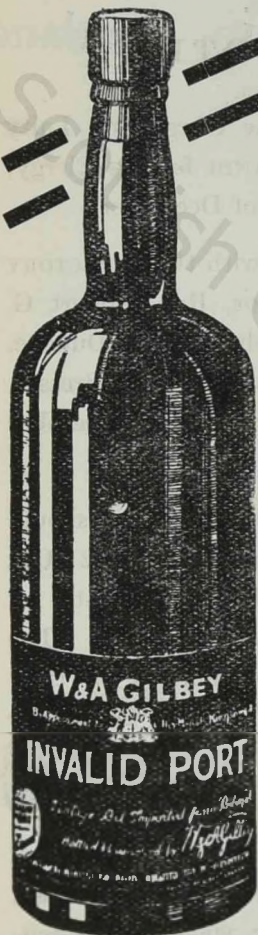

SECTION III.

LITURGICAL USE OF THE CALENDAR.

I. THE FESTIVALS.

The Festivals of the Church are not all celebrated with the same degree of solemnity ; the words *Double*, *Semi-Double* and *Simple*, found in the Calendar, show the degree of solemnity with which each feast is celebrated. The order is as follows : *double of the first class*, *double of the second class*, *double major*, *double*, *semi-double* and *simple*. When the office is *double*, an entire Anthem is said or sung before and after each Psalm ; when *semi-double*,

only a word or two are said or sung before the Psalm. A *simple* has only three lessons at Matins. A *feria* is a week-day for which no Saint's Office is appointed.

The principal Festivals are *doubles of the first class*. Some Festivals have an Octave, or succession of eight days, on which, with certain exceptions, the Office and Mass of the Feast are said, or a commemoration made.

II. THE ROMAN MISSAL.

The prayers and portions of the Holy Scripture, of which the Mass is composed, are partly always the same and partly different every day. Those that are invariable are contained in what is called the *Ordinary* of the Mass, at the beginning of the Missal. The parts that are changeable, or *proper*—*viz.*, the *Introits, Collects, Graduals and Tracts, Gospels, Offertories, Secrets, Communions and Post-Communions*—form the subsequent contents. As the *Prefaces* are not so frequently subject to change, they follow each other in regular succession in the *Ordinary* of the Mass.

If a double of the 1st or 2nd class, or a Feast of the Lord, falls on a Sunday, the Mass of the Feast is said instead of that of the Sunday, unless it be a Sunday of the *first class*—*viz.*, the First Sunday of Advent, the Sundays of Lent, Passion, Palm, Easter, Low, Pentecost and Trinity Sundays—which are never superseded. The Sundays of the *second class*, which are superseded only by doubles of the *first class*, are the 2nd, 3rd and 4th of Advent; Septuagesima, Sexagesima and Quinquagesima Sundays. The Gospels for Sundays thus superseded are said at the end of the Mass, instead of St John's Gospel; and a Commemoration of Sunday, by its proper *Collect, Secret and Post-Communion*, is made after the Collect, etc., of the Festival. The Calendar, in the first part of this Directory, indicates the various Prayers said at Mass on each day of the year.

III. THE VESPER BOOK.

The Evening Service of the Church is contained in the Vesper Book. The following is the order of Vespers: *Pater noster* and *Ave Maria* being said, the Priest intones the Versicle *Deus, in adjutorium meum intende*, to which the choir answer by the Response, *Domine, ad adjuvandum me festina*, with the *Gloria Patri*; and when five Psalms, with their Anthems, have been sung, the Priest chants the *Little Chapter*. Then are sung the Hymn, with its Versicle and Response, and *Magnificat* with its Anthem, followed by the Prayers and Commemorations appointed for the day; which, if it be neither a double nor within an Octave, are followed by the Commemoration or *Suffrage* of the Saints (or during Paschal time, the Commemoration of the Cross), to be found after the Common Vespers for Sunday. All these Commemorations on Sunday are indicated in the Calendar.

PART II.

THE HIERARCHY AND THE CLERGY.

SECTION I.

THE GENERAL HIERARCHY OF THE CHURCH.

THE Catholic Hierarchy, or the governing body of the Holy Catholic Church, consists of: 1. His Holiness the Sovereign Pontiff, assisted by the Sacred College of Cardinals, and by the Sacred Congregations (of which the Cardinals are the chief members), the Tribunals and the Offices of the Roman Curia; 2. The Patriarchs, Archbishops and Bishops; 3. The Apostolic Delegates, Vicars and Prefects; and 4. certain Abbots and Prelates.

I. GENERAL SUMMARY.

The less are those of: Babylon, *Chaldaic*; Cilicia, *Armenian*; the East Indies, *Latin*; Lisbon, *Lan*; Venice, *Latin*; and the West Indies, *Latin*.

The above summaries are for the most part taken from the official *Annuario Pontificio*, published at Rome in 1926.

Besides the *Residential Sees*, there are many *Titular Sees*, formerly (until 3rd March 1882) called *Sees in partibus infidelium*, that is, Sees in infidel regions, the Archbishops and Bishops of which only take their title from them without being bound to residence. These Sees are, for the most part, assigned to Archbishops and Bishops appointed, either to Apostolic Delegations, Vicariates or Prefectures; or to the office of Coadjutor, Auxiliary or Administrator of a Diocese.—Many are vacant.

II. THE SOVEREIGN PONTIFF.

HIS HOLINESS POPE PIUS XI (ACHILLE RATTI), the 260th Roman Pontiff, was born at Desio, March 31, 1857; ordained Priest, December 20, 1879; consecrated Titular Archbishop of *Lepanto*, October 28, 1919, transferred to Titular See of *Adana*, April 19, 1921, transferred to Metropolitan See of Milan and created Cardinal, June 13, 1921; elected Pope, February 6, and crowned February 12, 1922.

III. THE SACRED COLLEGE OF CARDINALS.

The Cardinals, as the advisers and assistants of the Sovereign Pontiff, are the Supreme council or senate of the Church. On the death of the Pontiff, they elect his successor.

There are three orders of Cardinals, *Bishops, Priests* and *Deacons*. These orders are distinct from those of the Hierarchy: with very few exceptions, the Cardinal Priests are archbishops or bishops; and the Cardinal Deacons are generally priests.

The Sacred College, when complete, consists of 70 members; 6 Cardinal Bishops, whose dioceses are the six "Suburban Sees," near Rome; 50 Cardinal Priests, who take their title from the "Titular Churches," to which they are appointed, with jurisdiction and right to a throne, etc., therein; and 14 Cardinal Deacons, who are appointed to other churches called "Deaconries."

The first Cardinal Bishop is *Dean*, the first of the Priests is *First Priest*, and the first of the Deacons is *First Deacon*, of the Sacred College. The Dean has the right of consecrating, and the First Deacon the right of proclaiming and crowning, a new Pope.

On the death of the Pontiff the Cardinal *Camerlengo* has the administration of the public affairs of the Holy See.

The "creation" of a Cardinal sometimes precedes, even by several years, its "publication" or proclamation. The Cardinal is then said to be "reserved *in petto*," and, when proclaimed, he takes precedence according to date of creation.

IV. THE ROMAN CURIA.

The Roman Curia, as re-constituted by the Apostolic Constitution *Sapienti consilio* (29th June 1908) of Pope Pius X., consists of the following Sacred Congregations, Tribunals and Offices:—

SACRED CONGREGATIONS,

And the Matters with which they have to deal.

1. *Congregation of the Holy Office.*—The protection of faith and morals; the judging of heresy; the doctrine and the use of Indulgences; impediments to Marriage with non-Catholics; dogmatic teaching as to Marriage and other Sacraments; the examination, and the prohibition, of books dangerous to faith, or otherwise pernicious.

2. *Consistorial Congregation.*—The preparation of matter for Consistories; the erection and division of dioceses, etc., and the election of Bishops. Also whatever relates to the government of dioceses not subject to the *Propaganda*; to the reports of Bishops concerning the state of their dioceses; to apostolic visitations; and to the spiritual care of emigrants.

3. *Congregation of Sacramental Discipline.*—Legislation as to the administration and reception of the Sacraments; dispensations from impediments to Marriage and to Ordination, and in regard to the Blessed Eucharist; questions as to the validity of Marriages and of Ordinations.

4. *Congregation of the Council.*—The observance of precepts of the Church and dispensations therein. Regulations as to parish priests and canons; to pious associations, pious bequests and pious works; to benefices, ecclesiastical property, etc. Also whatever relates to the celebration of Councils and their ratification, and to meetings and conferences of Bishops.

5. *Congregation for the Affairs of Religious.*—The Regulation of matters between Bishops and Religious, and amongst Religious themselves, including persons who, without vows, live a community life, or are secular members of Third Orders. Also the granting of dispensations to Religious.

6. *Congregation "de Propaganda Fide."*—Having jurisdiction over missionary countries, including, however, many regions where hierarchies are established. From this jurisdiction the United Kingdom, Holland, Luxemburg, Canada, Newfoundland and the United States, were withdrawn in 1908.

7. *Congregation for the Eastern Church.*—Having jurisdiction over all persons and things pertaining to the Oriental Rites, except in matters that belong to the Holy Office.

8. *Congregation of Sacred Rites.*—The care and regulation of rites and ceremonies; the beatification and canonisation of Saints; and whatever relates to sacred relics.

HIERARCHY RESTORED BY POPE PIUS IX., 29TH SEPT. 1850.

By Apostolic Letters of Pope Pius X., 28th Oct. 1911, England and Wales, which from 1850 had only one Province, were divided into three Provinces. SECTION III.

THE HIERARCHY OF SCOTLAND.

I. VICARS-APOSTOLIC.

From the Extinction of the Hierarchy in 1603 till its Restoration in 1878.

1. The ancient Hierarchy ended with JAMES BETOUN, Abp. of Glasgow, who died at Paris on the 25th April 1603, aged 79. After being subjected to the jurisdiction of the Archpriests and first Vicar-Apostolic of England till 1623, and afterwards to local Prefects of the Mission, the Clergy were incorporated into a missionary body by decree of *Propaganda*, 1653, and governed by the following *Prefects-Apostolic*—WILLIAM BANNATYNE (or *Bellenden*), 1653-61 ; ALEXANDER DUNBAR (or *Winsten*), 1662-68, 1672-94 ; and JOHN WALKER (or *Ross*), 1668-71. In May 1694 a Scottish *Vicariate-Apostolic* was established. This was divided into two *Districts*, the *Lowland* and the *Highland*, in February 1731 ; and these into three, the *Eastern*, *Western* and *Northern*, by Papal Rescript of 13th February 1827. This last arrangement remained in force till the re-establishment of the Hierarchy by the Apostolic Letter *Ex supremo Apostolatus apice*, 4th March 1878.

3. *Celebrations for Benefactors and Deceased Clergymen.*

The Sacred Congregation of the Council by a Rescript dated the 17th July 1924 has decreed (1) that the former obligation of Masses for deceased priests and five annual Masses for Benefactors

ceases on the 31st December 1924, and (2) that from the 1st January 1925 all priests affiliated to a Diocese in Scotland must celebrate one Mass each year for benefactors and all deceased priests.

A voluntary Association is being formed among the secular clergy of the country to perpetuate the ancient custom: a copy of the Constitution of the Association and Form of Promise may be had from the Diocesan Registrar.

Monsignore when followed by surname is usually written and pronounced *Monsignor*.

DIOCESE OF ABERDEEN.

Comprising Counties of Aberdeen, Banff, Caithness, Cromarty, Elgin or Moray, Inverness (north of a straight line drawn from the extreme north of Loch Luing to the junction of the Counties of Inverness, Aberdeen and Banff), Kincardine, Nairn, Ross (except Island of Lewis), Sutherland, and the Orkney and Shetland Islands.

