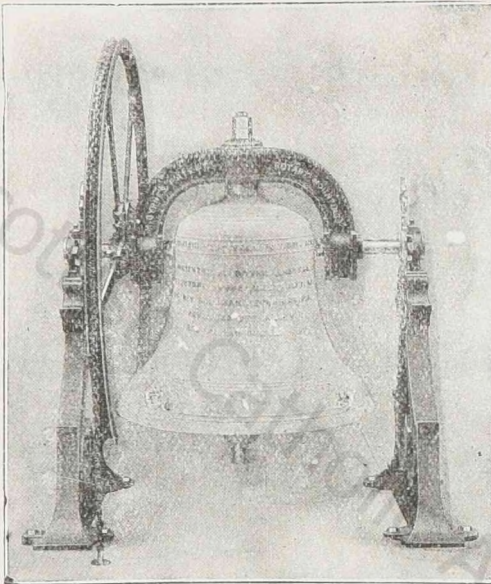

SECTION III.

LITURGICAL USE OF THE CALENDAR.

I. THE FESTIVALS.

The Festivals of the Church are not all celebrated with the same degree of solemnity ; the words *Double*, *Semi-Double*, and *Simple*, found in the Calendar, show the degree of solemnity with which each feast is celebrated. The order is as follows : *double of the first class*, *double of the second class*, *double major*, *double*, *semi-double*, and *simple*. When the office is *double*, an entire Anthem is said or sung before and after each Psalm ; when *semi-double*, only a word or two are said or sung before the Psalm. A *simple* has only three lessons at Matins. A *feria* is a week-day for which no Saint's Office is appointed.

The principal Festivals are *doubles of the first class*. Some Festivals have an Octave, or succession of eight days, on which, with certain exceptions, the Office and Mass of the Feast are said, or a commemoration made.

II. THE ROMAN MISSAL.

The prayers, and portions of the Holy Scripture, of which the Mass is composed, are partly always the same and partly different every day. Those that are invariable are contained in what is called the *Ordinary* of the Mass, at the beginning of the Missal. The parts that are changeable, or *proper*—viz., the *Introits*, *Collects*, *Graduals* and *Tracts*, *Gospels*, *Offertories*, *Secrets*, *Communions*, and *Post-Communions*—form the subsequent contents. As the *Prefaces* are not so frequently subject to change, they follow each other in regular succession in the *Ordinary* of the Mass.

If a double of the 1st or 2nd class, or a Feast of the Lord, falls on a Sunday, the Mass of the Feast is said instead of that of the Sunday, unless it be a Sunday of the *first class*—viz., the First Sunday of Advent, the Sundays of Lent, Passion, Palm, Easter, Low, Pentecost, and Trinity Sundays—which are never superseded. The Sundays of the *second class*, which are superseded only by doubles of the *first class*, are the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th of Advent; Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima Sundays. The Gospels for Sundays thus superseded are said at the end of the Mass, instead of St John's Gospel; and a Commemoration of Sunday, by its proper *Collect*, *Secret*, and *Post-Communion*, is made after the Collect, etc., of the Festival. The Calendar, in the first part of this Directory, indicates the various Prayers said at Mass on each day of the year.

III. THE VESPER BOOK.

The Evening Service of the Church is contained in the Vesper Book. The following is the order of Vespers: *Pater noster* and *Ave Maria* being said, the Priest intones the Versicle *Deus, in adjutorium meum intende*, to which the choir answer by the Response, *Domine, ad adjuvandum me festina*, with the *Gloria Patri*; and when five Psalms, with their Anthems, have been sung, the Priest chants the *Little Chapter*. Then are sung the Hymn, with its Versicle and Response, and *Magnificat* with its Anthem, followed by the Prayers and Commemorations appointed for the day; which, if it be neither a double nor within an Octave, are followed by the Commemoration or *Suffrage* of the Saints (or during Paschal time, the Commemoration of the Cross), to be found after the Common Vespers for Sunday. All these Commemorations on Sunday are indicated in the Calendar.

PART II.

THE HIERARCHY AND THE CLERGY.

SECTION I.

THE GENERAL HIERARCHY OF THE CHURCH.

THE Catholic Hierarchy, or the governing body of the Holy Catholic Church, consists of: 1. His Holiness the Sovereign Pontiff, assisted by the Sacred College of Cardinals, and by the Sacred Congregations (of which the Cardinals are the chief members), the Tribunals, and the Offices, of the Roman Curia; 2. the Patriarchs, Archbishops and Bishops; 3. the Apostolic Delegates, Vicars and Prefects; and 4. certain Abbots and Prelates.

Besides the *Residential Sees*, there are many *Titular Sees*, formerly (until March 3, 1882) called *Sees in partibus infidelium*, that is, Sees in infidel regions, the Archbishops and Bishops of which only take their title from them without being bound to

residence. These Sees are, for the most part, assigned to Archbishops and Bishops appointed, either to Apostolic Delegations, Vicariates, or Prefectures; or to the office of Coadjutor, Auxiliary, or Administrator of a Diocese.—Many are vacant.

II. THE SOVEREIGN PONTIFF.

HIS HOLINESS POPE BENEDICT XV. (JAMES DELLA CHIESA), the 259th Roman Pontiff, was born at Genoa, November 21, 1854; ordained Priest, December 21, 1878; consecrated Archbishop of Bologna, December 22, 1907; created Cardinal, May 25, 1914; elected Pope, September 3, and crowned September 6, 1914.

III. THE SACRED COLLEGE OF CARDINALS.

The Cardinals, as the advisers and assistants of the Sovereign Pontiff, are the Supreme council or senate of the Church. On the death of the Pontiff, they elect his successor.

There are three orders of Cardinals, *Bishops, Priests, and Deacons*. These orders are distinct from those of the Hierarchy: with very few exceptions, the Cardinal Priests are archbishops or bishops; and the Cardinal Deacons are generally priests.

The Sacred College, when complete, consists of 70 members; 6 Cardinal Bishops, whose dioceses are the six "Suburban Sees," near Rome; 50 Cardinal Priests, who take their title from the "Titular Churches," to which they are appointed, with jurisdiction and right to a throne, etc., therein; and 14 Cardinal Deacons, who are appointed to other churches called "Deaconries."

The first Cardinal Bishop is *Dean*, the first of the Priests is *First Priest*, and the first of the Deacons is *First Deacon*, of the Sacred College. The Dean has the right of consecrating, and the First Deacon the right of proclaiming and crowning, a new Pope.

On the death of the Pontiff the Cardinal *Camerlengo* has the administration of the public affairs of the Holy See.

The "creation" of a Cardinal sometimes precedes, even by several years, its "publication" or proclamation. The Cardinal is then said to be "reserved *in petto*," and, when proclaimed, he takes precedence according to date of creation.

IV. THE ROMAN CURIA.

The Roman Curia, as re-constituted by the Apostolic Constitution *Sapienti consilio* (29th June 1908) of Pope Pius X., consists of the following Sacred Congregations, Tribunals, and Offices.

SACRED CONGREGATIONS,

And the Matters with which they have to deal.

1. *Congregations of the Holy Office.* The protection of faith and morals; the judging of heresy; the doctrine and the use of Indulgences; impediments to Marriage with non-Catholics;

dogmatic teaching as to Marriage and other Sacraments; the examination, and the prohibition, of books dangerous to faith, or otherwise pernicious.

2. *Consistorial Congregation.* The preparation of matter for Consistories; the erection and division of dioceses, etc., and the election of Bishops. Also whatever relates to the government of dioceses not subject to the *Propaganda*; to the reports of Bishops concerning the state of their dioceses; to apostolic visitations; and to the spiritual care of emigrants.

3. *Congregation of Sacramental Discipline.* Legislation as to the administration and reception of the Sacraments; dispensations from impediments to Marriage and to Ordination, and in regard to the Blessed Eucharist; questions as to the validity of Marriages and of Ordinations.

4. *Congregation of the Council.* The observance of precepts of the Church and dispensations therein. Regulations as to parish priests and Canons; to pious associations, pious bequests, and pious works; to benefices, ecclesiastical property, etc. Also whatever relates to the celebration of Councils and their ratification, and to meetings and conferences of Bishops.

5. *Congregation for the Affairs of Religious.* The Regulation of matters between Bishops and Religious, and amongst Religious themselves, including persons who, without vows, live a community life, or are secular members of Third Orders. Also the granting of dispensations to Religious.

6. *Congregation "de Propaganda Fide."* Having jurisdiction over missionary countries, including however many regions where hierarchies are established. From this jurisdiction the United Kingdom, Holland, Luxemburg, Canada, Newfoundland, and the United States, were withdrawn in 1908.

7. *Congregation for the Eastern Church.* Having jurisdiction over all persons and things pertaining to the Oriental Rites, except in matters that belong to the Holy Office.

8. *Congregation of Sacred Rites.* The care and regulation of rites and ceremonies; the beatification and canonisation of Saints; and whatever relates to sacred relics.

9. *Congregation of the Ceremonial.* The regulation of papal ceremonies; of sacred functions performed by Cardinals; and of the precedence of Cardinals, and of envoys to the Holy See.

10. *Congregation for Extraordinary Ecclesiastical Affairs.* The consideration of matters submitted to its examination by the Supreme Pontiff through the Cardinal Secretary of State; especially those connected with civil laws, or relating to agreements made with civil powers.

11. *Congregation of Seminaries and of Universities of Studies.* The regulation of university and other studies; the granting of power to confer degrees, etc.

SECTION III.

THE HIERARCHY OF SCOTLAND.

I. VICARS-APOSTOLIC.

From the Extinction of the Hierarchy in 1603 till its Restoration in 1878.

1. The ancient Hierarchy ended with JAMES BETOUN, Abp. of Glasgow, who died at Paris on the 25th April 1603, aged 79. After being subjected to the jurisdiction of the Archpriests and first Vicar-Apostolic of England till 1623, and afterwards to local Prefects of the Mission, the Clergy were incorporated into a missionary body by decree of *Propaganda*, 1653, and governed by the following *Prefects-Apostolic*—WILLIAM BANNATYNE (or *Bellenden*), 1653-61; ALEXANDER DUNBAR (or *Winstler*), 1662-68, 1672-94; and JOHN WALKER (or *Ross*), 1668-71. In May 1694 a Scottish *Vicariate-Apostolic* was established. This was divided into two *Districts*, the *Lowland* and the *Highland*, in February 1731; and these into three, the *Eastern*, *Western*, and *Northern*, by Papal Rescript of 13th February 1827. This last arrangement remained in force till the re-establishment of the Hierarchy by the Apostolic Letter *Ex supremo Apostolatus apice*, 4th March 1878.

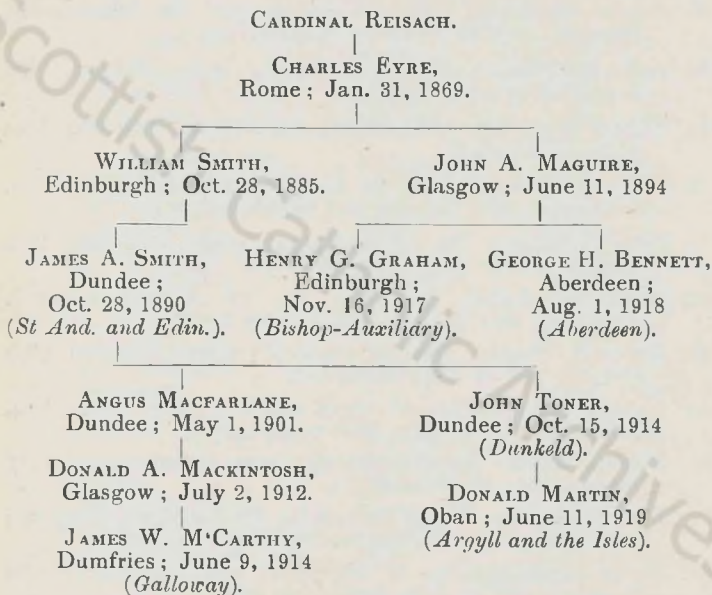

3. *Celebrations for Deceased Clergymen.*

By a rule immemorially observed in the Mission of Scotland, every Missionary belonging to it offered up three Masses for the soul of each Bishop or Priest who died attached to the Mission. In consequence of the greatly increased number of Clergymen, this rule was modified in 1847 by the Vicars Apostolic, by authority of the Holy See, in so far that every Missionary was bound to celebrate thrice for those belonging to his own District, and once for those who had served in another District. Lastly, in virtue of a Papal Rescript of 20th June 1879, the rule was again altered by the Archbishops and Bishops, to the effect that every Missionary is obliged to celebrate thrice for a deceased Missionary of his own Diocese, and once for one of any other diocese.

SECTION II.

DIOCESE OF ABERDEEN

Comprising Counties of Aberdeen, Banff, Caithness, Cromarty, Elgin or Moray, Inverness (north of a straight line drawn from the extreme north of Loch Luing to the junction of the Counties of Inverness, Aberdeen, and Banff), Kincardine, Nairn, Ross (except Island of Lewis), Sutherland, and the Orkney and Shetland Islands.

THE See of Aberdeen was founded at Mortlach in 1063; transferred to Aberdeen in 1125, under its fourth Bishop, Nectan; and was vacant for 301 years, from the death of Hon. WILLIAM GORDON at Aberdeen, on 6th August 1577.

DIOCESE OF ARGYLL AND THE ISLES.

Comprising Counties of Argyll and Inverness (south of a line drawn from the northern extremity of Loch Luing to the junction of the Counties of Inverness, Aberdeen, and Banff); the Islands of Bute and Arran and the Hebrides.

THE See of Argyll was founded about 1200, being disjoined from the Diocese of Dunkeld; and was vacant for more than three centuries. JAMES HAMILTON was appointed to the See on 14th July 1553, but was probably never consecrated.

The See of the Isles (*Insularum*, or *Sodorensis*) is said to have been founded about 447 by St PATRICK, who consecrated GERMANUS, its first Bishop; was united to *Man* till the end of the 14th century; and was vacant for 325 years, from the death of RODERICK MACLEAN in 1553.

PART V.

ECCLESIASTICAL AND GENERAL INFORMATION.

SECTION I.

ECCLESIASTICAL LAWS AND OBSERVANCES.

1. EASTER DUTIES AND INDULGENCE.

By Rescripts from the Holy See, dated 13th November 1916, the Faithful of the Dioceses of S. Andrews and Edinburgh, Glasgow and Dunkeld, are authorised to satisfy the obligation of the Paschal Communion, and to gain the Plenary Indulgence, on any day from the first Sunday of Lent to Sunday within the Octave of the Ascension, inclusively ; and those of the Diocese of Galloway, of Aberdeen, and of Argyll and the Isles, from the first Sunday of Lent till Low Sunday. This extension is granted for a term of five years.

2. FAST AND ABSTINENCE DAYS.

The new Code of Canon Law makes many important changes in the general law of fasting and abstinence. The Indult, however, granted in perpetuity to Scotland by the Holy See on 27th January 1911, still continues in force. The regulations of both Code and Indult as they apply to Scotland are here summarised.

