Archbishop Macdonald on 24th February, and announced in Consistory on 22nd June following. Residence, 19 Golden Square, Aberdeen.

Comprising Counties of Argyll and Inverness (south of a line drawn from the northern extremity of Loch Luing to the junction of the Counties of Inverness, Aberdeen and Banff); the Islands of Bute and Arran, and the Hebrides.

The See of Argyll was founded about 1200, being disjoined from the Diocese of Dunkeld; and was vacant for more than three centuries. JAMES HAMILTON was appointed to the See on 14th July, 1553, but was probably never consecrated.

The See of the Isles (*Insularum*, or *Sodorensis*) is said to have been founded about 447 by ST. PATRICK, who consecrated GERMANUS, its first Bishop; was united to *Man* till the end of the 14th century; and was vacant for 325 years, from the death of RODERICK MACLEAN in 1553.

§ I.

THE CATHOLIC HIERARCHY.

The Catholic Hierarchy, or the governing body of the Holy Catholic Church, consists of: 1. His Holiness the Sovereign Pontiff, assisted by the Sacred College of Cardinals, and by about twenty Sacred Congregations, or permanent ecclesiastical committees, of which the Cardinals are the chief members; 2. the Patriarchs, Archbishops and Bishops; 3. the Apostolic Delegates, Vicars and Prefects; and 4. certain Abbots and Prelates.

I. GENERAL SUMMARY.

The less are those of: Babylon, *Chaldaic*; Cilicia, *Armenian*; the East Indies, *Latin*; Lisbon, *Latin*; Venice, *Latin*; and the West Indies, *Latin*.

The number, according to the same *Gerarchia*, of Patriarchs, Primate, Archbishops, and Bishops (including 383 Archbishops and Bishops of *Titular Sees*, and 11 without Sees), was 1345.

NOTE.—*Titular Sees*, formerly called Sees *in partibus infidelium* (that is, in infidel regions), are, for the most part, assigned to Archbishops and Bishops appointed, either to Apostolic Delegations, Vicariates, or Prefectures; or to the office of Coadjutor, Auxiliary, or Administrator of a Diocese.

II. THE SOVEREIGN PONTIFF.

HIS HOLINESS POPE PIUS X. (JOSEPH SARTO), the 258th Roman Pontiff, was born at Riese, in the Province of Venice, June 2 1835; appointed Bishop of Mantua, Nov. 10, 1884; created Cardinal, June 12, 1893; made Patriarch of Venice, June 15, 1893; elected Pope, Aug. 4, and crowned Aug. 9, 1903.

III. THE SACRED COLLEGE OF CARDINALS.

The Cardinals, as the advisers and assistants of the Sovereign Pontiff, are the supreme council or senate of the Church. On the death of the Pontiff, they elect his successor.

There are three orders of Cardinals, *Bishops, Priests, and Deacons*. These orders are distinct from those of the Hierarchy: with very few exceptions, the Cardinal Priests are archbishops or bishops; and the Cardinal Deacons are generally priests.

The Sacred College, when complete, consists of 70 members: 6 Cardinal Bishops, whose dioceses are the six 'Suburban Sees,' near Rome; 50 Cardinal Priests, who take their title from the 'Titular Churches,' to which they are appointed, with jurisdiction and right to a throne, etc., therein; and 14 Cardinal Deacons, who are appointed to other churches called 'Deaconries'.

The first Cardinal Bishop is *Dean*, the first of the Priests is *First Priest*, and the first of the Deacons is *First Deacon*, of the Sacred College. The Dean has the right of consecrating, and the First Deacon the right of proclaiming and crowning, a new Pope.

On the death of the Pontiff the Cardinal *Camerlengo* has the administration of the public affairs of the Holy See.

The 'creation' of a Cardinal sometimes precedes, even by several years, its 'publication' or proclamation. The Cardinal is then said to be 'reserved *in petto*,' and, when proclaimed, he takes precedence according to date of creation.

Besides the 137 *residential* Archiepiscopal and Episcopal Sees, 29 of the 32 Vicariates-Apostolic are held by Bishops of *titular* Sees.

Five Episcopal Sees, two Vicariates-Apostolic, and four Prefectures-Apostolic are vacant.

Including 2 Delegates-Apostolic, 8 Coadjutors and 3 Bishops-Auxiliary, the number of Archbishops and Bishops now holding office in the British Empire is 174. There are also a few *retired*, or without episcopal office, of whom five are in England.

CATHOLIC POPULATION OF THE EMPIRE.

The estimated Catholic population of the United Kingdom is about 5 millions and a third: namely, England, 1,500,000; Scotland, 513,400; Ireland (according to the Census of 1901), 3,310,028. Including British America (with a Catholic population of about 2,600,000), Australia, India, and all other possessions, the total Catholic population of the British Empire is probably about 10 millions and a half.

POSTAL REGULATIONS.

INLAND LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.

When prepaid, not above 4 oz., 1d. ; for every additional 2 oz., $\frac{1}{2}$ d. Inland letters must not exceed 2 feet in length, 1 foot in width, or 1 foot in depth, unless sent to or from a Government Office.

LETTERS TO THE COLONIES AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

To all British Colonies and Possessions abroad, except Australia, British New Guinea and Rhodesia, the postage is 1d. the half-ounce. To Foreign Countries and the countries just mentioned, $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. the half-ounce.

