I. NOTES ON THE LITURGY.

I.—THE FESTIVALS.

The Festivals of the Church are not all celebrated with the same degree of solemnity; the words *Double*, *Semi-Double*, and *Simple*, found in the Calendar, show the degree of solemnity with which each feast is celebrated. The order is as follows: *double of the first class*, *double of the second class*, *double major*, *double*, *semi-double*, and *simple*. When the office is *double*, an entire Anthem is said or sung before and after each Psalm; when *semi-double*, only a word or two are said or sung before the Psalm. A *simple* has only three lessons at Matins. A *feria* is a week-day for which no Saint's Office is appointed.

The principal Festivals are *doubles of the first class*. Some Festivals have an Octave, or succession of eight days on which, with certain exceptions, the Office and Mass of the Feast are said.

II.—THE ROMAN MISSAL AND VESPER BOOK.

The prayers, and portions of the Holy Scripture, of which the Mass is composed, are partly always the same and partly different every day. Those that are invariable are contained in what is called the *Ordinary* of the Mass, at the beginning of the Missal. The parts that are changeable, or *proper*—*viz.*, the *Introits*, *Collects*, *Graduals* and *Tracts*, *Gospels*, *Offertories*, *Secrets*, *Communions*, and *Post-Communions*—form the subsequent contents. As the *Prefaces* are not so frequently subject to change, they follow each other in regular succession in the *Ordinary* of the Mass. In the Calendar, in the first part of this Directory, the proper Mass for each day in the year is indicated.

If a double falls on a Sunday, the Mass of the double is said instead of that of the Sunday, unless it be a Sunday of the *first class*—*viz.*, the First Sunday of Advent or Lent, Passion, Palm, Easter, Low, Pentecost, and Trinity Sundays—which are never superseded. The Sundays of the *second class*, which are superseded only by doubles of the *first class*, are the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th of Advent; Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima Sundays; and the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th of Lent. The Gospels for Sundays thus superseded are said at the end of the Mass, instead of St. John's Gospel; and a Commemoration of Sunday, by its proper *Collect*, *Secret*, and *Post-Communion*, is made after the *Collect*, &c., of the Festival.

The Evening Service of the Church is contained in the Vesper-Book. The following is the order of Vespers: *Pater noster* and *Ave Maria* being said, the Priest intones the Versicle *Deus, in adiutorium meum intende*, to which the choir answer by the Response, *Domine, ad adjuvandum me festina*, with the *Gloria Patri*; and when five Psalms, with their Anthems, have been sung, the Priest chants the *Little Chapter*. Then are sung the Hymn, with its Versicle and Response, and *Magnificat* with its Anthem, followed by the Prayers

and Commemorations appointed for the day; which, if it be neither a double nor within an Octave, are the Commemorations or *Suffrages* of the Saints, to be found after the Common Vespers for Sunday. All these Commemorations are indicated in the Calendar.

Every double has *first* and *second* Vespers: the *first* on the eve of the Festival, the *second* on the Festival itself. As a double is of higher rank than an ordinary Sunday, which is only a semi-double, it often happens that the Vespers are not of Sunday, but of some double that falls on it, or on the ensuing day, and in that case a Commemoration only is made of Sunday.

II. THE ANGELUS.

In Catholic countries, and in many places at home, the Angelus Bell is rung in the morning, at noon, and in the evening at sunset to honour the Mystery of the Incarnation. To gain the indulgences attached to this Devotion the Angelus must be said *kneeling*, except on Saturday evening and Sunday, when it is said *standing*. In Paschal Time, that is from Holy Saturday at noon till the Saturday before Trinity Sunday at noon, inclusively, the *Regina Cæli* is said instead of the Angelus. This prayer is always said *standing*. Those who do not know the *Regina Cæli* may gain the indulgences by saying the Angelus; but it must be said *standing* during Paschal Time. For the convenience of the Faithful is appended a translation of the *Regina Cæli* taken from the *Raccolta* (p. 165).

Queen of Heaven, rejoice. Alleluia.

For He whom thou wast made worthy to bear, Alleluia.

Hath arisen as He said. Alleluia.

Pray for us to our God. Alleluia.

V. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary. Alleluia.

R. For the Lord hath risen indeed. Alleluia.

Let us pray.

O God, who through the resurrection of Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, has vouchsafed to give joy to the whole world, grant us, we beseech Thee, that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may obtain the joys of eternal life. Through the same our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

III. INDULGENCES GRANTED TO THE FAITHFUL IN SCOTLAND.

An Indulgence is a remission of the whole, or a part, of the *temporal* punishment that often remains to be suffered for sins which, as to their guilt and *eternal* punishment, have been already remitted. For the effect and validity of an Indulgence, it is not only necessary that there be a competent authority in him who grants it, and a just cause or motive for the grant, but it is also necessary, on the part of him who obtains it, that he renounce and be sincerely sorry for all his sins, that he be in the state of grace,

and that he duly perform the conditions prescribed. Of Indulgences, some are called *plenary*, which, when fully obtained, remit the whole of the temporal punishment that remained due on account of past sins; others are for a certain number of years or days, which, when fully obtained, remit as much of the temporal punishment as would have been discharged by the performance of so many years or days of Canonical Penance.

The conditions for most of the Plenary Indulgences include confession. But for those who go to confession once a week, their weekly confession, if they remain in a state of grace, will suffice (Decrees of Sept. 9, 1763, and Nov. 15, 1841); and, by a Decree of June 12, 1822, a Plenary Indulgence granted for a *festival* may be gained if the confession be made a week before. Moreover, by a Decree of Oct. 6, 1870, it will for *any* Indulgence suffice that the confession, and also the Holy Communion, be made on the day before that which is appointed for the Indulgence.

The Holy See has been graciously pleased to grant to the Faithful in Scotland the following Plenary Indulgences, on certain conditions after specified:—

1st, From the Feast of St. Thomas, Apostle, 21st of December, to the first Sunday after the Epiphany, inclusively.

2nd, From Ash-Wednesday to the second Sunday of Lent, inclusively.

3rd, During the time appointed in each Diocese for complying with Easter duties.

4th, From Pentecost Sunday to Sunday after Corpus Christi.

5th, From Sunday before the Feast of SS. Peter and Paul to the Octave day.

6th, From Sunday before the Feast of the Assumption to the Octave day.

7th, From Sunday before the Feast of All Saints to the Octave day.

8th, On the Feast of St. Andrew, and during the Octave.

The following are the CONDITIONS on which the Faithful may gain these Indulgences.

1st, That within the time prescribed they approach to the Sacraments of Penance and the Holy Eucharist.

2nd, That on the day of their Communion they offer up some prayers to God for the happy state of the whole Church of Christ; for its Supreme Pastor, the Bishop of Rome; for peace and concord between all Christian Princes; for the exaltation and propagation of the Holy Catholic Faith, especially in our own country; and for the eternal salvation of all Christians.

3rd, That, if they have an opportunity, they visit within the limited time some church or oratory, and pray to God as has been mentioned before.

4th, That, if their circumstances enable them, they perform some works of mercy.

IV. INDULGENCE FOR THE LITANY OF THE B. VIRGIN.

On the 6th May, 1879, His Holiness granted the Apostolic Benediction, and an Indulgence of seven years on each Saturday, and on the Feasts of the Blessed Virgin, to the Faithful of England and Scotland who shall recite or sing the Litany of the Blessed Virgin in any church in either country.

V. THE PENTECOST NOVENA.

For the Pentecost Novena, prescribed by Encyclical Letters of 5th May, 1895, and 9th May, 1897, the following Indulgences have been granted to those taking part in the Novena; 1st, seven years and seven quarantines for each day; 2nd, a Plenary Indulgence on any one day of Novena, or on Pentecost, or on any day of the subsequent Octave, on the usual conditions of Confession and Communion and prayers for the Pope's intention. [These Indulgences are attainable by those also who are legitimately impeded from attending the Public Devotions, provided the Novena be done in private and the other conditions fulfilled.] Moreover, those who again, during the Octave of Pentecost, inclusive of Trinity Sunday, publicly or privately recite every day, according to their devotion, some prayers to the Holy Ghost, and satisfy the other conditions, may gain a second time the above Indulgences, both plenary and partial. All these Indulgences are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

N.B.—By a *quarantine* Indulgence is meant the remission of so much of the future penalty (*poena*) of sin as is the equivalent of keeping a Lent according to the strict discipline of the Church. (*Raccolta.*)

VI. DEVOTIONS IN THE OCTAVE OF CORPUS CHRISTI.

For the continuance and daily increase of the abundant fruit produced by the Decree of 20th December, 1905, on *Daily Communion*, Our Holy Father, POPE PIUS X., by a letter of the Sacred Congregation of Indulgences of the 10th April, 1907, to the Bishops of the Catholic Church, has expressed his wish to have, as far as may be possible, the following annual observances:—

(a) IN CATHEDRAL CHURCHES.

That on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, either immediately after the Festival of CORPUS CHRISTI, or (if the circumstances of persons or places so require) at some other time of the year to be fixed by the Bishop, there shall be in every Cathedral Church three days' prayer, as here described; namely—

I.—That, *on each day*, there shall be a sermon on the great excellence of the Sacrament of the Eucharist, and on the dispositions required for worthily receiving it. That, after the

sermon, the Blessed Sacrament shall be exposed; and during the Exposition the prayer *O most Sweet Jesus* (see below) shall be recited, to be followed on the Sunday by the *Te Deum*. That the *Tantum ergo* shall then be sung, and the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament be given.

II.—That, *on the Sunday*, the last of the three days, there shall be, at the usual parochial Mass, a homily by the Parish Priest on the gospel of the Sunday within the octave of CORPUS CHRISTI — or, if the Sunday be not within the octave, a sermon in preparation for a fervent Communion; and at this parochial Mass the faithful shall communicate. That, on this Sunday afternoon (or evening), there shall be the same service as on the two preceding days. And in the sermon the preacher shall exhort the faithful to more fervent piety towards the Most Holy Sacrament, and especially to a more frequent participation of this heavenly banquet, in accordance with the approved teaching of the *Catechismus Romanus* (see n. vi. of the Decree of 20th December, 1905). Moreover, at Benediction (as is said above) the *Tantum ergo* will be preceded by the *Te Deum*.

(b) IN PARISH CHURCHES.

His Holiness earnestly recommends that also in Parish Churches according as each Bishop in his prudence and discernment shall judge fit, there shall be at least those pious exercises which are above described for the cathedral Churches for the Sunday within the octave, or some other Sunday in the year.

That the faithful may more eagerly take part in the aforesaid pious exercises, His Holiness has been pleased to grant the following Indulgences, applicable also to the Souls in Purgatory:—

1.—An Indulgence of seven years and seven quarantines for each of the three days' prayer. 2.—A Plenary Indulgence to be gained once during the three days, on any day thereof, by those who devoutly assist at the devotions of any one day, and after Confession and Holy Communion pray for the intentions of the Holy Father. 3.—A plenary Indulgence to be gained on the Sunday by all who, after Confession, receive Holy Communion together in a Cathedral or a Parish Church, and pray for the Holy Father's intentions.

PRAYER BEFORE THE BLESSED SACRAMENT.

O most sweet Jesus, Who didst come into this world to enrich the souls of all mankind with the life of Thy grace, and Who, to preserve and sustain this life in them, dost daily give Thyself in the most august Sacrament of the Eucharist, as a saving medicine to heal their infirmities and a divine food to support their weakness, we pray and beseech Thee to pour forth upon

them most graciously Thy holy spirit, so that, being filled therewith, any who are in mortal sin may, by returning to Thee, be restored to the life of grace which they have lost; and that those who, by Thy great mercy, already serve Thee may daily, as far as each one is able, come devoutly to Thy heavenly banquet, and in the strength thereof may find a remedy for their daily venial faults and a support of the life of Thy grace, and, thus becoming more and more cleansed from sin, may obtain the everlasting happiness of heaven. Amen.

VII. DEVOTIONS ON THE FEAST OF THE SACRED HEART OF JESUS.

By a Decree of the S. Congregation of Indulgences, 22nd August, 1906, His Holiness Pope Pius X. ordered that each year on the Feast of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, in all Parish Churches as well as others where the feast is observed, the form of Consecration issued by Pope Leo XIII. on the 25th May, 1899, should be recited during exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, followed by the Litany of the Sacred Heart. To all who with devout and contrite heart assist at this pious exercise and pray for the Pope's intentions, His Holiness grants an Indulgence of seven years and seven quarantines, and further a plenary Indulgence to those who after confession receive Holy Communion. These Indulgences are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

VIII. THE DEVOTIONS FOR THE MONTH OF OCTOBER.

For the *October Devotions*, prescribed by Decrees of 20th August, 1885, etc., the following Indulgences have been granted: *1st*, seven years and seven quarantines each time one joins in the public recital of the Rosary and Litany of the B. Virgin (or, being legitimately impeded, says them privately), and prays according to the intentions of the Pope; *2nd*, a Plenary Indulgence to those who, having done this at least ten times, confess and communicate; *3rd*, a Plenary Indulgence to all who, on the Feast of the Rosary or within the Octave, confess, communicate, and pray in some church to God and the B. Virgin according to the intention of His Holiness; *4th*, seven years and seven quarantines, each time, for the recital of the following prayer to St. Joseph enjoined by the Encyclical of 15th August, 1889.