THE See of Aberdeen was founded at Mortlach in 1063 ; transferred to Aberdeen in 1125, under its fourth Bishop, Nectan ; and was vacant for 301 years, from the death of Hon. WILLIAM GORDON at Aberdeen, on 6th August 1577.

DIOCESE OF ARGYLL AND THE ISLES.

Comprising Counties of Argyll and Inverness (south of a line drawn from the northern extremity of Loch Luing to the junction of the Counties of Inverness, Aberdeen and Banff); the Islands of Bute and Arran and the Hebrides.

THE See of Argyll was founded about 1200, being disjoined from the Diocese of Dunkeld; and was vacant for more than three centuries. JAMES HAMILTON was appointed to the See on 14th July 1553, but was probably never consecrated.

The See of the Isles (*Insularum* or *Sodorensis*) is said to have been founded about 447 by ST PATRICK, who consecrated GERMANUS, its first Bishop; was united to *Man* till

the end of the 14th century ; and was vacant for 325 years, from the death of RODERICK MACLEAN in 1553.

THE See of Glasgow was founded about 543 by ST KENTIGERN (or *Mungo*) ; erected into a Metropolitan See, with four Suffragan Sees, by Innocent VIII., 9th January 1492 ; and was vacant for 275 years, from the death of JAMES BETOUN, 4th Archbishop, at Paris, on 25th April 1603, till the restoration of the Hierarchy in 1878.

PART V.

ECCLESIASTICAL AND GENERAL INFORMATION.

SECTION I.

ECCLESIASTICAL LAWS AND OBSERVANCES.

1. EASTER DUTIES AND INDULGENCE.

THE Faithful of the Diocese of St Andrews and Edinburgh, Glasgow and Dunkeld, are authorised to satisfy the obligation of the Paschal Communion, and to gain the Plenary Indulgence, on any day from the first Sunday of Lent to Sunday within the Octave of the Ascension, inclusively; and those of the Diocese of Galloway, of Aberdeen, and of Argyll and the Isles, from the first Sunday of Lent till Low Sunday. This permission is granted for a term of five years (S.C.C.; 25th Oct. 1926).

2. FAST AND ABSTINENCE DAYS.

The new Code of Canon Law makes many important changes in the general law of fasting and abstinence. The Indult, however, granted in perpetuity to Scotland by the Holy See on 27th January 1911, still continues in force. The regulations of both Code and Indult as they apply to Scotland are here summarised.

I. FAST DAYS OF ONE MEAL.

1. The Ember-days throughout the year.
2. The Vigils or Eves of Pentecost, Assumption, All Saints and Christmas.
3. In Lent all days except Sunday, up to noon of Holy Saturday.

N.B.—(a) If a fasting Vigil falls on a Sunday, the fast is not observed either on the Sunday or on the preceding Saturday;

(b) Except in Lent, a Holiday of Obligation is never a fasting day;

(c) The old law, forbidding the use of fish and flesh at the same meal, is abolished;

- (d) At the morning and evening refectations, the quantity and quality of the food taken are to be regulated by the approved custom of the country ;
- (e) The law of fasting is binding on all between the completion of their 21st and the beginning of their 60th years.

II. DAYS OF ABSTINENCE.

On which the Church forbids the use of Flesh Meat or Soup made from Meat.

1. All Fridays throughout the year ;
2. The Ember Wednesdays throughout the year ;
3. The Vigils or Eves of Assumption, All Saints and Christmas, but not when they fall on a Saturday or Sunday ;
4. In Lent, Ash Wednesday, Ember Saturday and (up to noon only) Holy Saturday.

N.B.—(a) Except in Lent, a Holiday of Obligation is never a day of abstinence ;

- (b) Eggs, butter and such like, as well as dripping, lard, and any condiments formed from animal fat, may be taken on any day of the year ;
- (c) The law of abstinence is binding on all who have completed their 7th year.

3. MARRIAGES.

Marriage may be contracted on any day of the year. The *Solemnising* of Marriage, *i.e.* the Solemn Blessing of the Church, which is given only during Mass, is forbidden from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday, and from the first Sunday of Advent to Christmas Day, all dates being inclusive. Bishops, however, may for a just reason allow the Solemnising of Marriage any day during the forbidden periods, provided the laws of the Liturgy be observed. A widow, who has already received this Blessing, may not again be blessed at any subsequent marriage.

Marriage is constituted by the free consent of two parties taking one another for husband and wife. Anything interfering with the freedom of consent, in the way of serious error, grave fear and violence, may endanger the validity of the marriage bond.

The age required for valid marriage is sixteen years complete in the case of the man, fourteen years complete in that of the woman ; those under twenty-one years of age should before marriage inform their parents and obtain their consent.

Marriage cannot be contracted without a Dispensation by persons within the third degree of kindred or the second degree

of affinity; if attempted the marriage is invalid. Spiritual kindred contracted by Baptism, *i.e.* between a god-parent and a god-child, is also an invalidating impediment.

Marriage between a Catholic and an unbaptised person is invalid without a Dispensation.

A "mixed" marriage (that is, a marriage between a Catholic and one who, though baptised, does not profess the Catholic Faith) is unlawful without a Dispensation; and the Dispensation cannot lawfully be given unless for a sufficiently grave reason, and subject to the following conditions as laid down by the Council of Fort Augustus (Decr., xvii. 5): 1. That *all* the children that may be born of the marriage shall be baptised, and brought up, in the Catholic Faith. 2. That the Catholic party shall have full liberty for the practice of the Catholic religion. 3. That no religious marriage ceremony shall take place elsewhere than before the Catholic Priest. 4. That the Catholic party shall endeavour to effect the conversion of the non-Catholic party to the true faith of Christ. These promises will ordinarily be made in writing by the parties.

For parties preparing for marriage, the golden rule is: *give very early notice to the parish priest*, who will furnish precise and helpful instructions as to both civil and ecclesiastical requirements. Banns have to be proclaimed on three consecutive Sundays or Holidays, and evidence of Baptism has to be furnished by both parties, even in the case of a mixed marriage. If it can be done without serious inconvenience, Catholics should be confirmed before marriage. As a general rule, the parish priest of the bride, in the case of a mixed marriage the parish priest of the Catholic party, will take charge of the marriage.

The Decree *Ne temere*, which became law in Scotland only on the 1st September 1908, made important regulations for the celebration of marriage, either between two Catholics, or between a Catholic and a non-Catholic. These regulations have been incorporated into, and somewhat modified by, the new Code of Canon Law, which came into force on the 19th May 1918. The following points should be noted:—

I. Engagements, even when formally and solemnly contracted, produce no canonical effects and afford no canonical ground for claiming a fulfilment of the promise.

II. Only those marriages are valid which are contracted before the parish priest or the Ordinary of the place, or a priest delegated by either of these, and at least two witnesses.

III. The parish priest and the Ordinary of the place validly assist at a marriage:

(a) only within the limits of their territory: within which they

assist validly at marriages not only of their own subjects, but also of those not subject to them ;

(b) provided that not compelled by violence or by grave fear they ask and receive the consent of the contracting parties.

IV. They assist licitly :

(a) when they have legitimately ascertained the free state of the contracting parties ;

(b) when they have ascertained that one of the contracting parties has a domicile, or at least has lived for a month in the place where the marriage takes place.

V. When the parish priest or Ordinary or delegate as above (No. II.) cannot be got :

(a) in danger of death marriage may be validly and licitly contracted before two witnesses only ;

(b) outside the case of danger of death, when these conditions are prudently considered as likely to last for a month, marriage may be contracted before two witnesses only ;

(c) in either case, if any priest is at hand, he should be called in to assist ; but his presence or absence does not affect the validity of the marriage.

VI. (a) The above laws are binding on all persons baptised in the Catholic Church, and on those who have been converted to it from heresy or schism.

(b) The same laws are binding also on the same Catholics as above, if they contract marriage with non-Catholics, baptised, or unbaptised, even after a Dispensation has been obtained.

(c) Non-Catholics, whether baptised or unbaptised, who contract among themselves, are nowhere bound to observe the Catholic form of marriage ; nor are those who, being born of non-Catholic parents, have been baptised in the Catholic Church, but have been brought up from infancy away from the Catholic faith.

4. SICK CALLS.

All sick calls should be given in at the Priest's house at a timely hour in the morning. If this reasonable rule were adhered to, it would save the Clergy much unnecessary labour, and the people many disappointments, which they may justly ascribe to their own want of system.

On Saturdays, eves of Holidays, and other days which are generally devoted to the Confessional, the Priest should not, if possible, be called away from this important duty. Unless in cases of necessity, sick calls should not be made on Saturdays or Sundays, when the Clergy have so many other duties to attend to

It is the duty of the people to conform to whatever regulations may be made by the Clergy, on these and other matters connected with Religion, in their respective congregations. All things should be done in order, according to the advice of St Paul.

When the Priest is called to attend a sick person, everything that he requires for the administration of the Sacraments should be furnished as becomingly as possible in the room where the sick person lies—viz., a table covered with a clean linen cloth, on which should be laid a candle, a vessel of holy water with an Asperges, a small vessel of common water for the purification of the Priest's fingers after the administration of the Holy Viaticum, and a napkin for the sick person at the time of Communion. As the Priest generally brings the Blessed Sacrament on these occasions, everything should be so becomingly prepared, according to their means, as to show the great respect of the inmates for Jesus Christ, and the high value they set upon the honour thus rendered to their house in the visit of their Lord and Redeemer.

While the Priest is administering the Viaticum and Extreme Unction, the assistants should devoutly offer up their prayers to God on behalf of the sick person, to implore that he may receive those Sacraments with the necessary dispositions.

SECTION II.

INDULGENCES AND DEVOTIONS.

I. INDULGENCES GRANTED TO SCOTLAND.

EXPLANATION OF INDULGENCES.

An Indulgence is a remission of the whole, or a part, of the *temporal* punishment that often remains to be suffered for sins which, as to their guilt and *eternal* punishment, have been already remitted. For the effect and validity of an Indulgence, it is not only necessary that there be a competent authority in him who grants it, and a just cause or motive for the grant, but it is also necessary, on the part of him who obtains it, that he renounce and be sincerely sorry for all his sins, that he be in the state of grace, and that he duly perform the conditions prescribed. Of Indulgences, some are called *plenary*, which, when fully obtained, remit the whole of the temporal punishment that remained due on account of past sins; others are for a certain number of years or days, which, when fully obtained, remit as much of the temporal punishment as would have been discharged by the performance of so many years or days of Canonical Penance. Thus, by a *quarantine* Indulgence is meant the remission of so much of the

future penalty (*poena*) of sin as is the equivalent of keeping a Lent according to the strict discipline of the Church.

Indulgences attached to sacred objects, such as rosaries, etc., are available to any person using these objects, and the Indulgences cease only when the thing is destroyed or sold.

The conditions for most Plenary Indulgences include Confession, Communion, Visit to a Church and prayers for the Pope's intentions. For an Indulgence granted for any particular day, Confession made eight days before will suffice; Communion may be made the day before, and both Confession and Communion any day within the Octave. For Triduums, Novenas and such-like, Confession and Communion may be made any day within the Octave after the conclusion of the exercises. For daily communicants, or for those who confess regularly twice a month, no special confession is necessary. The visit may be made to any church or oratory and may be made from noon of the preceding day to midnight of the last day of the time appointed. Prayer for the Pope's intentions should be recited vocally and not merely mentally. Jubilee Indulgences, as well as some others, have their own special conditions.