BOOK POST (INLAND OR FOREIGN).

$\frac{1}{2}$ d. for every 2 oz. Book-packets must be posted, either without covers (and not fastened in any way), or in unfastened envelopes, or in covers that can be easily removed for the purpose of examination. *Inland* book-packets over 2 oz. in weight may be sent as letter-packets.

NEWSPAPERS (INLAND).

For every registered newspaper, with or without a supplement, $\frac{1}{2}$ d. ; but a packet, containing two or more newspapers, is not liable to a higher postage than would be charged on a book-packet or letter of the same weight. Every packet must be open at both ends, and must have no enclosure, except its supplement or supplements. To places abroad, the postage is $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for every 2 oz.

UNPAID

inland letters, book-packets and newspapers are charged with double postage, and if *insufficiently stamped*, with double the deficiency.

REGISTRATION.

Prepaid letters, newspapers, and book-packets may be registered for the United Kingdom, and for almost all places abroad, for a fee of 2d.

PARCEL POST (INLAND).

The greatest length allowed is 3 feet 6 inches, the greatest length and girth combined, 6 feet. The greatest weight allowed is 11 lbs. The rates are : not above 1 lb., 3d. ; and 1d. for every additional pound, or part of 1 lb. ; but for 11 as well as 10 lbs. the charge is 1s. There is also a *Foreign and Colonial Parcel Post*.

MONEY ORDERS.

For inland money orders the charge is : for sums not exceeding £1, 2d. ; above £1 and not exceeding £3, 3d. ; above £3, and not exceeding £10, 4d.

POSTAL ORDERS

are issued for any value, mounting by sixpence, from 6d. to 21s. inclusive, at the following rates of poundage : 6d. to 1s. 6d., $\frac{1}{2}$ d. ; 2s. to 10s. 6d., 1d. ; 11s. to 21s., $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.

Broken amounts, but not fractions of a penny, may be made up by the use of stamps not exceeding fivepence in value affixed to the face of any postal order.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

1s. and upwards received at an interest of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. (or 6d. for every pound) per annum.

When the original Inventory was recorded after 1st June, 1881, the 44 Vict., cap. 12, sec. 41, provides that the one per cent. Legacy and Succession Duty payable by children and others, under the Legacy and Succession Duty Act, is not payable in respect of any personal property included in the Inventory, and on which the Stamp duty has been paid (Sec. 41). This does not apply to Legacies or Successions out of heritable property or out of foreign assets, or to heritable property ; nor does it apply to the duties payable by the other relatives of the deceased or strangers in blood : the Legacy and Succession Duties payable by those persons remain the same.

Sec. 42 of the above Act charges pecuniary legacies and shares of residue below £20 in value, where the deceased died on or after 1st June, 1881, with the duty imposed by the Legacy Duty Acts, subject to the relief granted by Sec. 13 of the 43 Vict., cap. 14, and “as modified by this Act” (See secs. 33 and 36).

Sec. 38, sub-section 2, charges with duty “any property taken as a *donatio mortis causâ* made by any person dying on or after the 1st day of June, 1881, or taken under a voluntary disposition, made by any person so dying, purporting to operate as an immediate gift *inter vivos* whether by way of transfer, delivery, declaration of trust or otherwise, which shall not have been *bonâ fide* made three months before the death of the deceased”.

* This applies only to lawful children of the deceased, illegitimate children being subject to Duty at the rate of 10 per cent.

Sec. 11 of 52 Vict., cap. 7, amends sub-sec. 2 of section 38 of 44 Vict. cap. 12, by substituting "twelve" months in place of "three" months before the death of the deceased, and "the description of property shall include property taken under any gift whenever made, of which property *bonâ fide* possession and enjoyment shall not have been assumed by the donee immediately upon the gift and thenceforward retained to the entire exclusion of the donor, or of any benefit to him by contract or otherwise".

PART V.

I. EVENTS, 1904.

14th February.—Opening of new Church at Gorebridge.

Some years ago a free site was given at Gorebridge by Captain Cuming-Dewar of Vogrie for the erection of a Catholic Church, and the building has now been completed. It is in the Gothic style of architecture, and stands on rising ground a little to the south of the railway station. The opening ceremony took place on 14th February last, when the building was blessed by the Archbishop of St. Andrews and Edinburgh, and Mass celebrated by Father Head, S.J., of Dalkeith. After Mass a powerful and impressive discourse was delivered by the Rev. Father Power, S.J., of Edinburgh. The church, which is capable of holding 200 to 300, was filled to its utmost capacity, many Catholics travelling from Dalkeith, Bonnybrigg, Pathhead, and the surrounding district. The choir of St. Mary's, Pathhead, under the conductorship of Father Jerrard, S.J., sang Barrett's Mass in a very pleasing manner. It had been arranged to hold an open-air service in the afternoon, but owing to the inclemency of the weather the idea had to be abandoned and Benediction was given at four o'clock inside the church. Father Power was again the preacher. In the course of the day the Archbishop and Rev. Fathers were entertained to dinner by Captain Cuming-Dewar of Vogrie.

1st May.—Inauguration of new High Altar at St. Patrick's, Dumbarton.