PRAYER TO S. JOSEPH.

To thee, O blessed Joseph, we fly in our tribulation, and while imploring the help of thy most holy spouse, thy protection also with confidence we crave. By that affection which united thee with the Immaculate Virgin, Mother of God, and by the fatherly love with which thou didst embrace the Child Jesus, we humbly

supplicate thee to look down benignantly on the heritage which Christ Jesus purchased with His Blood, and in thy might and power to succour us in our necessities.

Defend, O most provident Guardian of the Divine Family, the chosen race of Jesus Christ; keep us, most loving father, from all taint of error and corruption; do thou from heaven, as our most powerful Protector, stand graciously by us in this conflict with the powers of darkness; and as of old thou didst rescue the Child Jesus in the imminent peril of His life, so now defend the Holy Church of God from hostile wiles and all adversity, and through thy never-failing patronage so shield each one of us, that guided by thy example and supported by thy aid, we may live in holiness, piously die, and attain eternal happiness in heaven. Amen.

IX. PRAYERS ENJOINED BY THE POPE.

To be said kneeling after Low Mass.

Hail Mary, *three times.* Then *Salve Regina.*

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy; Hail, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To Thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve; to Thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this vale of tears. Turn then, most gracious Advocate, Thine eyes of mercy towards us; and after this our exile, show unto us the Blessed Fruit of Thy womb, Jesus; O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

V. Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God.

R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Let us pray.

O God, our refuge and our strength, look with favour on Thy people who cry to Thee; and through the intercession of the Glorious and Immaculate Virgin Mary, Mother of God, and Blessed Joseph her Spouse, of Thy Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and of all the Saints, mercifully and graciously hear the prayers which we pour forth for the conversion of sinners, and for the freedom and exaltation of our Holy Mother the Church. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

St. Michael the Archangel defend us in the day of battle; be our safeguard against the wickedness and snares of the devil;—"the Lord command him," we humbly pray;—and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, thrust into hell Satan and the other wicked spirits who go about the world for the destruction of souls. Amen.

An Indulgence of 300 days is granted to all who recite these prayers as above.

X. ASSOCIATION FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE FAITH.

This Institution assists by prayers and alms the Missionaries who are engaged in preaching the Gospel. The prayers are a *Pater* and *Ave* each day. It will suffice to say for this purpose the *Pater* and *Ave* of our morning and night prayers, adding the aspiration, *Saint Francis Xavier, pray for us.* The alms is only one half-penny per week. One member in ten acts as collector, and pays in the amount to another member, who has ten such collections to receive. Donations are likewise thankfully received. Two committees, one in Paris, and the other at Lyons, distribute their alms to the Missions. A return of the sums received, and of their appropriation, is inserted annually in the *Annals of the Propagation of the Faith.* This collection, to the reading of which each member is entitled, appears six times a year. One copy is supplied to every ten members.

PLENARY INDULGENCES.—On the 3rd of May (the Anniversary of the foundation of the Society); the 3rd of December (the feast of St. Francis Xavier); the feasts of the Epiphany, Annunciation, and Assumption—or any day within the Octave of these five festivals; the 29th of September (the feast of St. Michael); all the feasts of the Apostles; two days in each month, at the member's option; once a year for the *general* commemoration of deceased members; once a year for the *special* commemoration of deceased members of the Council, Committee, or Decade to which he belongs; at the hour of death, provided he invokes the name of Jesus. Children, who have not yet made their first communion, may likewise gain these indulgences. These and the following are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

PARTIAL INDULGENCES.—300 days every time a member attends the Triduum of the 3rd of May and the 3rd of December; 100 days every time a member recites *Our Father* and *Hail Mary*, together with the invocation of St. Francis Xavier; 7 years and 7 quarantines every time a member performs any good work in the interests of the Society.

FAVOUR OF PRIVILEGED ALTARS.—For every Mass said in the name of a member for a deceased member. For personal privileges and other special favours to Priests, see the *Annals.*

Whoever contributes at one time 200 francs (£8), at the least, to establish a permanent fund—even though this sum should be immediately expended on the Missions—shall be regarded as a member in perpetuity, and as such enjoy all the privileges and indulgences on performing the other conditions prescribed.

Alms and Donations for the Association are received in Scotland by any of the Clergy.

XI. EASTER DUTIES AND INDULGENCE.

By a Rescript from the Holy See, dated 26th September, 1906, the Faithful of the Dioceses of St. Andrews and Edinburgh, Glas-

gow and Dunkeld, are authorised to satisfy the obligation of the Paschal Communion, and to gain the Plenary Indulgence, on any day from the first Sunday of Lent to Sunday within the Octave of the Ascension, inclusively; and those of the Diocese of Galloway, of Aberdeen, and of Argyll and the Isles, from the first Sunday of Lent till Low Sunday. This extension is granted for a term of five years.

XII. FAST AND ABSTINENCE DAYS, AND LENTEN INDULT.

I.—FAST DAYS ON ONE MEAL.

1st, All the days in Lent except Sundays.

2nd, The Wednesdays and Fridays of Advent.

3rd, The Ember-days occurring in the four seasons of the year, being the Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays after the first Sunday of Lent, after Pentecost Sunday, after the third Sunday of September, and after the third Sunday of Advent. But if the 14th of September, or the 13th of December, fall upon a Wednesday, the Ember-Days of that season are kept the week following.

4th, The Vigils or Eves of Pentecost Sunday, of SS. Peter and Paul, of the Assumption, of All Saints, of St. Andrew, and of Christmas.

N.B.—When a Fast-Day falls upon a Sunday, it is to be observed on the Saturday before.

II.—DAYS OF ABSTINENCE.

On which the Church prohibits the use of Flesh Meat.

1st, All Fast-Days, unless a Dispensation be granted for some days in Lent.

2nd, All the Sundays in Lent, unless a Dispensation be granted.

3rd, The Fridays throughout the year. But if Christmas-Day falls on a Friday, it is not a day of abstinence.

III.—LENTEN REGULATIONS FOR 1910.

By authority of the Holy See.

1. *For those who are bound to fast.*

1. Flesh meat is allowed at the chief meal on all days, except Wednesdays and Fridays, Ember Saturday, and Holy Saturday.

2. Eggs, milk, butter, butterine or margarine, and cheese, are allowed every day without exception, both at the chief meal and, in small quantity, at collation. [Butterine is now allowed throughout the year.]

3. Dripping and lard are allowed at the chief meal and, in small quantity, at the collation every day in Lent except Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. [This permission is now extended to all fast and abstinence days throughout the year.]

4. Suet is allowed only when flesh meat is allowed.

2. *For those who are not bound to fast.*

The kinds of food, which are allowed at their principal meal to those who are bound to fast, are allowed at all times to those who are not so bound, with the exception of Holy Thursday, on which day flesh meat may be taken only at one meal.

3. *For all.*

1. On Sundays flesh meat, eggs, etc., may be taken by fasters and non-fasters alike at every meal; but fish and flesh cannot be taken at the same meal.

2. The prohibition of fish and flesh at the same meal applies to all days in Lent, as also to all fast-days throughout the year, and is binding on both fasters and non-fasters.

N.B.—The Holy Father earnestly exhorts the Faithful to compensate for these relaxations, granted for very urgent reasons, by other good works, and especially by almsgiving to the poor.

XIII. MARRIAGES.

By the decree of the Council of Trent (Sess. 24, Chap. 10 de Reformat. Matrimonii), the solemnising of Marriage is forbidden from Ash Wednesday till Low Sunday inclusively, and from the first Sunday of Advent till the Feast of the Epiphany inclusively.

The decree of the same Council (*ibid.* Chap. 1) respecting Clandestine Marriages was extended to the whole of Ireland on the 2nd December, 1827; and was consequently in force thirty days afterwards.

A decree, issued with orders and sanction of the Holy Father by the Sacred Congregation of the Council on the 2nd August, 1907, introduced into the marriage laws new and important legislation which, while binding the Church at large from Easter Sunday of 1908, by a special exemption of the Holy See (S. Cong. de Prop. Fide: 29th February, 1908), came into force in Scotland on and after the 1st September of the same year. By this decree it is enacted among other things, that no Catholic (with certain stated exceptions) can validly contract marriage save before the parish priest or the Ordinary (or the delegate of either), and at least two witnesses.

Marriage cannot be contracted by persons within the 4th degree of kindred without a Dispensation; and, if attempted, is invalid.—Spiritual kindred, contracted by Baptism or Confirmation, is an impediment.

A "mixed marriage" (that is, a marriage between a Catholic and one who, though baptised, does not profess the Catholic Faith) is unlawful without a Dispensation; and the Dispensation cannot lawfully be given unless for a sufficiently grave reason, and subject to the following conditions: 1. That *all* the children that may be

born of the marriage shall be baptised, and brought up, in the Catholic Faith. 2. That the Catholic party shall have full liberty for the practice of the Catholic religion. 3. That no religious marriage ceremony shall take place elsewhere than before the Catholic Priest. 4. That the Catholic party shall endeavour to effect the conversion of the non-Catholic party to the true faith of Christ.

XIV. SICK CALLS.

All sick calls should be given in at the Priest's house at a timely hour in the morning. If this reasonable rule were adhered to, it would save the Clergy much unnecessary labour, and the people many disappointments, which they may justly ascribe to their now want of system.

On Saturdays, eves of Holidays, and other days which are generally devoted to the Confessional, the Priest should not, if possible, be called away from this important duty. Unless in cases of necessity, sick calls should not be made on Saturdays or Sundays, when the Clergy have so many other duties to attend to.

It is the duty of the people to conform to whatever regulations may be made by the Clergy, on these and other matters connected with religion, in their respective congregations. All things should be done in order, according to the advice of St. Paul.

When the Priest is called to attend a sick person, everything that he requires for the administration of the Sacraments should be furnished as decently as possible in the room where the sick person lies—*viz.*, a table covered with a clean linen cloth, on which should be laid a candle, a vessel of holy water with an Asperges, a small vessel of common water for the purification of the Priest's fingers after the administration of the Holy Viaticum, and a napkin for the sick person at the time of Communion. As the Priest generally brings the Blessed Sacrament on these occasions, everything should be so becomingly prepared, according to their means, as to show the great respect of the inmates for Jesus Christ, and the high value they set upon the honour thus rendered to their house in the visit of their Lord and Redeemer.

While the Priest is administering the Viaticum and Extreme Unction, the assistants should devoutly offer up their prayers to God on behalf of the sick person, to implore that he may receive those Sacraments with the necessary dispositions.

XV. EXTRACTS FROM THE RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD FOR THE RELIEF OF THE POOR IN SCOTLAND.

Address—LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD, EDINBURGH.

[By enactment of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1894, the duties previously discharged by the Board of Supervision and

by Parochial Boards, have been transferred to, and are continued by, the Local Government Board and Parish Councils respectively; accordingly the latter names take the place of the former in the following Extracts.]

The Board issued a Circular Letter, dated 3rd November, 1864, enclosing rules relating to the "General Register of Poor," and "The Children's Separate Register". Rules I., II., and III. provide for the mode of keeping such Registers by the Inspectors of Poor in every Parish.

RULE IV.—"The Parish Council of each Parish or Combination shall before the first January, 1865, name and publicly announce two lawful days in the week on each of which, during one hour to be fixed and announced in like manner by that Council, but not earlier than 9 A.M., nor later than 3 P.M., both 'The General Register' and the 'Children's Separate Register,' directed by Rule V. to be kept, shall be open to inspection at the office of the Inspector of Poor, free of charge, by any known Minister of any religious denomination officiating in the Parish or Combination, and on payment of one shilling on each occasion that he inspects it, by any ratepayer of the Parish or Combination giving his name and address in writing."

RULE VII.—"The particulars relating to each child required to be entered in the 'Children's Separate Register' are:—

"1st, The name and the age ascertained or presumed. The date at which he or she became chargeable, and whether as an orphan, or as a deserted child, or as a child separated from a parent, or parents, and if so separated, then the reason for such separation.

"2nd, The Religious Denomination—whether Protestant or Roman Catholic—with the grounds for holding the child to be of the denomination entered in the Register.

"3rd, The name, religious denomination, and place of residence of the parents, or of the last surviving parent of the child, so far as these are known or can be ascertained.