I. FAST DAYS OF ONE MEAL.

1. The Ember-days throughout the year.
2. The Vigils or Eves of Pentecost, Assumption, All Saints, and Christmas.
3. In Lent all days except Sunday, up to noon of Holy Saturday.

N.B.—(a) If a fasting Vigil falls on a Sunday, the fast is not observed either on the Sunday or on the preceding Saturday ;

- (b) Except in Lent, a Holiday of Obligation is never a fasting day ;
- (c) The old law, forbidding the use of fish and flesh at the same meal, is abolished ;
- (d) At the morning and evening refectons, the quantity and quality of the food taken are to be regulated by the approved custom of the country ;
- (e) The law of fasting is binding on all between the completion of their 21st and the beginning of their 60th years.

II. DAYS OF ABSTINENCE.

On which the Church forbids the use of Flesh Meat or Soup made from Meat.

1. All Fridays throughout the year ;
2. The Ember Wednesdays throughout the year ;
3. The Vigils or Eves of Assumption, All Saints, and Christmas, but not when they fall on a Saturday or Sunday ;
4. In Lent, Ash Wednesday, Ember Saturday, and (up to noon only) Holy Saturday.

N.B.—(a) Except in Lent, a Holiday of Obligation is never a day of abstinence ;

- (b) Eggs, butter, and such like, as well as dripping, lard, and any condiments formed from animal fat, may be taken on any day of the year ;
- (c) The law of abstinence is binding on all who have completed their 7th year.

3. MARRIAGES.

Marriage may be contracted on any day of the year. The *Solemnising* of Marriage, *i. e.*, the Solemn Blessing of the Church, which is given only during Mass, is forbidden from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday and from the first Sunday of Advent to Christmas Day, all dates being inclusive. Bishops, however, may for a just reason allow the Solemnising of Marriage any day during the forbidden periods, provided the laws of the Liturgy be observed. A widow, who has already received this Blessing, may not again be blessed at any subsequent marriage.

Marriage is constituted by the free consent of two parties taking one another for husband and wife. Anything interfering with the freedom of consent, in the way of serious error, grave fear and violence, may endanger the validity of the marriage bond.

The age required for valid marriage is sixteen years complete in the case of the man, fourteen years complete in that of the woman ; those under twenty-one years of age should before marriage inform their parents and obtain their consent.

Marriage cannot be contracted without a Dispensation by persons within the third degree of kindred or the second degree of affinity; if attempted the marriage is invalid. Spiritual kindred contracted by Baptism, *i.e.*, between a god-parent and a god-child, is also an invalidating impediment.

Marriage between a Catholic and an unbaptised person is invalid without a Dispensation.

A "mixed" marriage (that is, a marriage between a Catholic and one who, though baptised, does not profess the Catholic Faith) is unlawful without a Dispensation; and the Dispensation cannot lawfully be given unless for a sufficiently grave reason, and subject to the following conditions as laid down by the Council of Fort-Augustus (Decr., xvii. 5): 1. That *all* the children that may be born of the marriage shall be baptised, and brought up, in the Catholic Faith. 2. That the Catholic party shall have full liberty for the practice of the Catholic religion. 3. That no religious marriage ceremony shall take place elsewhere than before the Catholic Priest. 4. That the Catholic party shall endeavour to effect the conversion of the non-Catholic party to the true faith of Christ. These promises will ordinarily be made in writing by the parties.

For parties preparing for marriage, the golden rule is: *give very early notice to the parish priest, who will furnish precise and helpful instructions as to both civil and ecclesiastical requirements.* Banns have to be proclaimed on three consecutive Sundays or Holidays, and evidence of Baptism has to be furnished by both parties, even in the case of a mixed marriage. If it can be done without serious inconvenience, Catholics should be confirmed before marriage. As a general rule, the parish priest of the bride, in the case of a mixed marriage the parish priest of the Catholic party, will take charge of the marriage.

The Decree *Ne temere*, which became law in Scotland only on the 1st September 1908, made important regulations for the celebration of marriage, either between two Catholics, or between a Catholic and a non-Catholic. These regulations have been incorporated into, and somewhat modified by, the new Code of Canon Law, which came into force on the 19th May 1918. The following points should be noted:—

I. Engagements, even when formally and solemnly contracted, produce no canonical effects and afford no canonical ground for claiming a fulfilment of the promise.

II. Only those marriages are valid which are contracted before the parish priest or the Ordinary of the place or a priest delegated by either of these, and at least two witnesses.

III. The parish priest and the Ordinary of the place validly assist at a marriage:

(a) only within the limits of their territory: within which they assist validly at marriages not only of their own subjects, but also of those not subject to them;

(b) provided that not compelled by violence or by grave fear, they ask and receive the consent of the contracting parties.

IV. They assist licitly :

(a) when they have legitimately ascertained the free state of the contracting parties ;

(b) when they have ascertained that one of the contracting parties has a domicile, or at least has lived for a month in the place where the marriage takes place ;

V. When the parish priest or Ordinary or delegate as above (No. II.) cannot be got :

(a) in danger of death marriage may be validly and licitly contracted before two witnesses only ;

(b) outside the case of danger of death, when these conditions are prudently considered as likely to last for a month, marriage may be contracted before two witnesses only ;

(c) in either case, if any priest is at hand, he should be called in to assist ; but his presence or absence does not affect the validity of the marriage.

VI. (a) The above laws are binding on all persons baptised in the Catholic Church and on those who have been converted to it from heresy or schism.

(b) The same laws are binding also on the same Catholics as above, if they contract marriage with non-Catholics, baptised, or unbaptised, even after a dispensation has been obtained.

(c) Non-Catholics, whether baptised or unbaptised, who contract among themselves, are nowhere bound to observe the Catholic form of marriage ; nor are those who, being born of non-Catholic parents, have been baptised in the Catholic Church, but have been brought up from infancy away from the Catholic faith.

4. SICK CALLS.

All sick calls should be given in at the Priest's house at a timely hour in the morning. If this reasonable rule were adhered to, it would save the Clergy much unnecessary labour, and the people many disappointments, which they may justly ascribe to their own want of system.

On Saturdays, eves of Holidays, and other days which are generally devoted to the Confessional, the Priest should not, if possible, be called away from this important duty. Unless in cases of necessity, sick calls should not be made on Saturdays or Sundays, when the Clergy have so many other duties to attend to.

It is the duty of the people to conform to whatever regulations may be made by the Clergy, on these and other matters connected with Religion, in their respective congregations. All things should be done in order, according to the advice of St Paul.

When the Priest is called to attend a sick person, everything that he requires for the administration of the Sacraments should be furnished as becomingly as possible in the room where the sick

person lies—viz., a table covered with a clean linen cloth, on which should be laid a candle, a vessel of holy water with an Asperges, a small vessel of common water for the purification of the Priest's fingers after the administration of the Holy Viaticum, and a napkin for the sick person at the time of Communion. As the Priest generally brings the Blessed Sacrament on these occasions, everything should be so becomingly prepared, according to their means, as to show the great respect of the inmates for Jesus Christ, and the high value they set upon the honour thus rendered to their house in the visit of their Lord and Redeemer.

While the Priest is administering the Viaticum and Extreme Unction, the assistants should devoutly offer up their prayers to God on behalf of the sick person, to implore that he may receive those Sacraments with the necessary dispositions.

SECTION II.

INDULGENCES AND DEVOTIONS.

1. INDULGENCES GRANTED TO SCOTLAND.

EXPLANATION OF INDULGENCES.

An Indulgence is a remission of the whole, or a part, of the *temporal* punishment that often remains to be suffered for sins which, as to their guilt and *eternal* punishment, have been already remitted. For the effect and validity of an Indulgence, it is not only necessary that there be a competent authority in him who grants it, and a just cause or motive for the grant, but it is also necessary, on the part of him who obtains it, that he renounce and be sincerely sorry for all his sins, that he be in the state of grace, and that he duly perform the conditions prescribed. Of Indulgences, some are called *plenary*, which, when fully obtained, remit the whole of the temporal punishment that remained due on account of past sins; others are for a certain number of years or days, which, when fully obtained, remit as much of the temporal punishment as would have been discharged by the performance of so many years or days of Canonical Penance. Thus, by a *quarantine* Indulgence is meant the remission of so much of the future penalty (*poena*) of sin as is the equivalent of keeping a Lent according to the strict discipline of the Church.

Indulgences attached to sacred objects, such as rosaries, etc., are available to any person using these objects, and the Indulgences cease only when the thing is destroyed or sold.

The conditions for most Plenary Indulgences include Confession, Communion, Visit to a Church, and prayers for the Pope's intentions. For an Indulgence granted for any particular day,

Confession made eight days before will suffice; Communion may be made the day before, and both Confession and Communion any day within the Octave. For Triduums, Novenas, and such like, Confession and Communion may be made any day within the Octave after the conclusion of the exercises. For daily communicants, or for those who confess regularly twice a month, no special confession is necessary. The visit may be made to any Church or Oratory and may be made from noon of the preceding day to midnight of the last day of the time appointed. Prayers for the Pope's intentions should be recited vocally and not merely mentally. Jubilee Indulgences, as well as some others, have their own special conditions.

PLENARY INDULGENCES GRANTED TO SCOTLAND.

1st, From the Feast of St Thomas, Apostle, 21st December, to the first Sunday after the Epiphany, inclusively.

2nd, From Ash-Wednesday to the second Sunday of Lent, inclusively.

3rd, During the time appointed in each Diocese for complying with Easter duties.

4th, From Pentecost Sunday to Sunday after Corpus Christi.

5th, From Sunday before the Feast of SS. Peter and Paul to the Octave day.

6th, From Sunday before the Feast of the Assumption to the Octave day.

7th, From Sunday before the Feast of All Saints to the Octave day.

8th, On the Feast of St Andrew, and during the Octave.

Conditions for gaining these Indulgences.

1st, That within the time prescribed the faithful approach the Sacraments of Penance and the Holy Eucharist.

2nd, That on the day of their Communion they offer up some prayers to God for the happy state of the whole Church of Christ, for its Supreme Pastor, the Bishop of Rome; for peace and concord between all Christian Princes; for the exaltation and propagation of the Holy Catholic Faith, especially in our own country; and for the eternal salvation of all Christians.

3rd, That, if they have an opportunity, they visit within the limited time some church or oratory, and pray to God as has been mentioned before.

4th, That, if their circumstances enable them, they perform some works of mercy.

PARTIAL INDULGENCES: THE LITANY OF THE B. VIRGIN.

On the 6th May 1879, His Holiness granted the Apostolic Benediction, and an Indulgence of seven years on each Saturday, and on the Feasts of the Blessed Virgin, to the Faithful of England and Scotland who shall recite or sing the Litany of the Blessed Virgin in any church in either country.

2. THE PENTECOST NOVENA.

For the Pentecost Novena, prescribed by Encyclical Letters of 5th May 1895 and 9th May 1897, the following Indulgences have been granted to those taking part in the Novena; *1st*, seven years and seven quarantines for each day; *2nd*, a Plenary Indulgence on any one day of Novena, or on Pentecost, or on any day of the subsequent Octave, on the usual conditions of Confession and Communion and prayers for the Pope's intention. [These Indulgences are attainable by those also who are legitimately impeded from attending the Public Devotions, provided the Novena be done in private and the other conditions fulfilled.] Moreover, those who again, during the Octave of Pentecost, inclusive of Trinity Sunday, publicly or privately recite every day, according to their devotion, some prayers to the Holy Ghost, and satisfy the other conditions, may gain a second time the above Indulgences, both plenary and partial. All these Indulgences are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

3. THE OCTAVE OF CORPUS CHRISTI.

For the continuance and daily increase of the abundant fruit produced by the Decree of 20th December 1905, on *Daily Communion*, Our Holy Father, POPE PIUS X., by a letter of the Sacred Congregation of Indulgences of the 10th April 1907, to the Bishops of the Catholic Church, has expressed his wish to have, as far as may be possible, the following annual observances:—

(a) IN CATHEDRAL CHURCHES.

That on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, either immediately after the Festival of CORPUS CHRISTI, or (if the circumstances of persons or places so require) at some other time of the year to be fixed by the Bishop, there shall be in every Cathedral Church three days' prayer, as here described: namely—

I.—That, on *each day*, there shall be a sermon on the great excellence of the Sacrament of the Eucharist, and on the dispositions required for worthily receiving it. That, after the sermon, the Blessed Sacrament shall be exposed; and during the Exposition the prayer *O most Sweet Jesus* (see below) shall be recited, to be followed on the Sunday by the *Te Deum*. That the *Tantum ergo* shall then be sung, and the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament be given.

II.—That, on the *Sunday*, the last of the three days, there shall be, at the usual parochial Mass, a homily by the Parish Priest on the gospel of the Sunday within the octave of CORPUS CHRISTI—or, if the Sunday be not within the Octave, a sermon in preparation for a fervent Communion; and at this parochial Mass the faithful shall communicate. That, on this Sunday afternoon (or evening), there shall be the same service as on the two preceding days. And in the sermon the preacher shall

exhort the faithful to more fervent piety towards the Most Holy Sacrament, and especially to a more frequent participation of this heavenly banquet, in accordance with the approved teaching of the *Catechismus Romanus* (see n. vi. of the Decree of 20th December 1905). Moreover, at Benediction (as is said above), the *Tantum ergo* will be preceded by the *Te Deum*.

(b) IN PARISH CHURCHES.

His Holiness earnestly recommends that also in Parish Churches according as each Bishop in his prudence and discernment shall judge fit, there shall be at least those pious exercises which are above described for the cathedral Churches for the Sunday within the octave, or some other Sunday in the year.

That the faithful may more eagerly take part in the aforesaid pious exercises, His Holiness has been pleased to grant the following Indulgences, applicable also to the Souls in Purgatory :—

1. An Indulgence of seven years and seven quarantines for each of the three days' prayer. 2. A Plenary Indulgence to be gained once during the three days, on any day thereof, by those who devoutly assist at the devotions of any one day, and after Confession and Holy Communion pray for the intentions of the Holy Father. 3. A Plenary Indulgence to be gained on the Sunday by all who, after Confession, receive Holy Communion together in a Cathedral or a Parish Church, and pray for the Holy Father's intentions.

PRAYER BEFORE THE BLESSED SACRAMENT.

O most sweet Jesus, Who didst come into this world to enrich the souls of all mankind with the life of Thy grace, and Who, to preserve and sustain this life in them, dost daily give Thyself in the most august Sacrament of the Eucharist, as a saving medicine to heal their infirmities and a divine food to support their weakness, we pray and beseech Thee to pour forth upon them most graciously Thy holy spirit, so that, being filled therewith, any who are in mortal sin may, by returning to Thee, be restored to the life of grace which they have lost; and that those who, by Thy great mercy, already serve Thee may daily, as far as each one is able, come devoutly to Thy heavenly banquet, and in the strength thereof may find a remedy for their daily venial faults and a support of the life of Thy grace, and, thus becoming more and more cleansed from sin, may obtain the everlasting happiness of heaven. Amen.