The Church of St. Patrick, Dumbarton, which was opened little more than a year ago, was the scene of an impressive ceremony on Sunday 1st May last, when his Grace the Archbishop of Glasgow solemnly blessed the new high altar recently erected. The celebrant of the Mass on the occasion was the Very Rev. Canon Taylor, of Motherwell, a former incumbent of Dumbarton, while the Archbishop was present in the sanctuary and after the first Gospel preached from Apoc. xxi. 3. The altar is of unique design. The material is a handsome white stone, with alabaster panels set in the front of the altar table. The reredos is fashioned in a Gothic style, the little circles being

backed by a greenish marble, giving the whole the appearance of a row of Gothic windows. The baldachino takes the form of a spire, the throne being supported by a cherub; and on the Gospel side of the altar is a statue of St. Patrick, patron of the church, while in a similar niche on the Epistle side is a statue of St. Margaret, Queen and Patroness of Scotland. The altar is a gift of an old member of the congregation, Mr. Patrick McKay, Westinlee. [From the *Glasgow Observer*.]

23rd August.—Opening of new Chapel at Oakley, Fifeshire.

The opening of a new chapel at Oakley marks another step in the continued spread of the Faith in Fifeshire. Oakley was originally opened as a station dependent on Dunfermline as far back as 1857. About 1860 it became a separate charge, and remained so till 1886, since when it has again been served from Dunfermline. Mass hitherto has been celebrated in the school, but the growing needs of the congregation necessitated a more commodious building. The new chapel, though of a temporary nature, is a substantial structure of wood, very pretty in design, and will accommodate about 150 worshippers. It will serve till the further development of trade in the district may allow of a more permanent edifice of stone. The opening took place on the 23rd August last. In the absence of the Archbishop the building was blessed by Rev. Roderick Grant, of London, and Mass celebrated by the Rev. Geo. Mullan, late of Dunfermline.

The thanks of priests and people are due to the kind benefactors who have provided the cost of the chapel, and have always shown a deep interest in the Catholic concerns of the district.

26th October.—Annual Meeting of the Catholic Truth Society.

A very successful gathering of the Catholic Truth Society took place in Edinburgh on the 26th October last. On the previous evening the Archbishop of St. Andrews and Edinburgh gave a reception to members in the North British Hotel. Besides various Bishops and Clergy of Scotland, there were present Bishop Casartelli, of Salford, Bishop Gaughren, Vicar-Apostolic of Orange River Colony, and over 600 ladies and gentlemen, representatives of the Catholic laity from all parts of the country. On the following day a conference of members was held, presided over by Bishop MacFarlane, of Dunkeld. Papers were read on "Church Music" by Father Gregory Ould, O.S.B., of Fort-Augustus, and on "Catholic Publications and Baneful Literature" by Father Bader, S.J., of Edinburgh. Both papers

were greatly appreciated and elicited a deal of instructive discussion. In the evening the large general meeting assembled in the Music Hall, at which about 1,800 persons were present. Archbishop Smith was in the chair. Major-General Lord Ralph Kerr, as president of the Society, extended a warm welcome to the large and representative gathering. After an address by the Archbishop, a singularly stirring discourse was delivered by Bishop Casartelli on "The Strenuous Life—A Word to Catholic Young Men". The Secretary intimated that the depôt of the Society was now established in Edinburgh. In the course of the meeting a telegram was received from His Holiness the Pope imparting the Apostolic Benediction to the members of the Society assembled.

6th November.—Opening of School-Chapel at Kilwinning.

The new School-Chapel at Kilwinning was formally opened on Sunday, 6th November, 1904, in the presence of a crowded congregation. Standing in the centre of the town, almost under the shadow of the ruins of the stately old Benedictine Abbey, the new chapel is dedicated to St. Winning, an Irish saint, who founded a church here in 715, and who preached and wrought miracles in the neighbourhood till his holy death in the course of the eighth century. The building, which is well arranged to the designs of Mr. G. Woulfe Brenan, Oban, will seat about 200 persons. It is divided by folding partitions, and heated throughout by hot water. The altar is in carved oak, of chaste design, by Beyaert of Bruges. The erection of this edifice has supplied a long-felt want on the part of the congregation of Kilwinning, who have hitherto had to hear Mass in various rented halls, and whose children have had to attend non-Catholic schools. The opening ceremony commenced with the blessing of the chapel by the Very Rev. Provost Chisholm, Paisley. Missa Cantata followed, at which Provost Chisholm also officiated, assisted by Rev. William C. Brown, the pastor of the mission. After the Gospel the sermon was preached by the Rev. Father Arsenius, O.F.M., who based his discourse on the words—"The work is great, for a house is prepared not for man, but for God" (1 Paralipomenon xxix. 1). The music, which consisted of Father Turner's "Mass of St. Cecilia," was sung by the choir of St. Mary's, Saltcoats. [*Glasgow Observer.*]

6th November.—Inauguration of new High Altar at St. Lawrence's, Greenock.

Sunday, the 6th November, 1904, was a red-letter day in the history of St. Lawrence's, Greenock. It marked the second

anniversary of the opening of the new church, and was fixed upon for the inauguration of the new high altar. High Mass was celebrated at mid-day, and the sermon was preached by the Archbishop. His Grace having commended the congregation for their generosity and the clergy of the church for their zeal, reminded his hearers that it was not in Greenock alone that such churches were springing up and that such altars were being built. All over the West of Scotland the same work was being done, and by-and-by no doubt their faith, and the faith of their children, would do for their country what the faith of their forefathers did hundreds of years ago; and again they might see every city almost with its cathedral and every parish with its beautiful church. By quoting the experiences of the past his Grace warned his hearers against laxity in the day of religious prosperity, and especially against insidious temptations to desert the ways of their fathers for ways that were new. At the evening service a sermon was preached by Very Rev. John Cuff, S.J., and Solemn Benediction was afterwards given.