"4th, The date of any minute of the Parish Council or Committee thereof, directing that the child be sent to the Poorhouse or be boarded out, and when directed to be boarded out, the name, religious denomination, and place of residence of the person with whom the child is boarded, and date of removal thereto; and if the child be registered as a Roman Catholic then the date of intimation sent, in terms of the Local Government Board's Minute of 13th February, 1862, to the priest of that faith residing nearest to the place where the child is to be boarded. Also, in like manner, similar entries with reference to every subsequent order for removal, and actual removal of the same child boarded out, from one place or house to another, or from the care of one person to another, from time to time so long as the child is receiving relief.

"5th, The date and the age at which, and the circumstances in consequence of which, the child may have ceased to be chargeable

to the Parish or Combination, and the name, residence, and occupation or trade, of the person with whom the child may have been apprenticed, or may have engaged as a servant, while receiving parochial relief."

RULE VIII.—"In every case in which an orphan or deserted child, or a child separated from its parents, is ordered to be sent to the Poorhouse, the Inspector shall state in the ticket for his, or her, admission, the religious denomination of the child as entered in the 'Child's Separate Register,' and the House Governor of the Poorhouse shall enter the child in the Poorhouse Register as of that denomination; and he shall cause to be delivered on Monday of each week to any known Minister of the religious denomination of any inmate, and who regularly visits, or has been nominated to visit the Poorhouse, for the purpose of instructing the children of his own denomination, a list of all such children then inmates of the Poorhouse, if he applies for it."

EXTRACT FROM MINUTE OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD, 13TH
FEBRUARY, 1862.

"Complaints have been made to the Board that Pauper children, whose parents were Roman Catholics, have been placed by the Parish Council in Protestant Institutions, to which Roman Catholic Clergymen are denied access, and have been thus brought up Protestants. The Board therefore desire to remind Parish Councils that they are bound to take care that the education given by them as a part of the relief, which they are required to afford to Pauper children, shall not be so conducted as to counteract the religious instruction which the parents, or surviving parent, may intimate a desire to give to any such child. In the case of children who have no surviving parent, the intention of the parents in this respect must be inferred to have been to bring up the children in the religious tenets which they themselves professed.

"In order to acquit themselves of these obligations, Parish Councils ought to place the younger children of Roman Catholic parents, whom it is desired to board out, in families of the Roman Catholic persuasion, when suitable families of that persuasion can be found in the parish, or within such distance beyond it as the Parochial Board may consider it expedient to send Pauper children. If no such families can be found and the parish has Poorhouse accommodation, then such Roman Catholic children ought to be placed in the Poorhouse, where the Roman Catholic Clergyman has access to them in terms of the Rules and Regulations; but if there be no suitable Roman Catholic family in which the child can be boarded, and the parish be not possessed of Poorhouse accommodation, then special care ought to be taken that wherever the child may be placed, the known Clergyman of the religious persuasion of its parents shall have free access to it, at reasonable hours, for the purpose of imparting religious instruction; and the place of

residence of every such child ought to be intimated to the nearest resident Clergyman of the religious persuasion of its parents.

“ Where there is a properly conducted Roman Catholic school in the Parish, the child of Roman Catholic parents, who is boarded out, ought to be sent to that school, if it be within a reasonable distance of the Roman Catholic family in which the child is boarded; or if no suitable Roman Catholic family can be found willing to receive it, and there be no Poorhouse accommodation belonging to the Parish, then the child, which must in that case of necessity be boarded in a Protestant family, ought, if possible, to be placed with one which resides within such a moderate distance of a properly conducted Roman Catholic school as will admit of the child's regularly attending that school, and the child should be required to attend it accordingly.”

Education of Roman Catholic Children.

“ The Board are of opinion, that although education is part of the relief which the Parish Council is bound to provide for pauper children, that Board is not legally bound to subsidise, from the Parochial funds, schools of every different religious denomination to which any of the pauper children and the ratepayers may happen to belong.

“ A parent, or if there be no parent, then a legal guardian is the only person who in the opinion of the Board has a right to determine what religious tenets shall be taught to the child. . . . In the case of children who have no surviving parent, the intention of their parents in this respect must be inferred to have been to bring up their children in the tenets which they themselves, or the last survivor of them, professed.”

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF
POORHOUSES.

By these rules the following, amongst other, provisions are made:—

The keeping of the Register of Inmates by the House Governor, and to enter therein the name, religious persuasion, etc., of every inmate.

RULE I. provides “ that inmates who refuse to attend on account of their religious principles ” shall be exempted from attendance at morning and evening prayers, and divine service on Sundays.

RULE II.—“ Any regular Minister of the religious persuasion of any inmate shall at any time in the day, on the request of any inmate, be allowed by the House Governor to enter the Poorhouse for the purpose of affording religious assistance to such inmate, or for the purpose of instructing his child or children in the principles of his religion.”

RULE LII.—“ When a regular Minister of any religious persua-

sion shall request permission to visit members of his congregation who may be inmates of the Poorhouse, orders shall be given for his admission at such hours as the House Governor may consider proper; and if such inmates, or several of them, desire it, arrangement shall be made for assembling them in some convenient apartment where religious instruction may be given or divine service conducted with decorum, and apart from the other inmates."

RULE LIIII.—No work except the necessary household work shall be performed by the inmates on Sabbath-day.

RULE LIV.—No work except as above shall be required from any poor person, who shall be entered in the Register as professing the Roman Catholic religion, on any of the following days observed as Holidays in the Roman Catholic Church, that is to say, the 1st and 6th days of January, the 17th and 25th days of March, the 29th day of June, the 15th day of August, the 1st day of November, Ascension Day and Corpus Christi Day.*

REFORMATORY AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

I. REFORMATORY SCHOOLS.

By the Reformatory Schools Act, 29 and 30 Vict., c. 117, section 16 (Aug. 10, 1866), it is enacted—

That the parent, step-parent, or guardian—or, if there be no parent, step-parent, or guardian, then the god-parent or nearest adult relative—of any youthful offender sent or about to be sent to a school which is not conducted in accordance with the religious persuasion to which the offender belongs, may apply to the court by whom such offender was sentenced to be sent to a Reformatory School; or to the visiting justices of the prison to which the offender was committed by that court; or to the justices or magistrate by whom the offender was sentenced to be sent to a Reformatory School (or justices or magistrate having the like jurisdiction); with request to send or remove such offender to a Certified Reformatory School conducted in accordance with the offender's religious persuasion: and the court, visiting justices, justices, or magistrate (as the case may be) shall, upon proof of such offender's religious persuasion, comply with the request of the applicant, provided—1, that the application is made before the offender has been sent to a Certified Reformatory School, or within thirty days after the arrival at such School; and 2, that the managers of the School named are shown to be willing to receive the offender.

II. INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

By the Industrial Schools Act, 29 and 30 Vict., c. 118, Section 20 (Aug. 10, 1866), it is enacted—

* Christmas and St. Andrew's day (not mentioned in the above Rule) are Holydays of Obligation in Scotland but the 17th and 25th days of March are not.

That, if the parent, step-parent, or guardian—or, if there be no parent, step-parent, or guardian, then the god-parent or nearest adult relative—of a child sent, or about to be sent, to a school, not conducted in accordance with the religious persuasion to which the child belongs, states to the justices or magistrate by whom the order of detention has been made or is about to be made (or to two justices or a magistrate having the like jurisdiction), that he, or she, objects to the child being sent to, or detained in the school specified, or about to be specified, in the order; and names another Certified Industrial School in Great Britain which is conducted in accordance with the child's religious persuasion, and signifies his, or her, desire that the child be sent thereto; then the justices or magistrate shall, upon proof of such child's religious persuasion, comply with the request of the applicant, provided—1, That the application is made before the child has been sent to a Certified Industrial School, or within thirty days after its arrival at such school; and 2, that the managers of the school are shown to be willing to receive the child.

N.B.—With regard both to Reformatory and to Industrial Schools, when thirty days after the offender's or child's entrance into a non-Catholic School have passed, application for transfer to a Catholic Reformatory or Industrial School can be made only to the Home Secretary. The following is the form of application:—

"To the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Home Department.—Right Hon. Sir, I, the undersigned, being the (*state relationship, or, in default thereof, whether god-parent or guardian, striking out from 'and' to 'kin'*) and nearest adult relative, or next of kin of....., an offender aged years, not belonging to the Established Church, but to the Roman Catholic Religion, and now under detention in the Certified School at....., apply to you to order, pursuant to the Statute 29 and 30 Vict., cap. 117, the transfer of the aforesaid..... to the Roman Catholic Certified School established at.....

"I offer the annexed proofs that the aforesaid..... belongs to the Roman Catholic Religion, and that the Manager of the School is willing to receive the Offender.

* * There is a Catholic Certified Reformatory School for *boys* at Westthorn, Parkhead, Glasgow; for *girls* at Mount Vernon, Liberton, Edinburgh.

There are Catholic Certified Industrial Schools for *boys* at 72 Abercromby Street, Glasgow; Slatefield Street, Glasgow; and Tranent; for *girls* at 74 Abercromby Street, Glasgow, and Nazareth House, Claremont Street, Aberdeen.

XVI. THE PIOUS ASSOCIATION OF THE HOLY FAMILY

FORM OF CONSECRATION OF A CHRISTIAN FAMILY TO THE HOLY FAMILY.

O Jesus, our most loving Redeemer, who didst come into the world to enlighten it by Thy teaching and by Thy example, and who didst will to pass the greater part of Thy mortal life in the poor cottage of Nazareth, in humble subjection to Mary and Joseph, thus sanctifying that Family which was to be the model of all Christian families: graciously receive this family, which dedicates and consecrates itself to Thee this day. Do Thou protect us, do Thou watch over us! Do Thou bestow upon us Thy holy fear, peace, concord, and Christian love; that so, by the imitation of Thy Family as our pattern and model, we may each and all obtain everlasting happiness.

O Mary, loving Mother of Jesus and our Mother, by thy gracious intercession make this humble dedication acceptable to Jesus, and obtain for us His graces and blessings.

St. Joseph, holy Guardian of Jesus and Mary, assist us by thy prayers in all our spiritual and temporal necessities; so that, with Mary and with thee, we may for all eternity bless and thank our Divine Redeemer, Jesus.

XVII. CELEBRATIONS FOR DECEASED CLERGYMEN.

By a rule immemorially observed in the Mission of Scotland, every Missionary belonging to it offered up three Masses for the

soul of each Bishop or Priest who died attached to the Mission. In consequence of the greatly increased number of Clergymen, this rule was modified in 1847 by the Vicars Apostolic, by authority of the Holy See, in so far that every Missionary was bound to celebrate thrice for those belonging to his own District, and once for those who had served in another District. Lastly, in virtue of a Papal Rescript of 20th June, 1879, the rule was again altered by the Archbishops and Bishops, to the effect that every Missionary is obliged to celebrate thrice for a deceased Missionary of his own Diocese, and once for one of any other diocese.

XIX. VICARS APOSTOLIC IN SCOTLAND,

FROM THE EXTINCTION OF THE HIERARCHY IN 1603 TILL ITS RESTORATION
IN 1878.

1. The ancient Hierarchy ended with JAMES BETOUN, Abp. of Glasgow, who died at Paris on the 25th April, 1603, aged 79. After being subjected to the jurisdiction of the Archpriests and first Vicar-Apostolic of England till 1623, and afterwards to local Prefects of the Mission, the Clergy were incorporated into a missionary body by decree of *Propaganda*, 1653, and governed by the following *Prefects-Apostolic*:—WILLIAM BANNATYNE (or *Bellenden*), 1653-61; ALEXANDER DUNBAR (or *Winster*), 1662-68, 1672-94; and JOHN WALKER (or *Ross*), 1668-71. In May, 1694, a Scottish *Vicariate-Apostolic* was established. This was divided into two *Districts*, the *Lowland* and *Highland*, in February, 1731; and these into three, the *Eastern*, *Western*, and *Northern*, by Papal Rescript of 13th February, 1827. This last arrangement remained in force till the re-establishment of the Hierarchy by the Apostolic Letter *Ex supremo Apostolatus apice*, 4th March, 1878.

The See of the Isles (*Insularum*, or *Sodorensis*) is said to have been founded about 447 by ST. PATRICK, who consecrated GERMANUS, its first Bishop; was united to *Man* till the end of the 14th century; and was vacant for 325 years, from the death of RODERICK MACLEAN in 1553.

The See of Whithorn (*Candida Casa*) or Galloway was founded in 397 by St. Ninian, Apostle of the Southern Picts; was extinct from about 803 to 1189; and was vacant for 320 years, from the death of ANDREW DURIE, O. Cist., at Edinburgh in September, 1558.

§ I.

THE CATHOLIC HIERARCHY.

The Catholic Hierarchy, or the governing body of the Holy Catholic Church, consists of: 1. His Holiness the Sovereign Pontiff, assisted by the Sacred College of Cardinals, and by the Sacred Congregations (of which the Cardinals are the chief members), the Tribunals, and the Offices, of the Roman Curia; 2. the Patriarchs, Archbishops and Bishops; 3. the Apostolic Delegates, Vicars and Prefects; and 4. certain Abbots and Prelates.