4. THE FEAST OF THE SACRED HEART.

By a Decree of the S. Congregation of Indulgences, 22nd August 1906, His Holiness Pope Pius X. ordered that each year, on the Feast of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, in all Parish Churches as well as others where the feast is observed, the form of Consecration issued by Pope Leo XIII. on the 25th May 1899 should be recited during exposition of the Blessed Sacrament,

followed by the Litany of the Sacred Heart. To all who with devout and contrite heart assist at this pious exercise and pray for the Pope's intentions, His Holiness grants an Indulgence of seven years and seven quarantines, and further a Plenary Indulgence to those who after confession receive Holy Communion. These Indulgences are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

FORM OF CONSECRATION TO THE SACRED HEART OF JESUS.

O most sweet Jesus, Redeemer of mankind, behold us prostrate most humbly before Thy altar. To Thee we belong; Thine we wish to be; and that we may be united to Thee more closely, we dedicate ourselves each one of us to-day to Thy Most Sacred Heart.

Many have never known Thee; many, despising Thy commands, have rejected Thee. Have pity on them, most merciful Jesus, and draw all men to Thy Sacred Heart. Rule, O Lord, not only over the faithful who never have gone away from Thee, but also over the prodigal sons who have forsaken Thee; and make them return quickly to their Father's house, lest they perish of misery and hunger. Rule over those who have been misled by error, or separated by schism; and call them back to the haven of truth and the unity of faith, so that there may soon be one fold and one Shepherd. Lastly, rule over all who are sunk in the old superstition of the Gentiles, and vouchsafe to bring them out of darkness into the light and kingdom of God.

Give to Thy Church, O Lord, safety and sure liberty; give to all nations peace and order; and grant that, over the whole earth, from pole to pole, may resound the words: Praise be to the Divine Heart, through which was brought to us salvation; glory and honour be to It for ever. Amen.

5. THE *PORTIUNCULA* INDULGENCE.

This is a Plenary Indulgence attached originally to the Basilica of St Mary of the Angels, commonly called the *Portiuncula*, near Assisi, and afterwards extended to all Franciscan churches, as well as to some others by Apostolic privilege. The faithful who visit any of these churches from noon of the 1st day of August till midnight of the 2nd day of August, may, on the usual conditions of confession, communion, and prayer for the Pope's intention, gain a Plenary Indulgence, *toties quoties*, that is, at each visit. The Indulgence is applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

By Decree of the Holy Office (26th May 1911, *cf.* Motu Proprio: 9th June 1910). Bishops are empowered to designate in the various localities of their dioceses one or more churches or oratories (public or semi-public), where the faithful, on fulfilment of the above conditions, may gain the *Portiuncula* Indulgence just as if they visited a church of the Franciscan Order. Further, for the greater

convenience of the faithful, power is given to the Bishops to transfer the Indulgence any year from the 2nd day of August to the Sunday immediately following, so that the visits may be made any time from noon of the preceding Saturday up to midnight of the Sunday. The day so appointed is noted each year in the current *Ordo Recitandi*.

The Indulgence may be gained by members of religious communities who visit their own church or oratory in which the Blessed Sacrament is reserved.

The conditions of confession and communion may be complied with anywhere.

It is the earnest wish and recommendation of the Holy See, that in the churches designated as above for the visits, there should, at the Sunday evening service, be recited in public special prayers for the Supreme Pontiff, for the Ministers of the Sanctuary and for all the faithful, a prayer to St Francis of Assisi, and the Litany of the Saints,—the whole to conclude with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

The following are the churches appointed :—

ARCHDIOCESE OF S. ANDREWS AND EDINBURGH AND DIOCESES OF ARGYLL AND GALLOWAY.—In each locality the Church of the Mission.

ARCHDIOCESE OF GLASGOW.—The Church or School-Chapel of each Mission.

6. THE MONTH OF OCTOBER.

For the *October Devotions*, prescribed by Decrees of 20th August 1885, etc., the following Indulgences have been granted: *1st*, seven years and seven quarantines each time one joins in the public recital of the Rosary and Litany of the B. Virgin (or, being legitimately impeded, says them privately), and prays according to the intentions of the Pope; *2nd*, a Plenary Indulgence to those who, having done this at least ten times, confess and communicate; *3rd*, a Plenary Indulgence to all who, on the Feast of the Rosary or within the Octave, confess, communicate, and pray in some church to God and the B. Virgin according to the intention of his Holiness; *4th*, seven years and seven quarantines, each time, for the recital of the following prayer to St Joseph enjoined by the Encyclical of 15th August 1889.

PRAYER TO S. JOSEPH.

To thee, O blessed Joseph, we fly in our tribulation, and while imploring the help of thy most holy spouse, thy protection also with confidence we crave. By that affection which united thee with the Immaculate Virgin, Mother of God, and by the fatherly love with which thou didst embrace the Child Jesus, we humbly supplicate thee to look down benignantly on the heritage which

Christ Jesus purchased with His Blood, and in thy might and power to succour us in our necessities.

Defend, O most provident Guardian of the Divine Family, the chosen race of Jesus Christ; keep us, most loving father, from all taint of error and corruption; do thou from heaven, as our most powerful Protector, stand graciously by us in this conflict with the powers of darkness; and as of old thou didst rescue the Child Jesus in the imminent peril of His life, so now defend the Holy Church of God from hostile wiles and all adversity, and through thy never-failing patronage so shield each one of us, that, guided by thy example and supported by thy aid, we may live in holiness, piously die, and attain eternal happiness in heaven. Amen.

7. CONSECRATION OF FAMILIES TO THE SACRED HEART.

It is the earnest desire of the Holy See that all Christian families should be consecrated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, and that a statue or image of Him be set up in a prominent place in each house, so that Christ may be enthroned as ruler in the home. All families should be consecrated separately, not in groups. The priest blesses the image, and recites the Act of Consecration. When a priest cannot be had, the image, which should be previously blessed, will be set in its place by the head of the family or other lay person, who also will recite the Act of Consecration. The Indulgences granted to each member of the family are: 1. 7 years and 7 quarantines on the day of consecration; 2. a Plenary Indulgence on the usual conditions on the day of consecration; 3. 300 days on the annual renewal of the consecration. The form of consecration, *which alone is valid for the effect of the Indulgences* (S.P.A. : 1st March 1918), is the following:—

ACT OF CONSECRATION.

O Sacred Heart of Jesus, who didst manifest to Blessed Margaret Mary the desire of reigning in Christian families, we to-day wish to proclaim Thy most complete regal dominion over our own. We would live in future with Thy life, we would cause to flourish in our midst those virtues to which Thou hast promised peace here below, we would banish far from us the spirit of the world which Thou hast cursed; and Thou shalt reign over our minds in the simplicity of our faith, and over our hearts by the whole-hearted love with which they shall burn for Thee, the flame of which we shall keep alive by the frequent reception of Thy Divine Eucharist.

Deign, O Divine Heart, to preside over our assemblings, to bless our enterprises, both spiritual and temporal, to dispel our cares, to sanctify our joys, to alleviate our sufferings. If ever one or other of us should have the misfortune to afflict Thee, remind him, O Heart of Jesus, that Thou art good and merciful to the penitent sinner. And when the hour of separation strikes, when death shall come to cast mourning into our midst, we will all, both those

who go and those who stay, be submissive to Thy eternal decrees. We will console ourselves with the thought that a day will come when the entire family, reunited in Heaven, can sing for ever Thy glories and Thy mercies.

May the Immaculate Heart of Mary, and the glorious Patriarch, St Joseph, present this consecration to Thee, and keep it in our minds all the days of our life.

All glory to the Heart of Jesus, our King and our Father.

8. PRAYERS AFTER LOW MASS.

To be said kneeling.

Hail Mary, *three times*. Then *Hail Holy Queen*.

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy; Hail, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To Thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve; to Thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this vale of tears. Turn then, most gracious Advocate, Thine eyes of mercy towards us; and after this our exile, show unto us the Blessed Fruit of Thy womb, Jesus; O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

V. Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God.

R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Let us pray.

O God, our refuge and our strength, look with favour on Thy people who cry to Thee; and through the intercession of the Glorious and Immaculate Virgin Mary, Mother of God, and Blessed Joseph her Spouse, of Thy Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and of all the Saints, mercifully and graciously hear the prayers which we pour forth for the conversion of sinners, and for the freedom and exaltation of our Holy Mother the Church. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

St Michael the Archangel defend us in the day of battle; be our safeguard against the wickedness and snares of the devil;—"the Lord command him," we humbly pray;—and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, thrust into hell Satan and the other wicked spirits who go about the world for the destruction of souls. Amen. (*300 days Indulgence.*)

To the above prayers may be added the following invocation said three times:

Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us.

(*Indulgence of 7 years and 7 quarantines.*)

9. THE ANGELUS.

IN Catholic countries, and in many places at home, the Angelus Bell is rung in the morning, at noon, and in the evening at sunset to honour the Mystery of the Incarnation. To gain the indulgences attached to this Devotion, the Angelus must be said *kneeling*, except on Saturday evening and Sunday, when it is said *standing*.

In Paschal Time, that is, from Holy Saturday at noon till the Saturday before Trinity Sunday at noon, inclusively, the *Regina Cœli* is said instead of the Angelus. This prayer is always said *standing*. Those who do not know the *Regina Cœli* may gain the indulgences by saying the Angelus; but it must be said *standing* during Paschal Time. For the convenience of the Faithful is appended a translation of the *Regina Cœli* taken from the *Raccolta*.

Queen of Heaven, rejoice. Alleluia.

For He whom thou wast made worthy to bear. Alleluia.

Hath arisen as He said. Alleluia.

Pray for us to our God. Alleluia.

V. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary. Alleluia.

R. For the Lord hath risen indeed. Alleluia.

Let us pray.

O God, who through the resurrection of Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, has vouchsafed to give joy to the whole world, grant us, we beseech Thee, that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may obtain the joys of eternal life. Through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

10. ASSOCIATION FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE FAITH.

The Association assists by prayers and alms the Catholic Missionaries in heathen and non-Catholic countries.

CONDITIONS OF MEMBERSHIP.—(1) The daily recitation of *Our Father* and one *Hail Mary*, with the invocation: *St Francis Xavier, pray for us*; and (2) the annual contribution of not less than 2s. 2d. yearly, or one halfpenny weekly. (3) Special Members contribute one guinea or more, yearly. (4) Life Membership subscription, £8.

ORGANISATION.—The usual method of collection is by the formation of Groups or Circles of Ten Members, of whom one acts as Collector. The Collector receives the contributions of his group, circulates among them the Annals of the Association, and pays over his collection to the Diocesan or Local Treasurer. A return of the sums received, and of their appropriation, is inserted annually in the *Annals of the Propagation of the Faith*. This periodical, to the reading of which each member is entitled, appears six times a year. One copy is supplied to every ten members.

PLENARY INDULGENCES.—On the 3rd of May (the Anniversary of the foundation of the Society); the 3rd of December (the feast of S. Francis Xavier); the feasts of the Epiphany, Annunciation, and Assumption—or any day within the Octave of these five festivals; the 29th of September (the feast of S. Michael); all the feasts of the Apostles; two days in each month, at the member's option; once a year for the *general* commemoration of deceased members; once a year for the *special* commemoration of deceased members of the Council, Committee, or Decade to which he belongs; at the hour of death, provided he invokes the name of Jesus.

Conditions for gaining these Indulgences.—To gain the Plenary Indulgences, the usual conditions of Confession, Communion, a visit to a church or public chapel, and prayers for the intentions of the Sovereign Pontiff are required. Members of religious houses, convents, seminaries, colleges, etc., may visit the private chapel of the establishment instead of the parish church. The Plenary Indulgences attached to the days mentioned can be gained once only at any hour from midday of the previous day to midnight of the day itself. Children, who have not yet made their first communion, may likewise gain these indulgences. These and the following are applicable to the souls in Purgatory :—

PARTIAL INDULGENCES.—300 days every time a member attends the Triduum of the 3rd of May and the 3rd of December ; 100 days every time a member recites *Our Father* and *Hail Mary*, together with the invocation of S. Francis Xavier ; seven years and seven quarantines every time a member performs any good work in the interests of the Society.

FAVOUR OF PRIVILEGED ALTAR.—For every Mass said in the name of an Associate for a deceased member.

Extensive Faculties are granted to priests who direct a Local Centre or become special members of the Association. The particulars may be obtained from the office of the British Branch, 96 Victoria Street, Westminster, S. W. 1.

Alms and Donations for the Association are received in Scotland by any of the Clergy.

SECTION III.

MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION.

1. EXCERPTS FROM PARLIAMENTARY ACTS.

Voluntary or Denominational Schools.

Education (Scotland) Act, 1918.

Sec. 18 (3). Any school transferred to the education authority shall be held, maintained, and managed as a public school by the education authority, who shall be entitled to receive grants therefor as a public school, and shall have in respect thereto the sole power of regulating the curriculum and of appointing teachers :

Provided that—

- (i) the existing staff of teachers shall be taken over by the education authority and shall from the date of transfer be placed upon the same scale of salaries as teachers of corresponding qualifications appointed to corresponding positions in other schools of the same authority :

(ii) all teachers appointed to the staff of any such school by the education authority shall in every case be teachers who satisfy the Department as to qualification, and are approved as regards their religious belief and character by representatives of the church or denominational body in whose interest the school has been conducted :

(iii) subject to the provisions of section sixty-eight (Conscience Clause) of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1872, the time set apart for religious instruction or observance in any such school shall not be less than that so set apart according to the use and wont of the former management of the school, and the education authority shall appoint as supervisor, without remuneration, of religious instruction for each such school, a person approved as regards religious belief and character as aforesaid, and it shall be the duty of the supervisor so appointed to report to the education authority as to the efficiency of the religious instruction given in such school. The supervisor shall have right of entry to the school at all times set apart for religious instruction or observance. The education authority shall give facilities for the holding of religious examinations in every such school.

(4) Any question which may arise as to the due fulfilment or observance of any provision or requirement of the preceding subsection shall be referred to the Department, whose decision shall be final.

(8) In any case where the Department are satisfied, upon representations made to them by the education authority of any education area, or by any church or denominational body acting on behalf of the parents of children belonging to such church or body, and after such inquiry as the Department deem necessary, that a new school is required for the accommodation of children whose parents are resident within that education area, regard being had to the religious belief of such parents, it shall be lawful for the education authority of that area to provide a new school, to be held, maintained, and managed by them subject to the conditions prescribed in subsection (3) of this section, so far as those conditions are applicable; the time set apart for religious instruction in the new school being not less than that set apart in schools in the same education area which have been transferred under this section.

Reformatory and Industrial Schools.

Education (Scotland) Act, 1908.