The altar is a fine piece of workmanship. The following details will give a general idea of its design. The altar itself stands well forward, being backed by a reredos 28 feet high and 24 feet wide. The reredos is divided into three tiers with figures of adoring angels and saints grouped about the altar throne. The altar stone is 10 feet long, and rests on four pairs of columns with carved panels between. Over the tabernacle rises the throne, which again is surmounted by the great canopy, supported by subsidiary canopies to buttress it, the centre pinnacle towering to a height of 37 feet. The whole is elaborately carved in white stone relieved by marble columns, and has been erected by Messrs. Boulton, of Cheltenham, to the designs of the late Mr. P. P. Pugin.

2nd December.—Opening of Memorial Chapel at Letterfourie, Buckie.

The Memorial Chapel of St. James, built by Sir Robert Gordon on his estate at Maryhill, Letterfourie, about three miles from Buckie, was formally opened on the 2nd of December, with imposing ceremonial, by the Abbot of Fort-Augustus, to whom the building has been presented. The weather was very favourable, and the little chapel was crowded. High Mass was celebrated and an appropriate opening address was delivered by the Abbot. Amongst those who took part in the services of the day were Bishop Chisholm, Aberdeen; celebrant, Prior Milne, Fort-Augustus; deacon, Father Mackintosh, Buckie; subdeacon, Father Macdonald, Huntly; master of ceremonies, Father Columba, Fort-Augustus; organist, Father Michael Barrett, Fort-Augustus; Father Adrian Blundell. Canon Wilson, Elgin, was also present.

The music was supplied by several monks, who came specially from Fort-Augustus. The chapel is under the patronage of St. James, the patron saint of the ancient Benedictine monastery at Ratisbon, Bavaria, where Sir Robert Gordon spent some of his earlier days. The chapel and house cost about £2,000. The feu is a large one, and the building is of a most substantial character. It is erected on the side of the road leading from Buckie to Deskford. The site is a lovely one, a magnificent panoramic view of the Moray Firth and the richly-wooded parish of Speymouth being obtained. The new chapel, which accommodates about sixty worshippers, presents a charming appearance internally, the altar being a masterpiece of artistic skill. The chapel is connected with the house by a wide cloister. The house is a roomy dwelling of two storeys and attics, containing about a dozen apartments. In addition to this handsome gift, Sir Robert has comfortably endowed the building, and has also equipped the sacristy with rich vestments. Gifts of a valuable character, including the sanctuary lamp and a rich sanctuary carpet, have been given by other benefactors. [*Aberdeen Free Press.*]

The Rev. PETER BURNS was born in Edinburgh on the 19th February, 1879. He entered Blairs College on the 23rd August, 1893. Four years later he passed to the Scots College, Rome, where he completed his ecclesiastical course. He received minor orders in the Scots College Chapel in Low Week, 1900, at the hands of Bishop Chisholm of Aberdeen. He was ordained subdeacon by Bishop Ceppitelli on the 1st November, 1902, deacon on the 20th December following, and priest by Cardinal Respighi on the 1st November, 1903. He is stationed as assistant at West Calder.

The Rev. ROBERT CAIRNS was born in Glasgow on the 21st May, 1877. He studied at St. Mungo's Academy, Glasgow, and entered Blairs College in September, 1892. In August, 1895, he was transferred to St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick. He received minor orders from Bishop MacFarlane of Dunkeld on the 28th September, 1902. He was raised to the subdiaconate on the 11th June, 1903, to the diaconate on the 5th April, 1904, and to the priesthood on the 24th May following—all at the hands of Archbishop Maguire. He is stationed as assistant at Dumbarton.

The Rev. FRANCIS CRONIN, D.D., was born at Lossiemouth on the 4th August, 1879. He entered Blairs College on the 8th August, 1892. After studying at St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, from 1896 to 1898, he was in the latter year transferred to the Scots College, Rome, for the study of philosophy and theology. His subsequent dates of ordination are the same as those of the Rev. Peter Burns. On his return to Scotland in 1904 he was appointed assistant at the Cathedral, Aberdeen.

The Rev. THOMAS J. DOYLE was born at Port-Glasgow on the 20th May, 1878. He entered Blairs College on the 17th August, 1891, passing in 1895 to St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick. Here he received tonsure and minor orders on 26th May, 1901; he was ordained subdeacon on the 25th March, 1904, deacon on the 12th and priest on the 24th May following—all at the hands of Archbishop Maguire. He is stationed as assistant at Newton, by Glasgow,

The Rev. WILLIAM FLANAGAN was born in Glasgow on the 12th September, 1878. He entered Blairs College in September, 1893, passing in 1897 to N. D. des Champs, Paris. A year later he was transferred to St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, where he completed his course of philosophy and theology. He received tonsure and minor orders on the 11th June, 1903, and subdiaconate on the 21st of the same month. He was ordained by Archbishop Maguire deacon on the 12th, and priest on the 24th May, 1904. He is serving as assistant at St. Lawrence's, Greenock.