I. GENERAL SUMMARY.

The less are those of: Babylon, *Chaldaic*; Cilicia, *Armenian*; the East Indies, *Latin*; Lisbon, *Latin*; Venice, *Latin*; and the West Indies, *Latin*.

This summary of *Residential Sees* of Archbishops and Bishops, amounting with the 14 Patriarchal Sees to 1023, is taken from the official *Gerarchia Cattolica*, published at Rome in 1909.

Besides the *Residential Sees*, there are many *Titular Sees*, formerly (until March 3, 1882) called Sees "*in partibus infidelium*," that is, Sees in infidel regions, the Archbishops and Bishops of which only take their title from them without being bound to residence. These Sees are, for the most part, assigned to Archbishops and Bishops appointed, either to Apostolic Delegations, Vicariates, or Prefectures; or to the office of Coadjutor, Auxiliary, or Administrator of a Diocese.—The number of Titular Sees is 610. Many are vacant.

II. THE SOVEREIGN PONTIFF.

HIS HOLINESS POPE PIUS X. (JOSEPH SARTO), the 258th Roman Pontiff, was born at Riese, in the Province of Venice, June 2, 1835; appointed Bishop of Mantua, Nov. 10, 1884; created Cardinal, June 12, 1893; made Patriarch of Venice, June 15, 1893; elected Pope, Aug. 4, and crowned Aug. 9, 1903.

III. THE SACRED COLLEGE OF CARDINALS.

The Cardinals, as the advisers and assistants of the Sovereign Pontiff, are the supreme council or senate of the Church. On the death of the Pontiff, they elect his successor.

There are three orders of Cardinals, *Bishops*, *Priests*, and *Deacons*. These orders are distinct from those of the Hierarchy: with very few exceptions, the Cardinal Priests are archbishops or bishops; and the Cardinal Deacons are generally priests.

The Sacred College, when complete, consists of 70 members: 6 Cardinal Bishops, whose dioceses are the six 'Suburban Sees,' near Rome; 50 Cardinal Priests, who take their title from the 'Titular Churches,' to which they are appointed, with jurisdiction and right to a throne, etc., therein; and 14 Cardinal Deacons, who are appointed to other churches called 'Deaconries'.

The first Cardinal Bishop is *Dean*, the first of the Priests is *First Priest*, and the first of the Deacons is *First Deacon*, of the Sacred College. The Dean has the right of consecrating, and the First Deacon the right of proclaiming and crowning, a new Pope.

On the death of the Pontiff the Cardinal *Camerlengo* has the administration of the public affairs of the Holy See.

The 'creation' of a Cardinal sometimes precedes, even by several years, its 'publication' or proclamation. The Cardinal is then said to be 'reserved *in petto*,' and, when proclaimed, he takes precedence according to date of creation.

There are 53 Cardinals, and 17 vacancies. One of the Cardinals now living was created by Pius IX. ; 37 by Leo XIII. ; and 15 by Pius X. Twenty-eight Cardinals have died during the present Pontificate.

Of the 53 Cardinals, 34 are Italian, 7 Austrian, German, or Polish, 3 French, 2 British subjects, 3 Spanish, 1 Portuguese, 1 of the United States, 1 Belgian, and 1 Brazilian.

Of the 42 Cardinal Priests, 1 is a Patriarch ; 24 are Archbishops, and 4 Bishops, of Residential Sees ; and the 13 others have received episcopal consecration ; so that, including the 6 Cardinal Bishops, 48 Cardinals are Patriarchs, Archbishops, or Bishops.

IV. THE ROMAN CURIA.

The Roman Curia, as re-constituted by the Apostolic Constitution *Sapienti consilio* (29th June, 1908) of Pope Pius X., consists of the following Sacred Congregations, Tribunals, and Offices.

SACRED CONGREGATIONS,

And the Matters with which they have to deal.

1. *Congregation of the Holy Office.* The protection of faith and morals ; the judging of heresy ; the doctrine and the use of Indulgences ; impediments to Marriage with non-Catholics ; dogmatic teaching as to Marriage and other Sacraments.
2. *Consistorial Congregation.* The preparation of matter for Consistories ; the erection and division of dioceses, etc., and the election of Bishops. Also whatever relates to the government of dioceses not subject to the *Propaganda* ; to the reports of Bishops concerning the state of their dioceses ; to apostolic visitations ;

and to the direction, temporal administration and studies of seminaries.

3. *Congregation of Sacramental Discipline.* Legislation as to the administration and reception of the Sacraments; dispensations from impediments to Marriage and to Ordination, and in regard to the Blessed Eucharist; questions as to the validity of Marriages and of Ordinations.

4. *Congregation of the Council.* The observance of precepts of the Church and dispensations therein. Regulations as to parish priests and Canons; to pious associations, pious bequests, and pious works; to benefices, ecclesiastical property, etc. Also whatever relates to the celebration of Councils and their ratification, and to meetings and conferences of Bishops.

5. *Congregation for the Affairs of Religious.* The regulation of matters between Bishops and Religious, and amongst Religious themselves, including persons who, without vows, live a community life, or are secular members of Third Orders. Also the granting of dispensations to Religious.

6. *Congregation "de Propaganda Fide"*. Having jurisdiction over missionary countries, including however many regions where hierarchies are established. From this jurisdiction the United Kingdom, Holland, Luxemburg, Canada, Newfoundland, and the United States, have recently been withdrawn.—With the *Propaganda* is united a Congregation for the Oriental Rites, and a Commission for the union of dissenting Churches.

7. *Congregation of the Index.* The examination, and (in concert with the Holy Office) the prohibition, of books dangerous to faith or otherwise pernicious.

8. *Congregation of Sacred Rites.* The care and regulation of rites and ceremonies; the beatification and canonisation of Saints; and whatever relates to sacred relics.

9. *Congregation of the Ceremonial.* The regulation of papal ceremonies; of sacred functions performed by Cardinals; and of the precedence of Cardinals, and of envoys to the Holy See.

10. *Congregation for Extraordinary Ecclesiastical Affairs.* The consideration of matters submitted to its examination by the Supreme Pontiff through the Cardinal Secretary of State; especially those connected with civil laws, or relating to agreements made with civil powers.

11. *Congregation of Studies.* The regulation of university and other studies; the granting of power to confer degrees, etc.

Besides the Archbishops and Bishops of the 138 *residential* Sees, 36 Vicars-Apostolic are Bishops of *titular* Sees.

Two Archiepiscopal Sees, three Episcopal Sees, and two Vicariates-Apostolic are vacant.

Including 2 Delegates-Apostolic, 7 Coadjutors and 6 Bishops-Auxiliary, the number of Archbishops and Bishops now holding episcopal office in the British Empire is 184. There are also a few *retired*, or without episcopal office, of whom three are in England.

CATHOLIC POPULATION OF THE EMPIRE.

The Catholic population of the British Empire may, from returns published in 1907, be estimated as follows:—

In the United Kingdom, 5,500,000 (*viz.*, Great Britain, 2,190,000, Ireland, 3,310,000); Gibraltar, Malta and Gozo, 215,000; Asia, 2,085,000; Africa, 350,000; America, 2,810,000; Australasia, 1,093,000 (*viz.*, Australia, 956,000, New Zealand, 107,000, Fiji and other Islands, 30,000): total Catholics in the Empire, 12,053,000.

POSTAL REGULATIONS.

INLAND LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.

When prepaid, not above 4 oz., 1d. ; for every additional 2 oz., $\frac{1}{2}$ d. Inland letters must not exceed 2 feet in length, 1 foot in width, or 1 foot in depth, unless official letters sent to or from a Government Office.

LETTERS TO THE COLONIES AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

To British Colonies and Possessions abroad, to Egypt, the United States of America, and the places in Morocco where there are British Post Office Agencies, the postage is 1d. the ounce. To Foreign Countries, except Egypt, $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. the first ounce, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. for each additional ounce.

POST-CARDS (INLAND).

The prepaid rate of postage on every post-card is $\frac{1}{2}$ d., and on every reply post-card 1d. Post-cards must be made of ordinary cardboard, not thicker than the thickest, nor thinner than the thinnest, official post-card. They must not exceed $5\frac{1}{2}$ in. by $3\frac{1}{2}$ in., nor be less than 4 in. by $2\frac{3}{4}$ in. The left-hand half of the address side may bear a written or printed communication.

POST-CARDS TO THE COLONIES AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

Post-cards for a destination outside the United Kingdom are charged at the rate of 1d. for a single post-card and 2d. for a reply post-card. They must be similar in size and substance to the official post-card, and must have the title "POST-CARD" printed or written on the address side. Post-cards for any British Possession and certain Foreign Countries may bear a written or printed communication on the left-hand half of the address side.

HALFPENNY PACKET POST.

This post to be used only for packets not exceeding 2 oz. in weight, and is intended for the transmission of printed or written matter not in the nature of a letter. Size not to exceed 2 ft. in length, or 1 foot in width or depth.

NEWSPAPERS (INLAND).

For every registered newspaper, with or without a supplement, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.; but a packet, containing two or more newspapers, is not liable to a higher postage than would be charged on a book-packet or letter of the same weight. Every packet must be open at both ends, and must have no enclosure, except its supplement or supplements. To places abroad, the postage is $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for every 2 oz. Weight not to exceed 5 lb.

UNPAID

inland letters, halfpenny packets, and newspapers are charged with double postage, and if *insufficiently stamped*, with double the deficiency.

REGISTRATION.

Prepaid letters, newspapers, and Printed Papers and Commercial Papers may be registered for the United Kingdom, and for almost all places abroad, for a fee of 2d.

PARCEL POST (INLAND).

The greatest length allowed is 3 feet 6 inches, the greatest length and girth combined, 6 feet. The greatest weight allowed is 11 lbs. The rates are:—

MONEY ORDERS.

For inland money orders the charge is: for sums not exceeding £1, 2d.; above £1 and not exceeding £3, 3d.; above £3, and not exceeding £10, 4d.; above £10, and not exceeding £20, 6d.; above £20, and not exceeding £30, 8d.; above £30, and not exceeding £40, 10d.

POSTAL ORDERS

are issued for any value, mounting by sixpence, from 6d. to 19s. 6d. inclusive, and for 20s. and 21s., at the following rates of poundage: 6d. to 2s. 6d., $\frac{1}{2}$ d.; 3s. to 15s., 1d.; 15s. 6d. to 21s., $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.

Broken amounts, but not fractions of a penny, may be made up by the use of stamps not exceeding fivepence in value or three in number affixed to the face of any postal order.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

1s. and upwards received at an interest of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. (or 6d. for every pound) per annum.

* This applies only to lawful children of the deceased, illegitimate children being subject to Duty at the rate of 10 per cent.

When the original Inventory was recorded after 1st June, 1881, the 44 Vict., cap. 12, sec. 41, provides that the one per cent. Legacy and Succession Duty payable by children and others, under the Legacy and Succession Duty Act, is not payable in respect of any personal property included in the Inventory, and on which the Stamp duty has been paid (Sec. 41). This does not apply to Legacies or Successions out of heritable property or out of foreign assets, or to heritable property; nor does it apply to the duties payable by the other relatives of the deceased or strangers in blood: the Legacy and Succession Duties payable by those persons remain the same.

Sec. 42 of the above Act charges pecuniary legacies and shares of residue below £20 in value, where the deceased died on or after 1st June, 1881, with the duty imposed by the Legacy Duty Acts, subject to the relief granted by Sec. 13 of the 43 Vict., cap. 14, and "as modified by this Act" (See secs. 33 and 36).

Sec. 38, sub-section 2, charges with duty "any property taken as a *donatio mortis causa* made by any person dying on or after the 1st day of June, 1881, or taken under a voluntary disposition, made by any person so dying, purporting to operate as an immediate gift *inter vivos* whether by way of transfer, delivery, declaration of trust or otherwise, which shall not have been *bonâ fide* made three months before the death of the deceased".

Sec. 11 of 52 Vict., cap. 7, amends sub-sec. 2 of section 38 of 44 Vict. cap. 12, by substituting "twelve" months in place of "three" months before the death of the deceased, and "the description of property shall include property taken under any gift whenever made, of which property *bonâ fide* possession and enjoyment shall not have been assumed by the donee immediately upon the gift and thenceforward retained to the entire exclusion of the donor, or of any benefit to him by contract or otherwise".

I. EVENTS, 1909.

14th February.—Opening of New Church at Kinlochleven.

Catholic interests have not been neglected at the new village of Kinlochleven, created by the British Aluminium Company. On Sunday, 14th February, the Bishop of the diocese of Argyll and the Isles solemnly blessed and opened a new church there, dedicated to our Lady of Lourdes and St. John. Mass was sung by the Bishop, the officiating ministers being the Rev. A. Macdougall, Daliburgh, and the Rev. D. Martin, Glencoe. The music for the occasion was supplied by the choir from Glencoe, the Proper of the Mass being sung by the Rev. H. Cameron of Barra, and the Rev. J. Barry, Glencoe. Mrs. Alston presiding at the organ. An eloquent sermon on Our Lady of Lourdes was preached by Father Milner, C.S.S.R., of Kinnoul, Perth to a crowded audience. The new church is situated in the heart of what is acknowledged to be the grandest scenery of Scotland, in the midst of a village that has sprung up like magic among the wild hills of Glencoe. The enterprise of the British Aluminium Company has peopled with a population of some thousands the once desolate lair of the red deer of Mamore.