Sec. 66 (1). The Court of Justice, in determining the certified school to which a youthful offender or child is to be sent, shall endeavour to ascertain the religious persuasion to which the offender or child belongs, and the detention order shall, where

practicable, specify the religious persuasion to which the offender or child appears to belong, and a school conducted in accordance with that persuasion shall, where practicable, be selected.

(3) Where an order has been made for sending a youthful offender or child to a certified school, which is not conducted in accordance with the religious persuasion to which the offender belongs, the parent, legal guardian, nearest adult relative, or person entitled to the custody of the offender or child may apply—

(a) if the detention order was made by a . . . court acting in and for the place in and for which the court which made the order acted; and

(b) in any other case, to the Secretary of State to remove or send the offender or child to a certified school conducted in accordance with the offender's or child's religious persuasion, and the Court or Secretary of State shall, on proof of the offender's or child's religious persuasion, comply with the request of the applicant:

Provided that—

- (i) the application must be made before the offender or child has been sent to a certified school, or within thirty days after his arrival at the school, and
- (ii) the applicant must show to the satisfaction of the Court or Secretary of State that the managers of the school named by him are willing to receive the offender or child;
- (iii) nothing in this section shall be construed as preventing any such person as aforesaid from making an application to the Secretary of State after the expiration of the said period of thirty days to exercise the powers of transfer conferred on him by the other provisions of this Act.

There is a Catholic Certified Reformatory School for boys at Westthorn, Parkhead, Glasgow.

There are Catholic Certified Industrial Schools for boys at Bishopbriggs, Glasgow; Slatefield Street, Glasgow; and Tranent (Mr William Considine, S.S.C., 2 Queen Street, Edinburgh, Secretary and Treasurer); for girls at 74 Abercromby Street, Glasgow, at Dalbeth, Glasgow, and Nazareth House, Claremont Street, Aberdeen.

Duties on Legacies, Residues, Etc.

To Husband or Wife, or Children,* or their descendants or lineal ancestors	1 per cent.

* This applies only to lawful children of the deceased, illegitimate children being subject to Duty at the rate of 10 per cent.

When the original Inventory was recorded after 1st June 1881, the 44 Vict., cap. 12, sec. 41, provides that the 1 per cent. Legacy and Succession Duty payable by children and others, under the Legacy and Succession Duty Act, is not payable in respect of any personal property included in the Inventory, and on which the Stamp Duty has been paid (sec. 41). This does not apply to Legacies or Successions out of heritable property or out of foreign assets, or to heritable property; nor does it apply to the duties payable by the other relatives of the deceased or strangers in blood: the Legacy and Succession Duties payable by those persons remain the same.

Sec. 42 of the above Act charges pecuniary legacies and shares of residue below £20 in value, where the deceased died on or after 1st June 1881, with the duty imposed by the Legacy Duty Acts, subject to the relief granted by sec. 13 of the 43 Vict., cap. 14, and "as modified by this Act" (see secs. 33 and 36).

Sec. 38, sub-section 2, charges with duty "any property taken as a *donatio mortis causa* made by any person dying on or after the 1st day of June 1881, or taken under a voluntary disposition, made by any person so dying, purporting to operate as an immediate gift *inter vivos* whether by way of transfer, delivery, declaration of trust or otherwise, which shall not have been *bona fide* made three months before the death of the deceased."

Sec. 11 of 52 Vict., cap. 7, amends sub-sec. 2 of section 38 of 44 Vict., cap. 12, by substituting "twelve" months in place of "three" months before the death of the deceased, and "the description of property shall include property taken under any gift whenever made, of which property *bona fide* possession and enjoyment shall not have been assumed by the donee immediately upon the gift and thenceforward retained to the entire exclusion of the donor, or of any benefit to him by contract or otherwise."

INLAND LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.

When prepaid, not above 3 oz., 2d.; for every additional ounce, $\frac{1}{2}$ d. Inland letters must not exceed 2 feet in length, 1 foot in width, or 1 foot in depth, unless official letters sent to or from a Government Office.

LETTERS TO THE COLONIES AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

To British Colonies and possessions abroad, to Egypt, the United States of America, and the places in Morocco where there are British Post Office Agencies, the postage is 2d. for 1 oz. and 1d. for each additional oz. To Foreign Countries, with the above exceptions, $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. the first ounce, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. for each additional ounce.

PRINTED PAPER.

The prepaid rate is $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for first oz. and not exceeding 2 oz. 1d.; each additional 2 oz. $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

The following articles or documents may be sent at Printed Paper rate:—Books and other publications, commercial or business papers of a formal character, as invoices, orders for goods or work to be done, inquiries for quotations; printed notices and letters (these may have the date, time, and place of meeting or appointment filled in in writing and formulas of courtesy not exceeding five words or initials); printed Christmas, New Year,

Easter, birthday, picture, greeting, and visiting cards; manuscripts and printed proofs. "Printed Paper" should be written on the top left-hand corner of the address side of envelope or wrapper.

POST-CARDS (INLAND).

The prepaid rate of postage on every post-card is 1d., except where it fulfils the conditions mentioned under Printed Paper rate, where the charge will be $\frac{1}{2}$ d. To come under the latter rate the words "Printed Paper" must appear on the address side and post-card should be crossed out. Post-cards must be made of ordinary cardboard, not thicker than the thickest, nor thinner than the thinnest, official post-card. They must not exceed $5\frac{1}{2}$ in. by $3\frac{1}{2}$ in., nor be less than 4 in. by $2\frac{3}{4}$ in. The left-hand half of the address side may bear a written or printed communication.

POST-CARDS TO THE COLONIES AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

Post-cards for a destination outside the United Kingdom are charged at the rate of 1d. for a single post-card and 2d. for a reply post-card. They must be similar in size and substance to the official post-card, and must have the title "POST-CARD" printed or written on the address side. Post-cards for any British Possession and certain Foreign Countries may bear a written or printed communication on the left-hand half of the address side.

NEWSPAPERS (INLAND).

For every registered newspaper not exceeding 6 oz., 1d., with a further $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for every additional 6 oz. or fraction thereof. If two or more newspapers are sent in a single packet, each copy will be liable to the same postage as if it had been posted separately. The limit of weight is 2 lbs. Every packet must be open at both ends, and must have no enclosure, except its supplement or supplements. To places abroad, the postage is $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for every 2 oz.

UNPAID

inland letters, halfpenny packets, and newspapers are charged with double postage, and if *insufficiently stamped*, with double the deficiency.

REGISTRATION.

Prepaid letters, newspapers, and printed papers and commercial papers may be registered for the United Kingdom, and for almost all places abroad, for a fee of 2d.

PARCEL POST (INLAND).

The greatest length allowed is 3 feet 6 inches, the greatest length and girth combined, 6 feet. The greatest weight allowed is 11 lb. The rates are:—

POSTAL ORDERS

are issued for any value, mounting by sixpence, from 6d. to 19s. 6d. inclusive, and for 20s. and 21s., at the following rates of poundage: 6d. to 2s. 6d. (by increases of 6d.), 1d.; 3s. to 15s., 1½d.; 15s. 6d. to 21s., 2d.

Broken amounts, but not fractions of a penny, may be made up by the use of stamps not exceeding fivepence in value or three in number affixed to the face of any postal order.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

1s. and upwards received at an interest of 2½ per cent. (or 6d. for every pound) per annum.

1. NOTABLE EVENTS IN 1920.

SCOTS COLLEGE (ROME) FUND.

(1) *Letter of Our Most Holy Father, Pope Benedict XV.*

To The Most Reverend Fathers and Lords—James Augustine, Archbishop of St Andrews and Edinburgh, and the other Bishops of Scotland—On Supporting and Developing the Scots College, Rome.

VENERABLE BROTHERS, HEALTH AND APOSTOLIC BENEDECTION,

Truly excellent service, and service calling for undying remembrance, Our Predecessor, Clement VIII., must be said to have rendered to your nation, when, in this fostering city of Rome, he founded the Scots College, with the object that chosen youths of fair promise, after having been duly taught and trained there in sacred matters, returning to their native land as priests should devote themselves to the eternal salvation of their fellow countrymen. For, to those who up to now have gone forth as God's

ministers from that school, Scotland owes great benefits; first and foremost she owes it that in those unhappy bygone days, when the Catholic Faith was so much the object of public persecution, she did not absolutely and completely lose the Faith.

However, the want of means, from which at an early date in its history the College began to suffer, rendered impossible the full harvest of good results which there was ground to hope for. Clement, its Founder, had, it is true, provided it with suitable revenue, but subsequently, through various misfortunes, this revenue was gradually reduced to such a point that finally it almost entirely ceased to exist. For the rest, the support which the object and needs of the College called for could not be looked for from the Church in Scotland, which at that period was harassed with enormous difficulties.

Though in the early part of last century, as the number of the Faithful began to increase, the Church in Scotland, after that long-continued persecution, was able to take breath again, and with every day that passed was able to make some progress towards a happier situation; nevertheless, in the condition of the College here in Rome, there took place no change for the better, and the calamity of the European War came upon its financial position with deadly and crushing effect.

We, therefore, in deep anxiety over this really alarming situation, some little time ago strongly urged you, Venerable Brothers, through two of your colleagues who had come to Rome to visit the Shrines of the Apostles, to make a united appeal to Scottish Catholics to come to the help of this your national College. The result, through God's help, has surpassed Our expectations, for, by means of collections, there has been gathered by you a sum of money such as to enable the College to pay its debts, and, besides, to make it solvent for the future. In this, high praise is due on the one hand to your zeal and to your energy, Venerable Brothers, and on the other hand, to the generosity of the Faithful—especially of the ordinary people, for it is an ascertained fact that the sum in question has been made up chiefly from the contributions of the working classes.

It remains now that you direct your attention not only to supporting but to developing this so promising an Institution. For it is in every way necessary both that it correspond to the growth of the Church there in Scotland and also that it serve to promote that growth, and for those reasons its means must be increased so that it may be able to maintain a

number of students such as to be obviously adequate to the purposes in view. To effect this you will use every effort which your wisdom and your pastoral care can suggest—stimulating the good will of your flock, which is more than ready to follow your directions, and there can be no doubt that your efforts in this matter will be most fruitful. However, since the enterprise will be successful in proportion to the degree of organisation devoted to it, therefore We wish and We desire that each one of you personally every year call the attention of your clergy to the matter of helping this College, and that you arrange that, likewise every year in every Mission in Scotland, the attention of the people shall, through your priests, be called to the same matter. In these addresses to the people the speakers will explain very carefully what exactly this House of the Scots in Rome is, what its object, what advantage the Scots have already received from it, and how much it is of importance to themselves that it should without interruption flourish more and more. Knowing thoroughly as we do the attachment and devotion of the Faithful in Scotland to this Apostolic See We are certain that they will more than fully meet Our wishes by providing in every way for the equipment of their national Ecclesiastical College in Rome—an Institution which forms a striking bond of union between them and the Head of the Catholic Church.

As an earnest of the Divine favour which We invoke upon you, and in token of Our greatest good will, We bestow upon you, upon your clergy, and upon your people the Apostolic Blessing.

Given at Rome at St Peter's the 25th day of the month of July on the Feast of St James the Apostle in the year 1920, the 6th year of Our Pontificate.

(2) *Statement by the Right Rev. Mgr. Donald Mackintosh, D.D., Ph.D., Rector of the Scots College, Rome.*

There seems to have been a special blessing from God upon the effort to raise this fund. To say that the effort has been most successful is less than the sober truth. Willing hands and generous hearts through the length and breadth of Scotland have, in this matter, achieved a success which must be called truly marvellous. All, practically, up and down Scotland have responded in a wonderful way to the invitation of the Holy Father and of the Hierarchy to shoulder the

burdens of the Scots College, Rome. If the Rector of the College may say so, one of the most inspiring memories of his life is the memory of the kindness, charity, faith, and enthusiasm which it came his way to observe wherever in Scotland it was his fate to go in connection with this fund.

The problems that confront the National College in Rome are not yet all solved, but a very considerable step has been made in the direction of solving them. Better perhaps even than that step—magnificent as it is—is the consciousness which that step has quickened into fuller being—the consciousness, namely, that Catholics in Scotland can and will carry through to complete success any enterprise that bears upon their Faith and appeals to their charity.

It is hoped that before long a permanent Board of Trustees will take over the custody of the fund. Considerable sums from the fund have already been expended to meet the debts of the College and to enable it to “carry on” from day to day. More remains to be expended on the buildings of the College in Rome and at Marino, and in supplementing the money provision otherwise available. But, when all that will have been reasonably well provided for, there will remain a fair balance from the fund to form—it is hoped—in the hands of the trustees the nucleus for the college of an endowment properly so called. As soon as the necessary formalities connected with this business have been carried out, the names of the trustees will be published. In that way, and in whatever other way it may be possible to adopt, it is hoped that the existence of the college in Rome, its work and its needs will become familiar to the Catholic public at home. All who know the Catholic body in Scotland know that when the existence, the work, and the needs of an institution like the National College in Rome are brought before that body—brought to its knowledge as a matter with which each member of that body is most closely concerned—that body will never suffer the needs of the College to go unheeded, will never suffer its work to be handicapped, or its existence to be threatened.

It cannot be denied that for a considerable period in the past the existence, the work, and the needs of the College in Rome have been practically unknown to the Catholic body in Scotland. It cannot be denied that when that body came to know of those matters it was startled and amazed. As far as the College and those on whose shoulders the burden of providing for the work and the welfare of the College proximately lies are concerned, they take the present opportunity of thanking God and of thanking all at home—from

the Hierarchy to the humblest contributor to the fund, and the humblest have done the most—for the great work which under their auspices and by them has been carried out for the welfare of the interests which all of us have most at heart—the welfare of souls and the welfare of the Church in Scotland.

FOURTH NATIONAL PILGRIMAGE TO LOURDES.

One of the outstanding events of the year was the pilgrimage to Lourdes which took place in the month of July. As this is the fourth occasion on which the devotion of the faithful of Scotland has manifested itself in similar fashion, it may be of interest to recall to mind previous visits to the famous shrine. In September 1899 the first of the National Pilgrimages was organised in answer to a great and long-felt desire. The pilgrims numbered 130, and amongst them were the late Archbishop Macdonald of St Andrews and Edinburgh, the present Archbishop then Bishop of Dunkeld, and the late Bishop Chisholm of Aberdeen, and thirty of the clergy of Scotland. A magnificent banner bearing the figure of St Andrew with the Royal Arms of Scotland was presented to the Basilica, and was placed among the standards of the world as a tribute from the nation to the Mother of God. The pilgrimage was under the conduct of a committee of priests from the various dioceses of the country, with the Very Rev. Canon Stuart of Edinburgh. as Organising Secretary. In 1908 a large and representative committee was selected by the Archbishops and Bishops, with a view to encouraging the scheme of national pilgrimages and of placing the enterprise on a sound foundation. The Committee chose as Secretary the Very Rev. Canon Lavelle of Perth, now of St Mary's, Dundee. In a short time arrangements were

completed, and in August 250 pilgrims, among whom were some sixty priests, set out for Lourdes to celebrate the Golden Jubilee of the Shrine of Our Lady. Fifty years had passed since the apparitions of the Mother of God to Bernadette Soubirous on the rock of Massabielle. A magnificent banner of St Margaret, bearing on the reverse the Lion Rampant of Scotland, designed by Mr R. Ogilvy Fairlie of Myers Castle, was taken to Lourdes, and has since been used as the national emblem on all similar occasions. A deep and lasting impression was made on the hearts of the pilgrims, and the story they had to tell on their return made the facts of Lourdes better known throughout the country, and engendered in others a desire to visit the scene of such wondrous and soul-stirring events.