The Rev. THOMAS P. GOURLAY was born in Glasgow on the 26th August, 1877. He entered Blairs College on the 10th August, 1892, and three years later was transferred to St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, where the remainder of his studies were completed. He received tonsure and minor orders from Bishop MacFarlane on the 28th September, 1902. By Archbishop Maguire he was ordained subdeacon on the 11th June, 1903, deacon on the 25th March, 1904, and priest on the 24th May following in St. Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow. He was appointed assistant at Burnbank. RIP

The Rev. JAMES HUGHES was born at Gartsherrie, near Coatbridge, on the 8th August, 1878. He entered Blairs College in 1894. His subsequent dates are the same as those of the Rev. John McIlvaine. He is stationed at Springburn, Glasgow. RIP

The Rev. JAMES KELLY, D.D., was born at Paisley on the 20th February, 1879. He entered Blairs College on the 4th September, 1893, and five years later he passed to the Sulpician Seminary at Issy, where he received the tonsure from Cardinal Richard on the 19th May, 1899. In October of that year he proceeded to the Scots College, Rome, where he finished his ecclesiastical course. He received minor orders from Bishop Chisholm in Low Week, 1900. He was ordained subdeacon on the 1st November, 1902, deacon on the 20th December following, and priest on Holy Saturday, 11th April, 1903, all at the hands of Cardinal Respighi. He is stationed at St. Patrick's, Glasgow.

The Rev. JAMES MACDONALD was born at Lennoxton on the 25th May, 1880. He entered Blairs College on the 27th August, 1893, and in 1898 was transferred to the Scots College, Rome. For his dates of ordination see under the Rev. Peter Burns. On his return to Scotland in 1904 he served temporarily at Broxburn, and was subsequently appointed assistant to the Cathedral, Edinburgh.

The Rev. JOHN MACMILLAN was born at Craigston, Barra, on the 14th May, 1880. He entered Blairs College on the 30th RIP

August, 1894, and in October, 1899, the Sulpician Seminary at Issy. Two years later he passed to St. Sulpice, Paris, where he received minor orders on the 20th December, 1902, and subdiaconate on the 4th July, 1903, from Mgr. Jourdain de la Passardière. He was ordained deacon on the 30th November, 1903, and priest on the 8th December following, both at the hands of Bishop Smith at the Pro-Cathedral, Oban. He has remained at the Pro-Cathedral as assistant.

R.I.P. The Rev. JOHN McILVAINE was born at Dumbarton on the 19th July, 1877. He entered Blairs College on the 31st August, 1893, passing in October, 1897, to N. D. des Champs, Paris, and the year following to St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, for the study of philosophy and theology. He received minor orders on the 28th September, 1902, subdiaconate on the 11th June, 1903, and diaconate on the 12th May, 1904, and was raised to the priesthood by Archbishop Maguire on the 24th May following. He is stationed as assistant at Dumbarton.

R.I.P. The Rev. WILLIAM J. MOLLOY was born at Maleaporam, Madras Presidency, on the 10th June, 1877. He entered Blairs College on the 1st September, 1893. Three years later he was transferred to N. D. des Champs, Paris, and in the following year to St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, where he completed his studies in philosophy and theology. His dates of ordination are the same as those of the Rev. Thomas P. Gourlay. He is assistant at All Saints', Coatdyke.

The Rev. WILLIAM MULLIGAN was born at Old North, Aberdeenshire, on the 21st February, 1880. He entered Blairs College on the 11th September, 1893, and on the 4th December, 1897, passed to the Propaganda College, Rome. He received the tonsure in February, 1899, from Mgr. Cassetta, and minor orders in the Scots College Chapel from Bishop Chisholm in Low Week, 1900. He was ordained subdeacon on the 25th July, 1903, deacon on the 1st November following, and priest by Cardinal Respighi on the 19th March, 1904. On his return to Scotland he was transferred temporarily to the Archdiocese of St. Andrews and Edinburgh, and appointed assistant at Dunfermline.

The Rev. FREDERICK R. PIRRIE was born at Coatbridge on the 15th April, 1877. After studying at St. Aloysius', Glasgow, he entered Blairs College in 1892. Three years later he passed to St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, where he continued the remainder of his studies. He received tonsure and minor orders from Bishop MacFarlane on the 28th September, 1902. His subsequent dates of ordination are the same as those of the Rev. Thomas J. Doyle. He is stationed at St. Alphonsus', Glasgow.

The Rev. ALEXANDER TAYLOR, D.D., was born at Greenock on the 1st July, 1876. He entered Blairs College on the 12th August, 1892, and in 1895 passed to St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick. In October, 1900, he proceeded to the Scots College, Rome, for the study of theology. He received tonsure and minor orders at various dates during 1900, and was ordained subdeacon on the 1st November, 1902, deacon on the 20th December following, and priest by Bishop Fratochi on the 25th July, 1903. Returning to Scotland in 1904 he was appointed assistant at St. Antony's, Govan. R.I.P.

The Rev. JOHN D. WOOD was born at Newcastle-on-Tyne on the 19th August, 1879. He entered Blairs College in August, 1893, and four years later passed to the Scots College, Rome. His dates of ordination are the same as those of the Rev. Peter Burns. He is assistant at Broxburn. R.I.P.

III. OBITUARY.

Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord. From henceforth now, saith the spirit, that they may rest from their labours; for their works follow them.—APOC., xiv., 13.