The neat little church, which accommodates over 200 persons, largely owes its existence to the generosity of a private donor and to the efforts of the Catholic working-men temporarily engaged by the various contractors in charge of the works. After their toil of a hard winter's day, the men cheerfully turned out and, working at night with the aid of lamps, literally carved out the foundations of the new church from the bare hillside. What was to their Catholic instincts a labour of love excited the surprise and admiration of others, and both they and their pastor, Father Barry, may well be proud of their church, built under such conditions.—[From the *Tablet*.]

8th July.—Opening of new Church at Aberlour.

On Thursday, 8th July, there was opened by Bishop Chisholm, Aberdeen, the Church of the Sacred Heart, a beautiful little

church that has been provided in Aberlour for the needs of the Roman Catholic community. It is in the meantime a mission station attached to Dufftown. By its connection with Dufftown, the new church traces a historical association with the ancient Cabrach mission of the Church. Shenval, in the Cabrach, ranks amongst the earliest of Roman Catholic stations in the Highlands. It was burned by the Duke of Cumberland's soldiers in 1746, and after that event Mass was said in a barn until 1780, when a new chapel was built. Protestants as well as Catholics, we are told, even the minister himself, helped to provide the materials for the building. As time went on, it was considered more convenient for priest and people to remove the headquarters of the Cabrach mission from Shenval to the farm of Upper Keithock, in Auchindoune. That was about 1790. In 1817, when the burgh of Dufftown was begun to be built, the station was removed there, being, of course, more central, and on the highway to Glenlivet and the upper missions. The church there was built in 1855, and although Shenval is now almost completely depopulated, and scarce a stone remains to show where the chapel once stood, it is represented to-day in its daughter church in Dufftown, and she in turn has provided yet another daughter church in the edifice that was opened for worship at Aberlour on Thursday last.

The church has been built on rising ground to the south of the burgh. It commands a wide view of the valley of the lower Spey. At one extremity it looks across at Ben Aigen; at the other there are seen the rugged slopes of Ben Rinnes, and across the Spey are the beautifully-wooded heights of Elchies. The building has cost £1,250, and the church proper is seated for 100 worshippers. The designs were prepared by Mr. A. Macpherson, architect, Edinburgh. The mason work is of hammer-dressed granite, and the altar and fittings are all appropriate and nice. The sanctuary is divided from the nave by a simple rood-screen surmounted by a calvary. The interior fittings are of pitch pine, which is left unvarnished. The church is intended to serve the Catholic population from Rothes to Blackboat.

At the opening ceremony, which was attended by a large gathering of the diocesan clergy, as well as by representative Catholics drawn from a wide district, Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Colin C. Mackenzie, Glenlivet, and the music of the service was rendered by a number of the clergy present. Bishop Chisholm preached on the Sacrifice of the Mass. [From the *Banffshire Journal*.]

30th July.—Opening of New School and Hall at Shotts.

During the past year the Mission of Shotts was still further equipped with the erection of a new school and hall. The school

is situated at Calderside, near the Caledonian Railway station, which is one of the most convenient sites in the district. It is a plain, substantial building consisting of two storeys, built of freestone, with a gable frontage. The school on the ground floor is divided into the several class-rooms, with glass partitions, all the fittings and appliances being thoroughly up-to-date. It has accommodation for about 500 scholars. The hall is on the second storey, with ante-room and smaller hall accommodations suitable for all kinds of entertainments. Father Hilgers, the pastor of the mission, is to be congratulated on the success which his untiring efforts have attained. Canon O'Reilly, of St. Alphonsus', Glasgow, a former incumbent of Shotts, formally inaugurated the new school on the afternoon of Friday, 30th July, and delivered an address on the occasion. There was a concert in the hall in the evening.—[From the *Glasgow Observer*.]

August 29th.—Inaugural Ceremony at St. Joseph's, Kilmarnock.

A spirit of generosity and zeal for the beauty of God's house, is a characteristic of the present-day Catholics of Kilmarnock. In the course of last summer a number of valuable and handsome gifts were made by members of the congregation to St. Joseph's Church, notably, a beautifully carved oak side altar, a fine massive oak pulpit, a sanctuary chair, a crimson sanctuary carpet of the best procurable quality, brass fittings, etc. These were formally inaugurated, in presence of a crowded congregation, by the celebration of Solemn High Mass by V. Rev. Canon Sheehy, the administrator, assisted by the local clergy. The Rev. John Charleson of Croy was the special preacher on the occasion. His fame as the first minister of the Scottish Established Church to join the Catholic Church, naturally attracted many, and his grave and earnest discourse, replete with deep and original thought, produced a lasting impression on his audience. He preached again at the evening service, at which there was an outdoor procession taken part in by the members of the various religious societies. The appearance of the church is now greatly enhanced by the number and excellence of the additions to its furnishings recently made.—[*Communicated*.]

30th August.—Re-opening of School at Kilsyth after reconstruction and extension.

During the past year considerable extensions have been made to the school at Kilsyth. A new entrance hall has been made at the south-east portion of the building in which white tiles have been most effectively used, giving access to a broad stairway leading to the new rooms forming the second storey superadded

on the old western portion of the school. On the ground flat the rooms have been rearranged so as to provide more efficiently for the supervision of the school. At the northern end a room specially fitted to deal with the youngest children, with separate entrance, has been arranged. The entrance has a glass lean-to roof, giving the porch a bright cheery appearance.

In the new portion of the building, the maximum of light has been obtained by the use of extra large windows. Here accommodation is provided in three lofty rooms for the 4th, 5th and 6th classes, while there is also a well-appointed teachers' room. The woodwork here is varnished. The outlook from these rooms is exceedingly bright. The northern one commands a fine view of the Kilsyth Hills and from the windows facing west a wide expanse of hill and dale meets the eye. Two of the newest pattern of stoves provide ample heating accommodation. The exterior appointments are of the finest that up-to-date sanitarians could wish for. The whole work of reconstruction has been carried out from plans by Mr. C. Ménart, architect, Glasgow, at a cost of about £2,000, and has resulted in a thoroughly equipped modern school.—[From the *Kilsyth Chronicle*.]

19th September.—Reopening of St. Michael's, Laggan.

Extensive structural improvements and a scheme of internal decoration have been going on for some time at this church, and the formal inauguration of these took place on the 19th of September. The church is built on the spur of a hill at the foot of a precipitous hill rising sheer up to a height of 600 feet. On the summit of this height is an ancient Pictish fort—said to be the best specimen of the kind in Britain.

The present church at Laggan was built only some sixty years ago. But owing to defective workmanship and long neglect the whole building had fallen into a semi-ruinous condition. The roof had subsided, and the walls were dangerously off the plumb. To prevent all danger, it was found necessary to build six strong buttresses, three on either side. The building operations were directed by Mr. Alex. McKenzie, civil engineer and architect, Kingussie, and the effect has been most satisfactory. Not only has the building been strengthened and secured for the future, but the architectural appearance has been much improved.

The inside has been painted throughout in simple but effective colours. The little sanctuary has been elaborately decorated by Dom Paulinus Gorwood, O.S.B., Fort Augustus.

On the day of reopening *Missa Cantata* was sung by the incumbent, Rev. Wm. Macmaster. The sermon was by Rev. Joseph McDonald, O.S.B., and the singing by a choir of priests.—[*Communicated*.]

10th October.—Opening of New Church at Dalmuir.

It is just over two years since Dalmuir was cut off from Clydebank as a separate mission, with Father Brotherhood, formerly of St. Mary's, in charge. Father Brotherhood entered into the work with characteristic zeal and energy, and already the mission has a magnificent church of its own, along with a house for the priests and a well-appointed school. The latter building, of course, was erected before Dalmuir became a separate charge, but it is only within the past year that the other buildings were erected. The presbytery, which adjoins the church, is built of red sandstone. The church is a handsome structure. It is spacious and well lighted. The lower portion of the building will be used as halls. There is a recreation room for the men of the congregation, and a large hall, where concerts, socials and such-like functions may be held. The building is of brick faced with concrete.

The opening ceremony took place on the 10th October. Very Rev. Canon Montgomery of Clydebank was celebrant, with Fathers B. Lynch and Ooghe as deacon and sub-deacon. The preacher on the occasion was the Rev. Canon Ritchie, the Diocesan Secretary. The Archbishop who was present in the Sanctuary also gave a short address, and imparted the Papal Blessing. The Rev. Fr. George, O.F.M., occupied the pulpit in the evening.—[From the *Glasgow Observer*.]



II. ORDINATIONS.

The Rev. JOHN ANGLER was born at Fort-William on the 27th May, 1882. He entered Blairs College in December 1898. In October, 1903, he was transferred to Issy, and two years later to St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick. He received tonsure and minor orders at St. John's, Perth, on the 20th June, 1909, and was ordained subdeacon on the 24th, deacon on the 27th and priest in St. Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow, on the 29th of the same month—all at the hands of Bishop MacFarlane. He is in charge of Taynuilt, Argyllshire.

The Rev. PETER BONNYMAN was born at Clochan, Banffshire, on the 2nd August, 1883. He entered Blairs College in October, 1900, passing in 1903 to Issy, and two years later to St. Sulpice, Paris. He received tonsure on the 17th June, 1905, from Mgr. Jourdain de la Passardière, and minor orders from Mgr. Amette on the 23rd February, 1907. In September of the latter year he was transferred to St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, where he completed the remainder of his studies. The dates of his major orders are the same as in the preceding notice. He is assistant at St. Patrick's, Glasgow.

The Rev. JOHN BOYLE was born in Glasgow on the 12th November, 1883. After passing some time at St. Aloysius', Glasgow, he entered Blairs College on the 9th September, 1899. In October, 1904, he passed to Issy, and thence two years later to St. Sulpice, Paris. He received tonsure on the 10th June, 1906, from Mgr. Jourdain de la Passardière; minor orders on the 29th June, 1907, subdiaconate on the 13th June, 1908, diaconate on the 19th December following, and priesthood on the 3rd July, 1909—all at the hands of Mgr. Amette, Archbishop of Paris. On his return to Scotland he was appointed assistant at St. Peter's, Partick.

The Rev. HENRY CORR was born at Aghamullin, Co. Tyrone, Ireland, on the 24th March, 1883. He entered Blairs College in September, 1898, and in 1903 was transferred to the Scots College, Rome. He received tonsure on the 31st March, 1906, and the first two minor orders on the 20th May, and the latter two on

the 9th June following; was ordained subdeacon on the 1st November, 1907, deacon on the 21st December of the same year, and priest on the 1st November, 1908—all at the hands of Archbishop Ceppetelli. Returning to Scotland in June, 1909, he was appointed assistant at St. Antony's, Govan.

The Rev. ALBERT EDWARD FRANKLIN was born in 1868 at Lee, Kent. He entered the Scots College, Rome, on the 23rd October, 1905. He received tonsure on the 22nd December, 1906. The first two minor orders on the 20th January, and the latter two on the 23rd February, 1907. In the same year he was ordained subdeacon on the 1st November and deacon on the 21st December; and was raised to the priesthood on the 18th April, 1908. He is one of the assistants at the Cathedral, Edinburgh.

The Rev. ALFRED JOSEPH GALLAUCHER was born at Gourock on the 1st October, 1884. He entered Blairs College in September, 1899, and in 1904 was transferred to Issy, and two years later to St. Sulpice, Paris. His dates of ordination are the same as those of the Rev. John Boyle. He is one of the assistants at St. Augustine's, Coatbridge.

The Rev. MICHAEL MCCARTHY was born near Rosscarbery, Co. Cork, Ireland, on the 16th September, 1880. His classical education was received at the University School, Skibbereen, Co. Cork, whence he passed for philosophy to All Hallows, Dublin, in September, 1902. He entered in September, 1905, St. Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, where he completed the study of theology. His dates of ordination are the same as those of the Rev. John Angler. He is serving as assistant at St. Margaret's, Glasgow.

The Rev. PETER MACFARLANE was born at Fort-William on the 18th September, 1884. He entered Blairs College on the 9th September, 1899, and four years later was transferred to the Scots College, Rome. He received minor orders on the same days as the Rev. A. E. Franklin. For subsequent ordinations, see the notice of the Rev. Henry Corr. He is assistant at Dalmuir, Glasgow.

The Rev. EDWARD MELLON was born in Edinburgh on the 11th December, 1884. He entered Blairs College on the 1st December, 1898, and in October, 1903, the Scots College, Rome. His dates of ordination are the same as those of the Rev. Henry Corr. Returning to Scotland in June, 1909, he was at once appointed assistant at St. Peter's, Edinburgh.