In 1912 a third National Pilgrimage met with even greater success. The pilgrims numbered 850, including a larger number of priests and many distinguished members of the Catholic community in Scotland. The same Prelates as in 1908 accompanied the pilgrimage. In 1914 over 100 pilgrims accompanied by Bishop Chisholm of Aberdeen, Canon Lavelle, Secretary of the Committee, and the late Rev. E. P. Rogan, D.D., journeyed to Rome. Eight days were spent in visiting the shrines and sacred antiquities of Rome, and an audience was granted by His Holiness Pope Pius X. Shortly after the return of the pilgrims the great war broke out, and all idea of pilgrimages had to be abandoned until better days should dawn. On the cessation of the war and the signing of the armistice the Pilgrimage Committee met and the arrangements were made for the Fourth National Pilgrimage to Lourdes. The undertaking met with a degree of success far beyond the expectations of even the most sanguine of the Committee. The increased difficulties of travel, the higher cost of rates and commodities could not deter the people of Scotland from manifesting to the world their ardent love for the Mother of God. In a very brief time the Secretary's books contained the names of 1218 persons who desired to take part in the projected pilgrimage. Among the pilgrims were the Right Rev. James W. M'Carthy, Bishop of Galloway, the Right Rev. Henry G. Graham, Bishop-Auxiliary of Edinburgh, over fifty priests, the Duchess of Norfolk, the Hon. Mrs Maxwell with her two daughters, the Misses Kerr, daughters of the late General Lord Kerr, and Lady Ann Kerr, and many other well-known Catholics. The difficulties of the journey were overcome by the enthusiasm and piety of the pilgrims, and four happy and fruitful days were spent at Lourdes. Many spiritual and temporal blessings were

received, and great edification was given to other pilgrims by the sterling piety of the Scottish visitors. The manner in which they took part in the Processions of the Blessed Sacrament and in the various devotions, their visits to the Grotto and the Piscina, their devout performance of the Way of the Cross attracted the attention of observers, and flattering testimony was given in many quarters to their edifying demeanour. The Committee look forward with every assurance of even greater success, and are prepared to organise pilgrimages to Rome, the Holy Land, Lourdes, or any other sacred place which the Catholics of Scotland may express a desire to visit. OPENING OF ST MARGARET'S TRAINING COLLEGE, CRAIGLOCKHART, EDINBURGH.

A new Training College for Catholic Teachers in Scotland was formally opened at Craiglockhart, Edinburgh, on the 20th October 1920. The building, formerly occupied as a Hydropathic and erected forty years ago at a cost of £70,000, is situated in a commanding position to the south-west of Craiglockhart Hill and is admirably suited to the purpose of a residential College. It will furnish accommodation for 200 students, and will thus relieve the congestion in the Training College at Dowanhill, Glasgow—the only other institution of a similar kind in Scotland. The property has been acquired by the Sisters of the Sacred Heart—a Community whose services in the cause of Catholic education are well known and widely appreciated.

The ceremony began with the Blessing of the new College by His Eminence Cardinal Bourne, Archbishop of Westminster. Solemn Mass was then celebrated by the Right Rev. Henry G. Graham, Bishop-Auxiliary of Edinburgh, in the presence of the Cardinal. In the afternoon a meeting was held in the College Hall, at which the Right Rev. John Toner, Bishop of Dunkeld and Administrator of the Archdiocese of Glasgow, presided. The platform party included in addition to the speakers, Fr. Bernard Vaughan and Sir Hugh Arthur Rose, and there was a very large and representative attendance of educationists and the general public. Cardinal Bourne wished the College Godspeed, and testified from personal knowledge to the eminent educational services of the Sisters of the Sacred Heart. He should like the inhabitants of

Scotland to realise that they now had working in their midst far and away the most important religious institution of women in the Catholic Church. Catholic parents looked to the Catholic Church to maintain the interests of Catholic education. There should be such oversight and such Catholic control of the school as would ensure true and proper Catholic teaching and a truly Catholic atmosphere. Hence the need of Catholic Training Colleges to supply the requisite number of Catholic teachers. For some time this had been a matter of anxiety to the Bishops, but it was now not only adequately but magnificently met.

Professor Darroch, who spoke on behalf of the National Committee for the Training of Teachers, said he was pleased to join with them in their rejoicings. He knew nothing of the work of the Sisters of the Sacred Heart, but he did know something of the work of the Glasgow College, and he knew there was no better education given anywhere in Scotland, and he was quite sure that if this college equalled what was done at Notre Dame they would do well. Within the last few weeks they had been in negotiation with the managers of the Catholic Education Council for Scotland, and an agreement had been come to according to which that college would receive the financial support of the National Committee. They wished the college to be independent and maintain the Catholic atmosphere, and the committee would keep simply to the point of view of seeing that the secular education was efficient.

Sir Henry Keith, on behalf of the Education Authorities of Scotland, congratulated the Sisters upon the arrangements which had been made for the training of teachers in the schools which were now controlled by the Education Authorities of Scotland. There was great need, he said, for teachers in all their schemes, and most of all in the transferred schools. Teaching provided an occupation now fairly well paid from the women's standpoint and it was a noble vocation in itself.

Mr John Craigen, Aberdeen, also spoke, and the proceedings concluded with votes of thanks moved by the Very Rev. Canon Stuart, St Mary's Cathedral, Edinburgh.

CATHOLIC TRUTH SOCIETY OF SCOTLAND.

During the period of the war the Catholic Truth Society had to suspend much of its usual work and to limit its efforts to the diffusion of Catholic pamphlets. The Council thought the time opportune to resume its former activities,

and a beginning was made with a Reception and Demonstration held in Edinburgh on the 27th and 28th September 1920. The functions consisted of a grand reception, a Pontifical Mass, two conferences, and a great demonstration. The reception was given by Archbishop Smith in the Kintore Rooms, Queen Street. His Grace was attended by his auxiliary, Bishop Graham, Bishop Bennett of Aberdeen, the Lord Abbot of Fort Augustus, Canons of the Edinburgh Archdiocese, many Scottish priests, and a representative gathering of laity. The service at St Mary's Cathedral on Tuesday consisted of Pontifical High Mass sung by Bishop Graham.

At noon, in the Cathedral Hall, Professor S. N. Miller, of the Glasgow University, read a paper on "Scottish Nationality and the Catholic Church." Bishop Bennett occupied the chair. In the afternoon, in the Lauriston Hall, Dr Terry, choirmaster and organist of Westminster Cathedral, gave an address on "Church Music Problems." Bishop Martin of Argyll and the Isles presided.

The great meeting in the Usher Hall, over which Bishop M'Carthy of Galloway presided, was addressed by the Right Rev. James Macdonald, O.S.B., the Abbot of Fort Augustus. His subject was "Union." During the course of a telling address he suggested the extension of the activities of the Society along a number of practical lines and greater co-ordination in Catholic effort. It seemed to him that if under the guidance of the Pope they were united to spread the Catholic Faith they could present an unbroken front to the enemy and sweep away all obstacles, and perhaps they might live to see the day when this country would once more return to the true fold of Christ.

The Council of the Society trust that their endeavours to revivify the Society will meet with general approval, and that the great success of the 1920 Annual Demonstration may be a happy augury for the future.

2. ORDINATIONS

The Rev. JAMES BLACK was born in Glasgow on the 25th June 1894. He received his secondary education at St Aloysius' College, Glasgow, whence he passed to Glasgow University in 1912. In October 1913 he entered St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, Glasgow. His studies were interrupted by a period of military service with the Royal Munster Fusiliers in 1917-18. Having been wounded and discharged from the Army he returned to St Peter's College in January 1919. He received the tonsure on the 2nd May, minor orders on the 3rd and 4th May, and the subdiaconate on the 1st November 1919. He was ordained deacon on the 1st May and priest on the 27th June 1920, in St Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow. All the orders were conferred on him by the Right Rev. James W. McCarthy, Bishop of Galloway. He is stationed at St Patrick's, Coatbridge.

The Rev. JOSEPH F. CASSIDY was born at Lochee on the 20th December 1894. He entered Blairs College, Aberdeen, on the 11th August 1910, and was transferred to the College

of Propaganda, Rome, on the 3rd November 1914. He received the tonsure from Cardinal Pompili in the South American College Chapel on the 28th October 1917, the first two minor orders from Mgr. Palica in the Basilica of St John Lateran on the 16th April 1918, the other minor orders in the Church of Sant' Andrea delle Valla on the 28th April 1918, and the subdiaconate in the Chapel of the Lateran College on the 13th July 1919, from Cardinal Pompili. He was ordained deacon by Mgr. Palica on the 20th December 1919, and priest by Cardinal Pompili on the 3rd April 1920, in the Basilica of St John Lateran. He is stationed at St John's, Perth.

The Rev. PATRICK DONAGHER was born at Middletown, Lough Duff, Co. Cavan, on the 9th April 1892. He entered St Mel's College, Longford, in 1910, and was thence transferred to St John's College, Waterford, where he was ordained priest on the 20th June 1920 by the Right Rev. Bernard Hackett, C.S.S.R., Bishop of Waterford and Lismore. He is stationed at St Joseph's, Dundee.

The Rev. CHARLES GALLAGHER was born in Glasgow on the 30th April 1891. He entered Blairs College, Aberdeen, in August 1908, and was transferred to the Scots College, Rome, in 1913. He received the tonsure on the 23rd December 1916, minor orders on the 4th February and 3rd March 1917, the subdiaconate on the 28th April 1918, the diaconate on the 5th April 1919, and the priesthood on the 18th May 1919. All the orders were conferred on him by Cardinal Pompili. He is stationed at St Luke's, Glasgow.

The Rev. ALEXANDER S. KERR was born at Fife-Keith, Banffshire, on the 31st May 1893. He entered Blairs College, Aberdeen, on the 29th August 1907, and was transferred to the Scots College, Rome, on the 10th October 1913. He received from Cardinal Pompili the tonsure on the 23rd December 1916, the first two minor orders on the 4th February, and the other minor orders on the 3rd March 1917. He received the subdiaconate from Mgr. Palica on the 16th March 1918, and was ordained deacon on the 28th April 1918, and priest on the 28th February 1920 by Cardinal Pompili in the Basilica of St John Lateran. He is stationed at the Cathedral, Aberdeen.

The Rev. HUGH MIMNAGH was born at Johnstone on the 12th September 1892. He was educated at St Mungo's Academy, Glasgow, St Columb's College, Derry, and St Peter's

College, Wexford. He was ordained deacon on the 13th June and priest on the 20th June 1920 by the Right Rev. William Codd, Bishop of Ferns, in St Peter's College Church, Wexford.

The Rev. PHILIP MURPHY was born at East Calder on the 6th September 1895. He entered Blairs College, Aberdeen, on the 11th August 1890, and was transferred to the College of Propaganda, Rome, in November 1914. He received the tonsure in the South American College on the 15th December 1917 from Cardinal Pompili, the first two minor orders on the 31st March 1918 in Basilica of St John Lateran, and the other minor orders three weeks later. He received the subdiaconate from Cardinal Pompili in the Lateran College on the 13th July 1919, and was ordained deacon on the 20th December 1919 by Mgr. Palica, and priest on the 3rd April 1920 by Cardinal Pompili in the Basilica of St John Lateran. He is stationed at St Peter's, Edinburgh.

The Rev. BERNARD O'HANLON was born at Niddry, Linlithgowshire, on the 2nd July 1893. He entered Blairs College, Aberdeen, in August 1907, and was transferred to the Scots College, Rome, on the 24th October 1913. The particulars of his ordination are the same as in the notice of the Rev. Alexander S Kerr. He is stationed at St Patrick's, Edinburgh.

The Rev. JOHN W. O'SULLIVAN was born at Dingle, Co. Kerry, on the 2nd June 1896. Having spent three years in St Brendan's Seminary, Killarney, he entered the Ecclesiastical Foreign Missionary College of St Patrick, Thurles, on the 1st September 1913, where he completed his studies for the priesthood. He received the tonsure on the 12th June, minor orders on the 5th and 6th September 1919, the subdiaconate on the 5th April, and the diaconate on the 6th April 1920. He was ordained priest in the Cathedral, Thurles, on the 20th June 1920 by the Most Rev. John Harty, Archbishop of Cashel and Emly. He is stationed at St John's, Cumnock.

The Rev. ALPHONSUS P. POWER was born at Lisnagry, Co. Limerick, on the 23rd August 1895. After a course of classics in Crescent College, Limerick, he entered St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, Glasgow, in September 1914. In January 1916 he was transferred to St Peter's College, Wexford, where he completed his studies for the priesthood. He received the subdiaconate from the Right Rev. Patrick Morrisroe, Bishop of Achonry, on the 28th April 1918, and

was ordained deacon on the 13th June, and priest on the 20th June 1920, by the Right Rev. William Codd, Bishop of Ferns. He is stationed at St Mary's, Dundee.

The Rev. WILLIAM F. QUIGLEY was born at Leith on the 16th October 1894. He entered Blairs College, Aberdeen, on the 12th August 1909, and was transferred to the College of Propaganda, Rome, in 1914. He received the tonsure from Cardinal Pompili in the South American College Chapel on the 28th October 1917, the first two minor orders from Mgr. Palica in the Basilica of St John Lateran on the 16th April 1918, the other minor orders in the Church of Sant' Andrea delle Valle on the 28th April 1918, and the subdiaconate in the Chapel of the Lateran College on the 13th July 1919 from Cardinal Pompili. He was ordained deacon on the 1st November 1919, and priest on the 17th March 1920 by Cardinal Van Rossum. He is stationed at St Mary's, Stirling.

3. OBITUARY.

Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord. From henceforth now, saith the spirit, that they may rest from their labours; for their works follow them.—APOC. xiv. 13.

It is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from their sins.—2 MACHAB. xii. 46.

Of your charity, pray for the soul of the Rev. THOMAS HOPWELL, who died at Kilbirnie on the 8th December 1919, in the 61st year of his age and the 31st of his priesthood.