PLENARY INDULGENCES GRANTED TO SCOTLAND.

1st. From the Feast of St Thomas, Apostle, 21st December, to the first Sunday after the Epiphany, inclusively.

2nd. From Ash-Wednesday to the second Sunday of Lent, inclusively.

3rd. During the time appointed in each Diocese for complying with Easter duties.

4th. From Pentecost Sunday to Sunday after Corpus Christi.

5th. From Sunday before the Feast of SS. Peter and Paul to the Octave day.

6th. From Sunday before the Feast of the Assumption to the Octave day.

7th. From Sunday before the Feast of All Saints to the Octave day.

8th. On the Feast of St Andrew, and during the Octave.

Conditions for gaining these Indulgences.

1st. That within the time prescribed the faithful approach the Sacraments of Penance and the Holy Eucharist.

2nd. That on the day of their Communion they offer up some prayers to God for the happy state of the whole Church of Christ, for its Supreme Pastor, the Bishop of Rome, for peace and concord between all Christian Princes; for the exaltation and propa-

gation of the Holy Catholic Faith, especially in our own country, and for the eternal salvation of all Christians.

3rd. That, if they have an opportunity, they visit within the limited time some church or oratory, and pray to God as has been mentioned before.

4th. That, if their circumstance enable them, they perform some works of mercy.

PLENARY INDULGENCE GRANTED TO GLASGOW TEACHERS.

A Plenary Indulgence is granted, subject to the usual conditions, to teachers in the Archdiocese of Glasgow who help in the preparation of children for their First Communion, and assist thereat (*S.P. A.*, 12th July 1924).

PARTIAL INDULGENCES : THE LITANY OF THE B. VIRGIN

On the 6th May 1879, His Holiness granted the Apostolic Benediction, and an Indulgence of seven years on each Saturday, and on the Feasts of the Blessed Virgin, to the Faithful of England and Scotland who shall recite or sing the Litany of the Blessed Virgin in any church in either country

2. THE PENTECOST NOVENA.

For the Pentecost Novena, prescribed by Encyclical Letters of 5th May 1895 and 9th May 1897, the following Indulgences have been granted to those taking part in the Novena :—1st. seven years and seven quarantines for each day ; 2nd. a Plenary Indulgence on any one day of Novena, or on Pentecost, or on any day of the subsequent Octave, on the usual conditions of Confession and Communion and prayers for the Pope's intention. [These Indulgences are attainable by those also who are legitimately impeded from attending the Public Devotions, provided the Novena be done in private and the other conditions fulfilled.] Moreover, those who again, during the Octave of Pentecost, inclusive of Trinity Sunday, publicly or privately recite every day, according to their devotion, some prayers to the Holy Ghost, and satisfy the other conditions, may gain a second time the above Indulgences, both plenary and partial. All these Indulgences are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

3. THE OCTAVE OF CORPUS CHRISTI.

For the continuance and daily increase of the abundant fruit produced by the Decree of 20th December 1905, on *Daily Communion*, Our Holy Father, POPE PIUS X., by a letter of the Sacred Congregation of Indulgences of the 10th April 1907, to the Bishops of the Catholic Church, has expressed his wish to have, as far as may be possible, the following annual observances :—

(a) IN CATHEDRAL CHURCHES.

That on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, either immediately after the Festival of CORPUS CHRISTI, or (if the circumstances of persons or places so require) at some other time of the year to be fixed by the Bishop, there shall be in every Cathedral Church three days' prayer, as here described: namely—

I. That, *on each day*, there shall be a sermon on the great excellence of the Sacrament of the Eucharist, and on the dispositions required for worthily receiving it. That, after the sermon, the Blessed Sacrament shall be exposed; and during the Exposition the prayer *O most Sweet Jesus* (see below) shall be recited, to be followed on the Sunday by the *Te Deum*. That the *Tantum ergo* shall then be sung, and the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament be given.

II. That, *on the Sunday*, the last of the three days, there shall be, at the usual parochial Mass, a homily by the Parish Priest on the gospel of the Sunday within the octave of CORPUS CHRISTI—or, if the Sunday be not within the Octave, a sermon in preparation for a fervent Communion; and at this parochial Mass the faithful shall communicate. That, on this Sunday afternoon (or evening), there shall be the same service as on the two preceding days. And in the sermon the preacher shall exhort the faithful to more fervent piety towards the Most Holy Sacrament, and especially to a more frequent participation of this heavenly banquet, in accordance with the approved teaching of the *Catechismus Romanus* (see n. vi. of the Decree of 20th December 1905). Moreover, at Benediction (as is said above), the *Tantum ergo* will be preceded by the *Te Deum*.

(b) IN PARISH CHURCHES.

His Holiness earnestly recommends that also in Parish Churches according as each Bishop in his prudence and discernment shall judge fit, there shall be at least those pious exercises which are above described for the cathedral Churches for the Sunday within the Octave, or some other Sunday in the year.

That the faithful may more eagerly take part in the aforesaid pious exercises, His Holiness has been pleased to grant the following Indulgences, applicable also to the souls in Purgatory:—

1. An Indulgence of seven years and seven quarantines for each of the three days' prayer. 2. A Plenary Indulgence to be gained once during the three days, on any day thereof, by those who devoutly assist at the devotions of any one day, and after Confession and Holy Communion pray for the intentions of the Holy Father. 3. A Plenary Indulgence to be gained on the Sunday by all who, after Confession, receive Holy Communion together in a Cathedral or a Parish Church, and pray for the Holy Father's intentions.

PRAYER BEFORE THE BLESSED SACRAMENT.

O most sweet Jesus, Who didst come into this world to enrich the souls of all mankind with the life of Thy grace, and Who, to preserve and sustain this life in them, dost daily give Thyself in the most august Sacrament of the Eucharist, as a saving medicine to heal their infirmities and a divine food to support their weakness, we pray and beseech Thee to pour forth upon them most graciously Thy holy spirit, so that, being filled therewith, any who are in mortal sin may, by returning to Thee, be restored to the life of grace which they have lost; and that those who, by Thy great mercy, already serve Thee may daily, as far as each one is able, come devoutly to Thy heavenly banquet, and in the strength thereof may find a remedy for their daily, venial faults and a support of the life of Thy grace, and, thus becoming more and more cleansed from sin, may obtain the everlasting happiness of heaven. Amen.

4. THE FEAST OF THE SACRED HEART.

By the Encyclical Letter *Miserentissimus Redemptor* of Pius XI dated 8th May 1928, it is decreed that the Act of Reparation thereto appended shall be solemnly recited in all churches throughout the world on the Feast of the Sacred Heart. The Act, together with the Litany of the Sacred Heart, is to be recited during Solenn Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament.

ACT OF REPARATION.

O sweet Jesus, Whose overflowing charity for men is requited by so much forgetfulness, negligence and contempt, behold us prostrate before Thy altar eager to repair by a special act of homage the cruel indifference and injuries, to which Thy loving Heart is everywhere subject.

Mindful alas! that we ourselves have had a share in such great indignities, which we now deplore from the depths of our hearts, we humbly ask Thy pardon and declare our readiness to atone by voluntary expiation not only for our own personal offences, but also for the sins of those, who, straying far from the path of salvation, refuse in their obstinate infidelity to follow Thee, their Shepherd and Leader, or renouncing the vows of their baptism, have cast off the sweet yoke of Thy law.

We are now resolved to expiate each and every deplorable outrage committed against Thee; we are determined to make amends for the manifold offences against Christian modesty in unbecoming dress and behaviour, for all the foul seductions laid to ensnare the feet of the innocent, for the frequent violation of Sundays and holidays, and the shocking blasphemies uttered against Thee and Thy Saints. We wish also to make amends for the insults to which Thy Vicar on earth and Thy priests are subjected, for the profanation, by conscious neglect or terrible

acts of sacrilege, of the very Sacrament of Thy divine love; and lastly, for the public crimes of nations who resist the rights and the teaching authority of the Church which Thou hast founded.

Would, O divine Jesus, we were able to wash away such abominations with our blood. We now offer, in reparation for these violations of Thy divine honour, the satisfaction Thou didst once make to Thy eternal Father on the Cross and which Thou dost continue to renew daily on our altars; we offer it in union with the acts of atonement of Thy Virgin Mother and all the Saints, and of the pious faithful on earth; and we sincerely promise to make recompense, as far as we can with the help of Thy grace, for all neglect of Thy great love and for the sins we and others have committed in the past.

Henceforth we will live a life of unwavering faith, of purity of conduct, of perfect observance of the precepts of the gospel and especially that of charity. We promise to the best of our power to prevent others from offending Thee and to bring as many as possible to follow Thee.

O loving Jesus, through the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary our model in reparation, deign to receive the voluntary offering we make of this act of expiation; and by the crowning gift of perseverance keep us faithful unto death in our duty and the allegiance we owe to Thee, so that we may all one day come to that happy home, where Thou with the Father and the Holy Ghost livest and reignest God, world without end. Amen.

The Indulgences granted are: (1) To the faithful present in any Church or Oratory at the recital of the above Act and the Litany of the Sacred Heart during Solemn Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament an Indulgence of seven years and seven Quarantines and further a Plenary Indulgence if, after Confession, they receive Holy Communion and (2) to those who elsewhere or at any time, even in private, recite the above Act, and Indulgence of three hundred days and further a Plenary Indulgence once in the month if they repeat the Act daily during the month, visit a Church or Oratory, go to Confession and receive Holy Communion. (*A. A.S.*, xx, p. 207.)

5. THE FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING.

Whereas, by the Decree of the S. Congregation of Indulgences, 22nd August 1906, His Holiness Pope Pius X. ordered that each year on the Feast of the Sacred Heart, in all Parish Churches as well as others where the feast is observed, the form of Consecrations used by Pope Leo XIII. on the 25th May 1899 should be recited during exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, followed by the Litany of the Sacred Heart, it is now enacted (*S.R.C.*, 28th Apr. 1926) that (1) the observance is optional on the Feast of the S. Heart, but obligatory on the Feast of Christ the King, and (2) the Form to be used is the one given below. To all who

with devout and contrite heart assist at this pious exercise and pray for the Pope's intentions, His Holiness grants an Indulgence of seven years and seven quarantines, and further a Plenary Indulgence to those who, after confession, receive Holy Communion. These Indulgences are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

FORM OF CONSECRATION TO THE SACRED HEART OF JESUS.

Most sweet Jesus, Redeemer of the human race, look down upon us humbly prostrate before Thy altar. We are Thine, and Thine we wish to be; but, to be more surely united with Thee, behold each one of us freely consecrates himself to-day to Thy most Sacred Heart. Many indeed have never known Thee; many too, despising Thy precepts, have rejected Thee. Have mercy on them all, most merciful Jesus, and draw them to Thy Sacred Heart. Be Thou King, O Lord, not only of the faithful who have never forsaken thee, but also of the prodigal children who have abandoned Thee; grant that they may quickly return to their Father's house lest they die of wretchedness and hunger. Be Thou King of those who are deceived by erroneous opinions, or whom discord keeps aloof, and call them back to the harbour of truth and unity of faith, so that soon there may be but one flock and one Shepherd. Be Thou King of all those who are still involved in the darkness of idolatry or of Islamism, and refuse not to draw them all into the light and kingdom of God. Turn Thine eyes of mercy toward the children of that race, once Thy chosen people. Of old they called down upon themselves the Blood of the Saviour; may It now descend upon them a laver of redemption and of life. Grant, O Lord, to Thy Church assurance of freedom and immunity from harm; give peace and order to all nations, and make the earth resound from pole to pole with one cry: Praise to the divine Heart that wrought our salvation; to It be glory and honour forever. Amen

6. THE MONTH OF OCTOBER.

For the *October Devotions*, prescribed by Decrees of 20th August 1885, etc., the following Indulgences have been granted:—*1st*, seven years and seven quarantines each time one joins in the public recital of the Rosary and Litany of the B. Virgin (or, being legitimately impeded, says them privately), and prays according to the intentions of the Pope; *2nd*, a Plenary Indulgence to those who, having done this at least ten times, confess and communicate; *3rd*, a Plenary Indulgence to all who, on the Feast of the Rosary or within the Octave, confess, communicate and pray in some church to God and the B. Virgin according to the intention of His Holiness; *4th*, seven years and seven quarantines, each time, for the recital of the following prayer to St Joseph enjoined by the Encyclical of 15th August 1889.