It is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from their sins.—2 MACHAB., xii., 46.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. ALEXANDER M'CORMICK, late of Carluke, who died at Rothesay on the 26th December, 1903, in the 33rd year of his age, and the 9th of his priesthood.

Father M'Cormick was born at Port-Glasgow on the 9th August, 1871. His ecclesiastical studies began at Blairs College, which he entered in August of 1884. Five years later he passed to the Petite Communauté, Paris, and in 1890 to St. Peter's College, Partick. Here and at New Kilpatrick he completed the study of philosophy and theology, and received his various orders, being ordained priest in 1895. His first appointment was to St. Mary's, Glasgow. In the following year he went as assistant to Shieldmuir where he remained for three years. In 1899 he went to St. Charles', Glasgow. His health had never been strong, and it was soon seen that he was not fitted for the hard labours of city life. In consequence he was sent to Westthorn, Dalbeth, where the quieter duties of chaplain were likely to induce an improvement in his health. Early in 1903 he was promoted to the mission of Carluke, but he was soon after compelled to relinquish all active missionary work, as he was found to be suffering from an acute form of consumption. He retired to Rothesay, where, after receiving the last Sacraments, he breathed his last on the 26th December, 1903. His body was conveyed to St. John's, Glasgow, where a requiem service was held on the following Tuesday. Canon Macluskey was the celebrant of the Mass, Father Forbes and Father Towie being deacon and sub-deacon. The Archbishop was present in the sanctuary and afterwards pronounced the absolutions.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. EDWARD WHYTE, S.J., formerly of the Sacred Heart, Edinburgh, who died at St. Ignatius' College, Stamford Hill, London, on the 26th January, 1904, in the 76th year of his age, and the 50th of his priesthood.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. ARCHIBALD CHISHOLM, of Marydale, who died at Inverness on the 27th January, 1904, in the 55th year of his age, and the 29th of his priesthood.

The Rev. Archibald Chisholm was born in Strathglass on the 6th February, 1849. His ecclesiastical studies began at Blairs College, which he entered in his seventeenth year, July, 1865. Five years later he proceeded to the Scots College, Valladolid, for his philosophy and theology. Here he remained five years, returning to his native country in May, 1875. In the following August he received all the major orders from Bishop Strain at Blairs College, being ordained priest on the 15th of that month. His first appointment was as assistant at Fochabers, where he remained two years. In August, 1877, the mission of Stonehaven was opened, and Father Chisholm was appointed its first pastor. He continued in this charge for three years, until in 1881 he was transferred to Nairn. In 1891 he was removed to Dornie and in this lonely mission he continued to serve for the next eight years. He was relieved of this charge in 1891, and transferred to Marydale in his native district. For a long time before his death Father Chisholm suffered greatly from an internal malady, and as the pains became more acute he in December of 1903 consulted a specialist, who pronounced his trouble to be cancer, and at the same time warned his friends that he had only a short time to live. He removed to Inverness for more capable nursing and treatment, and after passing through great suffering heroically borne, he quietly breathed his last on Wednesday the 27th January, 1904. The funeral service took place the following Saturday at St. Mary's, Inverness. The Rev. Alexander Bisset, of Nairn, was the celebrant of the Mass, and afterwards pronounced a tribute of respect over his dead friend. Owing to the circumstances of the season and locality only a limited number of the clergy could be present.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. FRANCIS JOSEPH HUGHES, who died at the Sacred Heart, Bridgeton, Glasgow, on the 3rd February, 1904, in the 59th year of his age, and the 34th of his priesthood.

Father Hughes was a native of Tyholland, Co. Monaghan, where he was born on the 5th August, 1845. His studies for

the priesthood were prosecuted at St. Macartan's Seminary, Monaghan, and at All Hallows' College, where he was ordained in 1870. He was immediately transferred to the Scottish Mission, and while waiting for an appointment he laboured at St. Mary's, Glasgow, for seven or eight weeks. His first appointment was to St. Alphonsus', Glasgow, where he remained for about a year and a half, until he was transferred to St. Mirin's, Paisley. Three and a half years later, in 1875, it was decided to establish a separate mission at Cardowan, and Father Hughes was appointed its first pastor. He organised the new mission, and whatever buildings were necessary at the time for the working of the parish. The work of the new mission was arduous, and told to some extent on Father Hughes' health, but he was nevertheless a strong, active man when he was appointed in 1886 to succeed the late Father Noonan in the charge of the Sacred Heart, Bridgeton. It was a comparatively new parish at that time, and was heavily burdened. Father Hughes set himself to complete the work that had been commenced, and to provide a suitable church and schools. The new schools were built, and an effort was made to begin the erection of a new church, but that this was not done was one of the regrets of Father Hughes, who longed to see the work commenced and completed. Though apparently robust, he was by no means healthy during his later years. A weakness of the chest hindered his efforts as a preacher for many years. The man was absorbed in the priest, and as a priest he realised the ideal of his people. His ceaseless anxiety to see the buildings of the mission completed disturbed his natural tranquillity, but it is remarkable that during the last few months he seemed to enjoy content and happiness, and to be possessed of the best of spirits. His last illness came upon him with startling rapidity. He was preparing to say Mass on Septuagesima Sunday, when he was seized with a shock of paralysis. He was immediately removed to bed, and medical attendance called in. The attack was seen to be a slight one, and high hopes were entertained of his eventual recovery. But a more serious shock supervened on Monday and prostrated him completely. The last Sacraments were administered; the patient lingered on for two days, and calmly expired on Wednesday, 3rd February. The funeral service took place on the following Friday. Canon Dyer was the celebrant of the Mass, with Fathers Duggan and Nolan as deacon and subdeacon. A large body of the Glasgow clergy assembled on the occasion and rendered the music of the Mass. The Archbishop was absent owing to indisposition. After the funeral discourse had been pronounced by Canon McBrearty, the absolutions were given by Canon Dyer, and the cortège proceeded to Dalbeth Cemetery for the interment. [*Glasgow Observer.*]