The Rev. Thomas Hopwell was born at Leicester on 26th February 1859; studied classics at the Grammar School there; at St Marie's College, Rugby, which he entered in 1877, and at Ratcliffe College, near Leicester. Thence he went to the Collegio Mellerio di Duoma d'Ossola, in Piedmont, where he studied philosophy and began the theological course. After remaining there for about three years, he had to return home early in 1884 for special medical treatment, in consequence of a serious accident. He entered St Peter's College, Partickhill, on 16th August 1887, and there completed the course of theology. He received from Archbishop Eyre the tonsure on 11th May 1889, and minor orders on the following day in the College Chapel, and was there ordained by him subdeacon on 30th May, deacon on 15th June, and priest on 23rd June in St Andrew's Cathedral. After his ordination he was stationed at St John's, Glasgow. In 1891 he was transferred to Hamilton and in 1892 to Langloan, Coatbridge. In 1894 he was given charge of the parish of St Bridget's, Kilbirnie.

where his devoted services during twenty-five years of his priestly career won for him the esteem not only of his parishioners but of all classes of the community. In March 1919 he was made the recipient of a valuable presentation to mark the occurrence of the silver jubilee of his pastorate, and to confirm the regard in which he was held. He was a man of many talents and conspicuous ability, an eloquent preacher and a musician of note. It was, however, in educational matters that he took the keenest interest; he was regarded as a leader and an expert in educational affairs, and his services as a member of the School Board, County Committee, and Education Authority were highly appreciated. Father Hopwell had been in failing health for some time past, but a temporary recovery had given reason to hope that all danger was past. His death occurring so suddenly and unexpectedly came as a shock to his friends. He expired on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. The funeral took place on the following Friday. Requiem Mass was celebrated in St Bridget's Church by the Rev. Father Lynch, assisted by the Rev. Father Brown as deacon, and the Rev. Father Diamond as subdeacon, the Rev. Father M'Sparran being master of ceremonies. The music of the Mass was rendered by a choir of priests under the direction of the Rev. Father Gallacher. Rev. Father Clarke presided at the organ. The panegyric was preached by the Rev. Father M'Menemy, Lambhill, who recounted the excellent work performed by Father Hopwell for religion and education. The Absolutions were given by the Right Rev. Mgr. Ritchie, V.G., in the unavoidable absence, through illness, of His Grace Archbishop Maguire. At the close of the service the funeral cortege proceeded to Dalbeth Cemetery, where the interment took place.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. JOHN LINSTER; who died at St Anne's, Musselburgh, on the 18th December 1919, in the 70th year of his age and the 43rd of his priesthood.

The Rev. John Linster was born at Fischen in the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg on the 4th October 1850. He studied classics at the College of Arlon, and philosophy at the Seminary of Bastogne in Belgium. At the opening of St Peter's Seminary, Partickhill, in October 1874, he joined the theological class as a student of the Western District. On the completion of his studies he was ordained priest by the Most Rev. Archbishop Eyre in the Seminary Chapel on the 17th March 1877, and was appointed assistant priest at St Patrick's, Glasgow. In 1879 he was transferred to St Mary's, and two years later he was given charge of Longriggend—a station hitherto attached to Airdrie, and erected into a separate mission on the 2nd September 1881. Here he spent the next twelve years of his life in the zealous discharge of the manifold duties of a missionary priest. In 1901 he was promoted to the charge of Dumbarton where his labours met with continued success. In 1901 he was compelled by ill-health to

relinquish the charge of Dumbarton. He soon recovered sufficiently to be able to return to active work, and was appointed chaplain to the Convent at Dalbeth. He continued at this post until a short time before his death, when he retired to St Anne's Convent, Musselburgh. He died on the 18th December 1919, fortified by the last Sacraments and Rites of the Church. The obsequies took place on the following Saturday. His remains are interred in the Catholic cemetery at Liberton, Edinburgh.

Pray for the soul of the Very Rev. CHARLES CANON DEVINE, who died at Aberdeen on the 23rd December 1919, in the 86th year of his age and the 60th of his priesthood.

The Very Rev. Charles Canon Devine was born at Muchals, Kincardineshire, on the 2nd July 1834. He entered Blairs College as a student of the Northern District on the 17th August 1847, and was sent on the 25th August 1853 to the College of Propaganda, Rome. On the completion of the usual course of studies in preparation for the priesthood, he was ordained priest on the 9th April 1860. He arrived in Scotland on the 4th June following, and after officiating for some months at Tombae and elsewhere, was appointed in November of the same year to the charge of Peterhead. The outline of his life and an appreciation of his character are given in the panegyric preacher on the occasion of his funeral by the Right Rev. Mgr. Canon M'Gregor, Rector of Blairs College:—

“That grand old man of many memories, Rev. Charles Gordon, singled out Charles Devine as one of the most promising boys in his large flock, and sent him to Blairs College when he was thirteen years of age. After an eminently satisfactory course there, he was sent to Rome—to the great international College of Propaganda. Those who knew the Canon, with his quiet way of listening to the opinions and sayings of others, knew him to be one of the shrewdest observers, and one on whose opinion on endless matters was well worth getting; but they did not know, and would never learn from him, the distinctions he carried away during his student career. I have seen several of the prize lists of his day, and some of the most coveted medals were won by Charles Devine. When he returned a priest to Scotland in 1860 he was, after helping in several missions, appointed by Bishop Kyle to Peterhead. His pastorate there was the index of his whole career. The quiet, zealous, methodical priest, loved by his people and respected by the whole community, faithfully looked after a widely scattered flock. The successive missions to which he was sent by his Bishop each speak with gratitude of his work in their midst—Inverurie, Portsoy, Wick, Retternear, and lastly Woodside, where he has been for the last twenty-two years. Canon Devine's life was in many respects a full life. It was the life of a good priest of God. He had no desire to take a lead in the secular affairs of the community in which he was placed.

His thought was his Catholic people, their welfare, their increase, their instruction in their holy religion, yet he indeed took a keen interest in the affairs of his fellow-man, and was ever ready to advise and help those outside the fold. No one was more revered and respected by all classes than Father Devine. His long, earnest, and devoted life was a source of edification to all, and all respected and revered the good Canon. To the last he was as keen as ever about his work. The end came swiftly. Blessed is that servant whom, when He cometh, the Lord shall find watching. He was watching and working with all the strength and powers God gave him up to the end. He died as he had lived, died as he wished to die, working unselfishly for God."

The funeral took place the following Friday from St Joseph's Chapel, Tanfield Walk, Woodside, Aberdeen, to St Peter's Cemetery. The Bishop officiated at the High Mass of Requiem, Mgr. Meany, V.G., being the assistant prelate; Fathers Ferguson and Marr, Cathedral, deacons; Father M. Laughlin, St Peter's, and Father Mackenzie, Cathedral, masters of ceremonies. A choir of priests sung the music of the Mass. The Absolutions were pronounced by the Bishop of Aberdeen, and the prayers at the graveside were said by the Right Rev. Mgr. Canon Meany, V.G.

Pray for the soul of the Very Rev. JOHN BERNARD MACLUSKEY, who died at London on the 29th January 1920, in the 69th year of his age and the 44th of his priesthood.

The Very Rev. John Bernard Macluskey was born at Glasgow on the 13th August 1851. He received his early education in St Aloysius' College, Glasgow, and entered Blairs College, Aberdeen, in July 1865. He was transferred to the Seminary at Issy in France in 1871 and passed to St Sulpice, Paris, in 1873. Having completed the usual course of studies, he was ordained priest on the 29th June 1876 in the Cathedral at Meaux by Mgr. Richard, then Coadjutor to the Archbishop of Paris. On his return to Scotland he was appointed assistant at the Church of Our Lady and St Margaret, Kinning Park, Glasgow, whence in 1879 he was removed to St Andrew's Cathedral. In 1882 he was given charge of St John's, Glasgow, in succession to the late Rev. Valentine Chisholm, where he remained until 1915 when he was forced by ill-health to retire from active pastoral work. Under his wise and energetic administration, St John's parish prospered and developed. New schools were built, and the old schools in Warwick Street were remodelled and brought up to the modern standard of requirements. A magnificent new church to the design of Messrs Pugin & Pugin of London was erected on the site of the old church—once a Quaker meeting-house—and solemnly opened on the 21st November 1897. The excellent qualities of Canon Macluskey were recognised by his ecclesiastical superiors, and he was appointed a Canon of the Cathedral Chapter

in 1900 in recognition of his eminent services to the cause of religion in the city of Glasgow. In 1910 he was elected to the Glasgow School Board, and gained the esteem of the members of that body by his educational abilities, and his diligent attention to the interests of the Catholic body and of the general community. He was also secretary of the Whitevale Refuge Scheme, a director of the Catholic Industrial Schools, a member of the Central Executive of the League of the Cross, a founder of the Seamen's Institute, and Chairman of the Prison Aid Society and of the Catholic Truth Society of Scotland. The mere enumeration of these offices bespeaks the active and industrious character of his life. He was a man of many abilities, but kindness of heart was perhaps his most outstanding feature. He endeared himself to all with whom he had to deal, and he won the love of his parishioners and the respect of all classes of the citizens of Glasgow. In 1902 on the occurrence of his silver jubilee he received the congratulations of his people at a great public function at which the late Archbishop presided, and the then Lord Provost was one of the speakers. Again in 1908, on his attaining the 25th year of his pastorate of St John's, he was made the recipient at a similar public demonstration of many tokens of esteem and affection. In 1915 his health, never too robust and impaired by long years of strenuous work gave way under the strain, and he was reluctantly compelled to retire and seek the rest to which his fruitful labours entitled him. For two years previous to his death he lived at Twyford Abbey, near London, where he was nursed with untiring devotion by the Alexian Brothers. He died on the 20th January 1920. The funeral took place on the following Tuesday. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Wm. Macluskey, nephew of the deceased, the Rev. Fathers Ryan and White being deacons, and the Rev. Father Hilgers, master of ceremonies. The interment took place at Kensal Green, where the prayers at the graveside were said by the Rev. Father Ryan.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. JOHN O'NEILL, who died at Dundee on the 25th February 1920, in the 61st year of his age and the 36th of his priesthood.

The Rev. John O'Neill was born at Blairgowrie on the 9th April 1859. He entered Blairs College on the 29th July 1872 and was transferred to the Benedictine College at Douai in France in September 1877. In October 1878 he began his philosophical studies at the Sulpitian Seminary at Issy, and the following year was sent to the Scots College, Rome. There in due course he received the tonsure and minor and major orders. He was ordained priest on the 22nd May 1884 by Mgr. Lenti in the Church of the German College, Rome. An outline of his subsequent career and a fine appreciation of his character are given in the panegyric preached by the Rev. John Doherty, Lawside, Dundee, on the occasion of his funeral:—

“ Father O'Neill on returning to Scotland after his ordination, held a curacy first in St Mary's, Forebank, Dundee, and afterwards in St Joseph's, Wilkie's Lane. After six years of city parish work he was promoted to the charge of the church in Alloa. Here he passed the next twenty-three years of his life. The youthful incumbent of Alloa did not, in any sense, live apart and in isolation from the townfolk of Alloa. His buoyant nature and his keen spirit of sportsmanship led him beyond the invisible boundaries of parochial retirement, and thus he gained the affectionate esteem of a wide circle of friends not confined to his co-religionists. He proved effectively to his non-Catholic brethren that a Catholic priest, how zealous soever he may be for the spread and exaltation of his Church, may still be endowed with all the gifts of a lovable and attractive personality. For six years Father O'Neill had laboured in St Mary's, Lochee. He began his work here with a determination to do his best. What he has been to all in past years he has ever been to you, the very embodiment of kindness. This was the dominant note in his character. It ruled supreme over his emotions; it radiated from him and around him. Indeed, his kindness of heart—natural gift as it was—seems to me to have presented a feature of that grace which theologians call, for want of a better name, grace gratuitously given, which is a grace that enables the recipient to be or do something which helps another to draw nearer to God. As an illustration I would instance the confessional, whither penitents betook themselves to him for peace and for encouragement, which he seemed to have a special gift to impart. At the bedside of the sick and infirm his presence was like sunshine banishing gloom. In the death-chamber he had a genius—a grave for uttering unpremeditated words to the disconsolate, surviving relatives, that acted as a soothing balsam on their wounded hearts. In his visits to homes where not all their inmates were saints he could bring back the erring to a sense of their duty much more easily by his smile than by a frown. Throughout his life Father O'Neill enjoyed a reputation among his clerical brethren in Scotland for athletic accomplishments and for physical strength. Many of them, for this reason, will feel a shock of surprise on learning of his death. Even we who have been in familiar proximity to him, even we could never have dreamt three months ago that this morning we should be celebrating his funeral obsequies. Indeed, so conscious was he himself of his physical powers that there was in him a strong clinging to life up to the very moment when he was to undergo the operation which was to prove fatal. But although he did entertain the hope of recovery, he prepared, nevertheless, to go into the house of his eternity, and was wholly resigned to the dispositions of the Divine Will. After that last operation the lamented patient never regained consciousness, so that, practically already dead to the world, fortified with all the blessings and helps of religion, and amid the intercessory prayers and recom-

mending supplications of two of his brethren at his bedside, he died the death which we might all innocently envy."

The funeral took place on the following Saturday. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated in St Mary's, Lochee, by the Very Rev. Canon Lavelle, with Father Sweeney as deacon, and Father Brough as subdeacon. Bishop Toner presided at the throne, attended by the Very Rev. Provost Butti and the Right Rev. Mgr. Canon Turner, V.G. The Absolutions were pronounced by the Right Rev. Bishop Toner. The interment took place at Balgay Cemetery, and all along the route crowds of sympathisers were lined up on each side, giving a remarkable testimony to the popularity of the deceased priest. Bishop Toner conducted the service at the graveside.

Pray for the soul of the Very Rev. THOMAS CANON WELSH, who died at Perth on the 12th March 1920, in the 50th year of his age and the 27th of his priesthood.