PRAYER TO ST JOSEPH.

To thee, O blessed Joseph, we fly in our tribulation, and while imploring the help of thy most holy spouse, thy protection also with confidence we crave. By that affection which united thee with the Immaculate Virgin, Mother of God, and by the fatherly love with which thou didst embrace the Child Jesus, we humbly supplicate thee to look down benignantly on the heritage which Christ Jesus purchased with His Blood, and in thy might and power to succour us in our necessities.

Defend, O most provident Guardian of the Divine Family, the chosen race of Jesus Christ; keep us, most loving father, from all taint of error and corruption; do thou from heaven, as our most powerful Protector, stand graciously by us in this conflict with the powers of darkness; and as of old thou didst rescue the Child Jesus in the imminent peril of His life, so now defend the Holy Church of God from hostile wiles and all adversity, and through thy never-failing patronage so shield each one of us, that, guided by thy example and supported by thy aid, we may live in holiness, piously die and attain eternal happiness in heaven. Amen.

7. CONSECRATION OF FAMILIES TO THE SACRED HEART
BY MEANS OF THE ENTHRONEMENT.

It is the earnest desire of the Holy See that all Christian families should be consecrated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, and that a statue or image of Him be set up in a prominent place in each house, so that Christ may be enthroned as ruler in the home. All families should be consecrated separately, not in groups. The priest blesses the image, and recites the Act of Consecration. When a priest cannot be had, the image, which should be previously blessed, will be set in its place by the head of the family or other lay person, who also will recite the Act of Consecration. The Indulgences granted to each member of the family are: (1) 7 years and 7 quarantines on the day of consecration; (2) a Plenary Indulgence on the usual conditions on the day of consecration; (3) 300 days on the annual renewal of the consecration. The form of consecration, *which alone is valid for the effect of the Indulgences* (S.P.A.: 1st March 1918; A.A.S. X, 154), is the following:—

ACT OF CONSECRATION.

O Sacred Heart of Jesus, who didst manifest to Blessed Margaret Mary the desire of reigning in Christian families, we to-day wish to proclaim Thy most complete regal dominion over our own. We would live in future with Thy life, we would cause to flourish in our midst those virtues to which Thou hast promised peace here below, we would banish far from us the spirit of the world which Thou hast cursed; and Thou shalt reign over our

minds in the simplicity of our faith, and over our hearts by the whole-hearted love with which they shall burn for Thee, the flame of which we shall keep alive by the frequent reception of Thy Divine Eucharist.

Deign, O Divine Heart, to preside over our assemblings, to bless our enterprises, both spiritual and temporal, to dispel our cares to sanctify our joys, to alleviate our sufferings. If ever one or other of us should have the misfortune to afflict Thee, remind him, Heart of Jesus, that Thou art good and merciful to the penitent sinner. And when the hour of separation strikes, when death shall come to cast mourning into our midst, we will all, both those who go and those who stay, be submissive to Thy eternal decrees. We will console ourselves with the thought that a day will come when the entire family, reunited in Heaven, can sing for ever Thy glories and Thy mercies.

May the Immaculate Heart of Mary, and the glorious Patriarchs St Joseph, present this consecration to Thee, and keep it in our minds all the days of our life.

All glory to the Heart of Jesus, our King and our Father.

8. PRAYERS AFTER LOW MASS.

To be said kneeling.

Hail Mary, *three times.* Then, *Hail Holy Queen.*

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy; Hail, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To Thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve; to Thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this vale of tears. Turn then, most gracious Advocate, Thine eyes of mercy towards us; and after this our exile, show unto us the Blessed Fruit of Thy womb, Jesus; O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

V. Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God.

R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Let us pray.

O God, our refuge and our strength, look with favour on Thy people who cry to Thee; and through the intercession of the Glorious and Immaculate Virgin Mary, Mother of God, and St Joseph her Spouse, of Thy Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and of all the Saints, mercifully and graciously hear the prayers which we pour forth for the conversion of sinners, and for the freedom and exaltation of our Holy Mother the Church. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

St Michael the Archangel defend us in the day of battle; be our safeguard against the wickedness and snares of the devil;—"the Lord command him," we humbly pray;—and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, thrust into hell Satan and the other wicked spirits who go about the world for the destruction of souls. Amen. (*300 days Indulgence.*)

To the above prayers may be added the following invocation said three times :—

Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us.

(*Indulgence of 7 years and 7 quarantines.*)

Amen.

9. THE ANGELUS.

In Catholic countries, and in many places at home, the Angelus Bell is rung in the morning, at noon and in the evening at sunset to honour the Mystery of the Incarnation. To gain the indulgences attached to this Devotion, the Angelus must be said *kneeling*, except on Saturday evening, and Sunday, when it is said *standing*. In Paschal Time, that is, from Holy Saturday at noon till the Saturday before Trinity Sunday at noon, inclusively, the *Regina Cœli* is said instead of the Angelus. This prayer is always said *standing*. Those who do not know the *Regina Cœli* may gain the indulgences by saying the Angelus ; but it must be said *standing* during Paschal Time. For the convenience of the Faithful is appended a translation of the *Regina Cœli* taken from the *Raccolta*.

Queen of Heaven, rejoice. Alleluia.

For He whom thou wast made worthy to bear. Alleluia.

Hath arisen as He said. Alleluia.

Pray for us to God. Alleluia.

V. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary. Alleluia.

R. For the Lord hath risen indeed. Alleluia.

Let us pray.

O God, who through the resurrection of Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, has vouchsafed to give joy to the whole world, grant us, we beseech Thee, that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may obtain the joys of eternal life. Through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

10. ASSOCIATION FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE FAITH.

The Association assists by prayers and alms the Catholic Missionaries in heathen and non-Catholic countries.

CONDITIONS OF MEMBERSHIP.—(1) The daily recitation of *Our Father* and one *Hail Mary*, with the invocation: *St Francis Xavier, pray for us*; and (2) the annual contribution of not less than 2s. 2d. yearly, or one halfpenny weekly. (3) Special Members contribute one guinea, or more, yearly. (4) Life Membership subscription, £8.

ORGANISATION.—The usual method of collection is by the formation of Groups or Circles of Ten Members, of whom one acts as Collector. The Collector receives the contributions of his group, circulates among them the *Annals of the Associations*, and pays over his collection to the Local Treasurer. A return of the sums received, and of their appropriation is inserted annually in the *Annals of the Propagation of the Faith*, One copy of each issue of the *Annals* is supplied to every ten members.

SPIRITUAL FAVOURS.—An exceptionally large number of spiritual privileges, including Plenary and Partial Indulgences, is granted to Associates. Extensive Faculties are also given to Priests who direct local centres or become special members. A complete list of these privileges may be obtained from the Secretary of the Scottish Branch, 1213 Dumbarton Road, Glasgow, or from any of the Diocesan Officials (*vid.* Part iv., Sect. 1, 4).

11. CATHOLIC TRUTH SOCIETY.

The following Indulgences were granted to the Catholic Truth Society in Scotland in perpetuity by a Decree of the S. Cong. de Prop. Fide, 6th October 1896:—

(1) A Plenary Indulgence (applicable to the Souls in Purgatory) to all present and future members of the Society on the day of their joining the Society, and also on the Feasts of S. Andrew, the Apostle; St Margaret, Queen of Scotland; S. Patrick; S. Columba and S. Ninian, or on any day within the Octave of these Feasts, on condition that they visit an Oratory of the Society, or their own Parish Church, and, after confessing their sins with sincere repentance and receiving Holy Communion, pray for the Propagation of the Holy Faith and for the intention of the Sovereign Pontiff.

(2) A Partial Indulgence of one hundred days every time they succeed in persuading a new member to join the Society, and every time they attend a General or Local Meeting of the Society.

SECTION III.

MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION.

1. EXCERPTS FROM PARLIAMENTARY ACTS.

Voluntary or Denominational Schools.

Education (Scotland) Act 1918.

Sec. 18 (3). Any school transferred to the education authority shall be held, maintained and managed as a public school by the education authority, who shall be entitled to receive grants therefor as a public school, and shall have in respect thereto the sole power of regulating the curriculum and of appointing teachers :

Provided that—

- (i) the existing staff of teachers shall be taken over by the education authority and shall, from the date of transfer, be placed upon the same scale of salaries as teachers of corresponding qualifications appointed to corresponding positions in other schools of the same authority :
- (ii) all teachers appointed to the staff of any such school by the education authority shall in every case be teachers who satisfy the Department as to qualifications, and are approved as regards their religious belief and character by representatives of the church or denominational body in whose interest the school has been conducted :
- (iii) subject to the provisions of section sixty-eight (Conscience Clause) of the Education (Scotland) Act 1872, the time set apart for religious instruction or observance in any such school shall not be less than that so set apart according to the use and wont of the former management of the school, and the education authority shall appoint as supervisor, without remuneration, of religious instruction for each such school, a person approved as regards religious belief and character as aforesaid, and it shall be the duty of the supervisor so appointed to report to the education authority as to the efficiency of the religious instruction given in such school. The supervisor shall have right of entry to the school at all times set apart for religious instruction or observance. The education authority shall give facilities for the holding of religious examinations in every such school.
- (4) Any question which may arise as to the due fulfilment or observance of any provision or requirement of the preceding sub-section shall be referred to the Department, whose decision shall be final.

(8) In any case where the Department are satisfied, upon representations made to them by the education authority of any education area, or by any church or denominational body acting on behalf of the parents of children belonging to such church or body, and after such inquiry as the Department deem necessary, that a new school is required for the accommodation of children whose parents are resident within that education area, regard being had to the religious belief of such parents, it shall be lawful for the education authority of that area to provide a new school, to be held, maintained and managed by them subject to the conditions prescribed in sub-section (3) of this section, so far as those conditions are applicable; the time set apart for religious instruction in the new school being not less than that set apart in schools in the same education area which have been transferred under this section.

Reformatory and Industrial Schools.

Education (Scotland) Act 1908.

Sec. 66 (1). The Court of Justice, in determining the certified school to which a youthful offender or child is to be sent, shall endeavour to ascertain the religious persuasion to which the offender or child belongs, and the detention order shall, where practicable, specify the religious persuasion to which the offender or child appears to belong, and a school conducted in accordance with that persuasion shall, where practicable, be selected.

(3) Where an order has been made for sending a youthful offender or child to a certified school, which is not conducted in accordance with the religious persuasion to which the offender belongs, the parent, legal guardian, nearest adult relative, or person entitled to the custody of the offender or child may apply—

(a) if the detention order was made by a . . . court acting in and for the place in and for which the court which made the order acted; and

(b) in any other case, to the Secretary of State to remove or send the offender or child to a certified school conducted in accordance with the offender's or child's religious persuasion, and the Court or Secretary of State shall, on proof of the offender's or child's religious persuasion, comply with the request of the applicant:

Provided that—

- (i) the application must be made before the offender or child has been sent to a certified school, or within thirty days after his arrival at the school, and
- (ii) the applicant must show to the satisfaction of the Court or Secretary of State that the managers of the school named by him are willing to receive the offender or child:
- (iii) nothing in this section shall be construed as preventing

any such person as aforesaid from making an application to the Secretary of State after the expiration of the said period of thirty days to exercise the powers of transfer conferred on him by the other provisions of this Act.