The Rev. EUGENE MURRAY was born in Govan on the 6th June, 1885. He entered Blairs College in September, 1900, pass-

ing in 1904 to Issy and in 1906 to St. Sulpice, Paris. His dates of ordination are the same as those of the Rev. John Boyle. He is stationed as assistant at St. Charles', Glasgow.

The Rev. ROBERT JOHN RATTRIE was born in Edinburgh on the 21st May, 1883. He began his ecclesiastical studies at the Seminary of Mount Melleray, Co. Waterford, Ireland. In 1903 he proceeded to Issy, and in the following year to the Scots College, Rome. For dates of ordination see the notice of the Rev. Henry Corr. He is one of the assistants at Stirling.

The Rev. GEORGE STUART was born in Glasgow on the 29th October, 1884. He entered Blairs College in September, 1899, and the Scots College, Rome, in October, 1903. His subsequent dates are the same as those of the Rev. Henry Corr. He is assistant at Port Glasgow.

The Rev. JAMES F. TONNER was born at Barness, Co. Tyrone, Ireland, on the 21st January, 1881. He entered Blairs College on the 1st September, 1898, and five years later was transferred to the Scots College, Rome. For dates of ordination see the notice of the Rev. Henry Corr. On his return home in 1909 he was appointed assistant at Lennoxtown.

III. OBITUARY.

Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord. From henceforth now, saith the spirit, that they may rest from their labours; for their works follow them.—APOC., xiv. 13.

It is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from their sins.—2 MACHAB., xii. 46.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. PATRICK FAY, late of the Diocese of Dunkeld, who died in Vancouver, B.C., on the 10th February, 1909, in the 61st year of his age, and the 37th of his priesthood.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. GEORGE ANGUS, who died at St. Andrews on the 17th March, 1909, in the 67th year of his age, and the 33rd of his priesthood.

Father Angus was the son of John Angus, formerly town clerk of Aberdeen, and was born in that city on the 9th of November, 1842. His father and family were members of the Established Church but very early in life, when only about fifteen years of age, he became a member of the Episcopal Church. He received his early education in his native city, but when only seventeen years of age he left Scotland and joined the Indian army as an ensign. After about three years in India he returned to England with the idea of becoming a minister in the English Episcopal Church, and with that object was entered as a student at St. Edmund Hall, Oxford, where some three years later he graduated.

He was ordained in the English Church by Doctor Ellicott, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, of whose kindness to himself Father Angus to the end of his life retained the most pleasant recollections. He well remembered how (as he had resolved to fast until after the ordination service was over), he caused much surprise to his *confrères* by not appearing at the substantial breakfast which Episcopal hospitality provided *before* the service. He, however, was surprised in his turn, when, at the luncheon after the service the kindhearted bishop said to his wife, "My dear,

please let Mr. Angus be served first, he has had nothing to eat since last night".

Father Angus subsequently became curate to the Rev. Mr. Edwards of Prestbury, who afterwards changed his name to Baghot de la Bere. This gentleman (who only survived the subject of this memoir a month), became one of Father Angus' greatest friends, and they regularly corresponded to the day of his death. Mr. Edwards was the hero of the well-known Prestbury Ritual case, which ultimately led to his having to leave his parish.

All this time the young minister had been gradually assimilating Catholic doctrine and practice. He soon began to see clearly the truth of the Catholic religion, and to realise that the necessity of Communion with the Holy See was a part of the faith once delivered to the saints. He hesitated no longer and in the early seventies was received into the Catholic Church at Dundee by the late Rev. W. J. B. Richards, O.S.C., of St. Charles' College, Bayswater. Shortly afterwards he joined the Oblate Community at Bayswater, but his stay there was not a very long one, and on his ordination to the priesthood in 1876, he was appointed by his Eminence the late Cardinal Manning to a position in the newly formed Catholic University at Kensington, where he laboured for some years. During this time and for some years after the closing of the University, Father Angus preached in many London pulpits both in the Westminster and Southwark Dioceses, where his services in the pulpit were in considerable request. He was also a frequent contributor to the columns of the *Whitehall Review*.

In the year 1884 Father Angus came to St. Andrews to minister to the very small congregation there. Here it was that the rest of his life was to be spent, a life happy but uneventful. The year after his coming the iron church on the Scores was opened, and this continued to be used as such until his death. Father Angus was until illness laid him aside most attentive to all the spiritual needs of his little flock, which he had the happiness of seeing considerably increased in numbers. During the twenty-four years in which he resided at St. Andrews, he was only absent for a single Sunday. He had in fact a curious dislike of travel. With the exception of his journey to India and back as a youth, he had never been out of Great Britain, a fact of which he would sometimes humorously affect to be proud.

During his years at St. Andrews Father Angus made many non-Catholic friends, too numerous to mention, and certainly did a great deal to break down the prejudices against our Holy Religion which existed on his arrival. He became well known both to English and Scottish Catholics by his articles in *The Tablet*, which appeared at irregular intervals for a period extending over many years. These articles almost invariably were on controversial subjects, but he dealt with them with so light

a touch that they never offended those, against whom they were, to a certain extent, directed, and were the cause of enjoyment to many.

About five years ago Father Angus was seized with the disease which ultimately proved fatal, and as time went on it became only too evident that he would never be fit for active work again. He much wished to live and die in his own home, and was greatly pleased when it was found possible to appoint a friend as his colleague and successor. For a short time after this event, he seemed to take a new lease of life, being enabled to give up the bath-chair he had hitherto used, and to take short walks. All this time, however, the disease was making progress, and Father Angus expired suddenly from heart failure on St. Patrick's day, 1909, having received Extreme Unction a few moments before.

The funeral took place on Saturday, 20th March, and the little church on the cliff was filled by an assembly representing all classes and creeds of St. Andrews. Father Laughton celebrated the Mass of Requiem and afterwards performed the last rites in the Cathedral burying ground.

About ten priests were present, and many more were unavoidably prevented by the fact that the funeral took place on a Saturday. By the special wish of the deceased, no funeral sermon or panegyric was delivered. [*Communicated*].

Pray for the soul of the Very Rev. JAMES Canon MCGINNES, who died at Innerleithen on the 18th April, 1909, in the 69th year of his age, and the 45th of his priesthood.

The following sketch of the career of Canon McGinnes is mostly taken from the touching discourse spoken at the funeral by the Very Rev. Provost Holder, Dundee :—

James McGinnes was born at Dundee on the 7th May, 1840. From his early boyhood he manifested a desire and a vocation to the priesthood, and he entered St. Mary's College, Blairs, on the 4th August, 1851. Two years later he was transferred to the Scots College, Valladolid, where after a course of brilliant studies he was ordained subdeacon by the Archbishop of that city on the 2nd September, 1861. He had then completed the usual curriculum of studies and was less than twenty-two years of age. After a stay of some six months at Blairs he was sent to the Seminary of St. Sulpice at Paris to still further advance his studies till he should reach the canonical age required for the priesthood. His time at St. Sulpice, short as it necessarily was, left a very definite mark on his mind, and he ever afterwards thought and spoke highly of the Sulpician system. Returning to Scotland and re-entering Blairs in September, 1863,

he remained there till the following year, when at Glasgow he was ordained deacon by Bishop Murdoch, Vicar-Apostolic of the Western District, on the 6th May. On the 7th May—exactly the 24th anniversary of his birth—he was raised to the priesthood by Bishop Gray, being the first priest ordained by that prelate.

The first theatre of his ministry was at Haddington, where he had temporary charge in the absence of the late Fr. Prendergast, and where he fell a victim to typhus fever of so virulent a type that his life was despaired of. On his recovery he was appointed to the Jedburgh Mission, from which a couple of years later he was removed to St. Andrew's, Dundee. In 1868 the congregation attached to this church had grown to such an extent that it was found necessary to cut off a large portion to form a new mission. A suitable piece of ground carrying a dilapidated old weaving shed and factory was acquired, and with this slender equipment Fr. McGinnes was appointed to found and build up what may be regarded as the chief work of his lifetime—the church and mission of St. Joseph. Here he laboured with marvellous energy and success until the re-establishment of the Scottish Hierarchy in 1878. Many changes were made all over the country at that time, and Fr. McGinnes left his dear St. Joseph's, being appointed by Bishop Rigg to the larger charge of St. Mary's in the same city. Two years later he, at his own request, obtained an appointment demanding less labour and anxiety. This he found at Alloa, where he remained for nine years.

In the midst of all his parochial solicitude and toil, Fr. McGinnes had ever kept up a close relationship with the great theologians, and it was quite in accordance with his tastes and pursuits that in 1889 he went back to his *Alma Mater* to take up the work of teaching the higher studies. His life at College was eventful both for himself and others. Those years of study and teaching served to deepen his own knowledge of philosophy and theology, the ripe fruits of which came out in later years. His influence on the students was most marked. With all his spirit of fun and easy pleasantry one was not slow to recognise his strong will and the intense earnestness of his character. His ideal of a student's life was a high one. Aimless or slovenly work was his *bête noire*. The single task he set himself as a professor was to send out young priests thoroughly trained and equipped in mind and body for work on the mission. His own bent of mind was of the very practical kind; of studies that were merely ornamental he was largely sceptical; and in his class-work, he always tried to make his students realise the practical bearing of what they learned on their future career. The pulpit training of the young Levites fell mainly to his charge, and in this connection he wrote his *Ministry of the Word*, a small manual on pastoral preaching that has been highly appraised

in various quarters. Over the health and general well-being of the students he watched unceasingly—he used humorously to remark that the Church in Scotland had no use for dead priests. He made the students look on the care of their health as a sacred duty; and he co-operated heartily with the then Rector, the late Dr. McDonald, in effecting several improvements in the College *regime*.

He returned to Scotland in 1894, at the same time severing his connection with the diocese of Dunkeld and attaching himself to that of St. Andrews and Edinburgh. He resided for some years at St. Patrick's, Edinburgh, and was for a short time in charge of Girvan and Linlithgow. In 1898 he was appointed to Innerleithen and there he spent the evening of his days. He was made a Canon in 1899. The large leisure allowed him by the smallness of his missionary charge was expended in study and in work for the common good of the Church. He was in much request as a preacher on great occasions; and he was always ready with voice and pen to aid in the defence and exposition of the Faith. He was an accomplished musician and several compositions from his pen, both sacred and secular, have been much admired. From its first institution he was convener of the Commission on Church Music, and long before the recent *Motu Proprio* of His Holiness Pius X, he was one of the first to advocate a return to a more religious style of music, and the more general use in our churches of Plain Chant.

He suffered greatly before the end. At the beginning of last year he was seized with a painful malady which never left him, and which during four months wore down his once robust frame to a skeleton. He passed peacefully away on Sunday, 18th April. Fr. Callan, O.M.I., was with him at the end.

Thus passed away a notable priest, of whom the panegyrist at his funeral could say: "He was a fine man, and a very model of a priest. From a genuine true-hearted parentage he inherited both the never-varying, large-minded and generous courtesy that stamped him a gentleman, and the warm, devoted faith that made him an ornament in the sanctuary. I never knew a more charitable, a more kind, a more forgiving man. Gentleness itself, it seemed his study to promote the comforts and conveniences of all others, to make all at their ease and at home, to avoid everything in speech or act that could be a cause for displeasure in the minds of those with whom he was associated; in a word, to be, as the Apostle speaks, 'all things to all men'. And this to such degree that he made a friend, almost an intimate, of every one that enjoyed the privilege of his converse. But this never at the expense of principles. For these he at all times stood up with deep intensity of conviction: these he proclaimed with unflinching boldness. Whatever he wrote or spoke he threw into the plainest and most direct language. His tongue was in close communication with his intellect and heart, and I think I may

claim that it was a leading characteristic of his life, that what he thought that he said, and what he said that he did—a perfect stranger to the faintest suspicion of guile or doubleness of aim. Above all it has been given us to behold in the person of Canon McGinnes a pious and devoted priest and minister of God. He was this in his every thought and word and act. Blessed by God with a wonderfully clear and keen intellect, he laid in his earlier years a solid foundation for his after studies. He was passionately fond of reading, but he loved most of all the study of his own profession, the study of the grand theology of the Church, almost to the exclusion of all else. It was the natural bias and bent of his mind, the special joy and refreshment of his life. His acquaintance with this subject both in the moral and dogmatic spheres, was extensive and deep, and in the treatment of intricate and complex questions his judgment could be safely trusted. It was this wide and accurate knowledge, coupled with a splendid command of Scriptural illustration and a wealth of apt and sprightly allusion, that gave a charm to his pulpit utterances, whether in lecture or sermon, that never failed to arrest the attention and captivate the heart. With his whole heart and soul he strove to fulfil in himself the injunction of the prophet: 'The lips of the priest shall keep knowledge, they shall seek the law at his mouth'. As a priest of God's Church, moreover, he was careful to translate into his life and work his great fund of theological reading. As a pastor, charged with the care of souls, he stood pre-eminent. A wise and powerful organiser, his greatest and most beloved work was the building up of St. Joseph's congregation and church; this he executed so well that his successor in that charge has never been able to discover any reasonable effort that was left untried or one that was imperfectly carried out. To the administration of the Holy Sacraments, to the work of the confessional, to the care of the sick and dying, he was devoted in heart and soul. His tenderness and charity to the poor and suffering have left a memory still green with us in Dundee, and such was his zeal and care for church and sanctuary wherever he has been placed, and so exact and minute his observance of ritual, that he might well have for epitaph the words of the Psalmist: 'I have loved, O Lord, the beauty of Thy house and the place where Thy glory dwelleth'. And as his life, so his end. Released to a very large extent from the anxieties and toil and worry of the missionary priest in this country, in the calm and peaceful retirement of Innerleithen, he drew nearer and nearer to God. More and more did he surrender himself to converse with his Saviour in prayer: his visits to the Sacred Heart of Jesus in the Adorable Sacrament of the Altar were so frequent and prolonged that an eye-witness has assured me that he 'almost lived in his little church'. And so, living with God, he died with God."