The Very Rev. Thomas Canon Welsh was born at Collace, in Perthshire, on the 20th March 1870. His infancy and early youth were, however, spent in the city of Perth, where he attended St John's Catholic School. At the age of thirteen, feeling an attraction for the ecclesiastical state, he entered Blairs College, Aberdeen, in July 1883, and four years later was transferred to the Scots College, Valladolid. During his college career he gave proof of marked ability and won many distinctions; he was fond of study, and found in the life of the seminary an atmosphere congenial to his natural bent. The climate of Valladolid, however, did not suit his constitution, and in May 1892 it was deemed necessary for him to quit the land of Spain to which he had become so attached. He returned to Scotland and was sent to Blairs to complete his studies. On the 16th July of the following year he was ordained priest in St John's, Perth, by the Right Rev. James A. Smith, then Bishop of Dunkeld, and afterwards Metropolitan Archbishop of St Andrews and Edinburgh. His subsequent career is outlined in the panegyric preached on the occasion of his funeral by the Right Rev. Mgr. Canon Turner of St Andrews, Dundee:—

"The first thirteen years of Canon Welsh's priestly career were spent in Blairs. We priests on the mission perhaps grudged those long years of absence from the Diocese, as the fields were ripe for the harvest and the reapers so few, but reminded by the words of the prophet Daniel, xii. 3, "They that are learned shall shine as the brightness of the firmament, and they that instruct many to justice as stars for all eternity," we felt consoled with the knowledge that the young professor was engaged in the all-important work of training the mind and forming the character of the future missionaries of Scotland. Thirteen years of professorial work were years of great merit, as well as years of great responsibility, when almost every word and glance might have their lifelong influence on the impressionable minds of those with whom

as professor he was in daily contact. Generations of priests who received their early training at his hands will love to recall the many traits of their gifted professor, his devotional appearance at the altar, his presence in the class-room, his geniality and boyish spirit on the recreation field. Canon Welsh, however, always felt a keen desire for mission work. His wish was at length gratified in 1905. His first charge was Ballechin, which meant ministering to the Catholic remnant, through straths and glens from Dunkeld to Glenlyon and the Moor of Rannoch. In this vast mission field the young priest met gentle and simple with affability and dignity, and to this day his memory is treasured in many a home in Strathtay district. From 1909 to 1914 Father Welsh had charge of the rising mission of Our Lady of Good Counsel, Broughty Ferry, and St Bride's, Monifieth. In 1911 he was promoted to a stall in the Dunkeld Chapter, and was cordially welcomed by Bishop MacFarlane, Provost Holder, and the Canons. Being near the great centre of mission activity of Dunkeld Diocese, Dundee city, his services in the shape of special lectures, addresses, and Retreats were sought after and greatly appreciated. On 24th June 1913 he was chosen to give the address of welcome to Bishop Fraser on the occasion of his enthronement in St Andrew's Pro-Cathedral, Dundee. In 1914 the Canon came to Perth to take charge as rector. Perth Mission, always one of importance, became doubly so during war time as hospital centre, barrack depot, and station for Belgian refugees. In all this work the Canon took a leading part, and but for his innate modesty and reserve the part he played might well have brought him public recognition. In every branch of mission work he was dignified and efficient; in his sermons and instructions, in reclaiming the erring, in counselling the sick, and preparing the dying—a true priest of God. The little ones loved to see him in school and playground, Sodalities and Confraternities treasured his words, and congregational gatherings were brightened and adorned by his presence. In all I have said or might say, I feel I would be merely outlining one of the most lovable personalities I have ever known, for, like the diamond, he sparkled from many angles, and whatever he touched he adorned. I might have referred to his keen wit and playful humour, his linguistic attainments, his deep liturgical knowledge, editing the *Catholic Directory* for over twenty years, his skill in preparing conference papers, documents for Roman congregations—in all trusted by bishops, beloved by his brother clerics, and cherished and esteemed by his own flock and citizens generally. During the last few years it was evident to us all that his strength was ebbing fast. His Bishop pleaded with him to spare himself, his clerical assistants relieved him as far as lay in their power, foreign climates were proposed, all to no avail, as he clung tenaciously to his native city, fearing probably a breakdown far from home, his books, and his many friends. The end came more rapidly than might have been expected: great weakness set in some ten days ago, his frame, never robust,

was worn out, although his eye never dimmed, nor mind faltered. On Wednesday last he received the Last Sacraments, with sentiments of tender piety, and after midday on Friday, in the twelfth month of his 49th year he entered into his eternal rest."

The funeral took place on the following Tuesday. Solemn Pontifical Requiem Mass was celebrated in St John's, Perth, by the Right Rev. John Toner, Bishop of Dunkeld. In addition to the clergy of the Diocese, a large number of priests from all parts of the country were present. Among the laity were many mourners from Dundee, Broughty Ferry, Monifieth, and Ballechin. The remains were interred in Wellshill Cemetery, Perth.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. MAXWELL OGILVIE, who died at Dundee on the 19th April 1920, in the 29th year of his age, and the 3rd of his priesthood.

The Rev. Maxwell Ogilvie was born at Broughty Ferry on the 2nd September 1891. He entered Repton School, Derbyshire, in 1904, and five years later went to pursue a course of higher studies at Balliol College, Oxford. During his stay at the University he became acquainted with a Catholic student of French origin, and on one occasion accepted an invitation to accompany him to the local Catholic Church. Being struck with what he there witnessed—the impressive ritual and the evident devotion of the congregation—he made up his mind to learn the meaning of what he had seen. The result was that he became convinced of the truth of the claims made by the Church, and having received the necessary instructions in the tenets of the faith was received into the Church by Mgr. Charles Kennard on the 26th May 1911. At an earlier period he had felt an inclination to enter the ministry of the religious body to which he then belonged; this inclination now revived and he resolved to enter into the ecclesiastical state. He therefore applied to the Bishop of his native place, and was accepted as a student of the Diocese of Dunkeld and sent to the Scots College, Rome. There in due course he received the tonsure and minor and major orders, and was ordained priest on the 30th March by Cardinal Pompili in the Basilica of St John Lateran, Rome. On his return to Scotland in 1919 he was appointed assistant at St Joseph's, Dundee. There he soon won the esteem of all who knew him, and the affection of the people by his piety, zeal, and constant attention to duty. He performed the multifarious duties of an assistant priest to the entire satisfaction of his ecclesiastical superiors and showed a remarkable capacity for dealing with boys, perhaps the most difficult branch of missionary work in a large industrial centre such as Dundee. He was thus entering on a career of great brilliance, which gave promise of great achievements in years to come, when he was struck down with influenza. Pneumonia supervened, and despite every means that human skill and ingenuity could devise, he died on the 19th April 1920, fortified

by the last Rites of the Church. The funeral took place on the following Thursday. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated in St Joseph's Church by the Very Rev. Canon M'Donald, the Rev. Fathers Russell and J. Fahy being deacons, the very Rev. Canon Lavelle, master of ceremonies. The church was filled with a sorrowing congregation, and amongst the mourners were priests from all parts of the country and representatives of the various religious communities in the Diocese. A panegyric was preached by the Rev. A. M'Kinley. The Absolutions were pronounced by the Right Rev. Bishop Toner. The interment took place at Balgay Cemetery, where the prayers were read at the graveside by the Very Rev. Canon M'Donald.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. BERNARD JOSEPH DAWSON, who died at Aix-la-Chapelle on the 7th May 1920, in the 65th year of his age and the 37th of his priesthood.

The Rev. Bernard Joseph Dawson was born at Tullow, Co. Carlow, on the 10th November 1855. He studied classics at St Patrick's, Tullow, and at Blairs College, Aberdeen, which he entered in July 1877. He completed the course of studies in preparation for the priesthood at St Peter's College, Glasgow, and was there ordained by Archbishop Eyre on the 22nd December 1883. From 1883 to 1889 he acted as assistant priest at St Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow, and in 1890-91 was in charge of the mission of Kilbirnie in Ayrshire. In 1891 he withdrew from active missionary work and subsequently went to live on the Continent. The last years of his life were spent in the Home of the Alexian Brothers at Aix-la-Chapelle, where his death occurred on the 7th May 1920.†

Pray for the soul of the Rev. JOHN ROGER, who died at Rowantrees, Huntly, on the 23rd June 1920, in the 43rd year of his age and the 18th of his priesthood.

The Rev. John Roger was born at Huntly on the 14th January 1878. He received his early education at the Catholic school of his native place, and in August 1892 entered Blairs College, Aberdeen, to pursue his studies for the priesthood. After four years in Blairs he was transferred to St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, whence he passed in 1898 to the Scots College, Rome, for the study of philosophy and theology. There he received the tonsure, minor and major orders, and was ordained priest by Cardinal Respighi on the 11th April 1903. On his return to Scotland he was appointed to the Cathedral, Aberdeen, where he spent eight years, and where in addition to the varied activities of an assistant priest he had assigned to him the special work of organising the district which was to form the now separate mission of Torry. In 1911 he was given charge of Inverurie, and in 1912 transferred to the more important mission of Nairn.

There he had the arduous work of ministering to a widely scattered flock and to the Catholic troops at Fort-George. He was also Diocesan Inspector of Religious Education in the northern and western portions of the Diocese. He had spent eight years in the faithful discharge of these duties when he was suddenly stricken, whilst to all appearance in full vitality, and in the robust vigour of life with a malady which proved incurable. After a prolonged illness borne with heroic patience, he died at Rowantrees, Huntly, on the 23rd June 1920, fortified with the last Rites of the Church. One who knew Father Roger well writes thus of him:—"His life to the casual observer held nothing beyond the ordinary—nothing but what the Catholic expects in every zealous priest. There was, of course, intense zeal for souls, strong faith, love for Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, and careful performance of priestly duties. There was nothing striking or eventful, nothing sketched on grand lines; its whole tone was that of simplicity and naturalness. The supernatural common-sense and joyousness which characterised his life as a student and priest were evidenced in a superlative degree in the agony of his last illness. The qualities which had endeared him to all who knew him enabled him to look at death as he had looked at life, with a smile. On his deathbed the words spoken by him to a friend who sought to console him when there was no longer a hope of recovery bespeak his cheerful resignation to the will of God, and are eminently characteristic, 'I have been trying to teach others how to die; surely I can play the part myself.'"

The obsequies took place on the Saturday following his death. Solemn Pontifical Requiem Mass was celebrated in St Margaret's, Huntly, by the Right Rev. George H. Bennett, Bishop of Aberdeen, the Right Rev. Mgr. M'Gregor, Rector of Blairs, being assistant priest, the Very Rev. Canon M'Donald, Keith, and the Rev. Father Auer, Dingwall, deacons. The music of the Mass was rendered by a choir of priests. The Absolutions were pronounced, and the prayers at the graveside said by the Bishop. The interment took place in New Cemetery, Huntly.—*[Communicated.]*

Pray for the soul of the Rev. JOHN ANGLAND, who died at Glasgow on the 17th July 1920, in the 65th year of his age and the 40th of his priesthood.

The Rev. John Angland who was born in 1856, was ordained priest in 1880. The first years of his priestly life were spent as assistant at St Mary's, Greenock, and St Patrick's, Glasgow. In 1886 he was given charge of the mission of Houston, where he laboured for the next four years. From 1891 to 1895 he acted as Chaplain to the Reformatory at Westthorn. Subsequently he retired to the Continent where he laboured for a number of years in Belgium. Returning to Scotland in 1919 he was appointed Chaplain at Dalbeth, Glasgow. Although in his sixty-fifth year,

his condition of health gave no indication of his approaching end. He was indisposed on the evening preceding his death, but his illness was not considered serious, and his friends were surprised to hear of his demise, which occurred suddenly on the 17th July 1920. The funeral took place on the following Tuesday. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated in Dalbeth Convent Chapel in presence of the Right Rev. John Toner, Bishop of Dunkeld. The interment took place in Dalbeth Cemetery.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. JOHN SIMPSON, who died at Inverness on the 6th September 1920, in the 44th year of his age and the 20th of his priesthood.

The Rev. John Simpson was born at Aberdeen on the 2nd November 1876. He received his first schooling at the Franciscan Convent in Huntly Street, and was for some time a pupil of Gordon's College, Aberdeen. Having given evident signs of a vocation to the ecclesiastical state, he entered Blairs College on the 29th July 1890. In 1894 he proceeded to the College of Notre Dame des Champs in Paris, where he continued the study of classics. In October 1895 he was transferred to the Seminary of the Sulpitians at Issy for the study of philosophy, and two years later was sent to the Scots College, Rome, for the theological course. There in due time he received the minor and major orders, and was ordained priest by Cardinal Respighi on the 1st November 1900. On his return to Scotland he was appointed assistant to the late Mgr. Weir at St Mary's, Fochabers. Two years later he served for a time at the Cathedral in Aberdeen. From there he was transferred to the charge of the mission of Our Lady and St John at Fetternear, where he spent the next sixteen years of his life. In November 1919 on the retiral through ill-health of the late Canon Chisholm, he was appointed to the mission of Marydale in the county of Inverness. Father Simpson's priestly career was not an eventful one; it was spent for the most part in outlying districts, and his name did not come prominently before the public. In his college days he had won the approbation of his superiors by his diligent application to work and his punctilious observance of rule, and in the circumstances of his missionary life he found opportunity to develop to an eminent degree the virtues of method and regularity which had characterised his conduct as a student. His role was that of a missionary priest, and in the faithful discharge of the manifold duties which attach to that office he won the esteem of all who knew him, and the affection of the faithful to whom he ministered. He had moulded his conduct of life on the Sulpitian rule: "*Imitamini quod tractatis*," and had but one aim—to nourish the sacerdotal virtues and to cultivate well the portion allotted to him of the Vineyard of Christ. His death at the early age of forty-four years is a serious loss to the Diocese of Aberdeen, and will be regretted by his brother clergy and the faithful of the missions

in which he served. His death occurred in a nursing home in Inverness on Monday the 6th September 1920. The obsequies took place on the following Thursday. Solemn Pontifical Requiem Mass was celebrated in St Mary's, Huntly Street, by the Right Rev. George H. Bennett, Bishop of Aberdeen, the Very Rev. Canon Stuart, Beauly, being assistant priest, the Rev. Fathers Auer and Manders, deacons, and the Rev. Fathers Cronin and Mulligan, masters of ceremonies. The music was rendered by a choir of priests. The Panegyric was preached by the Rev. G. Grant, Aboyne, and the Absolutions pronounced by the Bishop of Aberdeen. The interment took place at Tomnahurich, Inverness.

Pray for the soul of the Most Rev. JOHN ALOYSIUS MAGUIRE, Archbishop of Glasgow, who died at Glasgow on the 14th October 1920, in the 70th year of his age, the 45th of his priesthood, and the 27th of his episcopate.

The most Rev. John Aloysius Maguire was born in Glasgow on the 8th September 1851. He was of Irish descent, his parents having emigrated from Antrim to Glasgow a few years after their marriage. As a boy he attended St Mungo's Academy and St Aloysius' College, where he received his early education and was initiated in the rudiments of Latin, Greek, and French. In 1867 he became a pupil of the Jesuit College at Stoneyhurst, and one year later entered the Glasgow University, where he attended the law classes with a view to adopting the legal profession. The strong religious bent which characterised the family induced him to become an ecclesiastical student, and in 1871 he became an alumnus of the College of Propaganda, Rome. On the completion of the usual curriculum of studies in preparation for the priesthood, he was ordained by Cardinal Patrizi in the Basilica of St John Lateran on the 27th March 1875. In the following June he returned to Scotland and was appointed assistant in St Andrew's Cathedral under the late Dr Munro of happy memory. There he remained about four years building for himself a reputation as an erudite and eloquent preacher, and winning the esteem of all by his genial urbanity and invariable courtesy. His qualifications were recognised by the late Archbishop Eyre, and he was appointed secretary to the Archbishop—a post which he filled with the greatest ability for over twenty years. In 1883 he was given charge of St Peter's, Partick, and there found ampler scope for the display of his energetic zeal and organising capacity. The success attending his ministry was so conspicuous that in 1885 he became Vicar-General of the Archdiocese. He was then but thirty-four years of age, and had attained a dignity which most men might hope for only after a long lifetime of service. His mission in Partick extended over six years. On his departure from Partick he resided in Renfrew Street.