There is a Catholic Certified Reformatory School for boys at Westthorn, Parkhead, Glasgow.

There are Catholic Certified Industrial Schools for boys at Bishopriggs, Glasgow; Slatefield Street, Glasgow; and Tranent (Mr William Considine, S.S.C., 2 Queen Street, Edinburgh, Secretary and Treasurer); for girls at 74 Abercromby Street, Glasgow, at Dalbeth, Glasgow, and Nazareth House, Claremont Street, Aberdeen.

3. POSTAL REGULATIONS.

INLAND LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.

When prepaid, not above 2 ounces, 1½d.; for every additional 2 ounces, ½d. Inland letters must not exceed 2 feet in length, 1 foot in width, or 1 foot in depth, unless official letters sent to or from a Government Office.

LETTERS TO THE COLONIES AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

To British Colonies and possessions abroad, to Egypt, the United States of America, and the places in Morocco where

there are British Post Office Agencies, the postage is $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. for 1 ounce, and 1d. for each additional ounce. To Foreign Countries, with the above exceptions, $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. the first ounce, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. for each additional ounce.

PRINTED PAPER.

When prepaid, not above 2 ounces, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.; each additional 2 ounces, $\frac{1}{2}$ d. Limit of weight, 2 lbs.

The following articles or documents may be sent at Printed Paper rate:—Books and other publications, commercial or business papers of a formal character, as invoices, orders for goods or work to be done, inquiries for quotations; printed notices and letters (these may have the date, time, and place of meeting or appointment filled in in writing and formulas of courtesy not exceeding five words or initials); printed Christmas, New Year, Easter, birthday, picture, greeting, and visiting cards: manuscripts and printed proofs. "Printed Paper" should be written on the top left-hand corner of the address side of envelope or wrapper.

POST CARDS (INLAND).

The prepaid rate of postage on every post card is 1d., except where it fulfils the conditions mentioned under Printed Paper rate, where the charge will be $\frac{1}{2}$ d. To come under the latter rate the words "Printed Paper" must appear on the address side and post card should be crossed out. Post cards must be made of ordinary cardboard, not thicker than the thickest, nor thinner than the thinnest, official post card. They must not exceed $5\frac{1}{2}$ in. by $3\frac{1}{2}$ in., nor be less than 4 in. by $2\frac{1}{4}$ in. The left-hand half of the address side may bear a written or printed communication.

POST CARDS TO THE COLONIES AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

Post cards for a destination outside the United Kingdom are charged at the rate of $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. for a single post card, and 3d. for a reply post card. They must be similar in size and substance to the official post card, and must have the title "POST CARD" printed or written on the address side. Post cards for any British Possession and certain Foreign Countries may bear a written or printed communication on the left-hand half of the address side.

NEWSPAPERS (INLAND).

For every registered newspaper not exceeding 6 oz., 1d., with a further $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for every additional 6 oz., or fraction thereof. If two or more newspapers are sent in a single packet, each copy wi

be liable to the same postage as if it had been posted separately. The limit weight is 2 lbs. Every packet must be open at both ends, and must have no enclosure, except its supplement or supplements. To places abroad, the postage is $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for every 2 oz.

UNPAID.

inland letters, halfpenny packets, and newspapers are charged with double postage, and if *insufficiently stamped*, with double the deficiency.

REGISTRATION.

Prepaid letters, newspapers, and printed papers and commercial papers may be registered for the United Kingdom, and for almost all places abroad, for a fee of 3d.

PARCEL POST (INLAND).

The greatest length allowed is 3 feet 6 inches, the greatest length and girth combined, 6 feet. The greatest weight allowed is 11 lb. The rates are:—

MONEY ORDERS.

For inland money orders the charge is : for sums not exceeding £3, 4d. ; above £3 and not exceeding £10, 6d. ; above £10 and not exceeding £20, 8d. ; above £20 and not exceeding £30, 10d. ; above £30 and not exceeding £40, 1s.

POSTAL ORDERS.

are issued for any value, mounting by sixpence, from 6d. to 19s. 6d. inclusive, and for 20s. and 21s. at the following rates of poundage ; 6d. to 2s. 6d. (by increases of 6d.), 1d. ; 3s. to 15s., $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. ; 15s. 6d. to 21s. 2d.

Broken amounts, but not fractions of a penny, may be made up by the use of stamps not exceeding five pence in value or three in number affixed to the face of any postal order.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

1. RESTORATION OF THE HIERARCHY.

FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY.

To the Clergy and Laity from the Archbishops
and Bishops of Scotland.

Dearly Beloved Brethren and Children in Jesus Christ,

You are all aware that this is the fiftieth year since the Supreme Pontiff Pope Leo XIII., by Apostolic Letters dated 4th March 1878, restored the Episcopal Hierarchy in Scotland.

The pre-Reformation Hierarchy, consisting of the Bishops of thirteen Dioceses, became extinct with James Beaton, Archbishop of Glasgow, the faithful friend and ambassador of Mary Queen of Scots. He died at Paris in 1603. The government of the Church in Scotland was provided for by the Holy See by special arrangements suited to the abnormal circumstances of the Mission until the days of the Vicars-Apostolic. Of these, latterly, there were three, ruling the Eastern, Western, and Northern Districts respectively, and this arrangement remained in force till 1878 when the Hierarchy was re-established.

The Jubilee of such an important event in the history of the Church in our country must not be allowed to pass without acknowledgment of our deep thankfulness to Almighty God for all His mercies to us during the past half-century, and an earnest supplication for an increase of the same.

We have decided, therefore, to commemorate the occasion with befitting solemnity on Thursday, 29th November, the vigil of the Feast of our National Patron, the holy Apostle St Andrew.

On that day there will be celebrated in the presence of the Hierarchy in the Metropolitan Cathedral in Edinburgh at the hour of 11.30 a Solemn Pontifical Mass of Thanks-

giving, followed by the Te Deum, and a sermon will be preached by His Grace the Archbishop of Glasgow.

In order that none of the faithful may be deprived of participating in the Jubilee Commemoration a Te Deum is also to be sung or recited in all our Churches and Chapels on the Sunday following (2nd December).

And we exhort all our people to offer up their fervent prayers to Our Lord Jesus Christ the Divine Head of the Church, for a continuance of His favour and protection to the Church and its many interests and necessities in our beloved land.

May the Blessing of Almighty God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost descend upon you and remain with you for ever.

- 18th June 1928.—Leith. Opening of St Anthony's Catholic Intermediate School by the Hon. Lord Moncrieff. The school was built by the Edinburgh Education Authority at a cost of £20,301.
- 23rd June 1928.—Braemar. Reopening by Bishop Bennett of St Andrew's Church after extensive improvements including the covering of the lower part of the walls with oak panelling and the painting and re-decoration of the whole interior.
- 17th July 1928.—Bonnybridge. The judgment of the Court of Session on the appeal of the Stirlingshire Education Authority was reversed in the Second Division by a majority of three to one. The case is now before the House of Lords.
- 10th Aug. 1928.—Glasgow. Mr Daniel Morris of St John's Parish is made the recipient of the Papal Medal "*bere merenti*" for meritorious services to religion.
- 28th Sept. 1928.—Kilmarnock. Opening of C.Y.M.S. Halls by the Duchess of Norfolk. Cost £2000.
- 6-7th Oct. 1928.—Glasgow. Congress of Third Order of St Francis and Celebration of the Septcentenary of the death of St Francis of Assisi.
- 22nd Oct. 1928.—Roy Bridge. Blessing and laying of foundation stone of new church at Brae-Lochaber by the Right Rev. Donald Martin, Bishop of Argyll and the Isles.
- 27th Oct. 1928.—Tranent. Blessing and opening of church at Tranent by the Right Rev. Henry Gray Graham, Edinburgh

10th Nov. 1928.—Carnoustie. Blessing and opening of new church of St Anne, Dundee Street, by the Right Rev. John Toner, Bishop of Dunkeld.

He was raised to the priesthood by Cardinal Pompili in the Roman Seminary on the 15th May 1927.

The REV. JOSEPH FRANCIS MACARDLE was born at Drumconrath, Co. Meath, on the 25th March 1899. He entered St Finian's College, Mullingar, in 1916, St Mary's College, Rathmines, and the National University, Dublin, in 1922, "The Castle," Blackrock, Co. Dublin, in 1924, and St Kieran's College, Kilkenny, in 1927. He received the tonsure in February 1925, minor orders in June 1925 and March 1926, the subdiaconate on the 9th June 1928 and was ordained deacon on the following day. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. James Roche, Bishop of Ross, in the Cathedral, Kilkenny, on the 11th June 1928.

The REV. JOSEPH LAMONT was born at Lumphanan, Aberdeenshire, on the 27th October 1903. He entered Blair's College in 1918, the Seminary, at Issy, France, in 1923 and the Seminary of S. Sulpice, Paris, in 1927. He received the tonsure on the 6th June 1925, minor orders on the 29th May 1926 and the 11th June 1927, the subdiaconate on the 17th December following and was ordained deacon on the 9th April 1928. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. George H. Bennet, Bishop of Aberdeen, in Blair's College, on the 2nd June 1928.

The REV. JOSEPH BRETT was born at Lorrha, Co. Tipperary on the 1st June 1899. He studied at St Peter's College,

Wexford. He received the tonsure in April 1925, minor orders in May 1926, the subdiaconate in May 1927 and was ordained deacon in the following November. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. William Codd, Bishop of Ferns, in St Peter's College, Wexford, on the 7th June 1928.

The REV. JOHN BREEN was born in Waterford on the 1st March 1905. He entered Blair's College on the 12th August 1918 and was transferred to the Grand Seminaire at Coutances, France, in 1923. He received the tonsure on the 29th June 1925, minor orders on the 20th March and 29th June 1926, the subdiaconate on the 2nd April 1927, and was ordained deacon on the 29th June 1927. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. John Toner, Bishop of Dunkeld, in St Andrew's Cathedral, Dundee, on the 29th June 1928.

The REV. BARTHOLOMEW BURNS was born at Sneem, Co. Kerry, on the 21st December 1903. He entered Meingret College, Limerick, in 1919, and St John's College, Waterford, in 1921. He received the tonsure and minor orders in June 1927, the subdiaconate in October 1927 and was ordained deacon on the 15th June 1928. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. Bernard Hackett, Bishop of Waterford, in St John's College, Waterford, on the 17th June 1928.

The REV. PATRICK FRANCIS CASEY was born at Killarney, Co. Kerry, on the 4th June 1902. He entered St Brendan's Seminary, Killarney, in September 1917 and St Kieran's College, Kilkenny, on the 8th October 1922. He received the tonsure on the 7th September 1926, minor orders on the 7th June 1927, the subdiaconate on the following day and was ordained deacon on the 22nd September 1927. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. James Roche, Bishop of Ross, in the Cathedral, Kilkenny, on the 10th June 1928.

The REV. PATRICK CONWAY was born in Virginia, Co. Cavan, on the 15th August 1900. He studied at St. Finian's College, Mullingar and St Kieran's College, Kilkenny. He received the tonsure in June 1925, minor orders in June 1926, the subdiaconate on the 10th June 1927 and was

ordained deacon on the 9th June 1928. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. James Roche, Bishop of Ross, in the Cathedral, Kilkenny, on the 10th June 1928.