The body was conveyed to the Cathedral at Edinburgh, and

there the funeral took place on Thursday, the 22nd April. Mgr. Smith, V.G., was the celebrant of the Mass, with Fathers Long and Green as deacon and sub-deacon. Archbishop Smith, as well as Bishop Chisholm of Aberdeen, and Bishop MacFarlane of Dunkeld, were present in the sanctuary. The music, Vatican Plain Chant, was finely rendered by a select body of clergy. Over eighty priests were in attendance. At the conclusion of the noble panegyric, pronounced by Provost Holder over his dead friend, the Archbishop gave the Absolutions. The remains were then conveyed for interment to the cemetery at Mount Vernon.

Pray for the soul of the Right Rev. Mgr. DAVID McDONALD, D.D., Rector Emeritus, who died at the Royal Scots College, Valladolid, on the 19th September, 1909, in the 78th year of his age, and the 53rd year of his priesthood.

Monsignor David McDonald was born at Fort-William on the 16th March, 1832, of pious parents, whose ancestors had never lost the faith. He was baptised by the Rev. Donald Forbes, who was the priest in charge of the Braes of Lochaber for the long period of fifty-two years. The future priest was but a few years old when his mother removed to the district of historic Glencoe, where she taught a small school. The young David had never known his father, as he was a posthumous child, and in after years he was doubly devoted to his mother on whom had fallen the undivided care of his early years. An old man in Glencoe still relates that, when they were boys together bathing in the sea, he who was a Protestant and the elder of the two, used to dip David under the water and threaten to drown him if he did not renounce the faith. "You may drown me," the boy would answer, "but I'll never give up my faith." At Glencoe he delighted to attend the priest on his visit and serve at the altar. He was called by God to the Sanctuary early in life. When only nine years of age, being then "a little round chubby boy" (as he used to recall in his old age), he was taken from the lap of his mother and sent to the Scottish Benedictine Monastery at Ratisbon. He entered in September, 1841. In after years he used to speak most affectionately of St. James', Ratisbon. He always brightened up when one recalled to him the public school or gymnasium which he attended, and the ninepins, Easter eggs and other boyish amusements which had appealed so much to his youthful fancy. There he was confirmed and, probably, made his first Holy Communion. To his dying day he always recited in German certain prayers which he had learned as a boy at Ratisbon. He acquired a mastery of German, which long after proved of great service to him in hearing confessions in far-

off Valladolid, where he was the only priest familiar with the language.

The happy years spent in old St. James', Ratisbon, passed all too quickly. After four years, perhaps the happiest of his life, he was recalled to Scotland at the end of 1845 and entered Blairs College on the 26th January, 1846. He was in Blairs during the year of the Irish famine. The hardships of that terrible year, which were not confined to Ireland, found their way even to the College door. "The round chubby boy" had now sprung up the slim delicate lad so frail in appearance that a contemporary often expressed surprise that he outlived those years. In spite of his delicate health he was known at Blairs as a brilliant student, and few were the distinctions in class that did not come his way. He used to speak with the greatest affection of the late Archbishop Smith, who had been his professor and confessor at Blairs.

In due course he was sent to the College of the Propaganda in Rome, which he entered on the 29th August, 1850. The late Rev. Dr. Fox, who took up the bursary vacated by him, used to speak in the highest terms of his record in the Propaganda. There was no subject in which he did not hold the first or at least a leading place in his class. As librarian of the College he had the privilege of seeing many of the Bishops on their visit *ad limina*, and more than one—notably the distinguished Archbishop McHale of Tuam—took special notice of the bright young highland student, and would gladly have secured his services for their own diocese.

As time went on his close application to study and the confinement of Propaganda began to tell upon his constitution. He was, notwithstanding, a most punctual observer of rules and looked for no exemption. He insisted upon keeping all the days of fasting and abstinence like the most robust of his fellows. At last his overtaxed strength gave way, and after repeated fainting fits his superiors forbade him to fast during the remainder of his College days. He availed himself of this privilege only as long as he was under College discipline. After his ordination he took up the law of fasting again, and observed it rigorously long after old age is generally considered a sufficient reason for non-observance. During his stay in Rome he was under the spiritual direction of the Very Rev. Dr. Grant, rector of the English College, and afterwards Bishop of Southwark.

Papal Rome, as it was then, filled him with enthusiasm. Two events, which occurred in his time, were indelibly imprinted on his mind. One was the Definition of the Immaculate Conception, the other an accident which happened in the Convent of St. Agnes to Pius IX. and his entourage. He was present at both events. He used to describe with enthusiasm the scene presented at St. Peter's on that ever memorable 8th December, 1854, dwelling particularly on the rapturous joy of Pius IX., whose holy countenance streaming with tears gave evidence

that in discharging the highest prerogative of his authority he was at the same time satisfying the longing yearnings of his own heart. We may well believe that the young Levite, who was within two years of his ordination to the priesthood, received on that occasion a great increase of love for the Mother of God, towards whom he always cherished a tender devotion. He often expressed the wish that the invocations of the Litany of Our Lady might be the last sounds to fall upon his ears when about to appear before the Judgment seat of Her Divine Son.

At the falling of the floor in the Convent of St. Agnes on the 12th April, 1855, he was present with a group of students from the Propaganda. They were taken to a room where His Holiness Pius IX. was seated with Cardinal Antonelli and the papal suite attending. Suddenly the decaying timbers of the floor gave way and all were precipitated into a cellar beneath. The chair on which the Pontiff sat had fallen in some wonderful way over his venerable head, forming a canopy over him, so that he was neither touched nor stained by the falling debris. The lid of a snuff-box, inlaid with a beautiful mosaic of the Madonna, which the Pontiff held in his hand, was cracked in such a way as to display, as it were, twelve rays around the head of Our Lady's image. Fortunately no one was much the worse of the accident. The subject of this memoir received a knock on the head, which cannot have been very severe, as he was quite unaware of any personal mishap until the Pope with smiling countenance directed his attention to a lump on the side of his head. A commemorative monument was erected in a public place in Rome after the event. David McDonald is one of the names inscribed on the tablet.

He was ordained at the College of the Propaganda subdeacon on the 16th February, deacon on the 8th March, and priest on the 9th March, 1856. He returned to Scotland in the following May and was stationed for a few weeks only at St. Andrew's, Glasgow. He was offered and accepted a professorship in Blairs College, entering upon his duties on the 30th July, 1856. There he spent nine happy years, having amongst others as fellow professor the late Canon Caven, whose friendship all through life he held in the highest esteem.

In the year 1865 a professor was required for the College in Valladolid. The late Bishop Murdoch, who had been an alumnus, knowing the sterling qualities of Father David was most desirous of securing for his own Alma Mater the services of one so well adapted for the post by his training and experience. Father David accepted the position, but not too willingly, as the surroundings and work at Blairs were thoroughly congenial to him. Nearly forty years afterwards his life-long friend the late Monsignor Allen, rector of the English College at Valladolid, used to remind him of his early distaste for the *Colegio*. When asked some time after his arrival if he liked the place, he answered

very brusquely, "No, certainly not". It was not long ere he learned to love dearly not only the College and its authorities, but the country and its courteous, kind-hearted people.

He revered as saints the late Father Cameron, Rector, and the late Father Cowie, Vice-Rector of the College. Both were very much his seniors. Thus he was thrown very much upon himself and the younger Professors of the English College. For a long time he had to give four classes a day, the preparation for which necessitated burning the midnight oil and rising early to his books. He always spoke with pleasure of those early years of strenuous work, which was diversified, when he could snatch a day from his desk, by pleasant *meriendas* at one of the *Riberas*, or rides on muleback to the country with his friend Don Carlos of the English College. He was passionately fond of skating, and afterwards, when he became rector, it was an outstanding custom that as long as the ice was bearing—a rare occurrence—there was a truce to studies.

On the death of Father Cowie in 1876 Father David was nominated by the Bishops of Scotland to succeed him as rector, and he accordingly received in due course the royal appointment to that office from Alphonso XII. With much reluctance did he accept the positions on account of the high idea he entertained of the heavy responsibility. From the time he became rector, he had one thought only, the welfare of the *Colegio*. He at once set about putting it on a sound financial footing. The chief source of revenue is house property situated in Madrid, which had been left to supply funds for the education of Scottish students for the priesthood by Colonel William Semple, the founder of the College. As a portion of the property was then in a very dilapidated condition and yielding little or no returns he had a fourth part of the house-estate rebuilt at a cost of £8,000. This sum, which had to be got on loan, he was able by careful saving and management to repay in the course of a few years. It was his intention to have rebuilt the whole property, but the difficulty of raising the necessary loans prevented him from carrying out the greater scheme. As it was, the financial condition of the College improved so much that sufficient funds were available to educate as many as twenty-seven students at a time. His great ambition was to send out as many priests as possible for the work of the Mission in Scotland.

He did a great deal for the material improvement of the College itself. The chapel was refloored, five new altars were put in, and a handsome set of Via Crucis was erected. The College was completely transformed, so that many of the past students would scarcely recognise the old place. The reliquary, refectory, public rooms and students' rooms were all refloored with timber, and the grand spacious corridors were relaid with granolithic pavement. The sanitary arrangements were looked to and a

copious supply of water was introduced to the house. Electric light was also installed throughout the whole building.

He was above all solicitous for the spiritual welfare of the students. It is well known that in the College chapel the revelations of the Sacred Heart were made to the pious Juan de Oyos of the Society of Jesus. With fitting piety and zeal did good Father David rekindle the fire of devotion to the Sacred Heart by promoting it amongst his students. He frequently spoke to them on the devotion and encouraged them to keep up a constant circle of daily communions, which was never broken. Nothing delighted him more than to see them grouped around the altar every day in the month of June to offer their homage and reparation to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Benediction was given every day and no expense was grudged to beautify the altar. In the students' principal corridor a large artistic statue of the Sacred Heart was set up with a lamp constantly burning to remind them always of the devotion.

To foster the piety and vocation of the aspirants to the sacred priesthood he arranged for a spiritual conference to be given every Sunday evening. The Jesuit fathers, with whom he was always on terms of most intimate friendship, were frequently called in to do this work. Occasionally he gave the lecture himself, and his discourses, filled as they were with solid learning and piety, were remembered long after what had been said by more eloquent speakers was forgotten.

He was a painstaking and successful professor. He had no patience with the idle who shirked their work, but with the slow or backward he spared no trouble. He taught at one time or another every branch of the usual College curriculum. His favourite studies were Dogmatic Theology and Mathematics. German, Spanish and Italian he spoke with equal correctness and fluency. He wrote Latin, even in his old age, with great purity and elegance. He had a very nice sense of the beauties of Latin poetry and a gift of easy and rapid versification. But what struck one most about his many-sided proficiency was the ease with which he passed from one subject of science to another and taught all successfully.

He was of a sensitive and shy disposition. He did not figure much outside the College walls. Indeed, all public appearances were more or less uncongenial to him. It was obvious that he was entirely unconscious of his own gifts and powers. He was known to all as the most single-minded of men. With him there was no diplomacy, no two sides to his character. He could not conceal his feelings and one could read his very soul. He could be stern in cases of pride or disobedience, but was tender as a mother to those in difficulty or sickness. During the terrible year of the cholera in Spain, when thousands died in Valladolid and the plague claimed its victims under the shadow of the College walls, he went through a period of terrible anxiety. Only

those who were under him at that time can know and understand his solicitude. At night the light in his room was never extinguished for months, so that at a moment's notice he might be ready to rush to the bedside of his students in case of the slightest indisposition. Fortunately the destroyer passed by the door of the College, thanks under Providence to the wise precautions he adopted.