Pray for the soul of the Very Rev. ANTHONY CARROLL, C.P., of St. Mungo's, Glasgow, who died on the 29th April, 1904, in the 59th year of his age, and the 33rd of his priesthood.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. WILLIAM GALLAGHER, who died at Alexandria, Dumbartonshire, on the 24th May, 1904, in the 62nd year of his age, and the 34th of his priesthood.

The Rev. William Gallagher was a native of Glasgow, where he was born on the 3rd September, 1842. His ecclesiastical career began at Blairs College, which he entered in his eighteenth year, on the 21st July, 1860. Five years later he proceeded to the Scots College, Valladolid, when he pursued his course of philosophy and theology. On the completion of his studies he returned to Scotland in the summer of 1870, and was ordained priest by Archbishop Eyre on the 13th August of that year. His first appointment was as assistant at Partick, where he remained for five years. After serving for a year at Maryhill he was in 1876 promoted to the charge of Chapelhall. In 1879 came his appointment to the mission of Largs. Here he was destined to remain the next eighteen years, and it was in Largs that Father Gallagher's best years of missionary labour were spent, and his earnest work in a trying district made his name a household one in that part of the archdiocese. He opened the first school in Largs, and in the administration of his charge he displayed immense zeal, and was untiring in his efforts on behalf of his congregation. Great regret was felt when their long connection was broken by his appointment to Alexandria. This came in 1897, and here he remained till the end. For some time before his death his health had not been satisfactory, and a seizure on Thursday, 19th May last, gave warning of serious danger. The last Sacraments were administered on the following day. Everything was done to alleviate his condition, but the patient gradually sank, and breathed his last on Pentecost Tuesday, 24th May. The remains were removed to the church, and a solemn requiem was held on the following Friday. The celebrant of the Mass was Father Montgomery, of Clydebank, with Fathers Mullen and Jansen as deacon and subdeacon. The Archbishop and a large body of clergy were present on the occasion. The Rev. James F. Morrison, of Pollokshaws, preached the funeral oration. The remains were interred in Dalbeth Cemetery.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. JOSEPH B. PAYNE, of Bo'ness, who died at East Calder on the 19th June, 1904, in the 31st year of his age, and the 8th of his priesthood,

The early death of this young and amiable priest has been a source of deep regret to those congregations amongst whom he ministered, and particularly to his clerical brethren of the younger generation. He was born at Lochgelly on the 14th March, 1874. Evincing at an early age a call to the priesthood he was sent to Blairs College in September, 1887, passing five years later to Issy, and in due course to St. Sulpice, Paris. Here he was ordained priest on the 12th June, 1897. The first year of his missionary life was spent in Linlithgow. The next three years he served as assistant at St. Patrick's, Edinburgh. In 1901 Bo'ness, which for many years had been served from Linlithgow, was made a separate mission, and Father Payne was appointed to the charge. The pressing need of this mission was the erection of a school. To this duty Father Payne set himself with all zeal, and in the course of the second year of his incumbency he had the satisfaction of opening a handsome and commodious building suitable for all the present needs of the place. But the labours and anxieties in this connection told heavily upon his health. He had never been strong constitutionally, and in 1903 his health gave way completely. The following winter was spent in the Canaries; but all remedies proved fruitless, and he was brought home in a dying condition in the May of last year. Father Monaghan had him taken to the Presbytery at East Calder, and there every effort of care and nursing was expended on him during his few remaining days. He died on Sunday night, 19th June. His remains were conveyed to Edinburgh for burial. A solemn requiem was celebrated at St. Patrick's, Edinburgh, by Father Stuart, of Montrose, assisted by Father Miley, of Linlithgow, and Father Meade, of Edinburgh, as deacon and subdeacon. The Archbishop and a large body of priests were present on the occasion. The funeral discourse was delivered by the Rev. Francis Macmanus. After the final absolutions were pronounced by the Archbishop, the remains were conveyed to Mount Vernon for interment.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. JOHN BLACK, who died at Cardowan, Glasgow, on the 18th October, 1904, in the 81st year of his age, and the 57th of his priesthood.