The REV. EDWARD DEMPSEY was born at Alloa on the 20th November 1901. He entered Blair's College in 1918, the Seminary at Issy, France, in 1923 and the Seminary of St Sulpice, 6 Rue de Regard, Paris, in 1927. He received the tonsure on the 6th June 1925, minor orders in June and December 1926, the subdiaconate in June 1927 and was ordained deacon on the 17th December 1927. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. John Toner, Bishop of Dunkeld, in St Andrew's Cathedral, Dundee, on the 29th June 1928.

The REV. MICHAEL KELLY was born at Kelty, Fife, on the 28th January 1905. He entered Blair's College in August 1918 and the Seminary at Coutances, France, in October 1923. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. John Breen.

The REV. RODGER M'CAULEY was born in Co. Mayo on the 27th March 1904. He was educated in St Muredach's College, Ballina and St Peter's College, Wexford. He was ordained by the Right Rev. William Codd, Bishop of Ferns, on the 7th June 1928.

The REV. FRANCIS J. M'FARLANE was born in Edinburgh on the 10th October 1902. He entered Blair's College in 1918 and the Seminary at Coutances in Normandy in 1923. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. John Breen.

The REV. DOMINIC MACKELLAIG was born at Morar, Inverness-shire, on the 20th July 1904. He entered the Abbey School, Fort Augustus, in 1921, the Seminary at Issy, France, in 1923 and the Seminary of St Sulpice, Paris, in 1927. He received the tonsure on the 6th June 1925, minor orders on the 29th May and 18th December 1926, the subdiaconate on the 17th December 1927 and was ordained deacon on the 9th April 1928. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. James W. M'Carthy, Bishop of Galloway, in St Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow, on the 29th June 1928.

The REV. DONALD B. MACMASTER was born in Perth on the 22nd April 1902. He entered Blairs College on the 24th August 1916, the Scots College, Rome, in October 1921, and St Peters College, New Kilpatrick in October 1927. He received the tonsure on the 1st November 1925, minor orders in December 1925 and May 1926, the subdiaconate on 29th April 1928 and was ordained deacon on the 24th June 1928. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. James M'Carthy, Bishop of Galloway, in St Andrews Cathedral, Glasgow, on the 29th June 1928.

The REV. AENEAS VALENTINE MACRAE was born at Eskadale, Inverness-shire, on the 11th July 1904. He entered Blairs College in 1918 and the Seminary at Coutances, Normandy, in 1923. He received the tonsure on the 29th June 1925, minor orders on the 20th March 1926 and 2nd April 1927, the subdiaconate on the 29th June 1927 and was ordained deacon on the 24th March 1928. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. George H. Bennett, Bishop of Aberdeen, in Blairs College, on the 2nd June 1928.

The REV. JOSEPH R. MAXWELL was born at Newton-Stewart, Wigtownshire, on the 25th February 1903. He entered Blair's College in 1917 and the Seminary of Coutances, Normandy, in 1923. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. John Breen.

The REV. VINCENT T. O'SULLIVAN was born at Killarney in 1903. He studied at St Brendan's Seminary, Killarney, and St Patrick's College, Carlow. He received minor orders in June 1926, the subdiaconate on the 3rd March 1928 and was ordained deacon on the 24th March 1928. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. Matthew Cullen, Bishop of Kildare on the 10th June 1928.

The REV. DAVID LEO POWER was born at Waterford on the 4th September 1903. He studied at St John's College, Waterford, and St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick. He received the tonsure on the 1st July 1927, minor orders on the 2nd and 3rd July 1927, the subdiaconate on the 11th September 1927 and was ordained deacon on the 4th March 1928. He was raised to the priesthood by the Most Rev. Donald Mackintosh, Archbishop of Glasgow, on the 29th April 1928.

The REV. MICHAEL RYNN was born at Ballinaglera, Co. Limerick, in December 1900. He studied at St Patrick's College Cavan, and St Peter's College, Wexford. He received the tonsure in April 1925, minor orders in May 1926, the subdiaconate in May 1927, and was ordained deacon in November 1927. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. William Codd, Bishop of Ferns, in St Peter's Wexford, on the 7th June 1928.

The REV. PATRICK ALOYSIUS SHERIDAN was born at Gubavceney, Co. Cavan, on the 21st July 1904. He entered St. Patrick's College, Cavan, on the 1st September 1917. and St Kieran's College, Kilkenny, on the 12th September 1922. He received the tonsure on the 5th June 1925, minor orders on the 6th June 1927, the subdiaconate on the 8th June 1928 and was ordained deacon on the following day. He was raised to the priesthood by the Rev. James Roche, Bishop of Ross, in the Cathedral, Kilkenny, on the 10th June 1928.

The REV. MICHAEL TEEHAN was born at Tullaroan, Co. Kilkenny, on the 11th August 1903. He entered St Kierans College, Kilkenny, in September 1919. He received the tonsure on the 8th and minor orders on the 9th June 1927, the subdiaconate on the 8th June 1928 and was ordained deacon on the following day. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. James Roche, Bishop of Ross, in the Cathedral, Kilkenny, on the 10th June 1928.

The REV. PETER TRAVERS was born at Glenfarne, Co. Leitrim. He entered St Patrick's College, Cavan, in August 1917 and St Kieran's College, Kilkenny, in October 1922. He received the tonsure on the 16th September 1926, minor orders on the 7th June 1928, the subdiaconate on the 8th June 1928 and was ordained deacon on the following day. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. James Roche, Bishop of Ross, in the Cathedral, Kilkenny, on the 10th June 1928.

The REV. JAMES CUTHBERT WARD was born at Edinburgh on the 31st May 1904. He entered Blairs College in 1919, St Kieran's College, Kilkenny, in 1922, and St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, in 1923. He received the tonsure on the

1st and minor orders on the 2nd and 3rd July 1927, the subdiaconate on the 11th September 1927, and was ordained deacon on the 4th March 1928. He was raised to the priesthood by the Most Rev. Donald Mackintosh, Archbishop of Glasgow, in St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, on the 29th April 1928.

The REV. JOHN WARD was born at Edinburgh on the 17th December 1901. He entered Blairs College in 1918 and the Scots College, Rome, in 1921. He received the tonsure in 1925, minor orders in 1925 and 1926, the subdiaconate and diaconate in 1926. He was raised to the priesthood by Cardinal Pompili on the 15th May 1927.

4. OBITUARY.

Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord. From henceforth now, saith the spirit, that they may rest from their labours : for their works follow them.—APOC. XIV. 13.

It is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from their sins.—2 MACHAB. XII. 46.

Pray for the soul of the REV. JAMES BIRD, who died at Perth, on the 25th September 1928, in the 80th year of his age and the 55th of his priesthood.

The Rev. James Bird was born at Perth on the 27th August 1849. He entered Blairs College, Aberdeen, on the 31st July 1863, and was transferred to the Scots College, Rome, in 1869. As a student he showed remarkable ability, and was chosen by his superiors to occupy several positions of trust. On the completion of his course of studies he was raised to the priesthood by Cardinal Angelini in the Basilica of St John Lateran, on the 17th May 1874, and, in the following June he returned to Scotland. At that date the country was divided, for ecclesiastical administration, into three districts, presided over by Vicars-Apostolic. Father Bird belonged to the Eastern District, and was appointed to assist in the mission of Lochee. Later he served in the missions of Haddington and Milngavie. In 1878, at the establishment of the Hierarchy the latter mission was within the area embraced by the Archdiocese of Glasgow, and Father Bird elected to serve under the Western Archbishop. Thereafter he rendered valuable service to the church in the missions of St Vincent, Glasgow ;

Duntocher, the Sacred Heart, Glasgow, as chaplain at Barlinnie Prison, and, finally, as priest-in-charge of the mission of Newmains, Lanarkshire. In these various localities, Father Bird proved a zealous labourer, an able administrator and an esteemed and revered pastor of souls. "The deceased," writes one who knew him well, "brought the sunshine of God's grace wherever he went; the faces of the children lit up with joy at his approach; his visits were ever welcome in the homes of his flock and brought consolation and courage to the patients in the hospital and to the lonely prisoner in his cell. His kindly demeanour wrought much good wherever he went and endeared him to all."

Some twelve years ago his health became impaired, and, on being relieved of his missionary duties, he retired to live in Perth. There he edified all by his priestly mien and affable disposition. In the spring of 1928 his health was shattered by a serious illness, from which he never completely recovered. His death occurred on the 25th September 1928. The funeral took place on the following Friday. Requiem Mass was celebrated in St. John's, Perth, by the Rev. John M'Daniel, Perth, in the presence of the Bishop of Dunkeld, many of the clergy of Dunkeld and Glasgow, and a large number of friends of the deceased.

Pray for the soul of the **VERY REV. MGR. OCTAVIUS FRANCIS CLAYS**, Privy Chamberlain of His Holiness, who died at Wemyss Bay on the 17th November 1928 in the 54th year of his age and the 30th year of his priesthood.

The Very Rev. Octavius Francis Clays was born at Courtrai, Belgium, on the 29th August 1875. His course of studies began at the Episcopal Seminary in Courtrai and was continued in St Peter's College, Bearsden, which he entered in 1893. In 1896 he went to the Grand Seminary at Bruges and there received minor orders on the 30th May 1896. Later he returned to St Peter's College, where he received the subdiaconate from the late Archbishop Maguire on the 18th December 1897, and was by him ordained deacon on the 5th May 1898 and priest on the 19th March 1899.

Mgr. Clays first appointment was to St Agnes', Lambhill, Glasgow. He was afterwards transferred to Croy, and, for a short period, acted as chaplain at Elmwood Convent, Bothwell. In 1907 he was nominated to the staff of St Peter's College, Bearsden, where his professorial work was marked by exceptional brilliance. In 1923 he was honoured by being appointed a Privy Chamberlain of His Holiness the Pope. During the war period the deceased served with the 33rd Division of Artillery of the British Army and saw service in France and Flanders. As a result of his war experience he suffered in health, but was able to resume work in the Archdiocese of Glasgow, and, after a short

term as chaplain at Downhill, Glasgow, he was given charge of the mission of Baillieston. He remained there two years, and, in January 1928, succeeded the Rev. Joseph van Hecke as Rector of St Ignatius, Wishaw. His death occurred at Wemyss Bay on the 17th November 1928.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. SAMUEL FRANCE, D.D., who died at Dublin on the 5th January 1928, in the 38th year of his age and the 14th of his priesthood.

The Rev. Samuel France, D.D., was born in Edinburgh on the 10th January 1889. He early showed signs of a vocation to the priesthood and entered Blairs College in September 1903. Four years later he was transferred to the Scots College, Rome. He had a distinguished career in Rome where in 1912 he received the tonsure and minor orders, the subdiaconate on 1st November 1913, and the diaconate on the 7th March 1914, and in the following November was raised to the priesthood. He remained for a time in Rome, and took his Degree of Doctor of Divinity. He served thereafter for a time on the staff of St Marie's, Kirkcaldy, and was thereafter in charge of the missions of Haddington and Dunfermline. In the former mission he did much to improve the church, and at Haddington and Dunfermline he was greatly respected by the non-Catholic community and his services on the Education Authorities in both districts greatly appreciated. Dr France was a persuasive platform speaker and possessed a winning personality. He was a zealous priest and an excellent preacher. He was passionately fond of music and did not a little to encourage Church Music along the well-defined lines of the *Motu Proprio*.

The deceased had been in indifferent health for a number of years, and some time ago retired from the charge of St Margaret's, Dunfermline, in the hope that a rest would restore him to health. This hope was not realised and the sad news of his death was received with deep regret by his clerical brethren and the members of his former flock.