In his old age he mixed a good deal with the students. He would sit with them in the garden and talk of the days of old. He delighted to listen to their juvenile discussions, and in all their innocent amusements and jokes there was none more happy or pleased than the old rector. No wonder that his boys loved him dearly and wept most bitterly when, after he had retired from the rectorship in 1903, he left Valladolid not knowing whether he should return. To the joy of all he did return to spend the evening of his days in the old home, which he loved so well and where he had laboured so faithfully. His long life of seventy-eight years was spent in College with the exception of a few weeks on the mission and the nine years of his childhood before he went to Ratisbon. It is worthy of remark that upwards of seventy priests at present serving in the mission in Scotland, who were educated at Valladolid, passed through his hands as professor and rector. In the year 1901, having completed sixty years of College life, the past students presented him with addresses of congratulation, which he highly appreciated. In the year 1906, having then attained the golden jubilee of his priesthood, past students again sent him an address of congratulation along with a purse of sovereigns. He received from Pope Leo XIII. the honour of being made a Doctor of Divinity, and on his retiring from the rectorship he was nominated a Domestic Prelate of his Holiness with the title of Monsignor, which he did not in his humility adopt.

He was first and foremost a great priest—the priest always and in everything. Students went through their seven or eight years' course without ever seeing him miss his morning Mass. The fire enkindled in his heart at the morning sacrifice was kept alive by a continual circle of devotions. Every day he made two long visits to the Blessed Sacrament, besides never failing to attend at the community visit after dinner. His rosary and meditation were never forgotten. Week after week he went to the Sacred Tribunal. Even in extreme old age he practised rigorous mortifications, and when casually and unknown to him his instruments of penance were exposed to view they gave evidence of punishment. Every hour of the day had its allotted work, and every one could tell with certainty where he could be found at any given time and what he was engaged on. He seldom spoke of him-elf, and one had to live a long time with him to know how mortified and self-denying a life he led.

In December, 1907, he was visited by a stroke of apoplexy, from which he never recovered. He became very helpless and suffered much. His last years were cheered and relieved by the kind attention of the Superiors of the College and the students. Retaining his mental faculties to the very end he prayed constantly and prepared well for death. His constant ejaculation was the words of the Psalmist: "Bonum est mihi quia humiliasti me ut discam justificationes tuas". Many a time and oft from December, 1907, to the day of his death he uttered the words of St. Paul: "Cupio dissolvi et esse cum Christo". Having received all the sacraments and consolations of the Church he gave up his soul peacefully to God on Sunday, 19th September, the Feast of the Seven Dolours, a feast which he observed with great devotion all through life. He died in the same room as his saintly predecessors Father John Cameron and Father John Cowie. The cause of death was certified by the doctor of the College to have been cancer of the stomach. The obsequies took place in the College chapel on the 20th September, and were attended by a large circle of clerical friends in the city of Valladolid. He was buried in the College burying ground, where a simple cross bears the words, "Spes Nostra".

On the 19th October the Month's Mind was celebrated by solemn Requiem Mass in St. Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow, in the presence of the Most Rev. John Aloysius Maguire, Archbishop of Glasgow. The Very Rev. James W. Canon McCarthy was celebrant of the Mass, assisted by Rev. Andrew F. Thomson as deacon, and Rev. Peter McDaniel as subdeacon. The Archbishop gave the Absolutions. The service was attended by over sixty priests in choir habit, the greater number of whom had been students of the *Colegio*.—[*Communicated*].

Pray for the soul of the Very Rev. MICHAEL Canon PHELAN, who died at St. Mary's, Dundee, on the 19th September, 1909, in the 58th year of his age, and the 33rd of his priesthood.

Canon Phelan was born in the parish of Templeorum, Co. Kilkenny, on the 14th September, 1852. His early training was received at the Carmelite Seminary of Knocktopher, and his later studies at St. Kieran's College, Kilkenny, where he received all his orders, being raised to the priesthood by Bishop (now Cardinal) Moran on the 11th March, 1877. He placed his services at the disposal of the Eastern Vicariate of Scotland, and immediately after his ordination came to this country. He was a short time at St. Patrick's, Edinburgh, and was later transferred to St. Andrew's, Dundee. As in so many similar cases, his stay in Scotland was intended to be only temporary; but after some years' experience of work at St. Andrew's, though it is said

high inducements were held out to bring him back to Ireland, he decided to throw in his lot with the Scottish Mission, and accordingly he became affiliated to the diocese of Dunkeld. Altogether he was nine years at the Pro-Cathedral, and while devoting himself faithfully to the usual round of priestly duty, he in particular identified himself, and with conspicuous success, with the Temperance League of St. Patrick. It was during those years he formed that close and intimate friendship with the late Mgr. Clapperton, which continued unbroken till the latter's death. In 1886 he was transferred as senior assistant to St. Mary's. When at the close of the same year Father McDermott demitted office on being appointed to the professorial staff at the Scots College, Valladolid, Father Phelan was promoted to fill the vacancy, being thus at the early age of thirty-five placed in charge of one of the most responsible posts in the diocese. He soon proved himself worthy of the high confidence reposed in him by the Bishop. His first work of importance was to establish the mission of St. Patrick's. His predecessor had with wise foresight secured ground in the east of the town, with the immediate object of building a chapel-school, which should eventually form the centre of a new mission. To this work Canon Phelan set his hand towards the end of 1889. The foundation stone was laid on St. Patrick's Day, 1890, and twelve months later the mission was inaugurated with Canon Butti as its first pastor.

We may mention at this stage one other foundation of Canon Phelan's which he always regarded with a special pride and affection. When in 1901 Monifieth ceased to have a resident priest, Canon Phelan took over the charge, to which later on was added that of Broughty Ferry. At the latter place there was no church or chapel, and Mass for a time was said in a rented hall. The late Canon set his heart on building a church, and he had the satisfaction of seeing the foundation stone laid in April, 1904. The opening took place in the following year. So successfully had he laboured in gathering together the necessary funds, that on the appointment of a resident priest in April, 1908, he was able to hand over the new building practically free of debt.

Meantime he was not less assiduous in attending to interests nearer home. During his long incumbency of twenty-three years, the affairs of St. Mary's underwent steady progress and consolidation. The most memorable of his improvements in connection with the church was that carried out in 1901-2 in celebration of the jubilee of the building. This involved many alterations and additions, the most noticeable features being the two imposing towers built over the entry. The interior also was considerably remodelled, decorated and entirely reseated, the entire cost running to close on £4,000. Scarcely was this work successfully completed when he started to improve the

schools, and the year 1904 saw them undergo considerable improvement and extension.

With this bare record of his activities in building up the material fabric, we can give no adequate idea of the devotedness and the success of his pastoral work amongst his people. His whole interest in life seemed to centre on his flock, and St. Mary's and its welfare were as the apple of his eye. His attention to his schools and the education of the young was unflagging; indeed work amongst children seemed to have a peculiar fascination for him, and in their turn the little ones were not slow to recognise and reciprocate the affection he showed them. He enjoyed distinct oratorical gifts, and his extraordinary powers of moving his hearers were well known. Amongst the public at large he was held in high esteem. He had a charm of manner and kindly disposition that were very attractive, and he was much beloved and respected by those who enjoyed his intimacy. All the usual honours of a hard-working and successful ministry came his way. He was Missionary Rector, and a Canon of the Dunkeld Chapter since its erection in 1895. He was also a member of the School Board, and for many years had been a Justice of the Peace for the city of Dundee.

His death came with tragic suddenness. He had been confined to bed for some days with a slight chill and influenza. Neither his medical attendant nor those about him apprehended the least danger, and it was thought that in a few days he would be about his work again. On the night of Sunday, 19th September, without any preliminary warning, came a sudden collapse, and in a few moments all was over. Father Guinan was with him at the end. The news of his death cast a gloom over the neighbourhood, and indeed over the whole city. The body was conveyed to the church on Tuesday evening, and from that hour till the funeral there was a continual stream of visitors all anxious to get a last look at the dead priest. The Office of the Dead was recited on Wednesday evening, and the funeral took place on the following day. Three life long friends, Father Furlong of Waterford Cathedral, Father Thomas Roche of Youghal, and Father Brophy of Crieff, were the sacred ministers of the Requiem Mass, the first named being celebrant. Bishop Macfarlane attended by the Chapter assisted in the sanctuary. The clergy were present in large numbers and rendered the music of the service. In the church were many prominent citizens and representatives of the various public bodies of Dundee. At the close of the Mass the Bishop paid a brief but weighty tribute to the merits of the deceased Canon. His lordship then pronounced the Absolutions. The scene that ensued when his remains were lifted is indescribable. The loud sobbing, which nothing could suppress, of his entire congregation gave eloquent testimony to the hold which the deceased had over his people's affections. Outside, the streets presented the aspect of public mourning; large crowds

lined the roadway from the church to the eastern cemetery, and thousands thronged round the grave at the close. The last prayers were recited by Provost Holder. A Month's Mind was held at St. Mary's on the 20th October. There is a movement on foot to found some permanent monument to the late Canon's memory.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. ROBERT GRANT, of the Archdiocese of Glasgow, who died at Calais, France, on the 20th March, 1909, in the 67th year of his age, and the 42nd of his priesthood.

The Rev. Robert Grant was born in Strathavon, Banffshire, on the 10th July, 1842. His ecclesiastical studies were pursued at Blairs College, which he entered in 1856, and at the Scots College, Valladolid, to which he was transferred in 1858. Here he remained for nine years, being ordained by the Archbishop of Valladolid on the Holy Saturday of 1867. The first four years of his missionary life were spent at St. Mary's, Glasgow. In 1871 he was given the charge of Shotts. Here he continued for seven years ministering to a poor and widely scattered congregation, and during his incumbency succeeded in erecting a handsome chapel-house. From 1878 to 1885 he was at Alexandria. The latter year, after a short stay at St. Lawrence's, Greenock, finds him back again at Shotts. In 1889 failing powers obliged him to demit his charge, and for a number of years he occupied a subordinate position at St. Mary's, Glasgow, Barrhead and Coat-bridge. He retired altogether from active service in 1901, and subsequently resided at various places in England and the north of France. He was of a gentle and kindly nature, and was much beloved by all who knew him.

THE main object of this College is to educate and train for the Priesthood those who may feel themselves called to dedicate themselves to God and the salvation of souls as Clergymen on the Scottish Mission. To this object all its funds are applied.

The requisite outfit comprises, two suits of tweed of the pattern known as parson grey (small boys may come in knickerbockers), two pairs of strong shoes, one pair slippers, the usual underclothing for day and night use, flannels, stockings and towels, a warm overcoat for winter. The Course of Education comprises all that is usually taught in Colleges.

Henceforward Students will not be admitted before their fourteenth year. They must bring with them a certificate showing that they have satisfactorily stood an examination in religious and secular knowledge equivalent to that required in the Highest Grade of an Elementary School. The time of entry is the month of August—the exact date being fixed in June—and all students must be in the College on the day appointed. The greatest care is taken of their health; strict attention is paid to their comfort, and they are attended by a Medical Gentleman as often as occasion may require.

ST. MUNGO'S ACADEMY, TOWNHEAD, GLASGOW.

Conducted by the **MARIST BROTHERS.**

This Academy was founded in 1858 with a view to provide for the better-class Catholic children of Glasgow and environs a training both thoroughly religious and thoroughly practical.

In 1897, 1902 and 1905 the Premises were considerably enlarged in order to procure comfortable accommodation for the increased number of pupils. At present, besides the ordinary classrooms, the School has well-equipped Scientific Laboratories, an Art Room, a Library and a Hall for Modelling in Clay and Free Drawing. Attached to the School are open and covered Granolithic Playgrounds, provided with Gymnastic Appliances for the physical development of the Pupils.

The School comprises three separate *Departments, viz.:* (1) The *Primary Department*; (2) The *Higher Grade Intermediate Department*; and (3) The *Higher Grade Advanced Department*, all of which are regularly examined by H.M. Inspectors.

The **Primary Department**, including Infants' Classes, professes, together with the rudiments of French, the full course of the Primary Education Code (Scotland). The test of fitness to pass from this to the Higher Grade Intermediate Department is the Merit Certificate or the "Qualifying" Examination.

The **Higher Grade Intermediate** Course occupies three years, and includes Religion, English, French, Latin or German, Arithmetic, Mathematics, Geography, History, Experimental Science, Drawing, Vocal Music and Physical Drill.

The Intermediate Leaving Certificate of the Scotch Education Department completes this Course, and entitles the holder to proceed to

The **Higher Grade Advanced** Department, where an additional course of study, more or less on specific lines, is pursued, (1) by "Junior Students" in training for the Teaching Profession, (2) by Intending University Students for other Professions, and (3) by Students preparing for the Civil Service, etc.

The Complete Leaving Certificate of the Scotch Education Department brings this Course to a satisfactory conclusion.

Quarterly Reports of Application, Punctuality, etc., are issued to the Parents.

Fees payable quarterly in advance, on the 1st August, 1st November, 1st February and 1st May.