It is with regret we chronicle the passing away of this veteran missionary, the doyen of the Glasgow clergy, whose death removed one of the few remaining links with the old heroic figures and the herculean labours of the early fifties. He was born in Glasgow on the 24th April, 1824. He was received into Blairs College on the 19th July, 1836, and remained there six years in the study of the humanities. In August, 1842, he proceeded to the Scots College, Rome, for his philosophy and theology. Here he was ordained priest on the 21st May, 1848. He started im-

mediately for Scotland, where he arrived in company with the late Canon Caven on the 6th June. The following sketch of his subsequent labours is taken from the *Glasgow Observer*:—

On coming to Scotland, fifty-six years ago, he had to undertake arduous labours which might well try the health and strength of a man of the most robust physique. After serving for a year at St. John's, Glasgow, he took up missionary duties in Lanark, which was then a much wider mission than at present, and after some years of extremely hard work he was transferred to Carluke. The mission of Carluke was virtually founded and built up by Father Black. The Carluke of that time was not the Carluke of to-day, and Father Black, then a stalwart young man, found the work of ministering to the people in that scattered district quite as much as he could well undertake, although he carried out his duties cheerfully and gladly. In Wishaw he will be affectionately remembered even by the present generation as the first pastor of the mission after its separation from Hamilton in 1889. During Father Black's pastorate, which lasted for little over a year, Mass was said in a small hall above the stables attached to a hotel in the town. The growth of Catholicity may be judged from the fact that during that time the mission of St. Ignatius covered the districts of Wishaw, Motherwell, Shieldmuir, Carfin, Cleland and Newmains, and Father Black's district covered an area now ministered to by thirteen priests. On leaving Wishaw Father Black became the first pastor of St. Vincent's, Glasgow, after its formal establishment as a separate charge, and the difficulties that have always to be encountered in the administration of a new mission were met successfully by Father Black, who retired from the charge on his appointment to the administratorship of St. Andrew's Cathedral, in 1862. For the past twelve years Father Black was the pastor of the mission at Cardowan, and until last year, although an old man, he undertook all the work of administration and school management single-handed. Few of his contemporaries were of so robust constitution. To Father Black a walk of twenty or more miles would have meant no serious exertion in his younger days; and up till the last he displayed wonderful vigour for a man of his advanced years. In his last days he was not burdened by any special ailment except the infirmity of age. For a short time he had to have assistance in the work of the mission, and quite recently he became unable to undertake much exertion of any kind. His death occurred on Tuesday morning in the presence of Canon Toner, Rutherglen, Father Geerty, Coatbridge, and his own assistant, Father Kearney, after having received all the consolations of the last Sacraments.

The funeral took place on the following Friday, when a solemn requiem was celebrated by Father Ritchie, of Shieldmuir, assisted by Father Sherwood, C.P., and Father Geerty as deacon and subdeacon. Archbishop Maguire assisted in the sanctuary, and

a large gathering of clergy came to render their last farewells to their aged comrade. After a touching and eloquent panegyric by Canon Toner the absolutions were given by the Archbishop. The remains were then conveyed to Dalbeth for interment.

THE main object of this College is to educate and train for the Priesthood those who may feel themselves called to dedicate themselves to God and the salvation of souls as Clergymen on the Scottish Mission. To this object all its funds are applied.

The requisite outfit comprises, two suits of tweed of the pattern known as parson grey (small boys may come in knickerbockers), two pairs of strong shoes, one pair slippers, the usual underclothing for day and night use, flannels, stockings and towels, a warm overcoat for winter. The Course of Education comprises all that is usually taught in Colleges.

Henceforward Students will not be admitted before their fourteenth year. They must bring with them a certificate showing that they have satisfactorily stood an examination in religious and secular knowledge equivalent to that required in the Highest Grade of an Elementary School. The time of entry is fixed for the 31st of August, and all Students must be in the College by that date. The greatest care is taken of their health; strict attention is paid to their comfort, and they are attended by a Medical Gentleman as often as occasion may require.

ST. MUNGO'S ACADEMY, TOWNHEAD, GLASGOW.

Conducted by the **MARIST BROTHERS.**

This Academy was founded in 1858 with a view to provide for the better-class Catholic children of Glasgow and environs a training both thoroughly religious and thoroughly practical. With what success the Marist Brothers have laboured to attain this twofold object may be inferred from the liberal patronage that has all along been extended to the School by the Clergy and the Laity of the Archdiocese of Glasgow.

In 1897 and 1902 the Premises were considerably enlarged in order to procure comfortable accommodation for the increased number of pupils. At present, besides the ordinary classrooms, the School has a well-equipped Scientific Laboratory, a Museum and a Library, all of which are regularly visited by the Students. Attached to the School are open and covered granolithic playgrounds, provided with gymnastic appliances.

The School is approved by the Education Department, Whitehall, and is visited twice annually by H.M. Inspectors. The Higher Grade Department is, moreover, recognised by the Glasgow Burgh Committee on Secondary Instruction as a Centre for the Higher Education of Boys, and is endowed with twenty-four Government Scholarships.

For instruction purposes, the Pupils are classified in accordance with their attainments into *Departments*, and are taught in nine separate classes by a Staff of sixteen Professors. The Course of Studies is predominantly Commercial.

The Preparatory Department affords work of a recreative, interesting and instructive nature, suited to the age and capacity of beginners.

The Elementary Department embraces, with the rudiments of French, the full course of the Elementary Education Code (Scotland). The test of fitness to pass from this Department to the Higher Grade is the Merit Certificate or the "Qualifying" Examination.

The Higher Grade Department Course occupies four years, and includes English, Latin or German, French, Arithmetic, Mathematics, Bookkeeping, Shorthand (Pitman and Script), Geography, History, Theoretical and Experimental Science, Commerce, Drawing and Music, and is intended as a general preparation for entrance into Business, the Civil Service, the Ecclesiastical Colleges and the University.

Quarterly Reports of Application, Punctuality, etc., are issued to the Parents.

Fees payable quarterly in advance, on the 1st August, 1st November, 1st February and 1st May.