The funeral took place on the Monday following. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated in St Patrick's, Edinburgh, by the Rev. William Maccabe in the presence of the Bishop-Auxiliary and many of the clergy. The Absolutions were pronounced by the Bishop, who also officiated at the graveside. The remains are interred at Mt. Vernon.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. JOSEPH VAN HECKE, who died at Wishaw on the 20th December 1927, in the 75th year of his age and the 50th of his priesthood.

The Rev. Joseph van Hecke was born at Bruges on the 31st October 1854 and studied humanities at the local episcopal

seminary and philosophy at Roulers. He then came to the college at Partickhill, Glasgow, and on the completion of the usual course of theology was ordained priest by Bishop Maclachlan of Galloway in St Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow, in 1879. He was then stationed at St John's, Glasgow, and later transferred to St. Paul's, Shettleston. In 1893 he was given charge of the mission of Wishaw where he was destined to remain for the long period of thirty-four years. During that period he laboured with zeal and energy for the welfare of his flock and showed great administrative ability. He was instrumental in having a school built and the church improved and embellished. He was a man of wide culture and an authority on ecclesiastical subjects. His interest in his parishioners extended to their temporal as well as their spiritual interests and, for that purpose, he became a member of the Parish Council and School Board, and his services were much appreciated by the other members of these bodies. He was of a kindly disposition, generous to the poor and beloved by the children and his memory will endure as that of a good pastor faithful in the discharge of his missionary duties.

The funeral took place on the 23rd December. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Theophilus Delbeke, Shieldmuir, in the presence of the Archbishop of Glasgow and a large number of clergy and laity. The Very Rev. Mgr. Clays pronounced the panegyric. The Absolutions were pronounced by the Archbishop. The remains were taken to Cambusnethan Cemetery where the Very Rev. Mgr. Clays officiated at the graveside.

Pray for the soul of the REV. RICHARD HOGAN, who died at Denny on the 13th April 1928, in the 55th year of his age and the 31st of his priesthood.

The Rev. Richard Hogan was born at Glasgow on the 19th October 1873. His early boyhood was spent in Stirling, and, at the age of fourteen he proceeded to Blairs College to begin his preparation for the priesthood. In October 1892 he was transferred to the Scots College, Rome, and, on the 23rd May 1897 was ordained priest by Mgr. Cassetta. In June 1898 he returned to Scotland and was stationed at St Patrick's, High Street, Edinburgh. Having spent four years in the zealous discharge of the various duties of an assistant priest in this populous centre, he was given charge of the mission of Lochgelly in Fife. In this busy industrial area the deceased found scope for his organising capacity and business ability, and, during the fourteen years of his administration, laboured with great success for the welfare of his parishioners. In 1916 he was transferred to the mission of Denny.

Father Hogan was of a quiet, affable disposition, and endeared himself to all by his kind and genial manner. Endowed with superior talents he combined, with an unassuming demeanour, a

great determination of purpose, and accomplished much in an unostentatious fashion. The zeal which actuated his efforts enabled him to surmount the many obstacles that beset the path of a missionary priest and the Church, Hall, and Presbytery built through his instrumentality, in Lochgelly, testify to his prudent foresight, courage and persistent endeavour. The interests, spiritual and temporal, of his flock were his constant preoccupation, and it is no exaggeration to say that he spent himself in the furtherance of their welfare. He was revered by his people, and esteemed by all with whom he came in contact. By his clerical brethren he was held in honour for his sterling qualities of mind and heart, and because of his business acumen, wide theological lore and saintly conduct of life was regarded by them as a prudent counsellor, a model of priestly culture and demeanour and a loyal and generous friend. His death caused widespread regret. For a long period he suffered from heart trouble, and his activities were, in consequence, much hampered, but he was able to continue in office to the end of his life. Death came to him whilst he was discharging the duty of issuing a certificate in the Presbytery at Denny on the 13th April 1928.

The funeral took place on the following Tuesday. Requiem Mass was celebrated in St. Alexander's, Denny, by the Right Rev. Mgr. Mullan, V.G., in the presence of the Bishop-Auxiliary of Edinburgh, the Archbishop of Glasgow, a large number of clergy from all parts of the country, and a vast congregation of mourners. The Rev. Dr Walsh, Grangemouth, preached the panegyric. The remains are interred in the Old Cemetery, Stirling.

Pray for the soul of the **REV. EDWARD IGNATIUS MILEY**, who died at Edinburgh on the 7th June 1928, in the 55th year of his age and the 31st of his priesthood.

The Rev. Edward Ignatius Miley was born at Edinburgh on the 30th December 1873. In his fourteenth year he entered Blairs College, Aberdeen, to begin his studies for the ecclesiastical career, and, five years later, was transferred to the Scots College, Rome. He received the tonsure in 1893, minor orders in 1894, the subdiaconate on the 19th September 1897, and was ordained deacon on the 1st November following. He was raised to the priesthood in the Lateran Basilica by Mgr. Casetta on the 19th December 1897, and the following June, on the completion of the usual course of studies in preparation for the priesthood, returned to Scotland. He was appointed Assistant priest at Dunfermline, and, in this capacity, showed admirable zeal and energy. In 1901 he was given charge of Linlithgow. Subsequently he was appointed to Whitburn in 1912, Balerno in 1916, and Bonnybridge in 1922. In the mission of Bonnybridge he was instrumental in

having the presbytery improved, and in building a Church, parochial hall, and school. Father Miley was of an active, energetic disposition, and endowed with great mental qualities. He had a singular fascination of manner, and was a most interesting raconteur and conversationalist. Until a year or so before his death he seemed to possess a robust constitution, but of late his health had obviously become impaired. He was able to continue the exercise of his duties to within four days of his death. On Sunday the 3rd June it was seen that he was seriously ill, and, on the following Wednesday, he was removed to St Raphael's Nursing Home in Edinburgh. His death occurred there on Thursday the 7th June 1928. The remains were taken to Bonnybridge on the following Saturday, and, on Monday, Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated in St Joseph's Church by the Right Rev. Mgr. Miley, brother of the deceased. The panegyric was preached by the Rev. Francis Maenanus, Stirling. At the internment, which took place at Mount Vernon, Edinburgh, the prayers were read by Mgr. Miley.

Pray for the soul of the Right Rev. Mgr. JAMES CANON M'GREGOR, who died at Blairs College on the 10th February 1928, in the 68th year of his age and the 45th of his priesthood.

The Right Rev. Monsignor James Canon M'Gregor was born at Keith on the 4th April 1860. He entered Blairs College in 1873 and after the usual course of preparatory studies went to the Scots College, Rome. In May 1883 he was ordained by Cardinal Monaco, and on his return to Scotland was appointed curate at St Mary's Cathedral, Aberdeen. From 1891 to 1895 he was in charge of the mission at Dufftown and on the death of Mgr. Stopani returned to the Cathedral as Administrator. In 1899 he succeeded the late Bishop Chisholm in the Rectorship of Blairs College, and this responsible post he held till failing health forced him to resign it a few days before his death on the 10th February 1928.

During that long space of almost thirty years Blairs was blessed in having such a patient, wise and zealous priest to guide its destinies. It was a period of great development. Of the present stately pile of buildings only a small part existed when Mgr. M'Gregor was placed in charge of the College; the church, the noble tower and the whole front were built during his Rectorship. In that period the number of students had increased from between 70 and 80 to 160. New class-rooms, new dormitories and, above all, a new study-room were urgently needed for their accommodation, and almost the last active work of Mgr. M'Gregor was to superintend the building of this new wing and to see the students settled in their present comfortable quarters.

His whole heart and mind were centred in Blairs. He loved it as a man loves his own home. From a long association of thirty years he had come to know every stone of Church and College, the condition of every wall and fence and farm-steading, the age, it might almost be said, of every tree. He used to say, with a twinkle in his eye, that the nicest view he saw during his annual holiday was the first glimpse of Blair's grey tower that greeted him as he drove homeward along the Deeside road. His chief concern, however, during all those years was the spiritual welfare and the health and bodily comfort of the students. There must now be close on 200 priests in Scotland, who had the happiness of spending the first few years of their student life under his fatherly care, and it will assuredly be as a father that they will continue to remember him. His piety was simple, solid and manly. By nature he was kind and gentle, courteous and affable, serious and dignified; and these qualities became more and more pronounced with the passing of the years. He could be strict without being severe. He knew how to give a reprimand that left no sting behind it; his last word was always a word of encouragement.

Each new generation of students found him more and more easy of approach, and young and old consulted him about everything, from difficulties about their vocation down to the latest remedy for toothache. They never felt, because he never showed them, that they were staying too long or intruding on his valuable time; he seemed to be always at their service, always ready with a word of sympathy or good advice. He really loved to have the students around him and it was no uncommon sight to see him standing in the centre of a group of boys from the beginning to the end of a long recreation. He had a ready and receptive mind, a tenacious memory, and a fluency of speech that was quite remarkable, so that it only needed an adroit question from a knowing student to draw forth a flood of delightful talk—reminiscences, anecdotes, pawky humour, descriptions of life in the many foreign cities and countries he had visited. The bell for the end of recreation always found the tale but half told and the scene a thousand miles away from Scotland. Then it was a joke for both the talker and his audience to discover how it all began. No one ever knew. The story has often been told of how two students, greatly daring, went up to his room one day to ask for a holiday. They entered nervously and, feeling rather embarrassed at the kindly welcome they received, began to stammer forth disconnected words about "play-day" and "good weather." Before they knew it they found themselves listening to a discourse on the weather of Scotland, England and Ireland. Then they were across the Channel basking in the warm rays of a southern sun, shivering in a sirocco, tracing the devastating effects of a hail-storm on

an Italian vineyard and watching the sheet-lightning as it played over the Roman Campagna. It was instructive, it was thrilling even, but they listened with divided attention for their thoughts were with their fellow-students downstairs who were anxiously awaiting their return. When at last they came out of the Rector's room each looked a question at the other: "Is it Yes or No?" Neither of them knew. It was a delicate situation. They could not go back; they had to go down to the study-room and say something. Like sensible boys they resolved to give themselves the benefit of the doubt, so they made it a play-day and a play-day it was. But they kept out of the Rector's way for some time after, for one of them was not sure he was right and the other was afraid he was wrong.

How happy would Mgr. M'Gregor have been to live to a ripe old age amid the quiet scenes he loved so well. But God saw fit to take him to his reward as soon as his work was done. He had the extraordinary grace of a last illness that was fraught with no pain, only a deep lassitude that ended in a quiet sleep.

His mortal remains lie in the little cemetery at Blairs, within sound of the Mass-bell, and between those two great benefactors of the College, Bishop Chisholm and Mgr. Lennon. They laboured to raise the splendid material edifice; he laboured to raise the spiritual edifice that cannot be seen by the eyes of men, for it is deep in the hearts of those whose first steps towards the Altar of God were guided by his fatherly hand. May he rest in peace.

Pray for the soul of the REV. WALTER L. M'HARDY, who died at Ballater on the 10th March 1928, in the 41st year of his age and the 16th of his priesthood.

The Rev. Walter L. M'Hardy was born at Braemar on the 29th February 1888. He studied at Blairs College, Aberdeen and the Scots College, Rome, and was ordained priest on the 10th August 1912. His first appointment was to the Cathedral, Aberdeen, whence, after less than two years as curate, he was placed in charge of the mission of Inverurie, and, in 1920, was transferred to Chapelton, Glenlivet. A victim during his whole career as a priest of continual ill-health, it was thought that his native air of Deeside might suit him, and, in 1925 he was placed at Ballater. For a time he seemed to improve, but an attack of influenza was followed by a sudden collapse, and he died on the 10th March 1928, fortified by the rites of the Church. The Requiem at Ballater on the 13th March was followed by the funeral to Braemar, and was attended by many of the clergy of the diocese and elsewhere. The Very Rev. Canon Mackenzie, Braemar, was celebrant of the Mass and officiated at the interment.