At this time no religious function in Glasgow or even throughout

Scotland was considered complete without the attendance of the versatile, gifted, and brilliant young Vicar-General. His persuasive eloquence was appreciated all over Scotland, and self-abnegation being the keynote of his life, he never refused his presence to even the most distant parishes when his doing so was at all within the bounds of possibility. In January 1893 he was exalted to the high dignity of Provost, and from that time until his elevation to the episcopacy his commanding powers were continually before the Catholic public. Owing to the enfeebled health of Archbishop Eyre the management of the Diocese devolved upon the Provost. He performed the extra duties in a masterly manner. In the organisation of the different missions, with their multitudinous confraternities and societies, he was truly indefatigable. His magnetic personality attracted clergy and laity towards him, endearing him to the hearts of all; and thus his path was made smooth, and his suggestions were taken up with zest by the clergy of the city. During his nineteen years as Vicar-General he earned for himself the admiration of his colleagues; and when in 1894 it was found necessary to provide Archbishop Eyre with an Auxiliary-Bishop there was no surprise that the choice fell on the eminent ecclesiastic who for some time had borne willingly on his shoulders the greater part of the diocesan work. On Monday, 11th June 1894, the new prelate was consecrated Auxiliary-Bishop of Glasgow and Titular Bishop of Trocmadae in St Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow. His Grace Archbishop Eyre presided. The consecrating Prelate was the Most Rev. Dr Macdonald, Metropolitan and Archbishop of St Andrews and Edinburgh, the assistant Bishops being the Right Rev. James Smith, Dunkeld, and the Right Rev. Wm. Turner, Galloway.

From that date onwards the history of his career would be the story of the Archdiocese of Glasgow, and in a measure the history of Catholicity in Scotland. No event of importance took place with which he was not connected. There exists no record of his many activities; but a list of many prominent events in which he took a leading part during this period of his life, taken from the *Glasgow Observer*, furnishes some indication of the busy life he led and the dominant part he played in Catholic affairs.

In 1894 a new Convent and Training College for Teachers was opened at Dowanhill, Partick, Glasgow, under the charge of the Sisters of Notre Dame. In October 1895 he was present at the important ceremony in Dundee, when the newly-appointed Canons of the restored Chapter of the Diocese of Dunkeld were formally installed in the Pro-Cathedral, and preached a memorable sermon on the occasion. On Sunday, 22nd December 1895, the opening of the completed Church of St Francis, Glasgow, took place. Cardinal Vaughan was present and Solemn High Mass "Coram Cardinale" was sung by Bishop Maguire. On the 17th of March following (1896) he had the pleasure of seeing the foundation stone of St Patrick's Church, Glasgow, laid, and on

the 17th May of the same year he officiated at the opening of the new church of St Patrick, Coatbridge, and was present on 17th June at the opening of St Margaret's Memorial Church, Dunfermline. This fruitful year was also marked by the laying of the foundation stone of the New College of Blairs, and the celebration of the Golden Jubilee of St Alphonsus', Glasgow, on which occasion he preached in the evening, the morning sermon being delivered by Bishop Healy, of Clonfert, since Archbishop of Tuam—both preachers, then suffragan Bishops, being destined to ascend the archiepiscopal throne. On 13th June 1897 Dr Maguire preached at the re-opening of St Mungo's Church, Glasgow, and on the 3rd September of the same year was present at the laying of the foundation stone of Shieldmuir Church, and on the 26th of the same month pontificated at the opening of St Saviour's, Glasgow. On the occasion of the opening of St John's New Church, Glasgow, on 21st November 1897, Solemn Pontifical Benediction was given by the Bishop-Auxiliary for Glasgow, and on 25th September 1898 he was present at the opening of St Patrick's Church, Shieldmuir, the foundation stone of the chancel arch of which he blessed and laid on the 4th September of the previous year. On 24th February 1899 the Right Rev. Aeneas Chisholm, D.D., LL.D. was raised to the episcopacy, and on that occasion Dr Maguire preached the consecration sermon in St Mary's Cathedral, Aberdeen; and on 2nd July he pontificated at Solemn Mass on the occasion of the opening of St Augustine's, Langloan. In that same year (1899) the first Scottish national pilgrimage to Lourdes took place, and its success was a source of much gratification to the future Metropolitan of Glasgow. On 28th December 1899 Dr Maguire took Archbishop Eyre's place at the celebration of the Silver Jubilee of St Peter's College, Glasgow, and the opening ceremony of the new buildings.

In 1900 he was the principal figure at the opening of St Saviour's, Govan. He preached at the opening of a school at Holy Cross, Glasgow; a school at Whiterigg, Airdrie; and the Church of Our Lady of Good Aid, Motherwell. The silver jubilee of his priesthood was marked in 1900 by the presentation of an address and testimonial from the clergy and from the Catholic laity, the latter amount exceeding £1000, subscribed with remarkable alacrity and cheerfulness in all parts of the Diocese. Bishop Maguire preached the funeral sermon at the obsequies of the Most Rev. Angus Macdonald, Archbishop of St Andrews and Edinburgh, who died in April 1900, taking as his text the following verse from the eighth chapter of the Book of Wisdom: "Wisdom marcheth from end to end mightily and ordereth all things sweetly." The new Church of St James, Paisley, was formally opened on 3rd November by Bishop Maguire, and he assisted the consecrating Prelate at St Mary's, Leith, on 16th March 1902, when the Right Rev. Matthew Gaughran, O.M.I., was made Titular Bishop of Tentyra and Vicar-Apostolic of the Orange River Colony. Illness pre-

vented his presence at the opening of the completed buildings of Blairs College on the 23rd September of the same year, but earlier (5th March) he was able to take part in the celebration of the semi-jubilee of the Restored Hierarchy of Scotland. On 1st November he preached at the ceremony of the opening of the Church of Our Holy Redeemer, Clydebank, and officiated at the opening of St James's, Renfrew, St Peter's, Partick, and St Patrick's, Dumbarton. Space prevents us attempting any complete enumeration of the Catholic schools and churches opened during this period. These were verily the "seven fat years," and the zeal displayed under the shepherding of the dead Prelate has a memorial in these buildings that will testify to all future generations what a spring-tide burst of faith was manifested in Glasgow and the West of Scotland under the administration of the Most Rev. Dr Maguire. For the rest we can only throw into a summarised form the more important ecclesiastical events with which he was associated: 1905—Opening of the new Mission of St Luke's, Glasgow; opening of a new church at Stirling; opening of the Church of St Alphonsus', Glasgow. 1906—Opening of new Mission at Carntyne, Glasgow; opening of new church at Linwood; opening of the College Chapel of St Peter's, New Kilpatrick; opening of the new school at Dalry; opening of new Nazareth House, Glasgow; opening of the new chapel school at Tollcross, Glasgow. 1907—New Mission of St Roch's, Glasgow. 1908—Opening of the new church at Glenboig; opening of the new church at Burnbank. 1909—Opening of the new church at Dalmuir. 1911—Opening of the new Home for Working Girls at Barrhead; opening of Holy Cross Church, Glasgow; opening of the new Chapel of the Little Sisters of the Poor, Garngadhill, Glasgow. During the years of the Great War there were, of course, a lull in Catholic activities.

Archbishop Eyre died on 27th March 1902, and by a Brief of the 4th August of that year his Auxiliary was appointed his successor. At the early age of fifty-one, therefore, the deceased Prelate had attained to the dignity of the Archiepiscopal See of Glasgow. There was a renewal all over the Diocese of the goodwill and affection manifested towards him eight years earlier, and Archbishop Maguire took his place in the chair of St Kentigern amid the sincere and joyous acclamations of his people. On the 10th September 1903 he was invested with the Pallium in St Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow. About the year 1912 Archbishop Maguire's health had broken down so much that it became necessary to appoint a Coadjutor to assist in administering the Archdiocese. The choice fell upon Right Rev. Provost Mackintosh, St Margaret's, Kinning Park, who was nominated titular Archbishop of Chersona and Coadjutor of Glasgow on 11th July 1912. Archbishop Mackintosh filled the Coadjutorship for seven years, his death occurring in October 1919. Within the last few years the Archbishop's health became more and more enfeebled. Despite his failing strength he kept in touch with current events

and maintained a keen interest in Catholic progress and in affairs generally. His war pastorals were among the finest things of their kind—persuasive, eloquent, convincing—and they elicited a direct tribute of thanks from the highest quarters. Of recent months his Grace's growing malady cut him off entirely from the work he loved, and it became necessary to appoint as Administrator-Apostolic the Right Rev. John Toner, Bishop of Dunkeld.

Never at any time a robust man, the Archbishop had his first serious illness about six years ago, when he had continuous internal hæmorrhage which brought him to the point of death. The Last Sacraments had been administered and the end seemed at hand, but he miraculously recovered. God gave him three years before his next serious illness began, and the clergy and public knew well how much work he got through in that brief time. He visited his vast diocese confirming and preaching, and presiding over innumerable meetings, both clerical and lay; he threw himself heart and soul into the education question, and finally made two long journeys to consecrate Bishop Graham in Edinburgh and Bishop Bennett in Aberdeen. The journey to Aberdeen for the consecration there was his last public appearance. He received the Last Sacraments from the Right Rev. Mgr. Ritchie, V.G., on Thursday the 30th September. On Saturday the 9th October his illness grew worse and he was again given Viaticum for the last time. A fresh hæmorrhage on the brain occurred, and loss of speech and movement followed, but the Archbishop remained conscious until the end and was able to follow the prayers of the Church. He expired shortly before midnight on the 14th October.

The remains were taken to St Andrew's Cathedral on Sunday evening, and vast throngs of mourners came from all parts to pay their last tribute of homage to their beloved prelate and father-in-God. Thus was fulfilled a hope he had entertained and to which he had given expression in a letter to the Very Rev. Canon Ritchie:—"As a Glasgow Catholic I may say my connection with St Andrew's Cathedral has been almost unbroken. I was baptised in that mission, said in that church my first Mass as a missionary priest in Scotland, was there consecrated, and later installed as Archbishop. And there I look forward to making my last visit surrounded by the loving friends who will pray for my soul."

The funeral took place on Tuesday the 19th October. Solemn Pontifical Requiem Mass was celebrated in St Andrew's Cathedral, the Right Rev. James W. M'Carthy being celebrant; Right Rev. Mgr. Ritchie, Glasgow, assistant priest; Very Rev. Canon Hughes, M.R., Bridgeton, deacon; Very Rev. Canon De Backer, Pollokshaws, sub-deacon; Rev. Father P. Keating, of the Cathedral, master of ceremonies. There were also in the sanctuary—Right Rev. John Toner, Bishop of Dunkeld and Apostolic Administrator of the Archdiocese of Glasgow; Right Rev. George H. Bennett,

Bishop of Aberdeen; Right Rev. Donald Martin, of Argyll and the Isles; Right Rev. Henry G. Graham, Bishop of Tipasa and Auxiliary-Bishop of St Andrews and Edinburgh; Right Rev. Mgr. Morris, V.G., and Right Rev. Mgr. Miley, of Edinburgh; Right Rev. Mgr. Turner, V.G., Dundee; Right Rev. Mgr. Meany, V.G., Aberdeen; Right Rev. Mgr. Provost Brown, V.G. (Southwark); Right Rev. Mgr. M'Gregor, Rector, Blairs College; Very Rev. Canons J. J. Dyer, J. Ritchie, T. P. O'Reilly, P. Houlihan, J. Montgomery, W. P. O'Brien, M. M'Nairney, Hubert Van Stiphout, Wm. Davidson, and P. Hackett, all of Glasgow; Very Rev. Canon Malcolm (Dundee). There were also present in the Church a great number of priests from all parts of Scotland and representatives from the various Religious Communities. The Panegyric was preached by the Right Rev. John Toner, Bishop of Dunkeld. The Absolutions were pronounced by the Bishops. The interment took place in Dalbeth Cemetery, where the prayers at the graveside were said by the Right Rev. Bishop M'Carthy.

An Appreciation by Monsignor Provost Brown.

I first met the Archbishop at the London Eucharistic Congress, 1908. It will be remembered that much excitement was caused by the prohibition of the public procession of the Blessed Sacrament. A huge crowd had assembled outside the Albert Hall for the evening meeting, and very few police were present to regulate admissions. The result was a mass of humanity, some with tickets, others without, struggling to get into the hall. Having arrived early I was inside the main entrance, and I saw the Archbishop making vain efforts to reach the door. At last I managed to get a passage made for him, and breathless and exhausted he got within the porch. He always said that but for my timely intervention he would never have got in at all, and I think he was right.

The hall was packed to the utmost, and a feeling of disappointment and resentment weighed down the spirits of the vast audience. It was not until the Archbishop began his speech that people recovered their equanimity and began to cheer and laugh. Instinctively he did the right thing. He opened with a few humorous allusions to himself, his nationality and his accent, and at once put himself *en rapport* with his hearers. His speech was the speech of the evening, and raised the audience to a high pitch of enthusiasm.

I next met His Grace at Blairs College—I think in 1911—and we got to know each other well. Unfortunately his health was poor, and he was evidently struggling against the depression that often assails strong natures in sickness. But I had enough opportunity to gauge his great mental attainments. Not only was he a brilliant linguist, a man of almost encyclopedic information, but he possessed, *par excellence*, the power of getting straight to the heart of a question, and of coming to a decision regardless of

irrelevant or immaterial considerations. Such powers make a man predominant in discussion and debate, and often lead people to regard him as overbearing and intolerant, but these qualities in his case belonged to the head rather than to the heart. No man could be more generous to those who differed from him so long as he was convinced that they were sincere in their opinion.

The last time I met him was on the day of the consecration of Bishop Graham in 1917. I was prevented from going to the consecration of the Bishop of Aberdeen, otherwise I should have been present at the final public appearance of the Archbishop of Glasgow. From what I have been told he rose to the occasion and made a splendid impression upon all who saw him. Alas! it was his last great effort, and he went home to spend two years in the weariness of sickness, yet in patient preparation for the hour of death. Scotland has lost a great Archbishop. May he rest in peace.

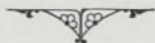
The requisite outfit comprises, two suits of tweed of the pattern known as parson grey (small boys may come in knickerbockers), two pairs of strong shoes, one pair slippers, the usual underclothing for day and night use, flannels, stockings and towels, a warm overcoat for winter. The Course of Education comprises all that is usually taught in Colleges.

Students will not be admitted before their twelfth year. They must bring with them a certificate showing that they have satisfactorily stood an examination in religious and secular knowledge equivalent to that required in the Highest Grade of an Elementary School. The time of entry is early in August—the exact date being fixed in June—and all students must be in the College on the day appointed. The greatest care is taken of their health; strict attention is paid to their comfort, and they are attended by a Medical Gentleman as often as occasion may require.