Pray for the soul of the **RIGHT REV. MGR. JOHN PROVOST M'INTOSH**, who died at Elgin on the 12th May 1928, in the 72nd year of his age and the 48th of his priesthood.

The Right Rev. Mgr. John Provost M'Intosh was born in the parish of Boharn on the 22nd June 1856. He was educated at Blairs College, Aberdeen, and the Scots College, Valladolid, Spain. On the completion of the usual course of study in preparation for the priesthood in June 1879 he returned to Scotland and was ordained in the Cathedral, Aberdeen, on the 22nd of the same month. After serving for a few months at Fochabers he was appointed curate at the Cathedral and remained there till 1886, when he was given charge of the mission of Peterhead. Four years later, in 1890, he was transferred to Buckie, which was to be the scene of his labours for the long period of thirty-seven years. In 1911 he became a Canon, and, in 1918, was elected Provost of the Cathedral Chapter of Aberdeen. Finally, in 1923, to the gratification of his many friends, His Holiness the Pope conferred on him the dignity of Domestic Prelate.

Towards the end of 1927 Mgr. M'Intosh was compelled by ill-health to retire from active service, and went to reside in Elgin. He did not long survive his retiral, and died on the 12th May 1928, fortified by the rites of the Church. The funeral took place four days later; Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated in St Sylvester's, Elgin, and the panegyric preached by the Very Rev. Canon Thomson, Peterhead, a classmate and lifelong friend of the deceased. The remains are interred in the ancient cemetery of St Ninian in the Enzie. At the interment a great concourse of Catholics and non-Catholics from Buckie and the surrounding district was assembled to pay a last tribute of respect to their father and friend.

Of a singularly gentle and kind nature, Mgr. M'Intosh during his long priestly career, endeared himself to all who knew him and the affection and respect of his own flock were shared by many outside that body. This was made evident on many occasions, and more especially on his retirement, when glowing tributes were paid to him by many who had worked with him on public boards and had learned to appreciate and revere him.

Pray for the soul of the **REV. DAVID ROBERTSON**, who died at Edinburgh, on the 29th February 1928, in the 61st year of his age and the 33rd of his priesthood.

The Rev. David Robertson was born in Banffshire on the 14th December 1867. He received his ecclesiastical education in Blairs College, Aberdeen and the Scots College, Rome. He was ordained priest in Rome in 1895 and, on his return to Scotland, was appointed assistant priest at Falkirk. He also served in the

same capacity at Stirling and later had charge successively of the missions of Jedburgh, Dunfermline and Lennoxton. In 1924 his health began to fail and he was appointed to the less arduous mission of Selkirk, where he continued, despite ill-health, to perform the duties of his office during the next four years. In the beginning of 1928 he became seriously ill and was removed to St. Raphael's Nursing Home, Edinburgh. His death occurred there on the 29th February 1928.

The funeral took place on the following Saturday. Requiem Mass was celebrated in St Mary's Cathedral, Edinburgh, by the Rev. J. Stuart, Dundee, in presence of the Bishop-Auxiliary of Edinburgh, and many of the deceased's colleagues and friends. The Rev. J. L. Stuart, D.D., West Calder, preached the panegyric.

In the history of Father Robertson's life there is nothing of what the world esteems of outstanding historical import; his record is rather one of faithful, unostentatious service in the discharge of the manifold duties of a missionary priest and of zealous interest in the welfare of the flock entrusted to his care. Of a generous, impulsive nature, Father Robertson was direct in speech and action; but if he "cared not for any man," yet "he knew no guile," and had but one aim and ambition—to further the cause to which he had dedicated in all simplicity and whole-heartedness, his life and his strength. His manner may at times have seemed somewhat brusque and masterful, but his earnestness was so apparent and his single-mindedness so manifest that none took offence, and all realised that "out of the fullness of the heart the mouth speaketh." In the various missions in which he laboured the deceased has left the cherished memory of a revered pastor. By the public with whom he came in contact he was regarded as a man of God, a straightforward defender of Catholic interests and an open-hearted friend. By his clerical brethren he was held in honour for his earnestness, devotion to duty, genuine, unobtrusive piety and priestly demeanour.

Pray for the soul of the REV. JOSEPH LEO SIEGER, who died at Glasgow, on the 8th February 1928, in the 49th year of his age and the 22nd of his priesthood.

The Rev. Joseph Leo Sieger was born at Greenock on the 13th April 1879. He entered Blairs College in September 1894, and, six years later, was transferred to St Peter's College, Bearsden. On the completion there of the usual course of studies he was raised to the priesthood in St Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow, by the late Archbishop Maguire, on the 9th June 1906. After his ordination he was stationed at St Mary's, Paisley, but, owing to ill-health, had to be relieved for a short period of all missionary work. He soon recovered and was appointed to the mission of Hamilton, where he was destined to spend the next fourteen years

of his life. In 1922 he was given charge of the mission of Dalry and Kilwinning. Of seemingly strong constitution, he gave the impression of being in the enjoyment of radiant good health, but early in 1927 an illness overtook him and, as he did not seem to be recovering, his superiors deemed it best to have him removed to a nursing home. A course of treatment therein brought him relief and he was declared convalescent, but, unhappily, the first time he ventured out of doors a relapse occurred, and death supervened on the 8th February 1928. The funeral took place on the following Saturday. Requiem Mass being celebrated in St Mary's Patrick Street, Greenock.

"Father Sieger," writes a friend who knew him well, "was of a bright, cheerful disposition, never without a smile and ever ready with a merry quip. The most difficult situations were met by him with a kindly joke that put all parties in good-humour and dispelled many a prejudice. His genial and kindly mien won many a strayed soul back to the path of duty and a long list of converts testifies to the effectiveness of his simplicity of manner. Behind it there was a sterling, personal holiness and an earnest zeal. One thing he did dislike—discussion without action—he believed in getting things done and left it to others to appraise his deeds. His record is that of a simple-hearted, kindly priest, faithful in the discharge of his duty and eager for the welfare of the flock of Christ."

Pray for the soul of the Most Rev. JAMES AUGUSTINE SMITH, Archbishop of St Andrews and Edinburgh, who died at Edinburgh on the 25th of November 1928, in the 88th year of his age, the 63rd of his priesthood, and the 39th of his episcopate.

The Most Rev. James Augustine Smith was born at Edinburgh on the 18th October 1841. From Holyrood School in Carfrae's Entry, Canongate, he passed to Wellburn Academy, Lochee, in October 1853, and the following August entered the ecclesiastical College at Blairs, Kincardineshire, to commence his studies for the priesthood. In October 1858 he was transferred to the Scots College, Rome, and in due course received the tonsure, minor orders and the subdiaconate. On the 18th March 1866 he was ordained deacon, and on the 31st of the same month raised to the priesthood by Cardinal Patrizi. He returned to Scotland in the early part of the following November and was stationed as assistant priest in St. Mary's, Dundee.

On the 22nd February 1867 he was appointed professor at Blairs College—a post for which he was admirably fitted by his deep knowledge of the classical languages. He remained in Blairs for over twenty-three years and, during that long period,

won the universal esteem and affection of many generations of students. His merits were recognised by his ecclesiastical superiors, and on the erection of the Cathedral Chapter of St Andrews and Edinburgh on the 23rd December 1885 he was nominated Canon Theologian. During this period of his life he acted from 1872 to 1890 as Compiler of the Scottish Ordo and Editor of the Catholic Directory for Scotland—a work in which he showed remarkable editorial comprehensiveness and accuracy. In 1890 he was chosen by the Holy See to fill the vacancy in the Diocese of Dunkeld, and on the 28th October of that year, he was consecrated in St Andrew's Pro-Cathedral, Dundee. He first took up residence in St John's Presbytery, Perth, but later transferred to Dundee where an episcopal residence had been procured through the generosity of the faithful of the Diocese. He continued to preside over the destinies of Dunkeld for a period of ten years, during which time great progress was made under his vigilant care and kindly influence. New missions were opened, new schools and halls built, older churches, schools and presbyteries improved and embellished, and Catholic interests in general furthered and consolidated.

On the 30th August 1900 Bishop Smith was translated from Dunkeld to the Metropolitan See of St Andrews and Edinburgh—a dignity for which he was eminently suited by his gifts of character and by his culture, zeal and administrative experience. Results equally fruitful attended his efforts in this wider sphere; a considerable expansion of Catholic activities was effected, a large number of new missions were established and vast improvements made in the ecclesiastical buildings within the territory of his jurisdiction. His kindness of manner won him the loyalty of his priests and the affectionate esteem of his flock. He was a popular prelate, admired by those with whom he came in contact for his scholarly attainments and beloved for his simplicity of character and genial personality. On the occasion of the jubilee of his priesthood in 1916 he was made the recipient of a presentation by the clergy of his See, entertained to a public luncheon at which the Lord Provost of Edinburgh presided, and congratulated at a public demonstration in the Usher Hall by the late Lord Skerrington, in the name of the Catholics and citizens of Edinburgh.

In 1916 the burden of years had begun to tell on his strength and he was reluctantly compelled to apply for assistance in the discharge of his heavy episcopal duties. A bishop-auxiliary was appointed to assist in the administration and to him the venerable prelate relinquished all Diocesan duties. In later years his health gradually declined and he was afflicted with a long lingering illness which he bore with edifying patience and resignation. His condition became critical in the third week of November 1928, the Last Sacraments were administered and the Archbishop

passed peacefully from this life on Sunday the 25th November 1928 in the episcopal residence at Greenhill Gardens, Edinburgh.

The remains were taken to St. Mary's Cathedral and large numbers of the faithful visited the church to pay their last tribute of homage to their beloved pastor and pray for the repose of his soul. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated on the following Thursday, the celebrant being the Right Rev. the Bishop of Galloway. Amongst those present at the obsequies were the Most Rev. the Archbishop of Glasgow, the Right Rev. the Bishops of Galloway, Dunkeld, Aberdeen and *Tipasa*; a large number of secular priests from all parts of Scotland, representative of Religious Orders and Communities, Catholic Societies and Associations and of various public bodies. The panegyric was preached by the Right Rev. Bishop Toner. At the conclusion the Absolutions were pronounced by the Bishops and the body was then lowered into the vault beneath the sanctuary.

ST MARY'S COLLEGE BLAIRS

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Extra-mural Professor

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THE main object of this College is to educate and train for the Priesthood those who may feel themselves called to dedicate themselves to God and the salvation of souls as Clergymen on the Scottish Mission. To this object all its funds are applied.

The requisite outfit comprises two suits of tweed of the pattern known as parson grey (small boys may come in knickerbockers), two pairs of strong shoes, one pair of light shoes for Sanctuary, one pair slippers, the usual underclothing for day and night use, flannels, stockings and towels, a warm overcoat for winter. The Course of Education comprises all that is usually taught in Colleges.

Students will not be admitted before their twelfth year. They must bring with them a certificate showing that they have satisfactorily stood an examination in religious and secular knowledge equivalent to that required in the Highest Grade of an Elementary School. The time of entry is early in August—the exact date being fixed in June—and all students must be in the College on the day appointed. The greatest care is taken of their health; strict attention is paid to their comfort, and they are attended by a Medical Gentleman as often as occasion may require.

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
